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JULY 4TH CELEBRATION

Bloomingdale's annual 4th of July celebration is slated for Tuesday, July 4 in a NEW LOCATION. This year's festivities will take place at Lake Street and Springfield Drive.

The day's events kick off at 11 a.m. with Cooky and Wizzo from WGN TV's Bozo Show. After some on-stage hijinks, the pair will greet youngsters individually. Bring your camera.

Beginning at 1:30 p.m. and running until 4 p.m., the Master Comedy Clown troupe will entertain with magic, antics and balloons. Family games will take place 2-4 p.m.

Beginning at 3:30 p.m. The Great Pretenders present their energetic and visually exciting show. They are masters at transporting the audience back to the days of Brylcreem, 3-D movies, poodle skirts and drive-ins. Highlights of their show include tributes to The Beach Boys, The Monkees and more.

At 5:30 p.m. American English takes to the stage presenting one of the finest tribute shows to the Beatles, including imitating the vocal harmonies that popularized the Beatles. It's more than just music. The group makes the audience feel the excitement of what it was like to see the Beatles "Live."

At 7:30 festgoers will be treated to the Trent Carlini Show with the Fabulous Ambassadors. The Ambassadors were at Bloomingdale's July 4 celebration two years ago and brought the house down right before the fireworks. They're back again, this time not only with their crowd-motivating show, but also backing Europe's Number One Elvis stylist, Trent Carlini. Carlini was born in Chicago, then lived in Italy from the age of four. As a teen he formed a group which enjoyed tremendous local popularity. He went on to record a song which made it to the top of European charts.

His resemblance of Elvis and his ability to perform his songs so well, led Trent Carlini to create a tribute to Elvis as his act which was performed all over Europe. He is now considered Europe's #1 Elvis stylist.

This is the second summer this exciting, young performer has brought his magic to the U.S. audiences. His talent, charisma and energy combined with the outstanding sounds of the Fabulous Ambassadors will make this a show to long be remembered.

Games with prizes and the kiddle train will be featured during the event. Food, pop, beer and wine coolers, plus ample seating will also be offered.

The entire day will be capped off by the traditionally fabulous fireworks display sponsored by the Bloomingdale Park District. This year the fireworks will take place at Springfield Park, just adjacent to the festival site.



GRASS CLIPPINGS CAN BE HAZARDOUS

Improper storage of grass clippings can produce disastrous results... specifically, fires.

When clippings are stored and tightly sealed in garbage sacks, the grass begins to decompose causing spontaneous heat. The heat produces methane which, when elevated to a high temperature causes fire.

Fire can ignite within hours to a few days, depending on the dryness of the grass. The damage is compounded when these bags are stored in a garage or set up against the side of the house as the fire could do serious damage to the entire structure.

The Bloomingdale Fire Department recommends that bagged grass clippings be kept outside and away from any buildings. One suggestion is to leave the clipping bags left open until garbage day when the tops are rolled down and crimped for pick up.

SEPTEMBERFEST PLANS

Plans are well under way for Bloomingdale's 17th annual Septemberfest celebration, scheduled to be held Sunday, Sept. 10 from 11 a.m. - 6 p.m. in Old Town Bloomingdale. Rain date has been set for Sept. 17.

Applications for booth space are now available. Each space is 6 x 10 ft. and the space fee is \$25.00. The \$5.00 increase reflected in this year's space fee will be placed in the Septemberfest Committee's scholarship fund. Completed applications are due prior to Aug. 1. Exhibitors must provide their own tables and chairs.

After exhibitors have made \$200 in profit, a donation of 10 percent of remaining profit is to be given to the Septemberfest Committee by Nov. 1, 1989. 



DISTRICT 13 HAPPENINGS

This spring has been a very busy one for Bloomingdale Elementary School District 13. We have been developing the plans for a new school and the remodeling of two others. The Board of Education adopted a new junior high reading curriculum and approved the purchase of a microcomputer network for the junior high school. During Teacher Appreciation Week, we honored sixteen experienced employees of the District. And in May, the Board of Education discussed the possibility of selling a half acre of ground to the Village.

In March the Board of Education hired FGM/c, an architectural firm from Oak Brook, to design a new school and to remodel DuJardin School and Westfield School. During April and May, the architects met with teachers, students, parents, administrators, and the Board of Education to discuss the things that should be in the new facilities. For the last two weeks in May and the first week of June, the architects worked in the lower level of the library, drawing floor plans and elevations of the new and remodeled buildings. On June 12, the Board of Education will approve the initial plans and budget for the project. The emphasis of the process to this point has been to involve the community as much as possible.

The Task Force for the Twenty-First Century, a committee of thirty community members set the parameters for the building proposal during this past winter. During the spring the architects have been holding public meetings and have been doing the design work in the community so that all interested people can have a voice in the future of the district.

In May, the Board of Education received reports from two groups of Westfield School teachers which will lead to improvements in the educational programs at the junior high school. Seventh and eighth grade teachers, Judith Baenen and Judy Becker, presented a new literature series for reading instruction. The new textbooks published by Prentice Hall emphasize strategic reading, reinforcing the skills being taught in the elementary grades and utilizing the approach to reading instruction which research has shown is the most effective.

Also, the Board of Education has authorized the purchase of a new networked computer laboratory for Westfield School. For eight years, Westfield students have been using Commodore Sixty-Four computers to learn word processing and data base management. Those machines are now wearing out, have software limitations, and are too limited in capacity. All junior high students are required to use word processing and data base management to produce written work. To reduce frustrations of teachers and students, to provide for more adequate software, and to improve student learning, the Westfield computer teachers, Jane Gazdziak and Ken Tucker, have recommended that the district purchase an IBM Personal System/2 network of twenty-eight computers. We hope to have the new laboratory set up and running by the start of the school next fall.

