11th Annual Septemberfest

COME ONE, COME ALL to the 11th Annual Septemberfest on September 11 (rain date September 18) from 11:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M. in Old Town (Lake St. and Bloomingdale Rd.).


This year's festivities will kick off with a Founders' Festival Parade beginning at 9:00 A.M. from Springbrook Shopping Center parking lot. The official opening ceremony will begin at 12:00 noon on the stage located behind the Park District Museum. Part of this ceremony will include the crowning of the Septemberfest Queen.

The annual end of the summer celebration will include numerous booths sponsored by local organizations, food, games, entertainment and antiques. This year, once again, there will be craft booths along Third Street.

There will be a show by the Park District's gymnastic team, "The Beamers" and the Park District Museum will be open from 11 - 6 with the "Art on a String" kite exhibit. In addition, the Skyliners, kite enthusiasts from Chicago, will be on hand giving kite demonstrations. Across the street the Post Office will be open from 12 - 4 with commemorative stamps and

Among the children's attractions are: a Moon Walk sponsored by Incarnation Church; helium balloons from the Chamber of Commerce; a gold fish game sponsored by Boy Scout Troop #457 and various games run by four Camp Fire groups. **MEMORIAL
PLAQUE
REDEDICATED**

On May 30, 1948, the Village of Bloomingdale dedicated a plaque to those men from Bloomingdale who lost their lives during World War II, Alfred Koehn and Roy Fuller. The bronze plaque was placed on the flagpole outside the old Village Hall, 108 W. Lake Street, and remained there until the new Village Hall was built on its present site. At the time of the move the plaque was taken off the pole and placed in the Village vault for safekeeping.

Recently, the plaque was chemically cleaned and restored to its original condition. On July 4th during the Country Fair flag ceremony this memorial plaque was rededicated "...to the memory of those two fine men and to all those who have laid down their lives to protect our freedom."

The plaque is currently at the Village Hall where it will be kept until it can be permanently mounted in a place of honor in the soon-to-be constructed Founders' Park.

NOTICE

A concentration of barium in the drinking water of the Village of Bloomingdale presently exceeds the 1.0 mg/1 allowable concentration set by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency. The Village, on April 29, 1982, received from the Illinois Pollution Control Board, a Variance from the barium standards which is valid until January 1, 1984. The average content of barium in water produced by Well No. 8, is 2.8 mg/1. There is no evidence that this concentration presents a threat to the health of water consumers.

FALL TREE PLANTING PROGRAM

The Village Board has provided up to \$10,000.00 of expenditures to fund this year's Parkway Tree Program. As done last year, the Village will share in 50% of the cost, with the property owners paying the other half.

The following are details on the program:

1. Trees will be furnished and planted during the fall by a contractor hired by the Village.
2. The program is for parkway trees only, not for private property. In areas without curbs or sidewalks, the trees will be planted *about* 15 feet from the street.
3. Trees will be guaranteed for one year. Care instructions will be furnished.
4. Some locations may not be eligible based on safety reasons.
5. A limit of 2 trees per parcel frontage is standard. Corner lots may have up to 4 total.
6. Requests will be handled based on the date received.
7. The program also will be available to other public jurisdictions and commercial properties, with residential areas having first priority, and commercial the lowest priority.
8. The total cost of each tree is *estimated* to be \$80.00 or \$90.00, so the property owners share should be \$40 - \$45.00.

Interested persons should fill out the form provided and send it to the Public Works Department at the Village Hall.

Bloomingdale State Bank, in cooperation with Alexian Brothers Medical Center, has scheduled the Medical Center's COMMUNICARE EXPRESS for two dates at the Main Bank location.

The COMMUNICARE EXPRESS is a mobile, health screening van that is equipped to provide a wide variety of tests for residents of the community. The van will be available at Bloomingdale State Bank, 114-118 E. Lake Street, on Monday, August 15 between 10 A.M. and 2 P.M., and again on Friday, August 19 between noon and 6 P.M.

Blood pressure screening and counseling will be free. In addition, hearing, vision, pulmonary function, and anemia testing will be available for nominal fees. The tests are administered by trained, registered nurses. Test results will be explained to each participant by the nurse. No appointments are necessary.



Trustee Robert Iden has been concerned with Bloomingdale both past and present ever since he and his wife Jo Ellen moved here in 1969. Iden joined the Historical Society in 1974, and served as President for two years. This concern for heritage is a part of Iden's life as he now owns Iden Co. in Elmhurst, which has been a family business since 1896. His desire to preserve the past led him to become a member of the Old Town Commission when it was formed in 1978.

While he's always been interested in historical Bloomingdale, Bob has also been a part of the future planning of the growth of the Village. He was a member of the Commercial Redevelopment Committee in 1979 when it was formed to promote commercial development along the Lake Street corridor.

As a trustee Bob was named liaison to the Economic Development Commission, out of which grew the Chamber of Commerce. He is now liaison to the Plan Commission which handles the development of the Village's comprehensive plan



and conducts public hearings on rezoning, annexations and the like. This keeps the trustee in constant touch with changes and new development in the area. His other responsibilities include the Comprehensive Planning Committee and Cable TV representative.

