THE MAYOR'S DIRECT LINE

The following is the first in a series of articles by Mayor Samuel J. Tenuto on topics relevant to the residents of Bloomingdale.

HELP US PROTECT YOU

Residential burglary, a "break-in" to your home, is the fastest growing crime in the United States. Burglary is not just a big city crime. Regardless of the neighborhood, whether a private home or an apartment, no dwelling can be considered safe. No door can be left unlocked and no family can be free of concern. It is a dangerous crime, a burglar confronted in your home could mean trouble.

Citizens have tired of living in fear and are looking for ways to protect themselves and their families. There must be closer cooperation between the police and the citizens to effectively combat the increasing crime rate.

Responding to the need to assist people in protecting themselves, the Bloomingdale Police Department has developed a Neighborhood Watch Program.

Neighborhood Watch is a program by which citizens watch each others homes and property, reporting suspicious incidents to the police, to help prevent burglaries and other crimes.

The Neighborhood Watch Program is intended to assist our residents by sharing information regarding crime prevention through a network of "block captains". The block captain would maintain a list of names, addresses, and telephone numbers of persons taking part in the program. They would be the liaison between the police and the residents. The captains would encourage the flow of information from neighbors about suspicious circumstances, coordinate home security surveys, and contact new neighbors about the program.

Awareness and involvement are the keys to a successful Neighborhood Watch Program. Residents, properly trained and directed, acting as "extra eyes and ears" for the police, can perform an invaluable service to their community.

Don't make the mistake of thinking burglary will only happen to the other guy.

THE PEOPLE'S CHOICE

At the March 12th Village Board meeting the board adopted an ordinance creating an Aesthetics Committee. The purpose of this committee is to promote awareness for an attractive community appearance of buildings, structures and landscaping in residential, commercial and public areas. It will also set up and administer an Awards Program which will recognize outstanding design and maintenance of residential, commercial and public areas and buildings.

The committee will have five members consisting of one Plan Commission member, one Old Town Commission member, one Chamber of Commerce member and two community group members or citizens. It will be their responsibility to make recommendations to the Village Board on matters pertaining to the aesthetics of Bloomingdale. The committee will meet only a few times during the Fall.

MEACHAM GROVE

The forest Preserve District of Du Page County has, over the years, purchased large areas in the northern part of our Village. These areas lie east and west of Bloomingdale Road and are known as Meacham Grove. Presently, the District is actively working on a restoration program in the eastern section. This program involves the addition of clay fill in the area by the old Krass gravel pit and what used to be a landfill.

The current restoration program was started in 1976, and the District hopes to be completed in 1987. This program is part of an overall master plan for development of this area into useable recreational and openspace, but an implementation schedule is yet to be established. Further information can be obtained through the District at 790-4900.

For persons who are new to the community or for those whose physician may have moved or passed away, Glendale Heights Community Hospital will suggest names of appropriate physicians. The referral number for this free service is 790-6355.

NO VILLAGE BRANCH PICKUP THIS YEAR

Over the past few years, the Village has picked up branches from May to October. We have found that this service we have been offering is duplicated by Glen Ellyn Disposal, as a part of the normal refuse collection. Therefore, we are reducing our expenses on this program.

According to Glen Ellyn Disposal, their guidelines for branch pickup are:

- 1. Branches must be bundled in 4-ft. lengths and each bundle should weigh less than 60 lbs.
- 2. Logs will not be picked up. (Your neighbors may want them for firewood.)
- 3. Phone calls to Glen Ellyn Disposal are not required, but are appreciated. Their telephone is 529-1076.

Should residents need further information, they should contact the Public Works Department at the Village Hall.

CABLE UPDATE

At the March 26 Village Board meeting the board agreed to send a letter to Metrovision informing them the Village feels the cable company is in breach of the Franchise Agreement.

