VILLAGE WIDE CURBSIDE RECYCLING PROGRAM TO BEGIN IN JANUARY

The Village of Bloomingdale and the County of DuPage are working together to expand the curbside recycling program to all Village residents. The County will be purchasing the recycling bins to be used by Bloomingdale residents for this program. Each household will receive one bin to collect newspapers, aluminum and glass. This bin should be placed at the curb along with your garbage on the regularly scheduled collection day.

Bins will be distributed by Browning Ferris Industries (BFI) during December. Each bin will have a serial number and will be assigned to each home. Should you be in the pilot area at this time, you will be receiving a new County bin which will replace your three bins that were distributed last October. Information detailing the program and specifying dates of bin delivery and the first week of the recycling pick up will be sent to every home in the Village in early December.

This program will not add any cost to your current garbage bill. The Village and the County are working to keep the garbage rates down with programs like recycling and it is important that we have your participation in this effort.

HANDICAPPED PARKING CHANGES

Beginning February 1, 1990, the office of the Secretary of State will begin issuing newly designed handicapped parking cards for all new applicants. In addition, new cards will be issued to current parking card owners because the current orange cards expire June 30, 1990.

The new four-year cards, which are issued to individuals with permanent disabilities, will be white with blue lettering. The temporary parking cards will be white with red lettering.

The new cards also carry the following statement — "The Handicapped Parking Card Owner Must Present Personal Identification to Law Enforcement Upon Request." This statement was added in order to assist law enforcement agencies in curbing abuse.

In other related news, a new law becomes effective January 1, 1990 which provides municipalities the option of increasing the \$50 handicapped parking fine to \$100.

NEW FACES, NEW PLACES

Two familiar faces at the Village Hall are now residing in new offices as Village staff underwent some reorganization (See related story in Mayor's Direct Line" p. 3) recently.

Daniel C. Wennerholm, formerly Director of Community Services, has now been appointed Acting Village Administrator as 17-year Village Administrator Bob Reeves announced an earlier retirement date than expected. Reeves is remaining on as a Village Consultant through March 1990.

Former assistant Village Engineer Michael D. Marchi was appointed to the position of Director of Village Services to take Wennerholm's place.

Dan started here at Bloomingdale as Village Engineer in April 1979. It was on his first day, in fact, that the official groundbreaking ceremony for Stratford Square was held. "It was a great thing to start with a champagne breakfast," he remembers.

Stratford was just the beginning of many more projects to come for Dan, including new wells, pump station, a major expansion of the wastewater treatment plant, construction of Springfield Drive, not to mention the Lake Michigan water project and the current Building Program.

Dan says his biggest challenge in his new position is to learn the "mechanics" of the system and the nuances of the job. His future challenges will be to study and recommend improvements to the organization.

Dan admits, when he went to college, he never dreamed of being a Village Administrator. But over the years of municipal work, he has found he enjoys the administrative end actually more than the design end as an engineer. As he says, "It's been a process of evolution, with many opportunities to gain valuable experience."

Dan and his wife Richa have been residents, along with their children, Carl and Sarah, since 1982. They are active in the community and in their church. When he "used to have time" Dan enjoyed woodworking and carpentry projects.

He also played bass guitar in college as a member of a group that played in Michigan, Illinois and Wisconsin until he became a "serious" student of engineering. Those were great times, he admits, but now he's content to just listen to the music of others.

Dan feels the best quality he brings to his new position is "a cool head." He has the ability to address situations and problems without getting upset or upsetting others. He deals with things on a logical, sound basis, making sure his answers and decisions are well thought out.

Mike Marchi began working for the Village in August 1985 as our assistant Village Engineer. He and his wife Laurel moved here from Peoria at that time. They now have two youngsters, six-year old Katie and three-year old Greg.

Working along with Dan, Mike has seen many projects through. Shortly after he began here, he was tackling the expansion of our wastewater treatment plant. Other projects have included the extensions of roads, sewers, utilities and streets for our new neighborhoods.

Mike says his biggest challenge so far has been suddenly being responsible for a staff of 41 very fine employees with a wide range of personalities and experience. But, he adds, he's looking forward to meeting that challenge.

Unlike Dan, Mike finds his present position to be close to what he had hoped for in his career plans, although there is more than just engineering to his job now. There is also the public works end and the building expansion which he is enjoying.

Mike says he has an analytical approach to problem solving and reaching resolutions on issues, and that is probably the best quality he brings with him to this job. He is also a dedicated professional which is good as there are many hours involved in this position.

Mike is also the scholarship chairman for the Illinois Society of Professional Engineers - DuKane Chapter Scholarship Program which provides scholarships for high school seniors wishing to become engineers.

