

TRIMMING OF PARKWAY TREES

Some of our residents have indicated a concern over the appearance of certain parkway trees. Typically, these parkway trees are located in an area between the sidewalk and the curb, and this is on Village property. While these trees are technically on Village property, it is important to recognize the need for each homeowner and/or business to give these trees the same amount of attention as they do the lawn areas in these parkways and other trees on their property.

The parkway trees need periodic pruning to keep the branches from overhanging sidewalks and presenting a problem for pedestrians. Also, the trees need to have periodic feeding with available commercial fertilizers such as tree stakes, as well as periodic watering to help the tree grow and be resistant to disease.

The Village could institute an extensive program for the care and feeding and pruning of all of these parkway trees. However, with the cooperation of each of our residents, such expense is unnecessary. There are apparently some communities which prohibit residents or private property owners from tampering with the parkway trees. It is our belief that, if properly done, there will be an improvement to the appearance of the trees and no damage will occur.

If residents desire further information they may contact the Public Works Superintendent at the Village Hall during normal business hours.



KUDOS FOR DETECTIVE SCHREIBER

Some overdue recognition goes to Bloomingdale Police Detective Tom Schrieber who was honored in April by the Addison Police and Fire Merit Review Board.

The Detective Supervisor received an official commendation for assisting the Addison Police Department with a conspiracy to commit armed robbery and murder case.

The suspects were taken in on weapon charges and refused to give their story to anyone but Schrieber as he had had previous dealings with them. Upon formal request of the Addison Police Department through the Bloomingdale Department, the detective came out in the middle of the night from his home to interrogate a number of persons.

As a result of his questioning, Schrieber was able to secure confessions from the suspects implicating them in a plot to rob and kill another subject residing in Addison. According to Police Chief Gary J. Schira, "It is indeed gratifying to know that the performance and abilities of our police department personnel, such as Detective Schrieber, are held in high regard by our peers. This is just one example of the excellent relationship we enjoy with other law enforcement agencies."

The Addison Police and Fire Merit Review Board is a non-profit organization made up of civic organizations and businesses in Addison. Some 400 people attended the dinner at which Schrieber and others were honored for their commendable actions.

GRANTS FOR LOCAL PROGRAMMING

The Northern DuPage Cable Television Agency (NORDCAT) is announcing a grant program to help foster local programming within the Consortium area.

15 YEARS IN THE P.D.

RADON

Two of our police department personnel have recently celebrated the 15 year mark with the Bloomingdale Police Department. Both officers began working on the same day, Corporal Larson at 8 A.M. and Commander Raney at Noon.

A lifelong resident of DuPage County, **Shilora Larson** joined the Bloomingdale Police Department on July 16, 1971 as the department's first female officer. She came from the Glendale Heights Police Department where she was a dispatcher.

Approximately four years later she became one of the first female police officers in DuPage County to be assigned to regular patrol duties. From January, 1980 through April, 1983 Shilora was in charge of the Support Services Division. She was reassigned to the Patrol Division in November, 1983.

Since September, 1984 she has been serving as one of the three corporals in the department. She has also been a department juvenile officer for much of her career.

Shilora and her husband Bob have lived in Bloomingdale for the past nine years. They are both very active in the Order of the Eastern Star, as well as serving as adult advisors for a Job's Daughters chapter.

David Raney joined the Bloomingdale Police Department on July 16, 1971 as the department's first radio dispatcher. He became a police officer in August, 1972. He was promoted to sergeant in August, 1976 and to the position of commander in April, 1983. He is currently serving as Commander of the Administrative Services Division.

David attended Northwestern University during the turbulent late 60's and credits the cool heads of the Evanston Police Department during that time period with initially attracting him into law enforcement. He is a graduate of the 134th session of the FBI National Academy, getting straight A's while attending.

David has been married for 11 years to Marian Raney and has two children, Brian, age 5 and Sarah, Age 2. The Raneys recently moved to Glen Ellyn after living the previous eight years in Hoffman Estates.

David is a Past Master of his Masonic Lodge in Elmhurst and is also currently serving as president of the Board of Trustees of the Church of the Cross, Presbyterian in Hoffman Estates. Based on recent reports which were carried in the local news, the Village has purchased a number of test kits to determine levels of radon in a small number of homes in Bloomingdale. Other states have noted high Radon levels also, and quite a bit of publicity has been made about it.

WHAT IS RADON AND WHERE DOES IT COME FROM?

Radon is a radioactive gas and occurs naturally due to the breakdown of various radioactive elements such as uranium, thorium and radium. It is at present, at small, unharmful levels in all the air we breathe. Outside air dilutes the radon to safe levels, but it can accumulate in airtight homes to levels which can be harmful, depending on many factors.

