

With the advent of Lake Michigan Water, the Village is now financially responsible to the DuPage Water Commission for the water residents and businesses use in Bloomingdale. Our total operating and maintenance costs for water have increased 58 percent with Lake Michigan water.

Obviously, water rates have to increase to keep up with these rising costs. In addition, one of the plans the Village is implementing includes a \$3 million grant from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for the improvements to our wastewater treatment plant. A requirement for obtaining this grant involves the conformity of the **sewer rate** for both residential and commercial users. For years, the business community has paid nearly twice as much as residents for both water and sewer.

Originally, a 70% rate increase in the water and sewer bills was projected for the "average" residential user (9,000 gallons per month or 18,000 per bill), and a 47% increase in the bills for the "average" commercial user (24,000 gallons per month). This kind of burden on water & sewer users was not acceptable to the trustees.

After several meetings and many hours of staff reworking plans and options at the trustees' urging, the Village Board has voted to adopt a three-phase plan which will increase water/sewer bills each May 1 for three years, beginning this year. The Board opted for a threeyear plan so as not to burden consumers with one large increase and to minimize the total increase required by subsidizing the rates and by spreading out capital improvements over a longer time period. These new rates will be applied to all water consumption after May 1, 1992.

The approved plan considers projected costs for operations and for capital improvements over an eightyear period. The rates were established such that no increases beyond the initial three-year phases are anticipated. We have no control as to our costs for water delivered by the City of Chicago to the DuPage Water Commission, therefore, any water increases from the City of Chicago will have to be passed along to our users.

Costs for major capital improvements for such items as additional water storage facilities, increased EPA sewer treatment requirements, water transmission lines and replacement of old failing sewer systems are covered by the eight-year program and will not re-

quire any additional bonding or rate increases. Cost for inflation have, with the exception of water from the City of Chicago, have been factored into the water/sewer costsfor the next eight years.

Following is a chart to give water and sewer users some idea of how the increases might affect them financially.

The percentage of increase varies by the amount of consumption, but using 18,000 gallons per two-month bill as a middle ground, we have a current 23% increase, 1993 will be a 23% increase and 1994 a 7% increase.

Using 24,000 gallons as a middle ground, commercial rates will decrease by 6% this year, increase by 18% in 1993 and increase by 15% in 1994.

SPRINKLING REGULATIONS

Here are some highlights on the water conservation ordinance, which is in effect from May through September, annually.

The following allows for sprinkling **ONLY** between the hours of 5 and 9 a.m. or between the hours of 5 and 9 p.m.:

Single family homes with odd numbers sprinkle Monday, Wednesday and Saturday

Single family homes with even numbers sprinkle Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday

Commercial, office and multi-family residential sprinkle Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday

Permits for sprinkling newly sodded or seeded lawns for thirty (30) consecutive days are available from the Director of Village Services

Hand-held watering devices are permitted without restriction as long as they are not left unattended.

Road Construction – 1992

Greenway Drive Reconstruction

The Village is planning to reconstruct Greenway Drive from Bloomingdale Road to west of 159 Greenway Drive during the summer of 1992. This project includes removal of the existing pavement including curbs and gutters and road base and replacement with new base, surface and curbs and gutters. The new road will be the same width as the existing road; no widening is planned. All work is funded 100% by the Village.

The project is scheduled to begin during the first week of July and will take approximately 3 months to complete. During construction the road will be closed to through traffic. If you live in the construction zone, or on one of the six adjacent streets (Sutherland Lane, Norton Lane, Bridgewater Lane, Surrey Lane, Plymouth Lane or Hempstead Lane) you will be permitted to proceed past the barricades to reach your residence.

All other through traffic should follow the posted detour route. The detour route is Greenway Drive to Bloomingdale Road to Edgewater Drive to Greenway Drive or the reverse route (Greenway to Edgewater to Bloomingdale to Greenway).

As part of this project, the Village will be installing a depressed curb at each driveway on Greenway Drive. This means the "bump" at the curb of each driveway is being eliminated, and a smooth transition from the street to each driveway will be constructed. The Village will also be reconstructing the driveway aprons, that is, the concrete driveway between the sidewalk and the curb, as part of the project.

Overlay Maintenance

The Village is planning to perform overlay maintenance on Creekside Drive, Brookdale Drive, Terry Lane, Morningside Drive, Dawn Court, Dee Court and Starling Court during the summer of 1992. All work is funded 100% by the Village.

New overlay construction consists of repairing curbs which do not drain properly, repairing failed pavement areas and installing a new asphalt surface over the entire road. We will not be repairing cracked curbs unless the failed curb is impeding drainage.

During this project, the streets will remain open to traffic. There will be brief periods when certain sections of the road are temporarily closed while work is taking place at a particular location. This work will begin in July and will take approximately 3 weeks to complete.

To recap, the water rates must increase due to the higher costs incurred from Lake Michigan water and the sewer rates are changing to come into conformity with EPA requirements in order to meet the requirements of the \$3 million grant.

