HOMEOWNER ADVISORY

During the late 1960's and early 1970's it was an industry recognized alternate to use aluminum wiring in residential construction. Under certain circumstances aluminum wiring of Type EC Grade may be unstable due to its constant contraction and expansion with heat and cold.

With this condition, the connections of the aluminum wiring at the main circuit breaker in the electrical panel and in the service meter enclosure may become loose. This can cause an electrical arc at the point of connection and burn the insulation. It is advisable that you, as homeowners, have a qualified Licensed Electrician inspect the type of wiring in your electrical circuit panel. If the wiring is aluminum, then it is necessary to check and tighten the connections in the service meter enclosure.

An alternate to periodically tightening the aluminum wiring, may be replacing the wiring with the appropriately sized copper conductor equivalent.

No permit from the Village of Bloomingdale is required as this is considered maintenance and *I* or repair work. For further information, call Daniel C. Wennerholm at 893-7000.

A DIFFERENCE BETWEEN LIFE & DEATH

Fire and emergency medical personnel require quick responses. If you ever need them to handle an emergency at your home, you want them there fast. That's why it is so important that your home be marked clearly with its appropriate address. A poorly marked home takes time to find and a delay of seconds can make a big difference between life and death. House numbers are often hidden by shrubbery or other obstacles, or they are poorly lighted, too small, too far from the street, script numbers, or too dirty or weather beaten to read. Many homes aren't marked with numbers at all. If any one of the above situations exists at your home, please correct the problem as soon as possible. Installing proper home identification, using contrasting colors, is one of the least expensive and most beneficial ways you can ensure home and family safety.

WINTER INFORMATION TO KNOW

There are still opportunities for more snowstorms this season, and there are several matters which the residents should be aware of. With the cooperation of all concerned, we can minimize the problems which may occur.

- Use extra caution when driving through intersections following a heavy snow fall. Snow is piled on cross streets when intersections are plowed. Until crews have made their final pass to completely clear the intersection, the snow piles along the curb lane may hinder visibility.
- Intersections are normally salted after snow removal operations are complete. This practice prevents salt from being plowed back up on the curb along with the snow. In cases where there are severe icing conditions, intersections and straight sections of road on hills are salted immediately.
- If you live on a dead end street or cul-de-sac, please be patient. Established priority requires that cul-de-sacs and dead end streets be plowed after major arteries and collector streets are plowed.
- Please do not attempt to stop the snow plow operators to discuss questions or problems. Such interruptions slow crews and reduce the speed of the truck and the efficiency of the snow removal operations. Drivers are instructed not to stop to talk to residents.
- If it is still snowing, or if snow is anticipated on the evening before garbage pickup day, we ask that you delay putting out your garbage for as long as possible. This will minimize the problem of garbage containers being covered by snow that is pushed against the curb by the plows. Place garbage containers on the driveway or as close to the driveway as possible. This will give the refuse collectors room to pick them up, even if they are covered with snow.
- Do not push, shovel, or blow snow onto the street. This is illegal and causes hazardous driving conditions.

PARKING RESTRICTION

It is against the law for any vehicle to be parked on any Village street within 12 hours after a snowfall of at least two inches. Illegally parked vehicles under this ordinance will be towed, and their owners will reimburse the Village for all costs or pay whatever storage fees which may result.

ROAD CONDITION INFORMATION

Several agencies offer wintertime road condition information. The Village CANNOT supply any information about state or county roads, since these roads are not plowed by the Village. We will appreciate your cooperation in calling us about Village roads only if there is a problem which you feel needs to be called to our attention. We CANNOT tell you precisely when a particular street will be plowed.

FIRE HYDRANTS

For the convenience of firefighters - if an emergency should occur (maybe at **your** address), dig a path to the fire hydrant in front of your house **from the street.** Dig out around the fire hydrant too. If firefighters can see a hydrant, they can get to it more quickly. Better yet, adopt a hydrant near your home and see that it is accessible.

MAILBOXES

The front face of your mailbox should be 8 to 12 inches **back from the curb** so it will not be damaged by a passing plow. This is especially important when snow is wet and heavy. The Village will not be responsible for damage done to mailboxes which were not in proper position.

CAUTION: MOTORISTS

Do not follow snowplows too closely. Sometimes they stop and then back up. If you're right behind one when that happens, well... Give snowplows plenty of space.

AND FINALLY

Driving on slick wintertime pavements is dangerous, even if they've been plowed. Take more time to get where you're going, begin slowing for stops sooner and, for heaven's sake, don't drink and then try to drive.

PHOTOGRAPHY EXHIBIT



The Bloomingdale Park District Museum at Old Town presents "Micky Pallas: Photographs 1945-1960" from February 20th thru March 19th. The exhibit is sponsored by the Illinois Arts Council's traveling exhibits program and is on a two-year tour throughout the state. Contained in the exhibit are 73 photographs of life in post-war America.

Mickey Pallas, who was born and raised on Chicago's west side, had always been intrigued by photography. By the mid-forties, he began to photograph weddings and union activities. KARPIEL NAMED FRIEND OF AGRICULTURE

Senator Doris Karpiel, 25th District, has been named a "Friend of Agriculture" by ACTIVATOR, Illinois Agricultural Association's political involvement fund. Illinois Agricultural Association is the statewide Farm Bureau organization.

