17th Annual Septemberfest

Once again, Bloomingdale proudly presents its annual Septemberfest from 11 A.M. - 6 P.M. on Sunday, September 10 (rain date Sept. 17). The official festivities will begin with a balloon launch at noon across from the stage area located on Franklin Street.


Part of the opening ceremonies will be the crowning of the Bloomingdale Septemberfest Queen. All young ladies between the ages of 16 and 21 who are residents of Bloomingdale are invited to enter.



The lucky young lady and her court will receive many wonderful prizes donated by Bloomingdale merchants. Once again the official jeweler will be Lustig Jewelers of Stratford Square.

The Septemberfest celebration will include an array of booths sponsored by local organizations, featuring food and games. Italian beef and sausage, hamburgers, corn, pizza, Italian ice and taffy apples are just a few of the food items



that will be sold in food booths sponsored by local NOT-FOR-PROFIT organizations. Many fine crafts and antique booths will be located along Third Street.

Applications for these booths will be accepted until all available spaces have been filled. To date, 56 spots have been spoken for. No refunds will be made on reserved spaces after August 15. Call Vi Morrisroe, Septemberfest Commission Chairman, at 980-7723 for details.

Entertainment this year will feature a variety of local talent. The Westfield Junior High swing choir and jazz band will be performing. Other local talent will be featured in a talent contest. Local talent acts are still needed for the talent contest. Non-professional performers interested in performing should contact Joanne Horvath at 980-3873. Mike Lettieri with M & R Music will act as disc jockey.

Additional entertainment will include the Bruise Brothers; Harmony Exchange, a men's barbershop quartet; and a miniature train ride for children.

Many of the old favorites will return again this year. Several of these include the Ice Cream Social sponsored by St. Paul's Church on First Street, and the Moon Walk sponsored by the Episcopal Church of the Incarnation.

In conjunction with Septemberfest, the Bloomingdale Women's Club will be sponsoring its 17th Annual Festival of Arts in the First Chicago Bank of Du-Page parking lot. Over 100 vendors will feature fine arts and crafts, as well as refreshments. Profits from the BWC festival will go to the Bloomingdale Police Department and the Bloomingdale Fire Protection District.

For your convenience, handicapped parking will be located at Central School, which will also have parking available for the booth people, although not for the public. Lost and Found is located next to the First Aid Station in the Fire Department.

WATER SUPPLY RECEIVES AWARD

A Certificate of Commendation has been awarded to the Bloomingdale Water Supply by the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) and the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA).

"The commendation is in recognition of the Bloomingdale Water Supply's consistent maintenance of required levels of fluoride in the drinking water throughout 1988," said Dr. Bernard J. Turnock, state health director. He explained that fluoride levels of public water supplies are measured each month by IEPA and, in many communities, the levels fluctuate and do not always meet required standards.

"Compliance with the state's fluoridation law is important to the citizens of the community because of the dentalhealth benefits derived from drinking fluoridated water," Dr. Turnock said.


Bernard P. Killian, IEPA director, said, "Efforts by operators to insure proper fluoride levels in their water supplies deserve recognition. Those who benefit from the dedication of these operators should be aware of their contributions to the public's dental health."

Of a total of 1,931 public water supplies in Illinois, 1000 fluoridate the water. Only 115 earned certificates for maintaining required levels of fluoride for an entire year.

MAYOR'S DIRECT LINE

Weekend Transportation Comes to Bloomingdale Sept.

About a year ago, a group of our senior citizens came to me with a concern. Although they could depend on Dial-a-Ride service during the week, there was no public transportation service available on weekends, making it virtually impossible for many of them to shop, make appointments or visit hospitalized friends on Saturday and Sunday.

I told these residents I would research the possibilities. Working with Bloomingdale Township Supervisor Bill Kassel and Bonnie LaBarre, Transportation Manager, we have come up with a plan that will provide Dial-a-Ride service from 9 a.m. - 1 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday for all Bloomingdale residents.

The Dial-a-Ride service will transport Bloomingdale Village residents anywhere in Bloomingdale Township and include Central DuPage Hospital. Glen Oaks Medical Center (formerly Glendale Heights Hospital) falls within these boundaries. Bloomingdale Township boundaries are:

Northern — south side of Devon in Roselle

Southern — north side of North Avenue (Route 64)

Eastern — west side of Rohlwing Road (old 53)
Western — a little west of Greenbrook Plaza,

a little west of Greenbrook Plaza,
 Hanover Park and about 200 feet west of

Kuhn Road, Carol Stream

Reservations can be accepted through the week and up to one hour before the travel time, as the schedule allows by calling 893-7555. The fares are \$1.25 adults; \$.75 senior citizens, handicapped and students; children under seven years of age travel free. Trips to Central DuPage Hospital are 25¢ extra.