This is the first Village water rate increase since 1988. We will continue to subsidize our water rates by allocating a portion of the property tax revenues to the water system.

On page 2 you will find some water conservation tips. As can be seen from the above charts, the new rate structure has been developed to encourage conservation. By conserving water, the effect of the increase can be minimized. This is important to keep in mind when watering lawns this summer.





Increase

Effective July 1, 1990, yard waste material (i.e. grass clippings, leaves, brush trimmings and tree trimmings) are no longer accepted at any landfill in the State of Illinois.

As many residents know, Browning Ferris picks up yard waste as part of the Village's yard waste program. Yard waste is to be placed curbside in either 33 gallon or less containers or in biodegradable paper bags. Yard waste stickers must be applied regardless of the method used.

Yard waste stickers are \$1.05 each and are available at the Village Hall or at the following local businesses: Ace Hardware, True Value Hardware, Dominicks, Jewel/Osco, Economart and Bloomingdale Pharmacy. They may also be purchased directly from BFI. Remember, a yard waste sticker must be applied to each container or bag used.

BFI will also pick up bundled branches if a yard waste sticker is affixed to each bundle. Bundles should be no longer than four (4) feet and weight less than 50 pounds. Branches may not exceed three (3) inches in diameter.

All yard waste should be placed at the curb at least four feet away from your other waste on your scheduled garbage pickup day. Any containers that contain a mixture of yard waste and other garbage will be left at the curb in order to comply with the State law.


The Village has received many questions about alternatives to placing numerous containers curbside. Purchasing a lawn mulcher is one option. Rear yard compost piles are allowed, but the burning of leaves and other yard waste is not permitted by the Village's municipal code.

Village Residents who are planning to build or install an accessory use or structure, such as a swimming pool, fireplace, patio, deck, gazebo, fence, addition. shed. room tached/detached garage, or central air conditioning unit, should contact the Village Services - Building and Zoning Division before starting the project. The Building and Zoning Division is staffed with certified/trained personnel who will be able to determine the various codes, requirements and permits involved with the construction of your individual project.

Many times, residents are unaware that their projects may cause drainage




problems for themselves and their neighbors; that the accessory use or structure is located in a public easement; that ordinances may prohibit certain types of projects; or that the accessory is encroaching upon a neighbor's property. In addition, for some projects, the Building and Zoning Division will make sure that the design plans include the proper construction materials for your safety and, during construction, will conduct an inspection(s) to make sure that your project is being built correctly.

The Building and Zoning Division has prepared informational packets which outline the basic requirements for new accessory uses and structures. Although these packets provide the basic requirements, each project is unique and residents should consult with the Building and Zoning Division before starting the project. Packets are available for the more common projects such as fences, decks, gazebos, sheds, swimming pools, patios, room additions, attached/detached garages, reroofing, fireplaces and residential central air conditioning units. These information packets are free of charge.



Circulation/Technical Services They Keep The Library Moving Efficiently

This month the library focuses its spotlight on the Circulation/Technical Services Department. This is that special group of people responsible for the processing and circulation of all the library's holdings. They catalog, label and input into the computer each item for the patrons to check out.

In order for patrons to check out any material, they must have a valid

Bloomingdale Public Library borrower's card. A card, issued for a period of three years, can be obtained by presenting identification showing that an individual is a resident of the Village of Bloomingdale. The staff knows the Village's boundaries and most of the names of the streets. Every day new patrons are registered and the information is entered into

When a patron checks out materials, the computer keeps track of when they are due, any reserves that may be on the items, and the number of times the items have been checked out.

The Circulation/Technical Services staff are also responsible for repairing, withdrawing and shelving of the materials. Often the staff can be seen doing jobs that are not part of the official job description...finding a lost parent, giving directions to a delivery person, offering a tissue in an emergency or lending a helping hand.


The Circulation/Technical Services staff consists of the Department Head, Sally Mee along with nine clerks, two senior shelvers and four shelvers. Pat Rooney, who has been on the staff since 1982, is supervisor of the shelvers. Keeping the library statistics has been the responsibility of Dolores Schram from the time she started with the library in 1982. Sue Drogos joined the staff in 1989 and can be seen assisting at story hours as well as at the front desk. Helen Asta (1989) and Karen Koehn (1991) divide their time between the front desk and inputting into the data base. Lisa Heil, a teacher's aide in Bloomingdale School District 13, has been a staff member since 1990. Lisa is responsible for all the original graphics in the department. The preeminent member of the staff, Harriet Smolla, has had many responsibilities since starting at the library in 1981. Currently, she is cataloging and inputting the library's acquisitions.

The two senior shelvers are both college students who originally started working at the library when they were in high school. Steve Slavick attends the College of DuPage and plans to major in journalism. The University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign is where Tamu Spells is majoring in accounting. These two energetic young people are responsible for shelving materials as well as assisting at the circulation desk.

From Glenbard North High School, graduating senior Kandice Krettler has been a shelver since her junior year. Samantha Hoover is a junior at Lake Park High School, while Katie Mendygral and Laura Frazen are sophomores. All of the shelvers work throughout the entire library, shelving

and straightening materials as necessary. They are often called upon to help the staff in other departments on special projects.