During Teacher Appreciation Week, I presented length of service awards to sixteen career employees of the district. Receiving ten year awards were Ann Mariotti, Leslie Fischer, Carol Deal, Mary Grebin, Louise Caldwell, Linda O'Connor, Jerry Gordon, Diane Glen, and Deborah Bodolay. Fifteen year plaques were given to John Erickson, Janice Cernock, Rose Salemi, and Diane Duffy. Barbara Decker, Peg Muldoon, and Jane Flexman were honored for their twenty years of service to the children of Bloomingdale School District 13.

Another item of interest which the Board of Education discussed this spring is the possible sale to the Village of a half acre of the five acre Tompkins Park located at the intersection of Winston and Edgewater. The total site is currently being leased to the Bloomingdale Park District on a month-to-month basis. The Village needs this land across from the Village tower on Winston in conjunction with the Lake Michigan water system the county is developing.

The community is invited to discuss these and any other items with the superintendent, Dr. Jerry Gordon, telephone number 893-9590, or come to a Board of Education meeting. The next two meetings will be held on Monday evenings, July 24 and August 28, at 7:30 p.m. in the district offices, 181 South Bloomingdale Road, Bloomingdale.

Special congratulations go to Peg Schmuldt, DuJardin first-grade teacher. The young woman was awarded the prestigious Kohl International Teaching Award.


Her enthusiasm, commitment and unique approach to teaching have been lauded by many. The Kohl Award is given to teachers who are recognized as exceptional educators.

The Bloomingdale Public Library has over 200 magazine and newspaper titles! One of the most popular areas of the library is our growing periodical collection.

Popular magazines and newspapers are available in our browsing area. Back issues are kept for 5 years, which are shelved on the back stacks of the adult department, open for all to use. Children's magazines are kept by the windows across from the children's desk. All but the most current issue of a magazine may be checked out for 1 week. Back issues of newspapers which are kept for 1 month can be requested at the front desk for in-house use. Some of the more scholarly magazines used for research are available on microfilm which can be viewed and copied on our microfilm reader/printer located in the adult department.

Every year the library sponsors the Adopt-A-Magazine program where you can "adopt" a magazine title by donating a year's subscription. The Adopt-A-Magazine program has been a fun and successful way to expand our periodical collection. Let us know if you would like to take part!

1989 Summer Library Program

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SUPER SUMMER SAFARI

"Super Summer Safari" is the theme of the 1989 Summer Reading Program to be held at the Bloomingdale Public Library. This year's program will include a variety of activities to encourage reading for children pre-school through 8th grade.

Registration is now open for all programs, which include craft classes for ages 6-9, story times for pre-schoolers, and a special toddler time for ages 18-36 months.


Thursday is our special program day and readers this summer can be entertained at a juggling workshop, magic show, hobby day, music program, and a presentation featuring live snakes.





Bloomingdale is fortunate to have many outstanding citizens, people who are always ready to get involved, to lend a hand, to be a good neighbor. One of these neighbors, however, stands out in the crowd. He's not a big man in stature, but many will agree, Paul Paoletti may just have the biggest heart in all of Bloomingdale.

Paul and his wife Dolly have lived in Bloomingdale for 17 years and have three children, Paul 19, Gina 18, and Lisa 14. He has located his business, Paul Paoletti, Ltd. a retail menswear store here for eight years.

He is a charter member and past president of the Bloomingdale Chamber of Commerce. He also served as co-chairman for the July 4th celebration for all four years the chamber sponsored the event.

Paoletti has always been a sponsor and participant in the annual Career Day during which youngsters have an opportunity to experience a position in village government, the school district or the business community. He is a supporter of all youth programs and a sponsor for local girls' softball, football and soccer.

Marklund Children's Home, another local cause he supports, presented Paoletti with their "Friendship Award" last year. In recent recognition from the Bloomingdale Village Board, it was said, "Paul is unequaled in his love and pride of Bloomingdale as evidenced by his numerous community activities."

Twice Paoletti has been named "Man of the Year" in Bloomingdale. During the sesquicentennial celebration in 1983, he was voted to receive that honor by ballots open to all residents. In 1988 he was selected as man of the year and represented Bloomingdale at the Greater Woodfield Visitors and Convention Bureau awards.

His dedication, especially to youth, extends beyond the borders of Bloomingdale. Paoletti is very active in the National Italian-American Sports Hall of Fame. He has been on the board of directors for eight years and has served as director of the Hall of Fame's scholarship program since its inception six years ago.

In 1987 Paoletti won the "How High Can You Fly" award from the NIASHF for his

scholarship work. He also founded the Paul Paoletti Ltd. Annual Charity Golf Tournament which donates the proceeds to special education funds for Paul Filipek, a deaf student, as well as to the Hall of Fame's scholarship program.

Just last month, Paoletti was duly honored by the NIASHF by being awarded the Don Ponte "Cup of Kindness." The award was named after one of the staunchest supporters in the early years who envisioned a hall of fame to rival all others.



His dream was cut short in 1978 by his passing, but the unfinished cup that epitomizes the Don Ponte award is left partially completed to show that his memory is still kept alive by the organization. It is the highest award annually awarded by the NIASHF and Paoletti is the 11th recipient in a long line of distinguished recipients which include Jack Brickhouse and Tommy Lasorda.

It was Brickhouse, in fact, who presented the award to Paoletti. Several awards were presented that evening, but the applause for Paoletti was the longest, loudest, and most emotional ovation of the evening.

And if more people from Bloomingdale had been in the audience it would have been even more so.


FARMERS MARKET

It will be located next to the barn on Lake Street. The ample parking in Bloomingdale Old Town makes it convenient for everyone.


