1986 VILLAGE STREET IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

The 1986 Street Improvement Program is currently under contract with work scheduled to begin on or about October 1 and for completion on October 31, weather permitting. In addition to the past practice of patching and overlaying the streets, the Village has contracted to "re-cycle" select streets in the Lakeshore Townhome area. The re-cycling process uses the existing road material which is ground up and replaced as the street structural base. A bituminous overlay is then placed on the base. The process is best used on streets which have deteriorated to the point that complete re-construction is required. The re-cycle process is less expensive than new construction since existing materials are re-used in the construction. The following streets are included in this year's program:

Also included in this year's program are alley improvements between Washington and Franklin, west of Bloomingdale Road. Total amount of this year's Road Improvements Budget is \$250,000.00.

FALL HYDRANT FLUSHING

It's that time of year again. Starting October 13th through October 24th, the Water Division will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village. The flushing will occur between the hours of 10 P.M. and 2 A.M. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

One question that is always asked is - Why does the Village flush hydrants? Hydrant flushing is routine maintenance for a water system. It accomplishes the following:

- 1. Improves water quality: Flushing removes minerals such as iron and magnesium that have collected in the water mains.
- 2. Improves water flow: By removing minerals, the inside diameter of a water main is increased and therefore, allows a better flow of water.
- 3. Hydrant maintenance: A fire hydrant is a mechanical device. Operation of a hydrant lubricates internal mechanisms and gaskets.
- 4. Hydrant inspection: Any deficiencies are noted and repaired as necessary to insure that each hydrant will perform when needed for an emergency.

1987 TREE PLANTING PROGRAM

The Village Board has again allocated funds for this very successful program which was started in 1982. The program provides trees, including planting, at a 50/50 cost sharing with the Village. The trees will be planted very early next Spring and are available for parkways and front yards.

The following are the guidelines of the program:

- 2. Trees will be 21/2 " caliper, unless stated otherwise.
- The Village reserves the right to disapprove requests based on conflicts, safety, or proper spacing.
- 4. Each parcel will be limited to two (2) trees. Corner lots will be allowed four (4) trees.
- 5. Participants will be given the opportunity to mark the location of the planting desired, but the Village retains the right to change, if necessary.
- 6. We anticipate the cost of the trees to be between \$200 and \$300 each, with the Village paying half of the amount.

The next time you happen to drive by Bloomingdale Church at 260 Glen Ellyn Road, take notice of the attractive 12-foot piece of art that rests on the brick front wall of the church. This colorful conversation piece was hand-drawn, routed on wood and then painted in brilliant colors by volunteers of the church.

The "people" logo incorporates a gathered mass of people to form the shape of a church topped with a cross. The insignia has been the official logo of the church since 1979, but this is the first time it has taken on such large proportions. Mrs. Rachel Yoder and several other members of the congregation dedicated much effort creating the unique visual, particularly in the laborious hours of hand-routing and handpainting.


Zachary, who has hemophilia, could need as much as \$25,000 per year to pay medical expenses. His parents do not have medical insurance to cover these potential expenses.

An artist's rendering of Incarnation Church.




HALLOWEEN PARTY




ON DISPLAY
