As of 9:11 am Wednesday, September 11, 1991 (9/11/91), 9-1-1 service was available to all residents and businesses of DuPage County.

Almost all of DuPage County has been activated with Enhanced 9-1-1 service which provides the telecommunicator a display showing the calling party's number and address. A few locations still have basic 9-1-1 service which will be upgraded in

the coming months.

This implementation is the result of a referendum which was passed in April of 1989 authorizing the collection of a \$.50 surcharge on telephone bills to establish 9-1-1 service countywide.

Residents and businesses of Bloomingdale can dial 9-1-1 for Police,

While the main emphasis of 9-1-1 is for emergency calls, callers should use the number anytime they need a police officer, firefighter or emergency medical personnel at their home or business. The telecommunicators will evaluate all calls on a priority basis, giving calls involving a threat to life the highest priority, threats to property the second priority, and all other requests for service the lowest priority. If busy, the telecommunicator may ask the

if it is a lower priority call, will place them on hold to handle a higher priority call.

The system has been designed with sufficient line capacity to handle the anticipated volume in each community.

Callers with questions regarding reports, tickets, court dates, dispositions, ordinances should call the administrative (non-emergency phone number for the Bloomingdale Police Department (529-9868) or the Bloomingdale Fire Protection District (894-8488). 9-1-1 should not be used for directions, information, reporting of power outages or other similar, clearly non-emergency, calls.

9-1-1 service is not available for cellular phones at this time. It is hoped that future enhancements will include this capability. 9-1-1 is available at all pay phones and is a free call.

NEW DIGS!

The dust has finally settled and the Village Hall offices are back to normal - but better! The remodeling project is completed and the various departments are once again under one roof. Building and Engineering are in their new quarters on the lower level of the Village Hall (in the former police department). Finance and administrative offices have taken over the entire first floor, along with refurbished council chambers and conference room.

This final stage completes the building program at 201 S.Bloomingdale Road

which began with the construction of our new police facility and concluded with the renovation of the above mentioned offices. The Village will celebrate by inviting residents to an open house on Saturday, November 2. Still ongoing is Phase 2 of the public works facility located on Glen Ellyn Road. A spring completion date is projected at which time tours will be available in those new facilities. The entire building project spans 31 months at a cost of \$9 Million. Despite this large expenditure, the Village portion of your taxes have been steadily decreasing.



Ford Adapts To Responsibilities

As New Village Clerk

Harriet Ford had some big shoes to fill when she took over the position of Village Clerk in June, 1991.

Marie Tayfel had held that position for ten years before resigning to join her husband who was transferred out of state by his company. People had grown accustomed to her and to her work style. They had gotten used to doing things a certain way. And, when it came time for Ford to step into the position, the transition was bound to be a challenge.

But, Ford said that "The staff at the Village have been extremely patient and supportive during the transition. They made me feel very comfortable, making what might have been a cumbersome task a great deal more enjoyable."

Ford is responsible for keeping records of the Village's ordinances, minutes of meetings and resolutions. She also represents the Village as a member of the DuPage County Clerks Association and the State Clerks Association.

She is no newcomer to Village politics. Ford is currently a member of the Bloomingdale Family Fest Committee and the chairman of the Blood Drive. Since coming to Bloomingdale in 1972, she has served in various capacities on the Marquardt District 15 Board of Education, the Bloomingdale Township Youth Commission, the Village of Bloomingdale Youth Commission and the DuPage County Mental Health Advisory Board.



At the same time Ford has maintained a full time career position as customer relations coordinator at Pulte Home Corporation.

Ford's organizational skills, high energy level and enthusiasm have proven to be beneficial in her new position, which can be quite hectic and challenging at times. Her first hand-understanding of Bloomingdale's growth in recent years has also been an asset to Ford in her capacity as Village Clerk.

"Bloomingdale is very special. It has kept its small town charm and personal involvement. People know each other, they get involved, they care ... Yet we have the benefits of a much larger suburb."

Ford's husband, Richard, is worldwide director of information systems for Komatsu-Dresser. The Ford family consists of five children: Tami, 23; John, 21; Rachel, 19; Ross, 17; and Cameron, 14. Her youngest son, 14-year-old Cameron, attends Glenbard North. Others are away at college.


The Village of Bloomingdale, in cooperation with the Bloomingdale-Township Transportation, began providing its residents with weekend bus service to supplement daily transportation service operated through the Township and PACE, in September, 1989. This service has proven to be a very beneficial convenience to residents throughout Bloomingdale, as they can be transported anywhere in Bloomingdale Township. Residents have taken advantage of this service to travel to Stratford Square, Bloomingdale Court and Springbrook Shopping Centers. They also use this service to get to Lexington Health Center, Marklund Children's Home, Alden Valley Ridge Nursing Center to do weekend volunteer work, and to make trips to doctors' offices, to Central DuPage Hospital, and to church on Sunday.

Operational hours for the weekend service are from 9 am to 1 pm on Saturday and from 10:30 am to 1 pm on Sunday. The Saturday service has grown in popularity since inception of the program. But the Village would like to encourage more Sunday usage by those who do not drive or do not have transportation available to go to church or to visit the shopping centers, nursing homes or cultural amenities that the Village prides itself on offering.

