# Village Public Works Facility -- Open House


The Mayor, Village Board and Village Services Department Staff of the Village of Bloomingdale invite the residents of Bloomingdale to join in the celebration of the dedication of the new Public Works Facility.

Rain or shine the festivities will be held on Saturday, May 16, 1992, from 10 am to 2 pm at 305 South Glen Ellyn Road in Bloomingdale. The Dedication ceremony and ribbon cutting will be held at 10 am with tours of the facility scheduled between 10:30 am and 2 pm.

The Village of Bloomingdale Village Services Department consists of three Divisions: the Public Works Division, Engineering Division and Building and Zoning Division. Public Works Division and Engineering Division staff will be available to present the services provided by the Village Services Department.

The Public Works Facility is constructed on 3.8 acres located at 305 South Glen Ellyn Road. The construction consisted of a 13,250 square foot office and vehicle repair facility, a 24,650 square foot vehicle storage facility and a 2,850 square foot salt storage dome. The project has been occupied since October, 1991 and was constructed at a cost of \$3,164,951. The project was part of the nearly nine million dollar Village Construction Program, which included the construction of a 32,000 square foot Police Facility and the renovation of the Village Hall. The entire Building Program was funded with no additional increases to the Village property tax rate.

The week of May 17 begins the celebration of American Public Works Week, so it is fitting that the Village of Bloomingdale celebrate the new Public Works Facility and the efforts of the Village Services staff.



The celebration will include the presentation of services provided by the Village, Services Department Public Works Division and Engineering Division, exhibitions and display of the equipment used by Village Services for infrastructure maintenance by Utility Division, Streets Division, Water Reclamation and Vehicle Maintenance.

Tours of the newly constructed Public Works Facility and the Water Reclamation Facility will be provided.

The DuPage Water Commission will open its doors to the public on Saturday June 13 and Sunday June 14 between 9 am and 5 pm at the Commission's main pumping facility located at 600 East Butterfield Road, Elmhurst.

# Hydrant Flushing Schedule

It's that time of year again. Starting Tuesday, March 31, through April 23, the Utility Division will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village. The flushing will occur between the hours of 8 pm and 12 midnight. Please DO NOT WASH LAUNDRY during the flushing hours. Rust staining of the clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period. If you have any questions regarding the hydrant flushing schedule, please call the Public Works Department at 529-5865.

One question that is always asked is -- "Why does the Village flush hydrants?" Hydrant flushing is routine maintenance for a water system. It accomplishes the following:

Improves water quality: Flushing removes minerals such as iron and magnesium that have collected in the water mains.

Improves water flow: By removing these minerals, the inside diameter of a water main is increased and therefore, allows a better flow of water.

Hydrant maintenance: A fire hydrant is a mechanical device. Operation of a hydrant lubricates internal mechanisms and gaskets.

Hydrant inspection: Any deficiencies are noted and repaired as necessary to insure that each hydrant will perform when needed for an emergency.

# Yard Waste Season Is Underway

As many residents know, Browning Ferris picks up yard waste as part of the Village's yard waste program. Yard waste is to be placed curbside in either 33 gallon or less contrainers or in biodegradable paper bags. Yard waste stickers must be applied regardless of the method used.

Yard waste stickers are \$1.05 each and are available at the Village Hall, or at the following local businesses: Ace Hardware, True Value Hardware, Dominicks, Jewel/Osco, Economart and Bloomingdale Pharmacy. They may also be purchased directly from B.F.I. Remember, a yard waste sticker must be applied to each container or bag used.

The Village received many questions about alternatives to placing numerous containers curbside. Purchasing a lawn mulcher is one option. Rear yard compost piles are allowed, but the burning of leaves and other yard waste is not permitted by the Village's municipal code.

# Water Conservation And Control

The summer season is right around the corner. Soon it will be time to take your garden hoses and sprinkler attachments out of storage to quench the thirst of your lawn. Once again Ordinance 90-30 will be in effect this year, which restricts the times and methods of water used for lawn sprinkling. These restrictions have been mandated by the State and Federal Authorities comtrolling the Lake Wichigan water allocations. The rule not only applies to current water utilities supplied by lake water, but to those who will be supplied by lake water in the future. Water conservation is important to each person in our community and by actively participating in conserving water, you protect a valuable natural resource and save money.

