## 18th Annual Septemberfest



Plans are underway for the 18th annual Septemberfest in Old Town, Bloomingdale to be held on Sunday, September 9, 1990 from 11:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. (raindate is September 16). Scheduled festivities will begin at 12:00 when the Boy Scouts post the colors at the stage area on Franklin Street.

Shortly after the opening flag ceremony, the new Miss Bloomingdale will be crowned, and other members of her court will be announced. The contest is open to all young women between the ages of 15 and 21 who are residents of Bloomingdale.

Miss Bloomingdale receives a scholarship to continue her education after her high school graduation, and the Queen and her court receive many other prizes. All money for the scholarship fund and prizes are donated by Bloomingdale merchants and organizations. In addition, part of the booth fee from Septemberfest is contributed to the scholarship fund. Lustig Jewelers of Stratford Square will once again be the official jeweler.

The 1990 Septemberfest celebration will once again feature a wide variety of entertainment for the entire family. The Bloomingdale Police Department will present its puppet safety shows, and the Friends of the Library and Bloomingdale Women's Club are planning to have games and activities for children of all ages. The Beamers will demonstrate their physical skill, and the award winning Westfield Junior High swing choir will perform at 1:00 p.m.

Back by popular demand, the Lip-Sync Contest takes place at 2:30 p.m. Winners will receive cash prizes of \$100 for first place, \$75 for second place, and \$50 for third place. For

Other entertainment will include the Blooz Brothers at 1:30 p.m. and Cirrus Falcon at 4:00 p.m. Mike Lettieri of M & R Music will be the disc jockey and general MC for the day. In addition, "Outrageous the Clown" will roam the crowd during the afternoon.

It would not be Septemberfest without the antiques, crafts, and food booths, and this year promises another wonderful selection of each. Hamburgers, hot dogs, pop corn, soft drinks, Italian ice, pizza and taffy apples are just a few of the culinary delights that will be sold by our local not-for-profit organizations at both Septemberfest and the Festival of Arts. Antique, crafts and art vendors will be located along Third Street and at the First Chicago Bank of DuPage parking lot.

Applications for booths for Septemberfest are \$25, and will be accepted until all available spaces have been filled. No refunds will be made on reserved spaces after August 15. For further information about booth reservations, call the Village Hall (893-7000).

## NEW PUBLIC WORKS BUILDING UNDERWAY



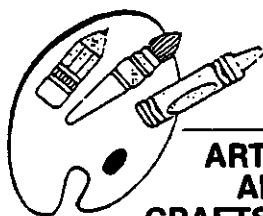
Some of the Public Works employees participated in the groundbreaking of their new facilities July 21.

Phase I of the Public Works Facility Construction began recently following a July 21 groundbreaking ceremony. The planned facilities will replace the existing 9,720 square-foot building located at 311 S. Glen Ellyn Road. The existing facility was constructed in the early 1970's and expanded in 1979.

The new facilities will provide a complex necessary to maintain the existing level of service provided by the Village Services Department and Public Works Division as the Village continues to grow.

The facilities will house, in a central location, the public works operations superintendent, administrative staff, street division, utility division and vehicle maintenance division.

The facilities will consist of a 15,000 square-foot office/vehicle repair building, a 24,650 square-foot vehicle storage facility, a 61-foot diameter salt storage building and a fueling facility.



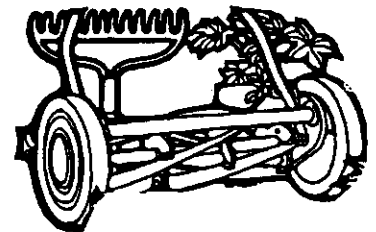

## NEW ASSISTANT ON STAFF



There was almost no question that our new assistant to the Village Administrator would take the path toward government. Harvey E. Schmidt was the product of a father who worked in politics for several years before becoming a political science teacher at Elmhurst College. His mother taught history and social studies at the high school level.

"There have been some great political debates in our house, says the 25-year old, with a grin. "We've got relatives on both sides of the issues."

When he was a youngster Harv wanted to be a professional basketball player, but a couple of injuries and the fact that he just wasn't fast enough made him rethink his career plans.

