


(L to R) Officers Thomas Knowles, Thomas Schrieber, and David Camic take the oath before Mayor Homola as new police officers of the Village.

Three More Officers Join Police Force

On July 11, 1977 three new police officers were sworn in by Mayor Robert J. Homola. They are Thomas Knowles, Thomas Schrieber and David Camic.

Tom Knowles had expressed previous interest in law enforcement, having studied many courses in this field at Triton College.

Tom Schrieber received his Bachelor's degree in Political Science from Illinois State University in June, 1976, and is currently pursuing graduate work at Roosevelt University.

David Camic has attended both the College of Dupage and the University of Illinois at Chicago where he has majored in criminal justice.

All three officers are currently taking a ten week course in basic law enforcement at the Chicago Police Academy. Each will then intern with an experienced Bloomingdale police officer for four weeks prior to being assigned field duties.

With the addition of officers Knowles, Schrieber and Camic, Police Chief McMahon feels that the department can better deal with the expanding village population and the resulting increase in calls for service.

From The Mayor's Desk

Dear Bloomingdale Residents:

The Village of Bloomingdale is growing in size and stature. The size is quite evident because we can ask for a census and stand by and be counted. The growth in stature is just a little more intangible.

One of the ways we grow in stature is in how we use the personal assets we as a Village possess. Again, the material things can be counted. However, I believe Bloomingdale's greatest potential is in its people.

Our Village Board is highly aware of this potential also, and is not just sitting idly by and letting things happen by chance. Just a short time ago, we attained the tremendous population figure of 5,000. For Bloomingdale, that was a traumatic occasion. The days of running the Village by the "seat of our pants" was gone. Your Village is meeting that challenge with positive action.

The Village Board, of course, has created a Plan Commission, Zoning Board of Appeals, Police Pension Board and Fire and Police Commission. They are important and necessary.

Your Village Board has gone beyond the necessities, We have an Architectural Advisory Committee, a very important Economic Development Commission, a fine Library Board, a Public Relations Committee and a new Youth Commission. All of these astute organizations require capable people from our Village to serve and provide us with the expertise that is there, and must be utilized.

The Village Board has taken another positive giant step in our future planning. We won't have to wonder if we can do this or if we can do that. The Board has created a Capital Improvements Commission whose basic function will be to advise the Village Board on basic priorities for capital improvements, and just as important, to suggest means of attaining those goals.

The Commission was created by ordinance 77-42 and the document can be obtained and-or read at the Village Hall. The Commission requires nine (9) members from the general public. We are interested in you and hope you are interested in this new challenge.

We are asking that you submit a resume to be considered on this Commission. Please submit them, in writing, addressed to the Mayor and-or the Village Board of Trustees. This is a non-partisan endeavor and through your cooperation, the entire Village Board will be involved in the final selection of the nine (9) members.

With your capable expertise, the Village again will achieve "Growth with Pride."

Recreational Vehicle Hearing

On July 19th the Village Plan Commission held open hearings to discuss the amendment to the Zoning Ordinance regarding the location and storage of recreational vehicles. In essence the ordinance would restrict the storing of a travel trailer or boat on a trailer in a residential area if the trailer or boat was more than 10 feet high, 18 feet long or 8 feet wide. After listening to comments from several citizens opposing the amendment, the Plan Commission tabled further discussion until the next pulic hearing to be held on September 20, 1977 at 8 p.m. in the Village Hall.

Garage Sale Signs

Planning a garage sale this fall? Be careful where you put the signs to advertise your sale. The Public Works Department will remove all signs which are placed on Village property. This includes parkways, median strips, as well as sign posts and utility poles. Signs of this type may be placed only on private property.

kitchen, because refreshments will be sold throughout the festival. Italian sausage sandwiches, hot dogs, popcorn, Italian ice and soft drinks will be served, so plan on spending the day!

All proceeds from the Festival of Arts will be donated to the Bloomingdale Park District.

