



Typical Residential Tax Bill




The Village Board has abated taxes since 1979. Since 1983 over 3 million dollars of taxes have been abated.

The tax rate of .4998 for the Village portion is one of the lowest BL. TOWNSHIP (2.1%) municipal tax rates in DuPage County. It comprises only 6.15% of your total property tax bill. The pie chart below entitled "Typical Residential Tax Bill" exhibits the breakdown of property taxes.

The pie chart entitled "Village Levy" details the percentage breakdown of the portion of the tax bill entitled "Village of Bloomingdale." As you can observe from the chart approximately one-half of the property taxes levied are used to fund major projects and improvements in the Village as shown by 50.4% allocated to the Debt Service Fund. The General Corporate Fund is responsible for 18% of the levy and the Library Fund 12.4%.

WATER HEATERS

Most manufacturers of water heaters recommend that you drain off a pail of water on a frequent basis, so that excessive sedimentation is minimized or evacuated from your tank. This is a common household chore that is beneficial, but may not be widely known or practiced.

In all potable water supplies, there are minute particles that can and will settle out in your water heater. In periods of rusty water, for example, this too can settle in your tank and cause problems over several days.

Draining a pail of water from your tank on a bi-monthly basis, or even a monthly basis, can result in prolonging the life of your heater, save energy, and provide hot water with minimal impurities.

RUSTY WATER WHAT CAUSES IT TO HAPPEN AND HOW TO DEAL WITH IT

The Village carefully monitors the water supply throughout the Water Distribution System through sampling procedures to ensure a consistently high quality of water to every resident. However, there are unavoidable instances when the water supply may suddenly become "rust" colored. The "rust" color is a result of the oxidation of iron, a natural and abundant mineral found in ground well water.

Ordinarily, this iron is present in very small, unnoticeable amounts. However, whenever the water lines are disturbed due to an interruption of the normal flow of water, such as a water main break, or a hydrant suddenly being opened, a "churning" effect occurs within the line and iron which has collected in the water mains is mixed with the clear water.

Main breaks occur most often in verv cold weather and this is the usual reason the water supply may be affected during the winter months. Another cause is construction within the Village. Instances of rusty water occur due to the necessity of having to perform new connections to the existing Water Distribution System. Another cause is the opening of fire hydrants by contractors to obtain water at various construction sites. The Village strictly controls the use of hydrants to minimize the problem of disturbances to the water supply. However, it is not always possible for the Village to prevent unauthorized or incorrect use of hydrants and as a result, the occurrences of rusty water are increased.

A recent cause of rusty water was the drainage of Winston Tank for painting. Without this tank in service, the system is pressurized in a different manner which affects the flow of water and can cause temporary rusty water problems.

Although rusty water is not a health hazard, you may not desire to drink discolored water. If you are washing laundry during a time when the water flow has been disturbed, the rusty water will be drawn into your home and affect the color of your clothing, particularly white articles of clothing. The resulting staining can be very upsetting, but it might be possible to remove it through the proper use of phosphate which is available at no charge from the Village Hall. It is MOST IMPORTANT that you do not use chlorine bleach in an attempt to remove the rust stains. Chlorine bleach will permanently set the rust deposits in the fabric. It is also recommended that the clothes remain wet; certainly they should not be placedin the dryer, as stain removal is more difficult after the clothes have dried. The phosphate should be added to the filled washer in a minimal amount (1/2 cup for a small load; 3/4 cup for a full load). The effectiveness of the phosphate is actually inhibited if too much phosphate is added per load. It is also recommended that a

high sudsing, powdered detergent be used in combination with the phosphate for more complete rust removal.

The Village of Bloomingdale makes every effort to eliminate or reduce the amount of iron-related water complaints by various treatment measures before the water reaches your service line. In addition, the Village also conducts hydrant flushing operations twice a year (Spring and Fall) to clear out rust and mineral deposits which accumulate in the lines. This flushing is conducted by Village workers during the hours of 10:00 P.M. to 2:00 A.M. only to minimize rust related problems to residents as much as possible. The Village publicizes the scheduled dates flushing will be performed in each area and displays the flushing schedule on the Village marquee as well.



COMMISSION CHANGES

Stephen Delzell was recently appointed to the Plan Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals to fill the unexpired terms of Ed Walendy who resigned due to business commitments. Delzell has served on the Old Town Commission for four and one-half years, spending three and one-half years as chairman. His knowledge and past experience will prove most beneficial to the Plan Commission.

Bloomingdale Police Sergeant Len Conradi has been appointed new coordinator of the Emergency Services and Disaster Agency (ESDA) as it has been determined an "in-house" coordinator would be most beneficial to the Village. Cliff Hall, volunteer and former coordinator, will remain with ESDA as assistant coordinator.

Sam Menton and Georgette Nootens have also been appointed to ESDA. These residents expressed an interest in the agency following the recent flooding.

"MARQUARDT DISTRICT 15 STUDENTS CELEBRATE THE CONSTITUTION"

As the nation celebrated the 200th Anniversary of the signing of the Constitution, Bloomingdale elementary students who attend the Black Hawk and Winnebago Schools, participated in both class and school celebrations.

On September 16th the students from both schools listened to the various speeches from government dignitaries on our Constitution, its laws, and the branches of our federal government. These speeches were broadcast nationwide to commemorate the Constitution's signing. Later that day, students stood at attention and recited the Pledge of Allegiance with President Reagan. Following both of these broadcasts, teachers within each school took the opportunity to develop class activities and subsequent discussions centering around the significance of our Constitution and the effect that it has had on our Country.

On Thursday, September 17th, there was a celebration of red, white and blue throughout both schools by the students and teaching staff. At Black Hawk the day began with the student body outside the school observing a flag raising ceremony, reciting the Pledge of Allegiance, and singing "My Country Tis of Thee." "We the People" stickers were worn by all; pictures were taken; and class time was spent discussing our country, its early history, and our form of government.

In both schools the intermediate grades of 4-6 took the opportunity to discuss the significance of the Constitution, aided by materials supplied by various newspapers and corporations. In the primary grades students also discussed the need to understand the Constitution; however, they utilized a variety of coloring projects in order to reinforce these discussions.

During the remainder of our school year, teachers will be highlighting parts of the Constitution in our Social Studies curriculum. It is the hope of the District 15 staff that the students participating in these activities develop an appreciation of what makes America the great country that it is.

He served many positions of leadership in Troop 457 and completed a bikea-thon for the restoration of the Statue of Liberty as his Eagle service project.



She is also active in the Youth Group at St. Isidore Church and is the youngest Eucharistic Minister in the parish.







- Stress the general rules of safe trick-or-treating; and if your children are very young, accompany them.





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