To be named a Friend of Agriculture, a candidate must be seeking re-election to the post currently held and receive at least a 60 percent rating based on IFB's weighted voting rating system. Doris Karpiel received an 65.12 percent rating, more than the 60 percent figure required.

Karpiel supported Farm Bureau on bills involving encouraging the use of ethanol in state vehicles, the use of a corn derivative, calcum magnesium acetate, to de-ice roads, and establishment of a comprehensive groundwater protection program.

She sided with Farm Bureau in opposing one bill in which tax increases were sought without referendum.

The ACTIVATOR trustee committee in District 25 voted to select Karpiel for the Friend of Agriculture designation. The trustee committee is made up of farmers from the candidate's legislative district

Ms. Karpiel is up for re-election in 1988.

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FROM THE DESK OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

A few of the activities which added an air of excitement to the educational program of the Marquardt School District centered around the implementation of a new spelling program and the adoption of new math books for the 1987-88 school year. Also, successfully implementing new state mandates was a challenge placed before the teaching and administrative staff of our district. Last year districtwide committees composed of parents, teachers, and administrators selected D.C. Heath Mathematics and D.C. Heath Working Words in Spelling as new elements of our comprehensive curriculum. As a part of our adoption process, classroom teachers during this school year will receive inservice activities in order to successfully implement these new programs. These activities have been designed by our outside consultants.

In accordance with the mandates put forth in the reform package known as SB 730, there will be a need to identify learner objectives and provide a sufficient assessment of these specific objectives in six curricular areas. Language Arts was the first area designated, followed by Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Fine Arts, and Health / Physical Education. In April, students in grades 3, 6, and 8 will be assessed in the area of Language Arts / Reading in order to fully accommodate the prescribed state mandate in SB 730. This testing of the Language Arts learner objectives will be in addition to the district's standardized testing which usually takes place within the first two weeks of February.

In an attempt to facilitate both standardized testing and the assessment of learner objectives, three pacing programs have been placed in effect for this year in the area of Reading, Language Arts, and Mathematics. These pacing programs are designed to maximize student competency in both the skill assessment required by the state and in the mastery of the district's curricular offerings.

It is the feeling of the teaching and administrative staff that the students of District 15 are on a path to achieving excellence with a relevant curriculum for all students.



BAG-O'-BOOKS SALE



Be The Caring Type GIVE BLOOD






VILLAGERS BACK TO PARK

SCHOOL DISTRICT 13 MOVES INTO 1988

On November 9, 1987 four newly elected members were seated on the Blooming-dale Elementary School District 13 Board of Education. Incumbents Mike Hovde and Jim Korbecki were joined by new members Ron Fangusaro and Ed Levato. Carry-over members are Karen Gerovac, Paula Luberda and Sue Modica. Retiring board members Carol Ahmed and Lucille Harter were honored with resolutions of appreciation and plaques marking their service to the school district.

Also at that meeting, new officers were selected for the 1987-88 year. The new officers are as follows: President, Mike Hovde; Vice President, Sue Modica; Secretary, Jerry Gordon; S.A.S.E.D. Representative, Sue Modica; and IASB Representative, Ed Levato.

The major challenge for the Board of Education will be to plan for the students from the new housing currently under construction within the district. Over the next few years, approximately one thousand new homes will be bult within the boundaries of School District 13. During last year, the Board of Education commissioned three studies to determine the impact of the planned housing developments. The studies done by the DuPage County Planning Commission, the Illinois State Board of Education, and a private consultant from Indiana University, produced top end enrollment projections of between 1600 students and 1900 students.

The Board of Education has asked the school superintendent, Dr. Jerry Gordon, to present the results of these studies

and some possible plans for the future to various organizations and groups in the community. If you would like him to speak to your group or meet with you and a few neighbors, please give him a call at 893-9590.

Another challenge for School District 13 has been the dramatic reduction in state aid this fiscal year. In July, the Governor of Illinois seriously reduced state funds which amounted to \$200,000 to this school district. In August, the Board reduced expenditures by over \$100,000 through reductions in personnel, supplies, extracurricular activities, and other items. That still left a shortfall of almost the same amount. If that \$100,000 is not made up in additional state aid or increased local property taxes next year, even deeper cuts will have to be made.

While these two opportunities are in our future, the Board of Education can point to some excellent accomplishments. During this past summer and fall a new heating and cooling system as well as a new roof have been installed at Westfield School. At the time Westfield School was built, the district did not have the ability to raise the funds to build a new school itself. It had to ask a state agency, the Capital Development Board, to build the school and lease it back to the district. Because of the priorities of this state agency, a cheaper first dollar building was built at the expense of long-term maintenance dollars for the school district. To solve the problems caused by such decisions, the district sold bonds this past spring and began the construction.

The Board of Education recently approved a recommendation of teachers and administrators to adopt a new mathematics series which should help our students increase their achievement in this area. Also the Board has endorsed an updating of our reading curriculum which will put the teachers of the district in the forefront of reading research and instruction throughout the state.
