

The traffic problems and congestion at the intersection of Lake Street and North Circle are well known to most Village residents. Recently, Mayor Tenuto met with Senator James "Pate" Philip (23rd District) on this matter. Thanks to Sen. Philip's assistance, the direly needed traffic signals at that intersection are to become a reality.

The Illinois Department of Transportation has directed its design group to begin the plans and specifications for the traffic signals. The preliminary cost estimate is \$138,000 funded as follows: 85%, Federal funds; 10%, IDOT; 5%, Village. Our share will be approximately \$6,900. The Village will also pay energy costs and one-third of the maintenance costs.

Funds for the improvement will be allocated in the 1986-87 fiscal year. IDOT will be contracting for this work prior to June 30, 1986 and construction is projected for late summer 1986.


Wagener's educational background includes a bachelor's degree from George Williams College and a master's degree plus 30 hours from Northern Illinois University.

DISTRICT 13 NEWS "GIVING COMMUNITY SERVICE"

Our students learn in many ways, not all of them involving the traditional classroom methods of teaching. As a child grows, so does his awareness of the community which surrounds him. One of our kindergarten units involves learning about "community hlepers" such as the postman, the druggist, the firemen, the police, and so on. Children often go on field trips within the community, and begin to explore possible careers. An excellent lesson on local government takes the form of Student Career Day in the Spring.

Each of our schools has its own student council, which plans both fun and service projects on alternating months. Some of the past service projects have included raising money for the Statue of Liberty restoration, writing to overseas servicemen, making stockings for Red Cross distribution, and raising money for food drives.

At this time of year, our students often think about giving something to their community in the form of service. Last year, DuJardin raised over \$600 for a Chicago food drive, Central adopted 23 people for Christmas, and Westfield students visited nursing homes to cheer patients and bring goodies.

This year, Westfield students will again visit Applewood Manor, bringing food, decorations, songs and games for the guests. DuJardin students will collect food and other items to help stock the Bloomingdale Food Pantry, and again Central will take part in the "adopt-a-family" program.








For the 1985-86 school year the administrative staff of the Marquardt School District has identified several instructional goals in order to maintain a quality education for the students of the Marquardt School District. The goal setting process by which these goals were established involved parents, teachers, building administrators, and Board members.

These district goals include the following activities:

- Adoption of a new language arts program which will promote the development of effective writing skills at each grade level - Kindergarten through Grade 8;
- Expansion of the computer program to include the primary grade levels, emphasizing Grades 3 and 4;
- Continual inservice and grade level articulation for the newly developed social studies program;
- Implementation of a new staff development model based upon the Madeline Hunter technique which provides the basis for improved teacher skills; and
- Utilization of a new teacher evaluation system in accordance with recent legislation.

Although not an instructional goal, the importance of improved school/community relations will be emphasized during this school year. This activity is intended to provide better communication with the general public regarding all the activities and accomplishments of the Marquardt school system.

In addition, energy conservation and the financial operation of the school district will be addressed. In the area of energy conservation it is our hope to reduce energy costs while providing a healthy and comfortable atmosphere in which students can learn. Financially, it is the District's goal to provide the best education for its students at the most reasonable cost to the taxpayer.

 Lastly, to keep pace with the everchanging educational scene, a districtwide committee composed of parents and teachers will be established for the purpose of addressing new state mandates, facility utilization, and the effect of projected enrollments on our educational program.

With the successful completion of these goals, the educational program of the Marquardt School District will better prepare its students to achieve their learning potential.

FOCUS ON HEALTH

On November 20, the day before the Great American Smokeout, the Blooming-dale unit of the American Cancer Society, in conjunction with Glendale Heights Community Hospital, sponsored a free computerized health appraisal screening at Westlake Townhome Owners Association Clubhouse.

The screening was designed to provide a well-rounded approach to help residents focus on a healthier life. Visitors to the clubhouse answered a short questionnaire and had their blood pressure taken. The information was then fed into a computer and a health age and longevity appraisal was received.

The information on the appraisal included one's: health age, projected remaining years of life, health score (from the number of good health practices being followed) and health recommendations. Both smokers and non-smokers found the screening informative and beneficial.

The event was part of the Bloomingdale unit's continuing program to help residents focus toward a healthier life.

NOTABLE NEIGHBOR

Bloomingdale resident Bill Parry went to the depths of the Atlantic Ocean and across the countryside of Wales in search of history and found his family too.

Parry remembers sitting on his grandfather's knee as a small boy hearing the stories about the great sea disasters like the sinkings of the Titantic and the Lusitania. He also recalls his grandmother saying that his great uncle Tom Evans was the helmsman on the Lusitania.

During the past ten years Bill, like his grandfather, enjoyed reading books about the ships which sailed the seas during the golden age of trans-Atlantic travel. He found that the first class passengers traveled like royalty with all the finest foods, wines and other delicacies. In addition, the state rooms and main lounges were designed and decorated to the extent that a king would feel right at home. It seemed like no matter what the wants or whims of any passenger, the ship's stewards could fill the exact need.

Conversely, the third class passengers and those in the steerage section traveled with only the barest of necessities. In most cases these people were the poor who were going to America to escape the harsh conditions and little work that prevailed in England. Everything they owned could be and was packed in a single piece of luggage.

The more Bill read the more fascinated he became with not only the ships, but the passengers as well.

About a year ago while doing research on the Titanic, he found a reference that helmsmen were rated above regular seamen. With little to go on except his grandmother's convictions, the name Tom Evans and his uncle's birthplace, Parkgate, Wales, Bill went to the Bloomingdale Public Library to read all their material available on the Lusitania. Not only was the library personnel able to give him a computer printout of all the available books, but one of the employees said she had some relatives living in the town where many of the Lusitania dead were buried.

Remembering some of the stories his grandmother had told him now frustrated Bill in that he wished he would have paid more attention to the details about his Uncle Tom. Then one day he found a book which listed a Tom Evans as the helmsman on duty just before the torpedo struck that tragic day of May 17, 1915.

Bill's next step was to contact a Titanic Historical Society member from New York who had done research on the crew of the

Lusitania. To his disappointment, the member's list had no information about Helmsman Tom Evans. However, since this list did not include the entire crew, the New Yorker suggested Bill write the Registrar of Shipping in Cardiff, Wales.

Just a few months ago the Registrar's office wrote back that they did indeed list a Thomas Evans, born in Parkgate, as being on the Lusitania when it went down. Bill's grandmother had been right. Now after some 70 years have passed, an official copy of Tom Evans' death certificate finally laid to rest all speculation about the fate of Uncle Tom.

It is to the memory of his uncle that Parry dedicated an exhibit containing items related to the sinkings of the Lusitania and the Titantic. The exhibit was on display at the Bloomingdale Public Library this summer and fall.

Once Bill learned the technique of tracing and verifying information, he wondered if he could trace other ancestors. To his surprise and excitement, he has been able to go all the way back to the year 1066 and the Normans.

Most relatives were traced to Wales where they toiled as soldiers, fishermen, sailors and tavern owners. Family Bibles, manuscripts and birth certificates were primary sources for information. The occupation of both mother and father were required to fill out birth certificates and other church documents. Since most of his family lived in the same region of Wales, it was a matter of reading extensive, well maintained church records. In addition, family members were more than willing to share old family documents and recollections which could be traced.

As he went back through family history, Bill found men who distinguished themselves on the field of battle. In the early 1800's another relative owned Sawyer's Arms Pub where he smuggled rum to avoid paying taxes. In 1750 another great uncle, Maurice Evans, sailed clipper ships to the East for spices and other merchandise.