Unlike many college freshmen, Harv had a pretty good idea of what he wanted to do - either go into some kind of public administration or political science research. After spending his junior year in Washington D.C. where he worked in a congressional program, he was convinced.

He received his bachelor's degree in political science/public administration

from Elmhurst College. He earned his master's of public administration in urban management from Northern Illinois University.

Prior to coming to Bloomingdale, Harv served as the assistant to the public works director, then assistant to the village manager in Lake Zurich. Before that he served as the assistant to human resource director in Lisle.

He finds the most fascinating part of his job to be the contact with the citizens, especially in a small community. He sees the community as an extended family. You might see the same resident you deal with on a complaint or work with on a project at the grocery store or in the park with their kids.

In public service, he says, you are working to make the community the best it can possibly be. Even though you don't always have 100 percent consensus, he wants residents to know we are all working toward that same goal.

Harv says he was brought up in a family believing in public service. He believes he is in a noble profession and changing people's perception of government on a local level is also very important to him.

Harv is single, but is keeping his eyes open. Right now his passion is basketball. "I'm fanatical about it," he admits. As his older brother is a basketball scout, Harv gets great opportunities to visit the camps and meet celebrities in the game.

We applaud Harvey's perspective and welcome him aboard.

## CITIZEN'S POLICE ACADEMY

Registration is now being accepted for the next class of the Bloomingdale Citizen's Police Academy. Interested village residents are eligible to attend. The next class will begin on Thursday, September 13, 1990, and finish on Thursday, November 15, 1990. Each class runs approximately 3 hours on Thursday nights for 10 consecutive weeks. The course covers subjects such as Search and Seizure, Evidence Processing, Gangs, Rape and many other facets of Law Enforcement. 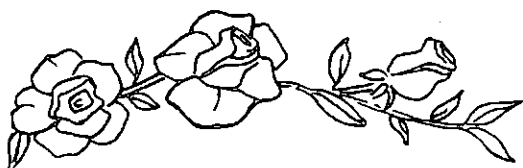


## WC GET ACQUAINTED HOUR

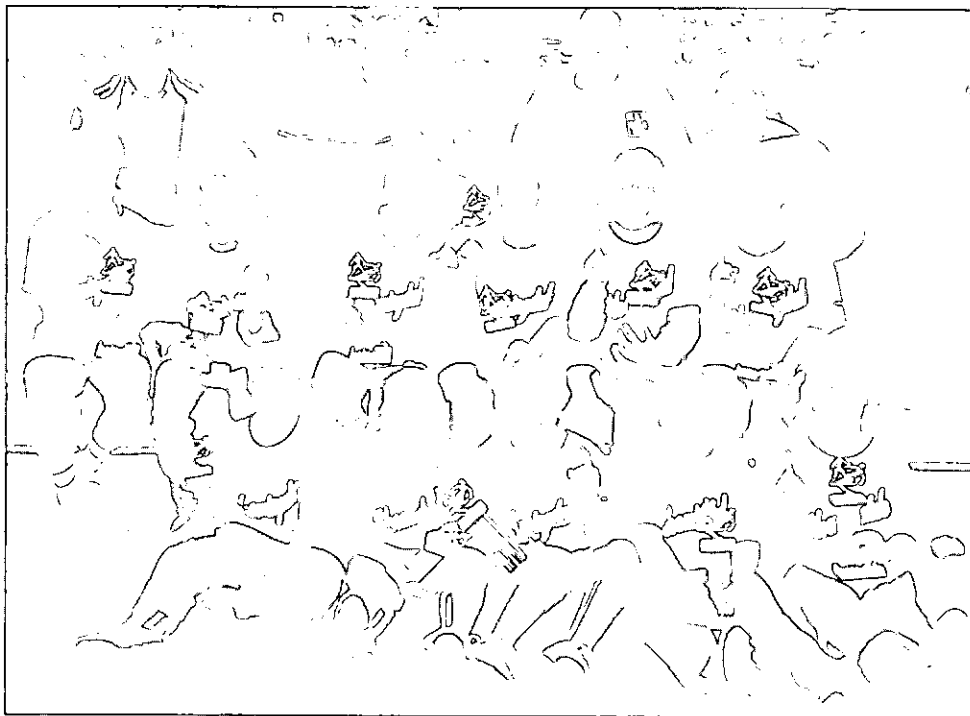
# BRATS BEAT OUT COMPETITION

## MARQUARDT MIDDLE SCHOOL STATE CHAMPS PLACE AT INTERNATIONALS

Marquardt Middle School's State Champion Problem Solving Team, 1990, travelled to St. Louis, Washington University, to compete in the International Future Problem Solving Conference held on June 9, 10, and 11. This is the third consecutive year that one of Marquardt's teams has won the State of Illinois Championship in the Intermediate Division (grades 7, 8 and 9).

