NOTABLE NEIGHBOR

Sixteen-year-old Bloomingdale resident, Nicole Pelant, recently placed fourth in the United States Figure Skating Association Regional Competition, Figures Division. Her standing there allowed her to participate in the Sectionals held in January where she again placed fourth in the Figure Division.

The Sectionals win enabled her to move on to the national competition to be held in mid-February in Minneapolis, Minnesota. Pelant will compete in the Figures Division of the national competition and will also try out for the Partners Ice Dancing.

Pelant has been skating since she was four and a half years old and started competing at the age of five. After watching a neighbor at her skating lesson, she decided to get on the ice and try it herself. As her interest developed, she was encouraged by her parents to take skating lessons.

Originally Nicole was going to learn to skate so that she could make use of the many ponds and lakes in the area. The Pelants revised that idea when they discovered how quickly and badly ice skate blades get chewed up on such surfaces.

She moved on to the Woodfield Ice Arena, which is no longer in existence. She now travels to the Riverview Ice House in Rockford, Illinois six times a week to take lessons under the direction of her two coaches, Carol Ueck and David Kinser. She has been training under them since she was ten years old.

"My favorite part of ice skating is the ice show held each year in May at the Riverview Ice House. There isn't any pressure, no judges, and if you fall, you can get up and laugh," said Pelant. "The costumes are fun and my friends are there."

The theme for this year's ice show is "Circus." The ice show always features a guest skater and has included skaters



such as Brian Orser and Dorothy Hamill in recent years. The guest skater for this year has not yet been announced.

Pelant has spent several summers in Rockford and spent last summer in Colorado Springs, Colorado to increase her skill and become the skater she is today. The coaching in Colorado Springs is especially good for skaters.

"It grows on you. Once you're in, you can't seem to get out. I feel proud when I do well, it keeps me in shape, and gives me something to do," said Pelant when asked what makes her keep on going. "I have a lot of friends in skating and have met a lot of interesting people from throughout the country."

"I love dressing up in the costumes - it's fun. Skating has helped with school and has made me more responsible. I have matured faster," said Pelant. Pelant presently is a junior at Glenbard North High School and the daughter of Barney & Judy Pelant. Of her recent placement at Sectionals, Pelant said, "It made me very happy. It was a lot more fun because I saw a lot of my friends." Pelant will compete against twelve other girls at the national convention.

PACE BUS ROUTE OFFERS CONVENIENT COMMUTING ALTERNATIVE

Through bus Route 407 Bloomingdale/ Roselle Feeder, Pace, the suburban bus division of the RTA, offers Bloomingdale residents an economical, timely and convenient way to get to the Roselle Metra train station.

Route 407 allows commuters to avoid traffic congestion and parking hassles by providing morning and evening rush hour service to and from the train station. The route meets three morning trains and four evening trains Monday through Friday. Serving Westlake, Deer Glen Apartments, Fairfield and Summerfields, the bus operates from Greenway and Bloomingdale Roads to the station and makes stops at any intersection along the route where it is safe to do so.

Pace also offers two other routes that serve Bloomingdale. Route 653 serves Wilshire Towers, Deer Glen Apartments, and other areas of Bloomingdale before going to the Glen Ellyn train station. Route 653 also provides rush hour service for commuters traveling to the train station.

In addition, Route 711 serves DuPage Center, Marian Park, the Wheaton Metra train station, Northland Mall, Chateau Village, K-Mart and Stratford Square.





PUBLIC NOTICE RADIUM IN WATER EXCEEDS LIMIT

This notice is for informational purposes. This is not a notice of immediate hazard to water consumers. Should a hazard exist, immediate notification will be made by the Village of Bioomingdale.

The Village of Bloomingdale Public Water Supply wishes to advise its customers that the USEPA maximum contaminant level (MCL) - the maximum amount currently allowed in drinking water for radium has been exceeded in samples collected in calendar year 1990.

Radium is an element which is naturally present in the deep ground water aquifer used as a source of water supply by the Village of Bloomingdale and other Northeastern Illinois communities. Radium in ground water occurs in two forms called isotopes - radium 226 and radium 228. Both isotypes are measured and combined to obtain a level of radium by IEPA.

The MCL for radium as designated by the Illinois Pollution Control Board is 5 pico curies per liter of water. Quarterly samples taken over the 1990 calendar year and analyzed by IEPA indicate the average level for the Village source, is 13.3 pico curies per liter.

Studies used to develop the current MCL indicate a portion of the radium which is ingested remains in the bone. The radiation released from the radium, because of its high energy, causes damage to the surrounding tissue.

The current MCL of 5 pico curies per liter for radium is based on a daily consumption of approximately 2 liters of water over a 70-year life time. The studies indicate that this consumption rate may result in the development of bone cancer in a very small portion of the population: 1 person in every 10,000 persons.

At the levels detected the short term risk is minimal and no special precautions need to be taken by the consumer at this time.

The USEPA is currently reviewing the MCL for radium isotopes 226 and 228. In light of more recent studies regarding the probability of developing adverse health effects. It is proposed that the revised MCL for each radium isotope will be 20 pico curies per liter. At the proposed maximum contaminant levels the Village supply would be in compliance.