Fares for this service are \$1.25 per adult, \$.75 for seniors, handicapped and students, and \$.25 extra for trips to Central DuPage Hospital.

It is recommended that reservations be made in advance of the day you plan to use the service, but same day reservations can be accepted subject to availability of rides by calling the TownshipTransportation office at 893-7555, and asking to speak to Randy or Darlene.

1992 Tree Planting Program

The Village Board has again allocated funds for this very successful program which was started in 1982. The program provides trees, including planting, at a 50/50 cost sharing with the Village. The trees will be planted early next spring and are available for parkways and front yards.

The following are the guidelines of the program.

- Since the budget is limited, the program will be on a first-come, first-served basis. Requests should be submitted by December 1, 1991. No money is needed at this time. Bills will be sent in early 1992.
- Trees will be 2½" caliper, unless stated otherwise. Trees will be quality nursery stock but not specimen trees.
- The Village reserves the right to disapprove requests based on conflicts, safety, or proper spacing.
- Each parcel will be limited to two (2) trees. Corner lots will be allowed four (4) trees.
- Participants will be given the opportunity to mark the location of the planting desired, but the Village retains the right to change, if necessary.
- We anticipate the cost of the trees to be between \$200 and \$300 each, with the Village paying half of the amount.
- Trees will be guaranteed for one year. Participants are responsible for all watering which will be described in instructions furnished by the Village.

Parkway Tree Replacement

Parkway trees are the trees in the Village right-of-way, alongside Village streets, usually located between the sidewalk and curb. These trees are typically spaced forty feet apart and are located to avoid conflicts with intersections, street lights, underground or overhead utilities and drainage.

If a parkway tree was removed, for whatever reason, three options are available to the resident for replacement of that tree:

- 1. The homeowner may replace the tree entirely on their own, choosing the time of planting, the size and the species of the tree. Tree species which are softwooded or have invasive roots or have short, wide forms are unacceptable for parkway planting. These include Willows, Populars, Evergreens, Silver Maple, Cottonwood, Siberian Elm, Tree of Heaven and Russian Olive. No permit for this work is required from the Village. Prior to digging, contact JULIE at 1-800-892-0123 to locate buried utilities. Further information regarding species selection can be obtained from Mr. Larry Slavicek in Village Services Department — Engineering Division.
- 2. The resident may participate in the Village 50/50 program for the replacement. This program offers 2½" trunk diameter trees of various species which are ordered in the fall of each year and are planted the following spring. See "1992 Tree Planting Program" within this "Almanac" for further information and an application form.
- 3. The resident may make a request for the Village to make the replacement. A list is maintained on a first-come, first-served basis and trees are planted when funds are available in the Tree Budget. As funds are limited, the planting is typically 2 or more years from the resident's request for the replacement. The trees are 2" or 2½" trunk diameter and the species are at the Village's discretion.

Public Notice

Radium in Water Exceeds Limit

This notice is for informational purposes. This is not a notice of immediate hazard to water consumers. Should a hazard exist, immediate notification will be made by the Village of Blooming-dale.

The Village of Bloomingdate Public Water Supply wishes to advise its customers that the USEPA maximum contaminant level (MCL) - the maximum amount currently allowed in drinking water for radium has been exceeded in samples collected in calendar year 1990.

Radium is an element which is naturally present in the deep ground water aquifer used as a source of water supply by the Village of Bloomingdale and other Northeastern Illinois communities. Radium in ground water occurs in two forms called isotopes - radium 226 and radium 228. Both isotypes are measured and combined to obtain a level of radium by IEPA.

The MCL for radium as designated by the Illinois Pollution Control Board is 5 pico curies per liter of water. Quarterly samples taken over the 1990 calendar year and analyzed by IEPA indicate the average level for the Village source, is 13.3 pico curies per liter.

Studies used to develop the current MCL indicate a portion of the radium which is ingested remains in the bone. The radiation released from the radium, because of its high energy, causes damage to the surrounding tissue.

The current MCL of 5 pico curies per liter for radium is based on a dally consumption of approximately 2 liters of water over a 70-year life time. The studies indicate that this consumption rate may result in the development of bone cancer in a very small portion of the population: 1 person in every 10,000 persons.

At the levels detected the short term risk is minimal and no special precautions need to be taken by the consumer at this time.

The USEPA is currently reviewing the MCL for radium isotopes 226 and 228. In light of more recent studies regarding the probability of developing adverse health effects. It is proposed that the revised MCL for each radium isotope will be 20 pico curies per liter. At the proposed maximum contaminant levels the Village supply would be in compliance.

The Village of Bloomingdale is committed to provided safe drinking water to its customers. The Village has restricted the amount of water produced by the deep well source causing the supply to exceed the MCL. The Village plans on using the well to prevent water supply shortages and other high volume demands. Quarterly monitoring of samples for radium levels will continue as required by IEPA.

In 1992 the Village expects to be providing Lake Michigan water from the DuPage Water Commission and will no longer use well water as the primary source of supply. Lake Michigan Water receives full treatment prior to its distribution and complies with all current USEPA standards including radium. If you have any questions please contact Robert C. 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


Chess Tournament

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
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National Geographic Exhibit