Iden was appointed to the Village Board in 1979 to fill a vacancy. He was then elected to a four year term in 1981. When Bob first came on the Board he was a bit overwhelmed by all the facets of running a village. But it didn't take him long to discover the similarities between watching over all aspects of a municipality and running a successful business.

In his leisure hours Bob enjoys most sports, but especially golf and tennis, interests which Jo Ellen shares. A pasttime the entire family enjoys is traveling; and now that their two daughters, Betsy and Katie are older (13 and 10, respectively), they have done some great sight-seeing throughout the U.S.

Iden maintains there is nothing that he really dislikes about being a trustee. He looks upon problems presented him as challenges. He feels the office of trustee has been a real learning experience. When he was first appointed Iden thought he'd never be comfortable getting up in front of a large group. Now he finds himself completely at ease, even chairing a difficult Board meeting. He says he's discovered the best way to learn is simply to "do it." And so he has.

DISTRICT 13 NEWS

For several months, we have been talking about the economic situation in District #13. Many District #13 residents may be assuming that the recent state tax increases passed by the Legislature and signed by the governor has solved all the district's problems. Such is not the case.

In 1982-83, we received \$615,000 in state aid. Even with the governor's new tax increase, we will receive only \$506,000 in aid this year, a decrease of \$109,000.

We have spent a considerable amount of time reviewing our 1983-84 budget for the second time. We want to be as conservative as possible in terms of expenditures without cutting programs and services to students. Thus we are cutting items from building and maintenance funds, and reducing education expenses by reducing the number of hours spent by teacher aides and substitute teachers.

We will continue our three-year energy conservation program in the school buildings, however because it saves money in the long run. We will be taking bids on electrical control work at Westfield, roof repairs at the other buildings, and major reconstruction on flashings for preventive maintenance.

In view of our projected budget deficit, our staff has been most cooperative. Not only have our teachers agreed to a delay in receiving their contracts, but they have been directly involved in the development of next year's compensation plan, so that it is mutually satisfactory to them and to the district. We are extremely fortunate in District #13 to have a teaching staff that works with the administrators.

Many of our teachers are attending workshops this summer to learn teaching techniques with the 10 new computers which our PTOs and STP have provided for the schools. They will be ready to put these new teaching tools to work when the new school year begins.

NEW BUILDING DIRECTOR NAMED

We'd like to introduce you to James Krautstrunk who was officially appointed Director of Building and Zoning by the Village Board on June 27, 1983. Jim comes to us with lots of experience in his field.

He began as a Designer/Draftsman in 1958 with the Kepler & Clark LTD Company and rapidly moved through the ranks, finally becoming their Construction Supervisor. In 1968 he joined the Village of Downers Grove as a Building Inspector and within a year was promoted to Director of Building & Zoning. It is there that Jim and his wife Gwen have made their home for the past 15 years. They have three children: Lori, 21; James, 18; and Brian, 15.

Krautstrunk's educational achievements include the Certificate of Achievement of Administrative Curriculum from the Academy for Code

Administration and Enforcement for the University of Illinois. He has also completed courses with the University of Wisconsin and Triton College in Multi-Discipline Residential Inspection.

Other experience in the building field include holding the position of Building & Zoning Commissioner with the Villages of Richton Park, Montgomery and neighboring Glendale Heights. In addition, Krautstrunk started his own construction company in Building Custom Homes in the \$80,000 to \$225,000 price range.

In his spare time Jim enjoys all kinds of outdoor activities, especially hunting, fishing, camping and golf. When relaxing indoors he likes bowling and simply spending time with Gwen.





SCHOOL BOARD ELECTIONS

DISTRICT 15 REGISTRATION

"Pet Rescue is like a lovely garden of every variety of cat and dog," says Dale D. Armon, Founder and President of Pet Rescue. "Here you can find every kind, color, age and description of pet and the most loving pets in the world to adopt. We urgently need *good* homes for them."

Most of Pet Rescue's four-footed family is up for adoption. Prospective owners are carefully screened and the best pet selected for each family. Due to space restrictions Pet Rescue is not accepting additional pets at this time, but will take a listing on additional pets for adoption and help place pets by referral when possible.

Pet Rescue's program includes phone counselling to help solve pet-related problems, education for more responsible pet owners and campaigning for low cost spay and neuter clinics. 



We are especially perturbed about certain cars racing up and down the street late Fridays and early Saturday mornings, gunning their motors, honking their horns, and on occasion, tearing up mailboxes. Could we please have some patrol to check this out?

There are five 25 MPH speed limit signs for northbound traffic and three 25 MPH speed limit signs for southbound traffic on Euclid Avenue between Lake St. and South Circle Ave. The Bloomingdale Police Department has been and will continue to monitor our streets for speeding violations, as well as other traffic violations. Extra patrol is given to an area when a problem is brought to our attention. In regards to the Euclid Ave. situation, our officers have been patrolling the area very frequently. Even with this extra patrol, the police officers cannot be in one

location for 24 hours a day since all areas of the Village must be patrolled. As with any other problem, the Police Department needs the cooperation of its citizens to apprehend certain types of violators. When a citizen hears or observes a violation occurring, he should call the police department immediately and try to get as much information about the offender(s) as possible: offender description (physical, as well as clothing description) and/or vehicle description (license plate number, color and make of the vehicle). With such information the department's efforts to apprehend and prosecute a violator will be greatly enhanced.