Heavy Traffic

To determine whether or not additional traffic signals are required, the Village conducted traffic surveys on several key roads during June and July. Normal weekend traffic on Lake Stret averaged 32,000 vehicles in a 24-hour period; rush hours counts were as high as 3400 vehicles in a 60-minute period. Even on Sunday traffic courts often exceeded 25,000 vehicles per day. Bloomingdale Road is also carrying an increasing volume with nearly 15,000 vehicles per day passing the new Village Hall.

Urban Progress

At the meeting of the Bloomingdale Village Board on August 8th final plans were submitted by Urban Investment for low rise multi-family apartments and single family homes. Before these plans are approved a Traffic Study must be completed. Later on this year Urban Investment will be submitting final plans for the proposed sixplexes. This development located at the west end of Indian Lakes Golf Course will have an estimated 178 single family homes, 91 apartments and 88 sixplexes.

New Special Traffic Unit

On July 19, 1977, the Village received a grant from the Illinois Department of Transportation's Traffic Safety Division to establish a Police Traffic Unit. The project authorizes the purchase of an additional patrol car, the assignment of two officers to the unit and the hiring of a records clerk to maintain more comprehensive program of traffic safety.

Chief of Police Pat McMahon feels that by zeroing in on high-accident areas, the Villge can achieve a 15 per cent reduction in the village-wide accident rate in the first year.

Chief McMahon was happy to announce that he has hired Robert LaDeur effective August 1, 1977 to coordinate the program. Bob had worked with the department during the Summer as an intern in police administration from Western State University.

The Chief's Desk

When Kirkpatrick MacMillan of Scotland invented the bicycle in 1839, he had no way of knowing the impact that his invention would have on today's society. More people are riding bicycles today for reasons of health, and transportation than ever before since its inception. But, this pleasant and healthful mode of travel has created serious traffic problems.

The interest in bicycling in conjunction with our society's growing affluence has caused a drastic increase in the number of bicycles being ridden on our streets. National accident statistics demonstrate that many of these bikes are being ridden by children who are allowed to venture forth into the streets without proper instructions relative to traffic regulations and safety precautions.

Everyone who drives a car in the State of Illinois must have a driver's license or permit, and every driver must obey the traffic laws. To ride a bicycle one needs no license, but the traffic laws still must be obeyed. Bicycle drivers, regardless of their age or whether they possess a motor vehicle operator's license, can be issued traffic citations for the violation of traffic laws.

Earlier this summer a youth was issued a citation by Bloomingdale Police Officers for failure to stop at a stop sign when he peddled past the control device and collided with an automobile passing on the cross street. Miraculously, the bicyclist was not injured very seriously; however, the damage to the two vehicles is readily seen in the accompanying photographs.

The most reasonable means of avoiding citations and accidents is the knowledge and practice of proper safety procedures. The following are rules that must be understood and followed to insure safe and enjoyable bicycling:

- 1. Avoid riding on very busy streets.
- 2. Always be sure you have a good grip on your handle bars with BOTH HANDS.
- 3. Always ride on the right side of the street, close to the curb, but watch for parked cars or people opening their car doors.
- 4. When riding with other bicyclists, always ride in SINGLE FILE. Allow a full bike's length between your bike and the one ahead of you.
- 5. Always ride YOUR bike alone. Never carry a passenger or large bundles; this throws you off balance and blocks your vision.
- ". STOP, look both directions, before entering the street from a sidewalk, driveway or alley. Remember, cars move much faster than bikes!
- 7. Obey all traffic signals and signs you see. They are for YOU as well as for all others on the streets.
- 8. NEVER hold onto any moving truck, car, motorcycle, or other vehicles allowing it to pull you along. Many bicyclists have been hurt badly, some even killed, in this manner.
- Avoid riding your bike after dark. But if you must, be sure you have proper lights and wear light colored clothing.
- 10. When approaching intersections that have no stop signs or other traffic signals, be prepared to put on the brakes at a moment's notice.
- 11. When crossing streets, with heavy traffic, stop, get off your bike, and walk it across the intersection at a crosswalk.
- 12. Let people crossing the street go first. Always slow down, or stop if necessary, to let them finish crossing.
- 13. Never "show off' while riding on the street. If you want to do "trick riding" or play games on your bike with friends, find an empty lot or area off the street entirely.