This weekend service is available to *Bloomingdale residents* only and is being funded by the Village of Bloomingdale. Bonnie LaBarre informs me that this is the first weekend service to be provided in all of DuPage County. We are making history here and she fully expects to be hearing from other communities as we begin our service *September*.

This intergovernmental agreement between the Village of Bloomingdale and Bloomingdale Township is good for a period of one year. At that time we will examine ridership and other aspects of the service to determine the feasibility of continuing it.

I encourage all residents who might benefit from weekend service to take advantage of this new program. I am also depending on you for feedback on the program. Blooming-dale Township will be promoting the new service through various local publications and Metrovision. For more information you may call the transportation office at 893-7555.

I want to thank the township for their cooperation in working out a feasible program for our residents. I am very pleased that Bloomingdale is in the forefront in providing this additional service for our residents.




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WATER QUALITY AND MONITORING

Recently, many questions regarding the quality of our drinking water have been asked. What used to be taken for granted has been surfacing into the limelight as a potential health risk or hazard. There have been numerous press releases that sensationalize the problems with drinking water standards, regulations, and monitoring quality. These press releases use quantitative nationwide statistics as their basis of data. While this data may be valid nationwide, it is equally important that the facts concerning your own Village-supplied drinking water supply be presented.

The Village of Bloomingdale Public Water Supply consists of well water. We have a total of five wells, three of which are deep wells (over 1400') and two shallow wells. Treatment of the water consists of chlorination for disinfection, fluoridation to prevent tooth decay, and phosphate for iron control.

The water quality is subject to the provisions of the 1986 Safe Drinking Water Act passed by Congress. The Environmental Protection Agency is responsible to enforce these provisions. In Illinois, the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency is responsible for the provisions governing public water supplies. These provisions regulate the standard of quality of the drinking water and also the monitoring of that quality. They also mandate that if a water supply violates a regulation, specific types of public notice to its water users be performed.

So what does all this mean to you, the water user? It means by law, the public owners of a water supply have a legal and moral responsibility to notify you, the customer, if a violation occurs, and what steps are being taken to correct the violation.

The Village of Bloomingdale is responsible for the operation, maintenance, and water quality monitoring of your drinking water supply. We currently conform to all of these regulations.

What are the types of water quality monitoring that are being performed for our drinking water? The monitoring can be broken down into five groups;

- 1. Bacteriological samples throughout the Village are drawn and sent to a state certified laboratory on a monthly basis. These samples are analyzed for coliform bacteria. We are required to collect fourteen samples each month from the distribution system and one from each well head providing water to the system. Additionally, each new water main added to the system is sampled before it is activated into the system. This type of sampling ensures that no bacteriological contamination is present in the system.
- 2. Inorganic/Mineral Analysis This type of sampling is required at each well head every three years, unless a violation of an MCL (Maximum Contaminant Level) exists. In 1981 we violated the MCL for barium in Well #8, through a variance we received from the I.E.P.A. In 1982 we were back in compliance with the barium MCL and since then we quarterly monitor that barium level to ensure no further violations.
- 3. Organic Chemicals Currently there are eight volatile organic chemicals (V.O.C.) MCL's. Our supply was required to collect samples for these 8 V.O.C.'s during the last quarter of 1988. These samples have been collected and confirmed that we are in compliance with the regulations. Additionally, we had analysis of 51 other V.O.C.'s (not required by E.P.A. as of this time) performed to insure the quality for future proposed regulations. V.O.C. samples must be collected every three years for our supply.
- 4. Radiation We are required to collect samples from each deep well and a distribution sample once every four years. Radium 226, 228 and gross alpha particle are analyzed. We are in conformance with these standards and will be taking new samples for these elements during this year.
- 5. Trihalomethanes We are required to sample for these compounds by 1993. These samples have been taken of our water, in coordination with I.E.P.A. during 1987-88 and we are in compliance with this regulation.

In addition to these five groups of sample types, there are various samples that we collect on a regular basis such as chlorine residuals and fluoride. These types of samples are performed to insure that our chemical treatment feeds are properly adjusted for maximum benefit and proper operation of chemical feed equipment.

These have been brief explanations of the types of samplings and water quality monitoring that are being performed on your drinking water supply in the Village of Bloomingdale. If you have any questions regarding water quality, please contact Robert C. Maguire, Utilities Supervisor, at 893-7000.