The Village of Bloomingdale is committed to provided safe drinking water to its customers. The Village has restricted the amount of water produced by the deep well source causing the supply to exceed the MCL. The Village plans on using the well to prevent water supply shortages and other high volume demands. Quarterly monitoring of samples for radium levels will continue as required by IEPA.

In 1992 the Village expects to be providing Lake Michigan water from the DuPage Water Commission and will no longer use well water as the primary source of supply. Lake Michigan Water receives full treatment prior to its distribution and complies with all current USEPA standards including radium. If you have any questions please contact Robert C. 

She has served Bloomingdale as a member of Old Town Commission working to create a unique commercial area while preserving and utilizing historically significant structures.


She has contributed to the work of both the Septemberfest Commission and the Family Fest Commission.

EVERY DAY WE GROW A LITTLE MORE SCHOOL DISTRICT 13 NEWS

As the teachers at the three schools in District 13 returned from the winter vacation on January 7, they found more students in their classes than when they left. Over the holidays, thirteen new students enrolled in District 13, making the total enrollment more than 1430 students. We are confident that the enrollment in the district at the start of the next school year will be at least 1470.

The Board of Education and the administration are preparing plans to adequately house these new students. Westfield School is going to be getting two new portable classrooms. Westfield is going to have to house a new special education class next year, will graduate its smallest class, and will have at least 35 more students than at the start of this year. The new portable building will go next to the existing portable on the parking lot. This means that we will lose some of the parking spaces for the staff and visitors. It is highly likely that we will need two portable classrooms at DuJardin and may need two classrooms at Central as well. We will have a better picture of the needs of the elementary schools after the kindergarten enrollment days, March 11 through 15.


The enrollment growth has meant more students involved in extra curricular programs also. The number of students participating in after school athletics has never been larger. We have over two hundred junior high students active in our award winning vocal and instrumental music programs, sponsored by Vicky Fraggos and Rodger Himmel.

As well as enrolling new students, the district is helping to provide new services to our students and community with the funds coming from the outside. We have a grant from the state coordinated by junior high science teacher Linda O'Connor to provide the Saturday Science program to almost one hundred interested science students on Saturdays this winter. Also, through a state drug awareness grant under the direction of Westfield Assistant Principal Joanna Medwick, we have sponsored three evening presentations on drug education to the parents of our community.

In addition, the Board is investigating the feasibility of offering afterschool child care at no cost to the taxpayer in cooperation with the Twinbrook YMCA. This program would use classroom, gymnasium, and library spaces at the end of the school day, when it is no longer needed by the district. An interest survey was distributed to District 13 parents in January to help determine the need for such a program.

To solve the long term housing problems of the school district, the Board of Education voted on January 14 to hold a referendum asking the voters for permission to build a new school and to add on to DuJardin School. The total cost of the project will be \$6,900,000. A committee of sixty residents, Citizens for the Referendum chaired by Myra Westfall and Mike Hovde, is organizing an information campaign concerning the April 2 referendum.

Plans Move Forward

Winnebago Renovation

Plans for remodeling Winnebago Elementary School continue to proceed on schedule. Mr. Wagener, Principal, remarked, "When the Administration began formulating changes two years ago in order to increase the teaching flexibility of the building, and to make it handicap accessible, we had no idea of the amount of time and energy it would take to make sure everything we discussed would meet the needs of the students, teachers, and parents."

The 17-year-old building was designed as an open concept facility (no walls) on three levels. As time passed and teaching styles changed, minor changes were made to the building. These changes met the needs of the students at that time, but have proven to be less effective in the current learning environment.

Teachers and administrators wanted a building with the greatest flexibility in order to provide a classroom environment that would meet the children's needs. Among the needs agreed upon are providing space for art and science classes, for 28 computers, additional storage space, as well as making the building handicap accessible.

In order to implement this project and obtain funds to cover the cost, plans required the approval of both the Regional Superintendent of Schools and the State Board of Education. This approval has been obtained. Life Safety Bonds are expected to be sold during the month of February. The district's excellent financial status and accounting practices should assure a low interest rate.


These bonds, in the amount of \$1,775,300 will be paid back over a ten year period. Over this ten year period this issue will add an average of 8.4 cents per year to the district's tax rate. To a homeowner with a house valued at \$100,000 approximately \$28 per year may be added to their tax bill as a result of this issue.

Once the project is completed in the fall of 1992, Winnebago will meet the needs of all students, address a variety of teaching styles and provide an excellent facility for its students.

Bloomingdale Church invites everyone in the community to come see their brand new Activity Center on Sunday afternoon, March 17th - 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. The just-completed 7500-square foot addition includes a gymnasium, kitchen, classrooms and enlarged office space. A short program will commence at 2:30 p.m. in the gymnasium with refreshments immediately following.

The new facilities were constructed in a unique way, saving the church about half of the actual construction cost. They did it themselves. There was no general contractor and most of the labor was the volunteer efforts of the men and women of the congregation itself. A retired builder, Don Wubs, and a construction company owner in the church, Dale Waterman of Waterman Bros. Construction Company, freely gave of their time and skills to direct the project. They worked with the architect, ordered the materials, and supervised the crew of Bloomingdale Church volunteers for almost a year as the building went up throughout 1990.

Actually this is the third major construction project that the church has taken on in its 12 year history in Bloomingdale. The church began as a new mission church in 1978 meeting in a local school.