AT WHAT LEVELS IS IT HARMFUL?

The Environmental Protection Agency has said that levels over four (4) picocuries per liter of air is hazardous. This has been compared to causing the same cancer risk as smoking four cigarettes a day. According to one study, the average level in North American homes is one (1) picocurie per liter.

WHAT IS BEING DONE ABOUT RADON?


Much of the publicity has related to the lack of information and definitive studies so far. This is changing now and a number of State and Federal agencies are allocating additional funds for further research to be done over the next few years.

WHERE CAN I GET FURTHER INFORMATION ON TEST KITS AND OVERCOMING THE PROBLEM, IF FOUND?

The State of Illinois, Department of Nuclear Safety can be contacted at (217) 546-8100. Their mailing address is 1035 Outer Park Drive, Springfield, IL 62704. Also, you can write to the U.S. EPA, Office of Radiation Programs, 401 M. Street, S.W., Washington, D.C. 20460. Test kits generally cost between \$12 and \$65 each.

WHEN WILL THE VILLAGE BE DOING ITS TESTS?

Because of the seasons and the fact that many people have open windows, we will be delaying the program until later this year when homes are closed for better readings. Summary results will be made public.



NOTABLE NEIGHBOR Fr. John Guiney - 25 Years of Serving

Some people search the seas for treasure, some people travel the world to see the Seven Wonders, and some people climb high mountains because they are there, but this notable neighbor went to Africa and discovered that people are what are important, not material things.

On the occasion of his twenty-fifth anniversary as a Roman Catholic priest, Reverend John Guiney, S.M.A., of St. Isidore's Catholic Church, Bloomingdale, speaks of his travels and experiences.

With a strong Irish brogue and a twinkle in his eye, Father John began his life's story by telling of his childhood. Growing up on a small farm in County Tipperary, Ireland, he realized that there was not enough work to support his mother, father and seven brothers and sisters. He also found little work available in the surrounding area.

With a little money and a lot of hope he moved to America and began a new life living with his aunt in Boston. Father John graduated from Boston College with a degree in Philosophy but still did not know what to do with his life. Not until he began studies in Theology at Catholic University in Washington, D.C., did he decide that the priesthood would be his life. In 1961 Father John was ordained a priest.



As he looked to where he may be of most good, Father John felt that being a missionary in Africa would be the choice. For the next twenty years he would travel through Western Africa and the countries of Guinea and Nigeria. In many ways he found conditions similar to his native Ireland. Both areas offered little in comparison to the luxuries we enjoy in the United States, like running water, electricity, and dependable telephone service.

Many of his years were spent working with lepers. To most of their fellow countrymen, lepers are still considered outcasts, even though the disease is not contagious. Trying to help people learn to care for themselves and feed themselves became Father John's top priority. He came to realize no matter what a person's handicap, everyone could contribute something. He also found that you have to be broadminded and accept people for who they are. As a result Father John came to realize that religion is a very human experience.

In 1982 he returned to the United States and was subsequently assigned to St. Isidore's parish.

For those who know him, Father John is a very warm, understanding person. He is always willing to help those who cannot help themselves. Like working on a street corner in late October helping to raise money by selling Knights of Columbus candy for the mentally handicapped children of Marklund Home.

Then there is a side of Father Guiney which is best described by the word on his car's license plate - Gadfly. Being an instigator of controversy led him to first be dubbed this name while working along the lvory Coast in Africa.

Here in Bloomingdale we find the Gadfly at work finding ways to overcome problems by challenging people for ideas and commitments to solving those problems.

Twenty-five years of serving his fellow man, Father John Guiney is a man of the world, a man of God, and one of our Notable Neighbors.




"WAVES TO FREEDOM"

A Real Production

Do you have your copy of the commemorative book, "Waves to Freedom" yet? The books, which went on sale during Liberty Weekend, will be available at the Village Hall, Bloomingdale Library, and local businesses through October 28. At \$3.00, the book is a real bargin, and an excellent example of student effort in School District #13. All proceeds go to the Statue of Liberty Ellis Island Foundation. Printing charges, done at cost by Budde Printshop, are being paid by the school district.

The campaign to market the book has taken the form of summer school class called Ad Busters. The highlight of the student marketing efforts, under the direction of Miss Fischer and Kim Stuffelbeam, was probably the day the Chicago Tribune interviewed the class, and immediately thereafter Channel 2 arrived to do the same. The story ran on the Six O'Clock News that evening.




Channel Two news reporter Dorothy Tucker listens to one of the "Ad Busters" talk about their progress.