The circulation desk is located at the entrance to the library, so it is the first and last contact that patrons have with the library and the staff endeavors to make it a pleasant experience.

Annual Report Fiscal Year 1991-1992

Statement of Purpose

The Bloomingdale Public Library actively provides current, high-demand popular materials and useful, timely information in a variety of formats for persons of all ages in pursuit of their recreational and personal needs. The Library places special emphasis on stimulating young children's interest in reading and learning, and assists students of all ages in formal education courses.

Commitment to Service

The Library Board of Trustees and staff are committed at all times to providing excellence in library services. The trustees and staff actively work together to make the Library an open, friendly and warm place for patrons to visit.

Highlights of the Year

On April 30, 1992, Bloomingdale Public Library's fiscal year ended and the statistics revealed that 1991/1992 was Bloomingdale Library's best year ever! Our year was so successful because of the wonderful patronage of our community and the outstanding support of Bloomingdale's business community and non-profit organizations, such as the Lions Club, the Bloomingdale Women's Club, and the Friends of the Library. In addition, the fine support the Library received from the Village of Bloomingdale helped to make the Library's year very successful.

Below are highlights of FY 1991/1992.

Our Patrons -

- checked out 170,048 items (books, videos, cassettes, etc.) over the past year almost a 10% increase over last year's 155,235 items.
- visited the library 155,452 times. This averages out to approximately 9.4 visits for each resident in Boomingdale.
- registered for many library cards. Now 10,968 residents (55%) of Bloomingdale have registered library cards.

Our Staff -

- added 5,673 new items (books, cassettes, videos, CD's, etc.) to our collection of materials, which increased our total collectin to 55,526 items.
- presented programs to 14,608 patrons: 12,134 children and 2,474 adults a 20% increase over last year.
- answered a record-breaking number of reference questions, approximately 20,644 during the year.

The Library -

- provided rooms for community group meetings 347 times and for library programs 424 times, for a total of 771. That's an average of almost 15 activities each week.
- expanded and added the following services for residences:
- Expanded services in the Youth Services Department in the following ways: Added another Toddler Time session to accomodate the growing demand; Increased offering of two very popular children's programs, First Aid for Little People and Home Alone, from once a year to twice a year; Started a Junior Friends, a summer volunteer organization for young adults; Started a winter reading program; Increased class visits to the Bloomingdale Public Library, as well as Librarian visits to area schools. Increased adult programming by offering a variety of programs almost weekly rather than once or twice a month. Expanded outreach to new residents by designing a new patron library information packet for distribution by the Welcome Wagon, realtors and staff. Started a writer's group, for local area writers, that meets monthly at the library. Added a new magazine service, InfoTrac, which greatly enhanced our patrons' access to magazines. Increased both the adult and children's summer reading programs.

Fiscal Year 1991/1992 was a very busy and progressive year for the Bloomingdale Public Library. The Library Board and staff extend a hearty "THANK YOU" to everyone for making it so successful.

New School Plans

With the passage of the referendum on March 17, the Board of Education began making plans for the construction of the new school on Springfield Drive. The new building will replace Central School and five portable structures now in use. The district's architectural firm FGM/c and the project architects, John Ochoa and Mary Ann O'Hara, have completed the design work and construction documents.

Bid packages for the one story, 56,000 square foot elementary school will be in the hands of potential bidders from June 15 through July 7. Bids will be opened by the Board of Education on July 7. We hope to award a construction contract at a special Board meeting on July 8. Groundbreaking is set tentatively for Monday, July 20.

Along with the actual construction of the new school, there are two side issues which are very important to our school community. As we are moving all sixth grade students from Westfield School to the elementary buildings, we will have to redraw the attendance boundaries between DuJardin and the new school. Also, the Board of Education will have to determine whether the new building will be called Central School or have a new name. Both issues will be very important to our parents. Therefore, the district will be forming two advisory committees to give the Board their recommendations. These committees made up of parents, teachers administrators and other concerned people, will be organized in September.

Faculty Committees

Major changes in District 13's programs come from in-depth studies completed by administrators and teachers of the issues involved. For two years Assistant Superintendent Dr. Janice Cernock and a committee of teachers have been studying the district's science curriculum and textbooks. In addition, they piloted two possible textbook adoptions. On June 8 the committee recommended that the district adopt new science textbooks from Scott Foresman in grades K-5 and Prentice Hall in grades 6-8. These new texts closely match the district's goals and philosophy. Their strengths contain integration of science concepts and the inclusion of many hands-on activities.

The technology committee, chaired by Chuck Swangren, Westfield's Principal, has also been very busy this year. At the May 11 meeting of the Board of Education, this committee recommended that the Board of Education install new IBM computer labs in our elementary schools over the next three years. In addition, they recommended that each of the three schools' library systems be computerized to take advantage of the electronic bulletin boards and other similar information services available today. The total cost of the new computers including software and necessary furniture would be \$250,000 to be spent over the three year period.