For the first time in their 3-year championship record, however, Marquardt's team qualified at the Internationals as semi-finalists. The team competed against 64 of the top teams from each state of the United States as well as some from other countries including Canada. Marquardt's team was rated 15th among the 64 teams. The top 15 teams are awarded certificates and a school plaque as International semi-finalists. The team winning the International Competition was from Salt Lake City, Utah.

In addition, the Marquardt team's alternate member, 8th-grader Noel Gres, competed on a team comprised of alternates from other states. The team took a second place award in the alternate competition. Marquardt's State Champion, International semi-finalists team, was composed of 8th graders: Rupal Desai, Kate Downes, Jacob Staub, and Ovette Villavicencio. The team is coached by Nancy Benson, science teacher at Marquardt Middle School.

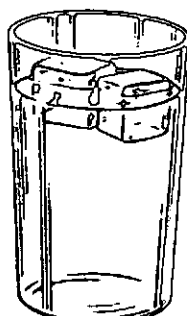

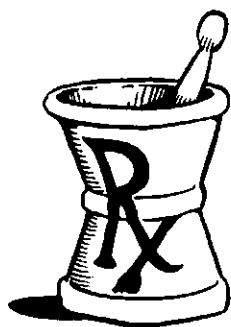

## PHARMICISTS TO CLEAN UP ENVIRONMENT

Insulin dependent diabetic patients can now dispose of their syringes and lancets in an environmentally safe and conscientious way. Bloomingdale Pharmacy, a Diabetic Shoppe pharmacy, will provide free disposal of insulin syringes and lancets through a licensed incinerator company.

To participate in the program, the patient can register at Bloomingdale Pharmacy and purchase a container for under \$2.00. The container will hold 50-60 syringes. When the container is full, it is returned to the pharmacy for safe, free disposal.

Healthcare-oriented diabetic shops are concerned about the increased risk of liability for the insulin dependent diabetic if syringes that are disposed of in the household garbage injure children or sanitation workers. 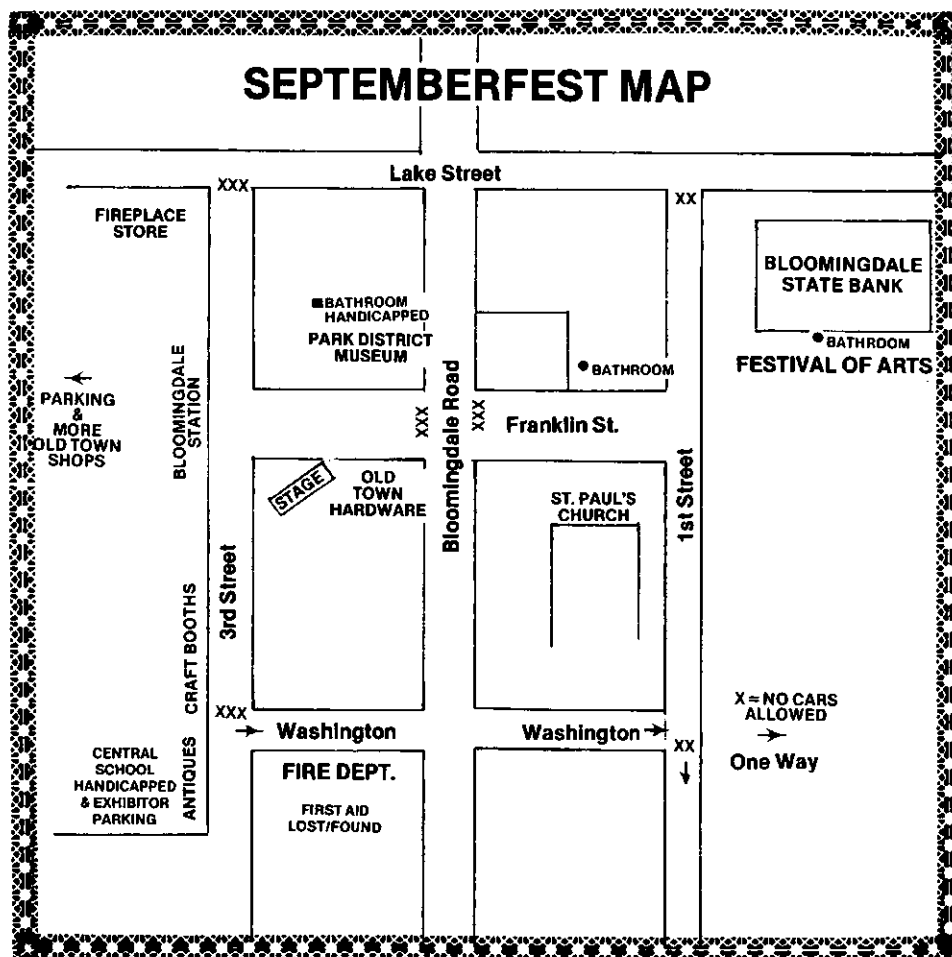
# FESTIVAL OF ARTS