- 14. NEVER follow close to a slow moving car or truck, or try to race with them. Chances are the driver would not see you and if he had to stop in a hurry, you might hit the back of his rehicle and could be hurt badly.
- 15. When leaving the school grounds on your bike, stop and look both ways and enter traffic very carefully. The sudden rush of bicycles leaving a school grounds, going in various directions into traffic is extremely dangerous!
- So, whether you are young or mature, obey the laws; help others to know and obey the laws; and you will be safer and happier in all your bicycle riding.

A new rock group on the scene? No. but it is a new public building constructed specifically to "go to the dogs."


In the past, any time a stray dog was picked up by the Village police it was necessary to transport the dog to the county animal shelter in Wheaton for temporary retention. Sparing an officer and a unit from the Village could be critical.

A new temporary shelter, designed by Gene Woerhle of our Public Works Department, has been constructed adjacent to the Public Works building on Glen Ellyn Rd. The structure has four individually heated kennels complete with separate fenced-in runs exceeding 15 feet. Flooring is concrete to facilitate propercleaning.

According to Public Works Director Bob Mundo, the shelter meets all requirements established by the State Department of Agriculture. The shelter is not built for long-term retention as most people who lose their dogs contact the Police Department within 24 hours regarding their missing pet.

Street Foreman Gene Woerhle, will be personally responsible for the maintenance of the new shelter he designed. Expenses for upkeep of the shelter will be met through fines for recovery of the pets.

We can now say that the dogs have a place in our village.

Mailing Facilitates Purchase Of Vehicle Stickers

On October 15th the Village of Bloomingdale will mail out to residents applications for vehicle stickers, dog tags, and bicycle tags. Fee schedules and self-addressed envelopes will be included in the mailings, so that residents can return their completed applications and checks or money orders to the Village. When the Village receives the completed applications and fees, it will then mail the requested tags to the resident. This process will greatly facilitate the purchasing of tags for both the Village and the citizens. Applications which are not immediately returned should be retained by the applicant - it is important that he have the application when purchasing tags.

When registering a dog for the first time, the application and fee should be accompanied by the dog's rabies vaccination certificate. Dog tags are valid one year from the last date or purchase.

Vehicle and bicycle stickers go on sale over the counter at the Village Hall on December 1st and must be applied by midnight February 15th, 1978.

The Plan Commission

Assisting the Mayor and Village Board are several commissions. Some of these are required by Illinois law; others are established by Village ordinance. This issue we are highlighting the Village Plan Commission.

Composed of nine members appointed by the mayor with the approval of the Village Board, each member serves a term of seven years. The commission elects its own chairman.

The primary responsibilities of the Plan Commission are:

- 1. To be the public hearing body for annexations, zoning changes, special use of land and amendments to the Village Zoning Ordinance.
- 2. To assure that legal requirements of State statutes and Village zoning ordinances have been complied with regarding notices of public hearings and actions of the Plan Commission.
- 3. To recommend to the Village Board a course of action through Findings of Fact on all public hearings.
- 4. To recommend to the Village Board any public hearing required for changes in the Zoning Ordinance.
- 5. To protect and promote the public health, safety, comfort, morale, convenience and general welfare of the citizens of Bloomingdale.

Playing a vital role in their deliberations is the Village Planner, Allen Kracower. Most recently Mr. Kracower was responsible for the development of the Old Town concept, funded by a federal grant.

In addition to Old Town several current projects occupy the Plan Commission. These include the Urban Annexation Agreement and subsequent development of that area; a zoning ordinance amendment regarding outside storage of recreational vehicles, and the establishment of an agricultural zoning classification.

The Plan Commission meets on the first and third Tuesday of each month at 8 p.m. at the Village Hall. All meetings are open and the public is invited to attend. Special hearings are also called and are announced through appropriate media and correspondence to affected parties.




