

NEW POST OFFICE OPENS SOON

Bloomingdale's new post office should be open for business toward the end of May, said Postmaster James Sutter. "Workers are finishing the interior and we anticipate taking possession on May 14. We'll take a week to do some preparatory work and plan to move in on Saturday, May 21."

The new post office is on the south side of Schick Road, just west of Bloomingdale Road. The new building is almost six times larger than the current structure. It has double the number of customer windows, more than double the number of lock boxes, expanded stamp vending machines and more than 10 times the parking space.

The current post office at 109 S. Bloomingdale Road was built in 1960 when Bloomingdale had fewer than 5000 residents. Our population today is about 14,000, a figure expected to double by 2005.

Hours for the new post office will remain the same as the present location. Currently the facility opens at 8:30 a.m. and closes at 5 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, and at noon on Wednesday and Saturday.

Sutter explains as soon as the budgetary crisis is over, hours will be expanded. In the meantime, for customer convenience, the Roselle Post Office remains open until 5 p.m. on Wednesdays.

There will be no interruption of service since the move will take place on a Saturday after business hours. A professional moving service has been hired.

CITIZEN INVOLVEMENT **HELPS BLOOMINGDALE POLICE** ARREST BURGLAR

Last November, residents of Westwind Townhomes on Glen Ellyn Road, Bloomingdale, were disturbed over five incidents of burglary. Working with the police, the homeowners learned about the methods used by the thief. By increasing the citizens' awareness the police were led to the identification and the arrest of the suspect.

This is an example of how the Neighborhood Watch Program can be of benefit to all Village residents. Bloomingdale Police Detective Scott Stick states that the goal of the program is to inform the residents of the crimes occurring within the Village and is not to have citizens trying to apprehend suspects or prying into the privacy of neighbors.

Under the guidance of Detective Stick, the Neighborhood Watch Program has grown from five individuals three years ago to thirty-five watch groups from all over the community. Ideally, the police department would like to see all areas of the Village become involved.


If you are not currently part of the Neighborhood Watch Group, you can help start your own group. All it takes is a few neighbors who are willing to help each other. The size of the group varies from just a few homes to an entire street.

One or more people from each group will act as a line of communication between the group and the police department. These people are called block captains.

The block captain and any other interested members of the group are encouraged to attend meetings once every other month. Basically, the meetings are used to give out crime prevention tips. In addition, information about home safety and other subjects are also covered.

In months when meetings are not scheduled, newsletters are distributed to the members of the watch group by the block captain. Although the time required to be a block captain is minimal, the results can give us a lot of satisfaction.


DISTRICT 13 NEWS by Larry Erickson, Assistant Superintendent TEACHERS GO TO SCHOOL, TOO!!

Teachers in District 13 are constantly being in-serviced to help them keep abreast of new research, laws, and state guidelines relative to education. This in-service takes place before and after school and on "special days" when children have a school holiday.

A committee of staff members guided by Dr. Cernock, Du Jardin School Principal, surveys what type of help is most needed by the teachers of the district. Survey results help them determine inservice programs for the year. During this current school year teachers have had the opportunity to participate in programs dealing with math, wellness, gifted education, drug education, study skills, and test wiseness. However, their most intensive work has taken place in the areas of reading and critical thinking. Under the direction of the District 13 Reading Coordinator Jane Vogel, the teachers in grades K-6 will have eighteen in-service sessions dealing with the teaching of reading. Teachers in grades 7 and 8 have participated in many critical thinking in-service sessions with Dr. Ed Clark of Naperville.

New state guidelines also give direction for some of the in-service programs for District 13 staff. Most recently, in cooperation with all of the school districts in the Lake Park area, teachers were inserviced on three very disturbing, yet real issues for education: AIDS, teen suicide, and child abuse. Experts on these topics were present to help our tea-

chers better understand why these things occur and how to deal with them in our school. The American Red Cross, DuPage Health Department, DuPage Medical Society, and Hanover Youth Commission, along with several private organizations in the Chicago area, furnished speakers and information to our staff, on that day.

WINNEBAGO SAFETY PATROL EARNS HONORS



This year, approximately 2,000 schools in AAA-Chicago Motor Club's 96-county Illinois and Northern Indiana Territory earned similar awards.








BLOOMINGDALE CHURCH 10TH ANNIVERSARY

Over the years the volunteer efforts of the congregation have transformed the five acre church property surrounding the buildings into a thoughtfully land-

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
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

COMMUNITY ANALYSIS

The Bloomingdale Library commenced work on its long range plan of service during a Community Analysis Committee meeting held at the library on March 2, 1988. This committee was recently formed by the library for the purpose of conducting a study of the Bloomingdale community. The information collected by the committee will provide background information for the Library Board of Trustees and staff in the writing of the library's long range plan of service. The plan needs to be completed before the library applies for the 1990 State Per Capita Grant.

Over the next several months, the committee will assess Bloomingdale in terms of its population, history, transportation, business and industry, communication media, education, adult education, recreation, organizations and groups, churches, social services, government and physical characteristics. From the research data, the committee will construct a community profile of Bloomingdale. The findings of the committee will play a key role in developing a long range plan for the library that is responsive to the current and future needs of Bloomingdale.

The committee comprised of library representatives, Mary Rodne, Cheryl Bennett and Jane Batte and community representatives, Dawn Nemec, Larry Knudsen, Leslie Zimmerman, Ronald Howe, Sr. and Marina Riemenschneider has set October as a target completion date for the community analysis.

If the book you want is unavailable when you're in the Library, you can always place a reserve on it. Just stop at the information desk and a librarian will take your name and phone number, and then call you when the book is ready for you to pick up.

Should you be looking for something the Library doesn't own, we can borrow it for you from another source. First we'll check the computer to locate the book, then arrange to have the library that owns it send it here, usually within two or three days. This service is free to Bloomingdale cardholders.

TAX FORMS

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
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
