



THE MAYOR'S DIRECT LINE "Village Adopts \$8.3 Million Budget"

On May 11, 1987, the Village of Bloomingdale adopted its fiscal year 1987-88 budget which provided forecasted total expenditures of \$8,319,330 for all purposes. Allocated to the Corporate Fund and other small funds is \$5,472,772, while \$2,846,558 is allocated to the Water and Sewer Fund.


Included in the budget are provisions for hiring two (2) secretaries, one (1) engineering inspector, one (1) maintenance man in Public Works, and a part-time intern in the Administration Department. Major purchases include four (4) squad cars, a two-and-one-half ton dump truck, a high pressure cleaner for sewer lines, and an additional computer work station in the Police Records Division. Village service levels for activities such as street repairs, snow removal, and policing will be maintained or enhanced during this budget year.

Capital improvements total 17% of the total budget. Some of the major projects included for this year are the painting of the Winston water tower, the planting of trees along Bloomingdale Road, the continuation of sidewalks in the South Circle area leading to the Park District and the area along Schick Road leading to Westfield School and the park, construction improvements to the Colony Green ditch, and the continuation of the annual road improvement program. Money has been allocated for the continuing program for the future purchase of Lake Michigan water.


The diagrams illustrate the Village's major source of revenues and the major expenditure categories. In the expenditure side, as in the past, Police protection and major capital projects are given a very high priority. On the revenue side, the State sales tax and user charges are the largest revenue producers.

This year the Village will see an expansion of its boundaries and commercial development with the annexation of three (3) parcels of land. Also expanding are the residential areas surrounding the Stratford Square Mall. This continued growth keeps raising the Village's revenue base without raising the Municipal property tax rates.

1987 VILLAGE STREET IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM


1987 Street Improvement Program is currently under design by the Engineering Division. The list of streets below are included in this year's program.

Generally the program consists of necessary patching repairs, storm catch basin repairs, curb and gutter replacement, and the installation of a 2-inch bituminous concrete overlay.

A portion of the work is performed by Village Public Works crews, while the overlay work is performed under contract by a road contractor.

This year's program budget of \$350,000.00, includes an amount for an engineering consultant to update the Village's street condition database which is urged in part to determine candidate streets for future years programs.





COMMUNICATIONS LIFELINE FOR HEARING IMPAIRED

Citizens with hearing impairments have a unique means of communicating with the Bloomingdale Police Department and the Bloomingdale Fire Protection District. Through grants from the Illinois Department of Rehabilitation Services, both agencies have a Telecommunications Device for the Deaf, or TDD, connected to their emergency phone lines. At first glance, the machine looks similar to a miniature typewriter, but for the hearing impaired, it can mean the difference between panic and the assurance of help during an emergency. A TDD in the home or business of the hearing impaired enables those persons to "talk" to public safety dispatchers by sending printed messages over telephone lines to the TDDs at the Police and Fire Departments. Police and Fire Dispatchers are alerted to an incoming emergency TDD call by a two-tone signal. Once the dispatcher places the phone receiver into the rubber cups of the TDD, the communication line for the hearing impaired is established.

Currently, the hearing impaired must purchase TDDs at their own expense, with the cost of a unit starting at \$159.00. Recently passed Illinois legislation, however, may soon make these lifesavers available to the deaf and hearing impaired free of charge. In addition to the TDD, the Police Department has a directory of interpreters for the hearing impaired. Residents who have questions about the TDD can contact Communications Supervisor Patricia Ritter at the Bloomingdale Police Department at 529-9868 for information. TDDs are connected to the Bloomingdale Police Department Emergency phone 529-3341 and the Bloomingdale Fire Protection District Emergency phone 529-2323.

There will be many more recognitions by the time school is out and summer school has begun. Over 200 students have enrolled for our summer session.



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

FROM THE DESK OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

The Marquardt School District 15 Board of Education was presented a summary report of the 1986-87 district goals at its May 26th Discussion Meeting. This summary included, for the second consecutive year, receipt of the Certificate of Excellence in Accounting and Business Practices by our District Office. Also, Mr. Rick Finck, Business Manager, reported to the Board the successful implementation of a new computer hardware system and accompanying software. The Business Office now utilizes the Compaq 386, which incorporates three Kapro personal computers connected via an IBM network. The software purchase was arranged through Specialized Data Systems and involves payroll, accounting, personnel and student data base components.

With the adoption of the "D.C. Heath Mathematics" and "Working Words in Spelling" programs, Mrs. Norris - Curriculum Director - indicated that developing inservice programs for the teachers in these two curricular areas will be the major thrust of the 1987-88 curriculum goals. She further indicated that the music teachers will pilot a variety of music textbooks in the hope of recommending a districtwide K-8 music adoption.

An additional goal for curriculum and instruction next year would be an inservice program for the implementation of selected units in the "Health Skills for Life" program. This is the health program used in the Glenbard Associate Districts which addresses drug and sex education at all grade levels.

Mr. Sayers, Marquardt Middle School principal, indicated the completion of the job description for the consulting

teacher. This job description describes the role and subsequent responsibilities of a consulting teacher in providing assistance to a teacher under remediation. Also, Mr. Sayers indicated the recommendations of the 6th Grade Study Committee with regard to the development of a middle school program. For the 1987-88 school year this committee will continue to review the curricular and instructional framework for the incorporation of the 6th Grade into a middle school program. This study coincides with the review of preliminary plans for an addition to the Marquardt Middle School. This addition would provide for closed classrooms and support areas for the incorporation of the 6th grade into our existing junior high facility.

Mr. Wagener provided recommendations as a result of a Kindergarten/Early Childhood District Committee. This committee addressed the alternative of utilizing Craft School as a Kindergarten Center/Early Childhood Center. This report will be utilized in the evaluation of various alternatives as a result of an increasing student population.

In addition, the district administration and staff will review the standardized testing program in order to identify curricular strengths and deficiencies and, where necessary, provide supplemental materials. The purpose of this review will be the improvement of classroom teaching strategies in accordance with the newly adopted curriculum.

The district wishes to acknowledge the work of its teaching staff in the successful accomplishment of our district goals.
