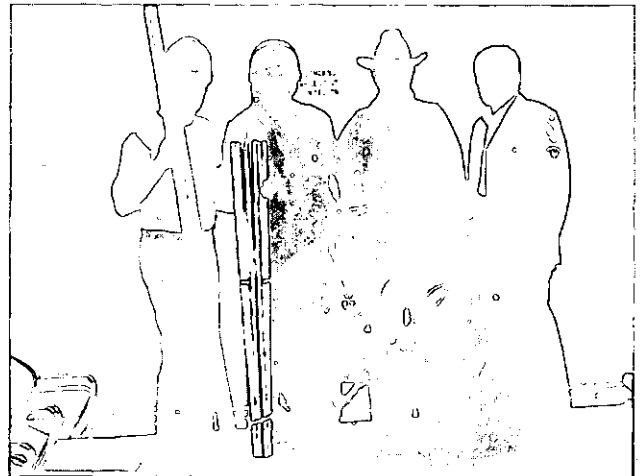
Dinner, from hors d' oeuvres through dessert, will feature roast prime filet of beef as the entree. Wine donated by Cribari Winery will be served with dinner.

In addition to the open auction there will be a silent auction. Closed bids will be taken on these (35 at press time) from 7 to 10 PM and the highest bid will be accepted. A number of unusual and innovative items can also be found here valued from \$25 to \$150.

Another highlight of this memorable event is the limited participation raffle available only to those in attendance. First prize is an original watercolor by world renown Cathy Bouchard (see related article this issue) valued at \$2000. FUNDS FOR OLD TOWN?

The Village has filed a preliminary application for \$412,500.00 of Community Development Block Grant funds through DuPage County. These funds are to be used for further development of our Old Town District. Three projects are included in the application: purchase of land and construction of a 100 car municipal parking lot west of Third Street near Lake Street; an updating of the Old Town Plan originally done in 1975; and street improvements on Third Street from Lake Street to Schick Road, including paving, curbs, drainage and lighting.

The total estimated cost of these projects is \$442,500.00, and the Village has allocated \$30,000.00 as our share of the parking lot project.

NOTICE

The Village, on April 29, 1982, received from the Illinois Pollution Control Board, a Variance from the barium standards which is valid until January 1, 1984. The average content of barium in water produced by Well No. 8, is 2.8 mg/1. There is no evidence that this concentration presents a threat to the health of water consumers.

LAKE PARK HIGHLIGHTS

- Enrollment has increased to 2,602 students this year at Lake Park High School District 108. Officials say enrollment will stay near this level for a few more years.
- Bloomingdale's Philip Richards was among 10 Lake Park seniors who received letters of commendation for high performances in the national Merit Scholarship program. Three other seniors have been named semi-finalists and have a chance to win \$1,000 scholarships.
- The district saved more than \$54,000 in utility expenses thanks to the first-year operation of an energy management system at West Campus.
- English teachers are participating in the Illinois Writing Project in a continual effort to improve student writing skills.
- Computer classrooms are in place at each campus and students are learning technological skills for home, college and the marketplace.

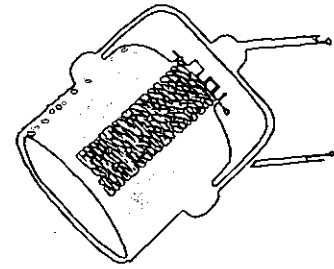

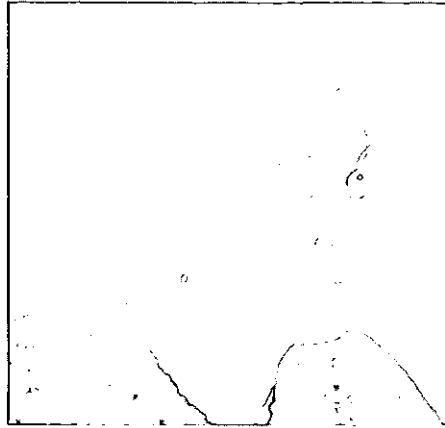
SPOTLIGHT

It's that ability to work with people and the desire to stand up to represent her community that led Mary Lou to run for office. She says she doesn't mind being the only woman



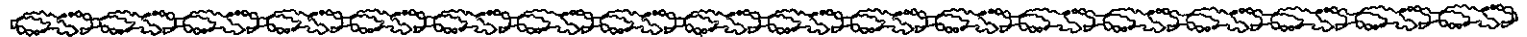
on the Board. Perhaps it's her independent streak which gives her the confidence she displays.