In whatever spare time he can find, Mike likes golf and photography. He would have really liked to have been a golf pro, he says, although the hours are probably just as bad. As for photography, he would like to get into developing his own pictures some day.

We are happy to see Dan and Mike in their new positions and look forward to working with them in these capacities.

SNOW REMOVAL OPERATIONS

With the seasonal snowfall just around the corner, the Village Services Department, Public Works Division is ready to combat snow and ice on the 100 miles of Village streets, making them safer for motorists.

When a storm begins, day or night, the Village crews are promptly mobilized and begin spreading salt. The Village initially salts all Village streets approximately 100 feet before and after each intersection. The initial salt application mitigates icing conditions contributing to more effective snow removal operations. After a 1-inch to 2-inch accumulation of snow, crews begin the snow plow operations.

Snow plow operations begin according to predetermined snow routes. These routes consist of 5 routes with 11 vehicles. Cul-de-sacs and dead ends are handled by 2 separate vehicles. These routes have been carefully designed to allow for the optimum use of the available snow plowing equipment and personnel. ALL Village owned streets will eventually be plowed, but main streets are cleared before side-streets, which are cleared before cul-de-sacs and dead ends. The rate at which the streets are cleared depend on many factors including total accumulation, type of snow (wet or powder-like), temperature and volume of traffic on streets during plow operations.

Answers to the most commonly asked questions about snow removal:

QUESTION: What are the Village of Bloomingdale's Parking Regulations when it snows?

The Village's winter parking ban takes effect after snowfalls of 2-inches or more. The ban applies to all vehicles on *any* Village owned street and is in effect for a period of 24-hours or until the streets have been cleared of snow. Residents can assist Village crews in the snow removal efforts by parking vehicles in driveways or other off-street parking areas.

QUESTION: Why does my driveway sometimes get "plowed in" when a snow plow truck passes by my house?

The Village snow plows are designed to direct the snow to the curb side of the plow blade. "Side delivery plows" are the fastest and most efficient means available to remove snowfall from the streets. As a result, snow is discharged along the length of the curb, the parkways, and the private driveway areas. The Village has thousands of private driveways abutting Village streets, the cleaning of which is the responsibility of the property owner. Manpower and equipment limitations prohibit the Village from responding to routine requests to remove snow from private driveways. Therefore, we strongly recommend you delay your schedule for clearing the driveway until the snow plows have cleaned the majority of your street. Also please remember, that Village Ordinances prohibit the DISCHARGE OF SNOW ONTO THE VILLAGE STREETS. This illegally placed snow may freeze or become compacted, creating a safety hazard for all motorists.

QUESTION: Does the Village repair my mailbox if damaged during snow plowing operations?

The Village will replace and/or reimburse a resident up to \$35.00 for a mailbox and post which is damaged as a result of the Village snow plow operations, *provided* the mailbox is installed per Village set back requirements.

If you have questions as to whether or not your mailbox is in compliance with Village requirements, you may contact the Street Division of Village Services Department or the Public Works Division at the numbers listed below.

CHRISTMAS TREE CHIPPING PROGRAM

This season the Department of Village Services - Public Works Division will collect and chip Christmas trees disposed curb side by Bloomingdale residents. This pilot program is being implemented to conserve yard waste volumes at landfills in cooperation with new State Legislation to be in full force and effect on July 1, 1990.

Residents are requested to dispose of their Christmas trees with the regular curb side collection. In an effort to reduce the volume of yard waste at the landfill, the Village has requested Browning Ferris' cooperation by not collecting Christmas trees for refuse disposal on the scheduled dates.

If the scheduled collection dates are inconvenient, residents can dispose of their trees at the Public Works Facility drop off area, at 311 Glen Ellyn Road.

In the event that snow plowing operations are in process on the scheduled collection dates, Christmas trees will be collected by Browning Ferris and disposed of for chipping at the Public Works Facility.

All Village residents are encouraged to pick up mulch generated by the Christmas tree chipping program at the Public Works Facility, 311 Glen Ellyn Road. Mulch will be available on a "first come-first serve" basis while supplies last. Questions regarding mulch availability can be answered by contacting Public Works Division secretary at 529-5865, Monday through Friday, 7:30 AM to 3:30 PM.