Metrovision originally agreed that by January 1, 1984 construction would be completed to the point of allowing activation of the system and offering service to some 4,000 residents. They asked for and were granted an extension to April 1, 1984 to accomplish this. They could not meet this date either.

The Village officials feel the notice of penalties might be the only way to get Metrovision management to take notice that they are not in strict compliance with the terms of the Franchise Agreement, in terms of construction, as well as in other requirements. It is hoped Metrovision will take action in resolving these matters before further action must be taken by the Village.

No doubt you noticed all of Bloomingdale seemed to be adorned with beautiful wreaths and garland this holiday season. It would be a loss to the community if this event were to be discontinued. Each year has brought more people out to Bloomingdale to take part in the festivities.



MAILBOXES


This winter has certainly kept our public works crews busy removing the snow and ice. Hopefully, this is now behind us for several more months. Unfortunately, some of our residents experienced some damage to their mailboxes and posts due to snow removal.

In some cases, mailboxes are insecurely fastened to the post, or the post is weak. When heavy snow and ice is thrown against it, sometimes damage occurs. We cannot be responsible for this, but residents can and should take steps to protect their mailbox from this.



Sometimes, the post is located too close to the street or is leaning and our plow hits it. Since we try to clean all the way to the curb, a few mailboxes may be damaged this way.

Since many residents may not be aware, we have prepared some sketches of how mailboxes should be located. This information was provided by the Post Office. We ask residents to check their mailbox for compliance, and to relocate theirs if necessary. By doing this, and by making sure that the installation is sturdy, homeowners can reduce the likelihood of damage.

SPOTLIGHT

When you ask Trustee Biff Behr why he ran for the office of trustee, you can detect a twinkle in his eyes as he explains he wants to be mayor someday and figures this is a good stepping stone. Whether he is serious or not, (and we suspect he isn't) the fact remains that Behr doesn't fit the mold of a politician. And that, in itself, is refreshing.

In everyday life Biff is the president of Behr & Co., a local C.P.A. firm specializing in personal, professional and corporate financial planning. The firm handles tax return preparation and represents clients, if necessary, in front of the I.R.S., as well as analyzing business and individual investments and transactions to determine long-term tax and financial impact. It also develops long-term financial plans for families.

Behr's many affiliations speak to his success in his field. He is a director on the board of one of the operating banks in First Oak Brook Bancshares and a vice president and director of NRS, Inc., a company specializing in computerized accounting systems. He is also vice president and director of AUTCO, Inc., a company specializing in support services for the automobile industry.


It is this varied experience and expertise he brings to the Village serving on the DuPage Water Commission and as chairman of the Village's Finance Commission. On one hand Behr will interrupt the Village Board's progress with probing questions revealing his insight into the magnitude of the process, while on the other hand, his sometimes flippant comments serve to remind all present, we are, after all, only human.

When he seriously answers the question of why he sought public office, Behr acknowledges the posi-



tion is a challenge for him and affords him an opportunity to draw on his professional and technical expertise. But he too, as do most of the trustees, expresses a dislike for all the red tape that stands in the way of accomplishing a goal or solving a problem. He does like the fact that he has the opportunity to work with a variety of people who offer him a chance to learn new information or to expand on prior knowledge.

Trustee Behr brings a constant enthusiasm to his position, you get the feeling that he is sincerely concerned about the Village and its residents. He was attracted to Bloomingdale in 1976 because of its long history providing greater stability. "Yet, at the same time," he says "it seemed to be an area experiencing tremendous growth. It was this combination of stability, with a fresh outlook, which appealed to me then and now."



Biff is also very enthusiastic about his hobby - the restoration and collection of antique automobiles. He is a member of the Auburn/Cord/Duesenberg Club and one of the founders of the Great Lakes Region Vintage Chevrolet Club of America. Many of the vehicles he has restored are on display at museums throughout the United States. Biff is especially proud of his three cars on permanent display at Disney's EP-COT Center in Florida.