# HIGHLIGHTS OF ORDINANCE NO. 90-30, WATER CONSERVATION AND CONTROL ARE AS FOLLOWS:

- Single Family residential addresses with odd numbers may use the public water supply for outside watering through automatic sprinkling devices only on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday between the hours of 5 am and 9 am or 5 pm and 9 pm.
- Single Family residential addresses with even numbers may use the public water supply for outside watering through automatic sprinkling devices only on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday between the hours of 5 am and 9 am or 5 pm and 9 pm.
- Units of Government, Commercial, Industrial, Manufacturing, Office Buildings and Multi-family Residential buildings may
  use the public water supply for outside watering through automatic sprinkling devices only on Tuesday, Thursday and
  Sunday between the hours of 5 am and 9 am or 5 pm and 9 pm.
- Permits for newly sodded or seeded lawns will be available from the Director of Village Services office upon application for such permit. Permits would allow for outside watering by means of automatic sprinklers for a period of thirty (30) consecutive days between the hours of 5 am and 9 am or 5 pm and 9 pm.
- The use of hand-held watering devices is permitted without restriction for any purpose except when the device is left on unattended, or no device is used to control the flow of water. If a hand-held watering device is left on unattended, it is considered to be an automatic sprinkling device and subject to the restrictions previously mentioned.

The times that automatic sprinkling is permitted have been established not only as a conservation method, but also are optimum times for effective lawn sprinkling with minimum loss due to evaporation or runoff.

THE WATER CONSERVATION AND CONTROL ORDINANCE NO. 90-30 IS EFFECTIVE FROM MAY THROUGH SEPTEMBER, ANNUALLY. Copies of the Ordinance are available at the Village Hall.

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# Brush Collection & Chipper Service

The Village Services-Public Works Division Residential Brush Collection and Chipper Program will begin on Monday, April 27, 1992. The program will run for one month. This program will be held again in the fall beginning on September 28, 1992.

The Pick-Up Program is offered twice per year at NO charge. Please read the following information carefully to understand what preparations are necessary and to confirm in which section of the Village you live.

Brush, branches and stems under six inches in diameter are the only items that will be picked up. LEAVES, VINES and MULTIFLORA (rose bushes with thorns) WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.

Residents will be allowed PICK-UP SER-VICES ONLY during their scheduled pick-up week. Each brush removal period will be one week in duration. Residents are encouraged to have their materials out NO LATER THAN THE

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

# **Community Outreach**

Since 1984, the Bloomingdale Neighborhood Watch program has grown from the initial six to more than 100

block captains.

These volunteers work as liaisons between their neighborhood and the police department, essentially serving as "extra eyes and ears" for the department. Their primary purpose is to immediately report any suspicious activity to the Police Department, and to organize their neighbors to do likewise. The block captains also distribute educational information, a bi-monthly newsletter, and serve as a communication link, alerting residents in their area about situations relevant to crime prevention concerns.

A successful Neighborhood Watch program requires citizens willing to volunteer their time and ideas so that the community's quality of life can be enhanced. Awareness and involvement are the keys to a successful program. Bloomingdale is fortunate to have both.

Continuing the commitment to education, the Bloomingdale Police Department developed Bloomingdale's Citizen Police Academy in 1988 as an extension of the Neighborhood Watch and Community Relations programs.

This series of classes, conducted by the Bloomingdale Police Department, was modeled after a Citizen Police Academy already established in Orlando, Florida. To our knowledge, this Citizen Police Academy is the first of its kind in Illinois.

The purpose of the academy is to build better understanding between residents and police departments through education. The goal of the program is to ultimately assist in the reduction of crime through deeper community support.

The Citizen Police Academy is not designed to make participants certified police officers, nor does it give the graduates the authority to act as police officers. What it has achieved is an acute awareness of the in-depth and on-going training given to police officers and a respect for the ability and desire of these officers to serve the community.

The focus of the academy curriculum has been to provide an informative overview of the fundamentals of police work as taught by Bloomingdale police officers representing various areas of expertise. Class structure includes lecture and discussion, role playing and experimentation by students, as well as films and hands-on demonstrations by the instructors. Class topics include:

#### ORIENTATION:

Students learn how the police department is structured and participate in a vehicle deployment exercise.

# CHAPTER 38 -- SEARCH AND SEIZURE:

This covers the Illinois Criminal Code and aspects of Constitutional Law as it applies to Law Enforcement.

# D.U.I., CHAPTER 95 1/2, ACCIDENT INVESTIGATION:

This class deals with the Illinois Vehicle Code, D.U.I. laws and how accidents are investigated.

# RAPE AWARENESS:

Types of rape, profiles of rapists and the

different classifications of rapists are discussed.

# AUTO THEFT, RADAR ENFORCEMENT:

Methods and details of radar enforcement are discussed, with students given the opportunity to actually monitor traffic for speeders.

# USE OF FORCE, DEFENSIVE TACTICS, HANDCUFFING:

This class covers the lawful amount of force allowed when effecting an arrest and the limitations thereof.