"Keep Brenda Smiling"

Brenda Johnson's bright smile wins many hearts. She is one of the 100 patients at Marklund Home who are suffering from mental retardation. Brenda almost drowned in a neighborhood pool in Plainfield, Illinois on an August day in 1978. Although she was saved, the deprivation of oxygen caused permanent and irreversible brain damage.

In 1970 the Knights of Columbus in Tinley Park decided to do something for the mentally retarded. They started a charity drive held on Halloween weekend to raise funds for these children. They chose Tootsie Rolls, the unique children's candy treat, as a giveaway in return for contributions.

Since that time over seven million dollars has been raised; the program is now going in forty states throughout the country. Last year in Illinois alone over one million dollars was raised for this worthy cause. More importantly, 90% of the net proceeds from the drive remain in the local communities. Last year the Knights of Columbus gave \$1,000 to the Marklund Home and almost \$700 to the Bartlett Learning Care Center.

This year the Knights, their families and friends will be out "shaking their cans" on Halloween weekend to raise funds for these kids.

On the 4th of August Governor James Thompson signed a proclamation declaring October 29th and 30th as HELP RETARDED CITIZENS DAY in Illinois.

In his proclamation Thompson stated "Last fall, the Knights raised over one million dollars which was distributed to nearly 300 organizations devoted to assisting those with mental handicaps."

But what do proclamations, statistics and numbers of people mean to Brenda Johnson? If you are a parent with healthy, happy kids, think of those children like her who will probably never reach the age of 18. (According to Marklund Administrator Pat Pearce, 80% of her residents do not survive past 18 years of age.)

This Halloween let's put real meaning into the children's plea, "Help the Poor", and I am sure that somehow, some way Brenda will know and she will keep smiling.

BLOOMINGDALE RESIDENT OF INTERNATIONAL ACCLAIM

Internationally acclaimed artist Cathy J. Bouchard, recently featured at Art Expo Cal '81 in San Francisco and Art Expo N.Y. '82 at the New York Coliseum, following a European exhibition tour including Newgate Gallery - London, the Innes Art Gallery - Edinburgh, Scotland, and International Spring Fairs '82 in both Birmingham, England and Frankfurt, Germany, has become not only one of this country's leading fine artists, but also has an extensive following in Europe.

As a resident of Bloomingdale, Bouchard has donated an original watercolor painting entitled "Canyon Mesa", valued at \$2000 to the October 16, 1982 Dinner/Auction fundraiser for the Bloomingdale Sesquicentennial. The painting cannot be purchased; it is, in fact, the first prize in a raffle to be conducted at the Dinner/Auction at Stratford Square.

Born and raised in the Chicago area, Ms. Bouchard, a totally self-taught watercolorist, has exhibited in numerous annual Chicago area art shows since 1970. She has to her credit over 100 awards and honors, a magazine cover, and on occasion personally appears at a select few locals including Gold Coast Art Show and Oak Brook Fine Arts Promenade.

Her travels have taken her from the



East Coast to the West Coast, but a special stop happens to be Denver, Colorado where she lived and painted for nearly five years. Her unique watercolor and oil style has been greatly influenced by exposure to the grandeur of the beautiful and vast landscaping of the West.

Cathy J. Bouchard originals have become a permanent part of numerous corporate collections throughout the country including Allstate, McDonald's, Prudential and United Airlines. Bouchard lithographs can also be seen on over 15 television programs and TV commercials nationwide.

Ms. Bouchard has resided in Bloomingdale for one and a half years with her two daughters, Jennifer and Melissa, and her husband/manager Dr. Robert B. Schwieger. Man Of The Year

George's drive, enthusiasm and strong personality, coupled with the full support of his family, turned a mere concept into a reality. So the Italian-American Boxing Hall of Fame came into being.

Soon it became apparent the Boxing name was too limited. In order to honor all athletes, the name was changed to The Italian-American Sports Hall of Fame. George Randazzo now serves as the President.