The project began in February, under the direction of Leslie Fischer, who heads the district's Accelerated Learning Enrichment for Cildren (ALEC) Committee. Students explored historical facts about the Statue of Liberty, and the effects of immigration on our country. Teachers incorporated the project into every subject. Mathematics classes, for instance, learned that the Lady's arm is 42 feet long, and her index finger 8 feet. Science classes studied the effects of salt water on her copper sheathing.

Students were invited to submit original stories, poems, interviews with immigrants, skits, songs and art work. A committee of judges, including Paula Luberda, Patt Korbecki, Karin Hahn, Sandy Weishaar, Diane Zysko and Miss Fischer, chose 104 pieces of student work to include in the publication. Jeff Kreml's art was chosen for the cover design, with artwork by Ginger Ingole on the back cover.

Then came the marketing campaign. Students discussed advertising strategies on a limited budget, and began to explore markets. They contacted local businesses to take books on consignment, and arranged displays at Bloomingdale Library and Village Hall. Pos-




Joey Gebis goes over the marketing strategy for the week.

SUMMER PROGRAMS SUCCESS

Students who attended summer school in Marquardt School District 15 demonstrated impressive gains in academic achievement. The three summer programs offered included Chapter I, Computer Camp and Primary Summer School.

The overall purpose of the Chapter 1 Summer School was to provide remediation in two of five basic subject areas — reading, language arts, mathematics, science and social studies — to selected students.

The program served 81 sixth, seventh and eighth graders. At its conclusion, 56 scholastic achievement awards were presented.

Another summer school program, Computer Camp offered the Apple Challenge Program. This program is a meritaward system which sets requirements for students to achieve Red and Yeliow Apple Awards. Activities included research, consultation with experts and computer use. Of 140 students participating, 28 received Red Apples for their proficiency in the area of computer education.

The district's newest summer school offering, a primary summer school program, emphasized reading and writing. Activities gave the students an opportunity to improve in areas of competency or strengthen areas of deficiency.

Students were grouped according to "at risk" or "enrichment" status by grade level. There were also activities promoting interactions between the two groups. The integrating of math, computers, science and social studies into the reading and writing experiences was accomplished when appropriate.

Writing samples from the first day and the last day of the program showed that 73 percent of the students improved their written expression. The Board of Education was pleased with the success of this year's summer program and congratulates the teaching staff on their continuing efforts to provide quality education for the Marquardt students.



DID YOU KNOW?

A Bit of Bloomingdale History

DuJardin Elementary School is named for Rosamond DuJardin, a well-known author who lived a short distance from the school on Glen Ellyn Road. She and her husband owned and sold to the school district the property on which the school building is built. Her grandchildren attended DuJardin after it was built in 1964.

Rosamond DuJardin was born Rosamond Neal on July 22, 1902 in Fairland, Illinois. When she was two, she and her family moved to Chicago where she attended school. Her family members were avid readers, enjoying everything from Shakespeare to Sherlock Holmes.

With such a prolific introduction to written material, it was perhaps natural for Rosamond to become a reporter on her high school paper. She also enjoyed writing poetry.

Upon graduation from Morgan Park High School she worked in the billing department of Charles A. Stevens. It was after her marriage to Victor DuJardin that she became a serious writer. It was Victor who encouraged her to hire household help so she would have the time to devote to writing.

Before her death in 1963, Rosamond had published 100 short stories and 21 novels. She also wrote plays for radio programs. She is probably best known, however, for her fiction for teenagers published in the 1950's and 60's. Her daughters helped her to understand teenagers' emotions and thinking processes. Local scenes were often used as settings for her books.

The Bloomingdale Public Library has ten or Mrs. DuJardin's novels on the shelves in the juvenile section. Three of the titles are *Class Ring*, *Junior Year Abroad* and *Senior Prom*.

Great News! Bloomingdale Park District baseball programs are very popular. The bad news is there is limited parking near Tompkins Park, Winston and Edgewater. The two fields there host approximately 50 families for each game scheduled, plus coaches, umpires, grandparents and friends. Why are there "no parking" signs on the east side of Winston, near Fairfield. During certain seasons baseball fields attract large volumes of people and this should be considered when making "no parking" decisions. A study should be done in order to create more parking.

We have determined over the years that the relatively high traffic volumes on Winston require controls in terms of parking. These volumes, combined with the grade kids crossing the streets, turning traffic from Edgewater and Fairfield onto Winston, are all considerations which need to be made in combination.

Neighborhood parks, such as this one, could use off-street parking but only for short time periods and usually they are cost-prohibitive especially compared in priority with other needed programs. I am forwarding a copy of your letter to Tom Lovern, Park District Director, for his response regarding the need for additional off-street parking spaces at the park.