### FATS, FIREARMS:

Each student has the opportunity to participate in a simulation using the Firearms Training System. This is a training device used to create realistic scenarios in which officers fire a .375 Magnum, modified to shoot a laser at a screen on which a lifelike and life-size scene is depicted. The student is put in a shoot/don't shoot situation and must make that decision.

#### INTERVIEWS AND

INTERROGATIONS, JUVENILE LAW: Proper interview/interrogation techniques are discussed and demonstrated with students given a chance to role play. Juvenile Law covers specifically the Juvenile Justice System and how it operates.

# STREET GANGS, BIKER GANGS, SATANIC CULTS:

Gang structure, language, history, location and lifestyle are discussed. Street gangs are emphasized due to their infiltration into the suburbs. Satanic Cults are also discussed.

## CRIME SCENE PROCESSING:

Participants are given the opportunity to view and experiment with equipment used to gather evidence from a crime scene. Proper procedure is discussed with demonstrations of different techniques.

Bloomingdale Police Department intends to continue giving residents the opportunity for crime prevention education using the most innovative programs possible. The substantial increases in suspicious auto and person reports have coincided with the continued growth and

success of the Neighborhood Watch Program. As our citizens have become more cognizant of crime prevention techniques, they have also become more active in that endeavor.

# Tompkins Park -- Win/Win For All

Mayor Samuel J. Tenuto said recently that Tompkins Park "is an example of inter-governmental cooperation which benefits all of our residents."

Tompkins Park, located on 5.12 acres of land at Edgewater Drive and Winston Lane was originally owned by School District 13. The School District needed the revenue from the sale of that land to apply toward the building of their new elementary school on Springfield Drive.

The Village obtained an open space grant for \$70,000 from the Illinois Department of Conservation, a grant for acquisition of land for park and recreational uses. The Village then used that grant money toward the \$198,500 sale price of School District 13's land on March 20, 1991.

Shortly thereafter, the Village constructed a new water pumping booster station to bring Lake Michigan water to the Village on the part of the property along the east side of Winston Lane.

On March 23, 1992, the Village Board conveyed the remaining 4.38 acres of Tompkins Park to the Bloomingdale Park District at no cost. The land, now titled in the name of the Bloomingdale Park District, will continue to be used as a park, complete with playground and baseball fields. The Park will continue to be designated as Tompkins Park in memory of the late Harold Tompkins, District 13 Superintendent from July 1972 through December 1978.

The School District got needed revenue from the sale to apply toward their new school building. The Park District acquired title to the land where they have operated recreational facilities for more than 15 years. The Village obtained \$70,000 from the State to partially defray the cost of the land purchase, part of which they used for the new pumping station.


The residents of Bloomingdale are the end recipients of a "win-win-win" transaction.

Village Compliance With Americans With Disabilities Act


The Americans With Disabilities Act is given full force by the federal certified regulations issued by the US Department of Justice. These regulations require that the Village designate an ADA Coordinator, adopt an ADA grievance processing procedure, process a public notice of compliance, conduct a self-evaluation of its programs, activities and services, and evaluate the accessibility of all its facilities.

The Village Board at its January 27, 1992 meeting adopted Resolution 92-R-3, indicating that Harvey E. Schmidt will be the Village's ADA Coordinator.

A copy of the resolution and grievance procedure is available at the Village Hall, 201 S. Bloomingdale Road.

The ADA Coordinator is responsible for promptly and accurately responding to any complaints from residents or those who visit Village facilities, that allege there is not equal opportunity to participate in a Village program, activity or service, or that alleges there is not equal accessibility for a qualified disabled person at a Village facility. All such complaints will be responded to within the parameters of the grievance procedure.





During the Christmas season members delivered Christmas Food Baskets and gift certificates to needy families in the area.






# **Easter Egg Hunt**





# Growing To Serve

"Growing to Serve" has been the motto of the Bloomingdale Public Library since its inception in 1974. Over the years, the Library has grown considerably and always the Library Board and staff have kept the motto "Growing to Serve" in the forefront. During the next several months, the Library will be growing again in order to better serve its patrons. A remodeling project that will enable the Library to utilize all its existing space, will begin sometime in May. This project will include some handicapped accessibility work and the addition of a new and expanded library automation system.

The first Library was housed in two mobile classrooms totalling 1,500 square feet . The initial book collection was made up of donations. In September 1980, voters approved a referendum to build a permanent 20,000 square foot facility. It opened in July 1982 with approximately 13,000 square feet in use.

By 1982, the Library held 26,697 volumes and loaned 94,484 items to patrons. Today, it holds around 55,000 items, and will loan more than 160,000 items this Fiscal Year.