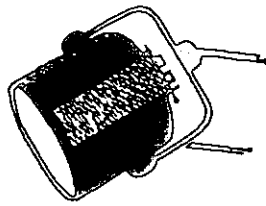

CHRISTMAS OPEN HOUSE

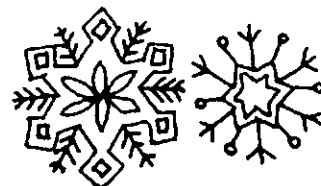

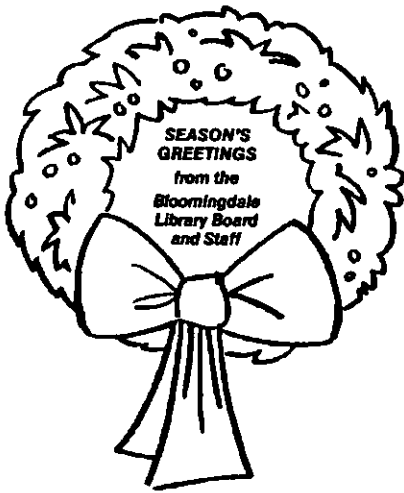

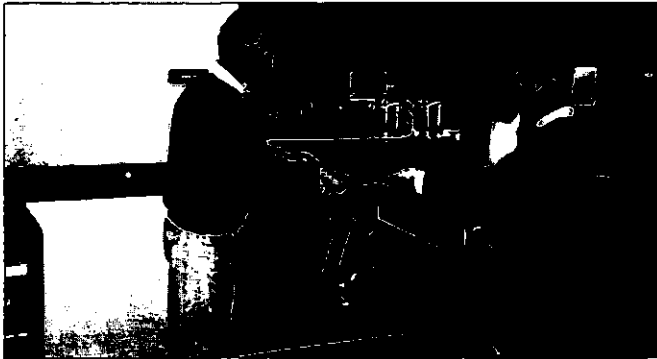


NEW IBM-COMPATIBLE PC

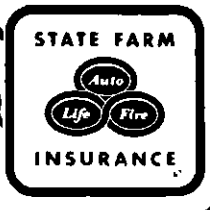
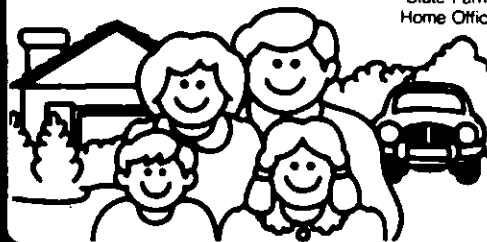
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A NEW WAY TO CHOOSE YOUR PUZZLE(S) TO CHECK OUT AND TAKE HOME!

A card file box with a picture or drawing and description of each puzzle will be kept on the Children's Reference Desk. You simply choose the ones you'd like (up to 3) and give the card(s) to the Reference Person. She will take the puzzles you want to the check-out area (just like we do with the cassettes), and they will be waiting for you when you are ready to check out.

You're probably wondering why we are making this change. You know how disappointing it is to get a puzzle home and find there are missing pieces, or that you got the wrong puzzle in the bag; perhaps you've been billed for a puzzle that you never had, because the bag belonged to a different puzzle than was actually inside. The computer only reads the zebra label — it can't count pieces or read titles. Even if the puzzles are in order when hung on the rack, they do get mixed up when they are used in the Library.

We will now have special puzzles in 2 wooden boxes to use while you're in the Library (these are not to be checked out as long as they are stored in the wooden boxes), and separate ones for you to check out and take home (these will be kept in the office). We hope that this new system will work out better for you and for us.

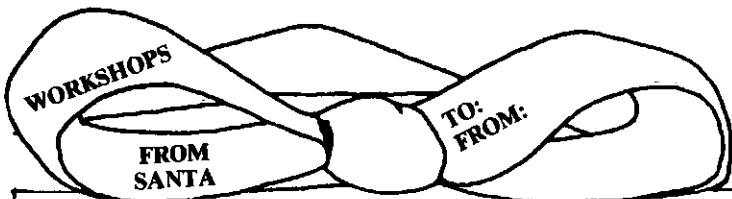

NEW VIDEO GIFT FROM THE MACARTHUR FOUNDATION

Bloomington has received 23 new and uniquely valuable videos from the Chicago-based John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation. The videos are part of The MacArthur Library, a special collection of quality film/video productions dealing with areas of MacArthur Foundation interest such as health, peace and international cooperation, and world environment and resources.

The MacArthur Library is a follow-up gift from the Foundation to the more than 2,000 public libraries that are participating in The MacArthur Library Video Classics Project. The Project enabled these libraries to obtain up to 20 popular PBS series in videocassette form at one-tenth their actual cost, or through outright grants or other assistance from the Foundation. In January 1989, the Library received the MacArthur Library Video Classics, which include classic PBS video productions such as "The Jewel in the Crown" and "Nova". The Foundation has spent more than \$1.7 million on The MacArthur Library project; the total retail value of the tapes distributed to the 2200 libraries exceeds \$15.4 million.