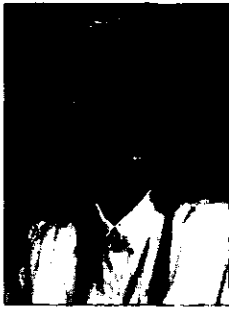

As of July 20, 1990 the participants in the Station Read 1990 Summer Reading Program read 10,680 books. A total of 652 children enrolled in the summer reading program. The last official day of the program was Saturday, August 4 and the finale was Wednesday, August 8. Children who have completed 10 books by August 4 were invited to attend the finale.

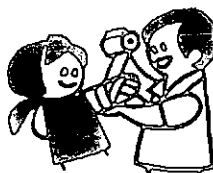
## WHERE HAVE ALL THE PUZZLES GONE?

Even though you don't see puzzles hanging on a rack in the Youth Services Department, they are available for you to check out and take home. Just ask for them at the Youth Services desk, or simply choose the cards for those you would like from the blue file box on the front of the desk. (You may take 3 at a time). Each card in the file box represents a puzzle that's available for checking out, and will have a picture or drawing of a puzzle, or a description of what it is like and how many pieces it has.

The Reference Librarian will get your puzzles from the office of the Youth Services Librarian, check to be sure they are in the correct bag, make certain all the pieces are there, and take them to the circulation desk where they will be waiting for you when you are ready to check out.

This new way of handling puzzles really works — there haven't been any mixed-up bags or missing pieces since the new system was started last spring. It also means there are more puzzles available for you to choose from.

If you prefer to use puzzles in the Library and not check them out for home use, a wooden box-rack on one of the tables is filled with puzzles for in-library use only. Enjoy!



## FIRST AID FOR LITTLE PEOPLE

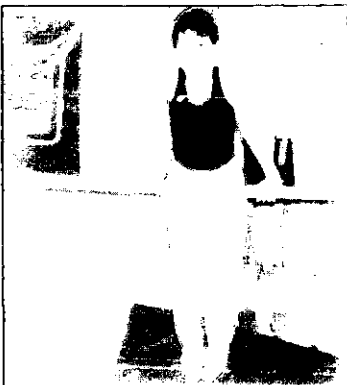
# ABOUT TOWN

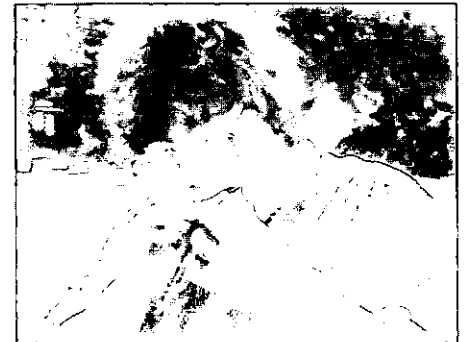