Over the past several years, the Library has increasingly felt the effects of the expansion of its collection, increased use by patrons and the need for more space. As a result, the Library Board adopted, as a part of the Library's LONG RANGE PLAN 1989/1990 - 1991/1992 the following goal: "Facilities accommodate an expanded materials collection, an expanded population, and expanded library programming." To do this, the Board developed, with the help of a library building consultant, a building expansion program that projects the Library's space needs through 2010.

Using this Building Program, the Library's architect, Dwain Lutzow of Dahlquist and Lutzow Architects, prepared a two phase interior remodeling and improvement program. Phase I included remodeling and utilizing all the Library's existing space with a cost estimate of \$600,000.

The Library Board, realizing that the entire project could not be financed without a referendum, decided to complete the project in phases, so that portions could be funded out of the Library's general fund, creating no tax rate increase for residents at the present time. The Library Board and staff then determined what phase to complete first with a

\$190,000 budget. Needs were prioritized and the need for space came out on top.

They decided that that moving the Youth Services Department to the lower level and expanding the Adult Services Department on the first level would eliminate some of the Library's current major space problems with minimal cost and revised the original remodeling plans accordingly. These plans include basically putting up some walls, painting and carpeting at a fraction of the original project.


A small portion of the entire building project needs are being met by completing this phase only. Heating and air conditioning problems, too expensive to be corrected now, and other building problems will still exist and will need to be addressed in the future. The Library Board and staff felt that this partial renovation project would be the best way to provide better service to our patrons with minimal cost.

Part of the Library's remodeling project will include handicapped accessibility, installing a lift to the upper level mezzanine and hardware and door modifications. This work will be funded partially through a federally funded LSCA Grant that the Library received through the Illinois State Library.

The Library is also incorporating in this renovation project the addition of a new and enhanced automation system that will be shared with seven other libraries -- Addison, Batavia, Franklin Park, Glen Ellyn, Itasca, Villa Park and St. Charles. Recently these libraries formed a consortium and chose Data Research Associates (DRA) of St. Louis, MO as the vendor for the consortium.

The new system has numerous capabilities that our current automation system does not have and will really enhance the accessibility to information for our staff and patrons. In April the Library will be converting from its present vendor, CLSI, to DRA. In May the first on-line public access catalog or OPAC will be available to our patrons.

The Library Board and staff are excited about all these upcoming changes and the ways in which these changes will enable us to provide better service to our patrons, allowing us to keep our ongoing motto "Growing to Serve".



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
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

# Red Cross Classes For Youngsters



The Bloomingdale Public Library has scheduled two American Red Cross Courses targeted to the need for little ones to develop strong skills in first aid and self-care.

Each course consists of two sessions. Upon completion of both sessions in either course, participants will receive a Red Cross Certificate of Attendance.

Registration and payment of the \$3 fee for each of these courses are required in advance. Library cards are required. To register, stop at the Youth Services desk or call the library, 529-3120.

FIRST AID FOR LITTLE PEOPLE will teach children in grades 1, 2 and 3 how to handle an emergency situation. Those enrolled will also make a first aid kit with supplies provided by parents from home.

The classes will be held both Monday and Tuesday, April 27 and 28 from 4-5 pm.

HOME ALOME, a two-day course with sessions on Monday and Tuesday, May 4-5 from 4-5 pm, will teach children from kindergarten through sixth grade, simple rules and procedures for self-care, designed to promote responsibility and self-awareness. A course-related activity book reinforcing those lessons will be provided for children to work on with their parents at home.

Both programs are limited to 20 participants, so you will want to register early.

AMERICAN RED CROSS BABYSITTING COURSE, offered from 9:15 am to 4:30 pm on Saturday, June 6, will be open to boys and girls age eleven and older. Registration is required. Students who attend the class and successfully meet the requirements will be Red Cross certified.

The course covers the following topics: responsibilities of a babysitter, basic child growth and development, selection of appropriate toys and games, home safety and accident prevention, basic first aid, personal safety of a babysitter, feeding of children and handling and diapering of infants. Representatives from the police department, fire department and a hospital are also scheduled to attend.

This class is a full-day workshop. Students need to bring a lunch, a beverage and a doll they can diaper. Enrollment is limited to 30. Debbie Wells, a certified Red Cross instructor, will teach the class. To register please stop by the Bloomingdale Public Library or telephone 529-3120. Bloomingdale residents will be given priority and non-residents will be notified if space is available.

They have spent countless hours establishing authenticity, obtaining permission from historic sites and collecting seeds from these trees.







In addition, there will be pizza, oriental food, root beer floats, hand-dipped sundaes, beer and pop (to name just a few) to whet your palette throughout the fest.



Sponsorships are available for the Bloomingdale Family Fest to be held at Springfield Drive and Lake Street on Jùne 27, 28 and 29.