After allowing a glimpse at the sedate side of Biff Behr he can't resist adding, "When not working, or at a Village meeting or under a car, I can generally be found eating dinner at Rosati's or Carlos Sweeney's, or at Killshot looking for someone who plays racquetball as badly as I do, or at Nautilus wishing I was younger." Now where can you find another politician who would admit to that last part in print?

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LIONS HALF-A-THON

The Bloomingdale Lions Club annual Half-a-thon is scheduled for June 9, 1984 to begin at 8:30 A.M. The Lions began the Half-a-thon in 1978 as a community service to promote physical fitness in the community. The race has grown so quickly in the past few years that it has become a major run in the area. The club is expecting anywhere from 1200 to 1500 runners this year.

Hummels were first created in the early 1930's. Servicemen during WWII helped introduce the figurines to this country by sending them home as gifts from Europe. Today 90 per cent of the Hummels produced are sold in the United States.

Although many pieces increase in value over the years, Ray Wagner suggests you should always buy what you like, not necessarily what you think will grow in value. In this way each piece becomes part of you or part of the family, as happened with his collection. The same holds true for collector plates, he says. Two of the several series available are Norman Rockwell and Gone With the Wind.

Whether you are an avid collector or just a beginner you will be impressed with how knowledgable and helpful the people at the Cove are when it comes to helping you select just the right item.

TEN YEAR VOLUNTEER



Bloomingdale Police Chief Gary Schira says, "Pat is a very caring conscientious person whose sincere involvement makes her a valuable member of the board."

Former Mayor Bob Homola saw all of these qualities ten years ago when Pat worked in his campaign for mayor. After his election Bob asked Pat to serve on the Police Pension Board. When asked why she has continued on the board for all these years, Pat simply states, "I enjoy the work and enjoy working with the officers."

The five person Police Pension Board's primary function is to invest funds so that the officers receive the maximum return on the money invested. There are guidelines as to what types of investments can be used, but the actual selection is made by the board. The money for this fund comes from contributions made by both the officers themselves and the Village. Another function of the board is to evaluate disability claims.




He is an active Bloomingdale Lion. as well as being involved in the Grocery Manufacturers Sales Executives and the Merchandising Executive Club.

Seventh-grade art students at Westfield judged and selected plaster sculptures with an olympic theme by their classmates to be displayed at the Roselle Library. Du-Jardin students chose a jungle fantasy theme for display at the Bloomingdale Public Library. Central students hosted their parents at evening sessions throughout the month, where they created original works of art for the home. Art in our schools is directed by Renee Cherrie at Central, Carmen Parrilli at DuJardin, and Marge Bristow at Westfield.

Rodger Himmel directs instrumental music in our district. The solo contest in March brought many first place ratings to his students, and the Westfield Jazz Band took first-place honors at Mundelein Jazz Fest.

Our students have distinguished themselves in academic areas as well. Anil Gurnaney, Westfield's entrant in the sectional spelling bee, took top honors at that meet and went on to represent Westfield at the county meet. Central's top speller was Patrick Lee, with Rachel Pope taking top honors at DuJardin.

Westfield's mathematics students took part in two competitions, one sponsored by the Illinois Mathematics League, and the other sponsored by Westfield for all students. Winners in local contests will go to compete at Lake Park and at the state level.

DuJardin's annual science fair brought many blue, red, yellow and white ribbons to students. Exhibits ranged from studies of molds in foods to solar system to space ships.

Young writers at Central and DuJardin saw some of their efforts acted out in assemblies at their schools. Rachelle Scheller and Brad Jones from DuJardin, and Jimmy Hanlon, Michele Sajdak and Nikki Darch took the honors. Certificates of Creativity were presented to 18 additional students at Central, and 17 at DuJardin.

Bloomingdale's second annual Student Government Day will be coming up on Friday, May 4. Michael Zivic, Assistant Principal at Westfield, will be directing the contest, which will select students to fill the shoes of village officials for the day.