Titles in The MacArthur Library include "Best Boy", the Academy Award-winning documentary on a 52-year-old retarded man's journey into independence from his aging parents; "The Day After Trinity", an Academy Award-nominated documentary on the life of J. Robert Oppenheimer and the development of the atomic bomb; "Points in Space", an award-winning BBC documentary of the choreography of MacArthur Fellow Merce Cunningham; and "Amazonia: A Celebration of Life", which studies Peru's tropical rainforest, its diverse inhabitants, and the threat posed to them by deforestation.

DISTRICT 13 NEWS

D.A.R.E. TO BE INTRODUCED IN DISTRICT 13 SCHOOLS

For a number of years, children in Bloomingdale School District #13 have received valuable instruction directed at preventing drug and alcohol abuse among the student population. Goals of this instruction include:

(1) Providing Basic Alcohol/Drug Information

Specific alcohol/drug information is essential if we expect to affect actual alcohol and drug use behavior.

(2) Building Life Skills

Skills such as communication, assertiveness, problem solving, stress management, social skills building, and managing peer pressure are crucial to the development of healthy, successful individuals who will make positive and productive life choices.

(3) Developing Alternatives

Alternatives serve positive, health-enhancing functions served by negative, health compromising behaviors.

More recently the district has received federal monies through the Drug Free Schools and Communities Act Program which have been used to upgrade our curriculum materials, to provide for increased guidance services, and to provide speakers and special programs for our students and their parents. This effort, being directed by Ms. Joanna Medwick, Assistant Principal of the Westfield School, is being strengthened this winter by adding another component, the D.A.R.E. or Drug Abuse Resistance Education program. Made available to the schools through the Bloomingdale Police Department, this program will begin in January, 1990, in the fifth grades at Central and DuJardin Schools, and the sixth grade at Westfield School.

The D.A.R.E. program focuses on four major areas of education which are similar to the goals of the district:

- Providing accurate information about tobacco, alcohol and drugs.
- Teaching students decision-making skills.
- Showing students how to resist peer pressure.
- Giving students ideas for alternatives to drug use.

Working with Ms. Medwick in this program will be Detective Paul Deibel, of the Bloomingdale Police, who has worked closely with School District 13 in our previous drug education programs. Beginning in January, Detective Deibel will present Project D.A.R.E. drug lessons, during each of seventeen weeks, in each of our schools.

The Project D.A.R.E. program, which is endorsed by the United States Department of Justice, began as a experimental program in Los Angeles in 1983. Its success rate is very high which is why use of the program has spread across the United States and the world.

School and police personnel who have been involved with Project D.A.R.E. are very enthusiastic about the program. They indicate:

1. D.A.R.E. students are less accepting of substance use.
2. D.A.R.E. students are better prepared to deal with pressure from their peers to try drugs.
3. D.A.R.E. students have more respect for law enforcement officers.
4. D.A.R.E. students are less likely to be drug involved when they leave schools.

All of those involved with the Project D.A.R.E. in Bloomingdale are anticipating these same results.

DISTRICT 15 NEWS

Marquardt Middle School's award-winning Future Problem Solving Program was highlighted in a presentation at the Illinois Association of School Boards, Illinois Association of School Administrators, and the Illinois Association of School Business Officials Joint Annual Conference held recently in Chicago. Marquardt District 15's Curriculum Director, Beverly Norris, and Science Teacher/Problem Solving Coach, Nancy Benson, conducted a panel discussion along with Jim Victory, Illinois Math and Science Instructor, on "Championship Problem-Solving Techniques."

Marquardt Middle School became involved in the Future Problem Solving Bowl, sponsored by the Illinois Council for the Gifted, in 1984. In 1987 one of Marquardt's 8th grade team members, Christopher Cyr, was named the State Champion in the individual competition, Intermediate Division. The following year, Marquardt's 7th grade team captured the State Championship in the Intermediate Division, followed by another State Championship in May 1989.

The presentation at the I.A.S.B. Conference highlighted the various facets of the Problem Solving Program at Marquardt. Mrs. Norris, the Curriculum Director, explained the background of Problem Solving, while Mrs. Benson focused on the meaning of the "external and internal components" of the program. Mrs. Betty Warick, mother of Tom Warick, one of the students on the team, gave her views on the competition from a parent's perspective.

The presentation also featured a video presentation of the current Marquardt Problem Solvers at work. The students were given the problem of "School Funding" to deal with as they were videotaped. This video demonstrated the format of Future Problem Solving and coaching strategies employed by Mrs. Benson in getting students ready for competition. The 7th Grade Problem Solvers who took part in the videotaping were: Matt Orcutt, Christine Tragos, Tracy Walendy, and Javier Cervantes. The 8th graders who participated were: Ovette Villavicencio, Rupal Desai, Dan Anderson, and Jason Comella.