College-Without-Walls

DuPage Open College, a new college-without-walls of the College of DuPage, is expanding its services to the local community through the courtesy of the new Glenside Public Library, located on Fullerton Avenue at President Street in Glendale Heights.

The library has leased the entire

mezzanine to the college. The space will be used to provide both credit and non-credit courses, seminars and workshops, as well as courses with flexible options for adults in reading, writing, computational and study skills. 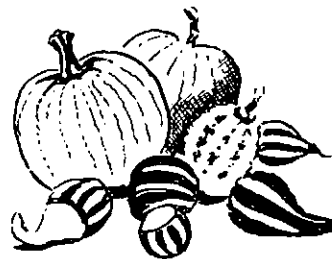

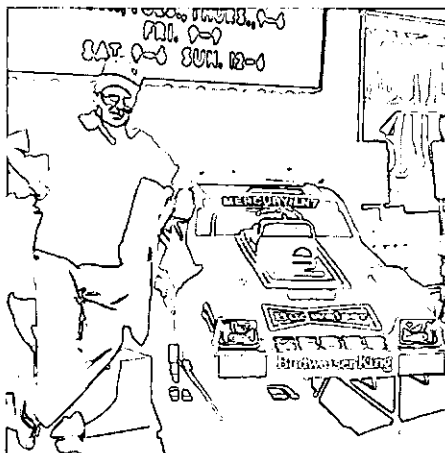

Activities planned for later in the fall season include "A Women's Guide to Care and Feeding of the Auto" on November 4th and a Christmas Party on December 2nd.

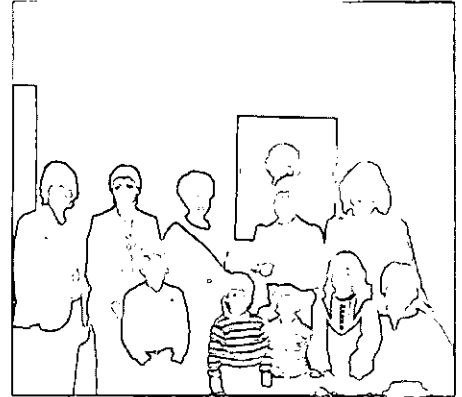

DISTRICT 13 NEWS

by Brandt G. Crocker, Superintendent School District #13

As anticipated, enrollment this year is down. 1262 students are registered, 32 less than last year. Individual school enrollments are: Central 271, DuJardin 500, Westfield 491. Class size is an average of 22 students per teacher. Each classroom also has the part-time services of an instructional aide.

Every instructional aide is a fully certified teacher. Why do we hire certified teachers as aides? First, there are more teachers today than there are jobs. Second, by hiring teachers as aides, the aide is fully qualified to step in as a substitute when the regular classroom teacher is absent, resulting in a smooth transition for the student and staff. When openings do occur on the staff, we have a group of qualified people to consider for teaching positions along with new applicants.

Since our district does not negotiate contracts with a teachers' union, you may wonder how grievances and concerns are dealt with. Through our Professional Relations' Council made up of the superintendent, assistant superintendents, building principals and two elected representatives from each building, we discuss teacher benefits, Board of Education policies, teacher evaluation procedures and anything else that is of concern to our staff.

We invite you to walk through our schools and observe the many changes over the summer. At Westfield, some of the open-space areas have had walls installed to cut down on distractions for students and teachers; shower and locker rooms have new tile floors, and a discipline center has been constructed. With so many parents working, the school can better deal with behavior problems using in-school suspensions, rather than sending students out of school for varying lengths of time. At Central, lockers look like

new after electrostatic painting, and new carpeting has been added to stairwells and the office. Several classrooms and washrooms were repainted. DuJardin School, with the cooperation of parent labor and some PTO money added to district funds, has been provided with a completely refurbished kitchen and teacher lounge. Special thanks go to John Armstrong, Ken Hulata, Jim Korbecki, John Feterici, Russ Kosey, Jeanette Schuerr, Carmen Parrilli, Frank Stagno. Cooperative efforts with the Village provided DuJardin with a newly surfaced parking lot. Park District cooperation has furnished more asphalt area at Westfield.

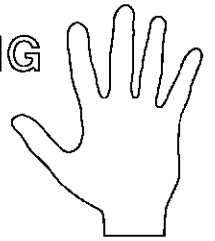