All in all, a fun day is guaranteed! So mark the date on your calendar now — September 10, 1989. We're looking forward to seeing you there!



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

PARKWAY TREE TRIMMING

Residents have recently contacted the Village in regard to trimming of parkway trees.

Recent inquiries relate to concern with low-hanging branches over sidewalks which may create potential problems for pedestrians. Some concerns are raised on larger trees which have dead limbs, or trees which have some disease or have died.

At the present time, the Village does not have the staff or equipment to perform a comprehensive tree trimming program.

Since many of our parkway trees are still relatively young and small in size, we request the assistance of the residents to keep their own parkway trees trimmed to provide for a 10-foot height at the sidewalk areas. This will efficiently resolve problems for pedestrians.





The members of the Bloomingdale Public Library's Chess Team who won first place in the Interlibrary Chess Tournament.




Bloomingdale member Matthew Croll anticipates his next move against a Poplar Creek Chess Club member.



SUCCESSFUL SUPER SUMMER SAFARI




Youngsters gingerly hold the boa constrictor brought by Robert James for Animal Encounters at the Reading Program Finale.







REYES PRODUCTIONS

Gloria Reyes, Bloomingdale resident since October 1988, has created Reyes Productions, a company which sells workshops on social etiquette for children. The workshops are called "Mini Manners" and are designed to teach children the ages of 7 and 8 the basics of manners in order to "promote positive child behavior and to help them gain self esteem and self confidence."

The workshops focus on three main types of manners: manners in the home, manners at school and with friends, and manners in public. Reyes focuses on such things as dining and telephone etiquette, sharing, learning to wait patiently, respecting others and their property, as well as dining in public, and the proper manners while attending parties.

Although Gloria deals primarily with 7 and 8 year olds, she will sometimes work with younger children. She also offers assistance to 12-14 year olds in learning social graces, where she concentrates on one's self esteem or making the best of what you have and who you are. A program developed for use in the elementary schools is also available, with the focus of the session generally decided by the principal or faculty.

The Mini Manners workshops are generally offered through libraries, Girl Scouts and other similar organizations, though private classes set up by a group of parents can be obtained. The normal charge for the workshop is \$10.00 per child, with fees for private groups set depending on the needs of the group.


The workshops generally last for 2½ hours and provide "hands on experience in such skills as eating spaghetti properly or actually writing a thank you note." The workshop is able to provide positive feedback to those attending. Gloria does recommend a repeat workshop after approximately 4 months in order to provide positive reinforcement to the children with respect to the skills covered in the original workshop.

Reyes will soon be making available a social etiquette book/kit, also entitled *Mini Manners*, which talks about manners and has information for parents. She originally developed this program through a department store in the Houston, Texas area. Gloria has a degree in home economics and has had several years of teaching experience at both the high school level and community college level. 
INDIAN LAKES NEWS

Although the Village has a program where the homeowner only pays fifty percent of the cost, their share would still be \$150,00 a tree, I hardly think it's fair that the two homeowners whose houses don't even face Edgewater Drive should be responsible for planting an entire block of trees. There seems to be an over-abundance of trees when it comes to landscaping the Village facilities. There are almost a dozen trees surrounding the small structure located at the northwest corner of Winnebago School. Trees were planted on Bloomingdale Rd. to coincide with the new sidewalk even though most of the homes had existing trees and bushes. The sewage treatment plant on Glen Ellyn Road is beautifully landscaped with bushes and trees in wooden planters and a split rail fence. Edgewater Drive is a main thoroughfare and the Village should take a little more pride in making it presentable not only for the residents but for people outside our community who use our streets to commute to work and shop. Bloomingdale is a fast growing Village with more beautiful and expensive homes being

Dear Ms. Quinlan:

Generally, our tree program is limited to requests made by residents, who agree to share in the cost for a new parkway tree or front yard tree.

These requests are handled on a firstcome, first-served basis, within a limited budget.

In regard to areas such as Edgewater Drive, where there were trees planted at one time, but have been removed over the years for some reason, our policy is to fill in these gaps when funds are remaining in the budget.

With the popularity of the program, only 20 or so trees have been planted thusly, out of 825 total.

Trees planted around the Treatment Plant or other Village facilities are funded separately and do not compete with the public streets. Also, the Bloomingdale Rd. plantings were done as a separate program to enhance the appearance of our main thoroughfare.

We will keep these areas along Edgewater and other streets on our list to fill in as funds are available in future years. Thank you for letting us know of your concern, and if I can be of further assistance, please let me know.
