

20th Annual Septemberfest

For 20 years, Bloomingdale residents and area neighbors have been coming together for one last summertime fling the Sunday following Labor Day. The annual Septemberfest celebration has come to be a well-loved gathering of neighbors amid booths set up by notfor-profit organizations, crafters and antique dealers.

The event was originally sponsored by the Bloomingdale Historical Society as an effort to help Bloomingdale relate its past with both its present and future. The early years featured such events as children's historical costume contests, beard growing contests, hay rides, antique car parades, as well as the still popular food, handmade items and antiques.

Fifty-cent raffle tickets were sold for handmade quilts. Proceeds were used to help renovate the historic park district building (now the museum) and to obtain historic artifacts in the area of Bloomingdale.

Over the years certain elements of the day have come and gone, but the home town flavor remains the same. The 20th annual Septemberfest will take place from 11 a.m. - 6 p.m. on Sunday, September 13. The official flag ceremony begins at noon followed by an introduction of dignitaries present. Immediately following is the coronation of the 1992 Septemberfest King and Queen.

Although Maureen Reagan was named Bloomingdale's Bicentennial Queen, the first Septemberfest Bloomingdale Queen was crowned in 1977. Sixteenyear old Lisa LoPresti received a silver charm bracelet and charm and a \$100 savings bond. A Lake Park High School junior, she worked as a nurse's aid at Bloomingdale Pavilion and as a volunteer at Marklund Home. A new tradition began last year as the customary Queen contest was expanded to include the crowning of a king. The contest is open to any young person between the ages of 16 and 21 who is a resident of incorporated Bloomingdale. Deadline for entries is Friday, August 28. For more information on the contest see p. 8.

Last year Septemberfest committee members were pleased to be able to award a \$1000 scholarship to both the queen and the king, as well as a \$500 scholarship to each of the first runnersup. This year organizers are hoping to increase those.

Solicitation letters have recently been mailed out to area businesses to help augment the funds set aside for the scholarships. Already generous donations have been made by NBD Bank Bloomingdale, Ristorante Amalfi, J&M Liquor, Bloomingdale Soccer Club, Egghead Software, Helios, LaSalle Talman Bank and NSK Corporation.

In addition, the Septemberfest Committee has added \$5 to the cost of booth rentals earmarked for the scholarship fund. They have made a commitment to continue to offer sizable scholarship awards to those young adults chosen to represent Bloomingdale's youth.

The Septemberfest celebration will be highlighted by a variety of entertainment starting at 11:00 a.m. with disk jockey Mike Lettieri of M&R Music. Local talent will be featured from 1-1:30, followed by Rick Lindy singing classics from the 50's. Lindy is a Bloomingdale resident and former member of the Serendipity Singers.

The local talent show will take place from 3:30 - 4:30 p.m. Interested persons should leave their name & type of act at the Bloomingdale Public Library or call Mike Lettieri at 790-9556.

According to Septemberfest Chairman Buzz Puccio, there will be plenty of food and drink available. Applications for booths for Septemberfest are \$30, plus \$15 for an electrical hookup and will be accepted until all available spaces have been filled. In attempt to get a handle on the brush problem, the Village of Bloomingdale offers a brush pick-up program twice a year, once during the month of May, and once during the month of October. Brush Collection Chipper Program

The Bloomingdale Public Works, Street Division, will be offering their annual Brush Collection and Chipper Program beginning Monday, September 28, 1992 through Friday, October 30, 1992.

The following information will help the residents of Bloomingdale to get prepared for this event:

- Brush, branches, and stems under six (6) inches in diameter are the only items that will be picked up. LEAVES, VINES AND MULTIFLORA (ROSE BUSHES WITH THORNS) WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.
- Each resident will be allowed <u>PICK-UP ONLY</u> during their scheduled pick-up week. Each brush removal period will be one week in duration.
- Residents are encouraged to have their materials out NO LATER THAN THE FIRST DAY OF THEIR PICK-UP SCHEDULE.
- ALL BRUSH, BRANCHES AND STEMS SHOULD BE PLACED <u>AT THE</u> <u>CURB</u> AND SHOULD BE STACKED IN AN ORDERLY FASHION WITH CUT OR BUTT END TOWARDS THE CURB. Brush, branches or stems should <u>not</u> be bundled or tied. Any branches, stems, and brush exceeding six (6) inches in diameter will not be picked up.
- Bagged or canned branches will not be picked up. Small twigs and leaves should be in bags with tags for B.F.I. to pick-up.

On February 10, 1992 the Village passed an Ethics Ordinance. This Ordinance was the result of more than 18 months of work by the Citizen's Chaired Ethics Committee comprised of James Briggs, Stephen Hartley, Larry Hollingsworth, Kandy Litchfield, David Riemenschneider and Bernadette Tasher.

The Committee was charged by the Village Board with the responsibility of developing an Ethics Ordinance that would guide the conduct of elected and appointed officials, as well as Village employees.

Highlights of this new Ordinance are:

...a statement expressing the goal that all public officials "avoid any action that might suggest the appearance of impropriety".

Ethics Ordinance

...No elected or appointed official or Village employee is permitted to "accept, solicit or receive, anything of value either in money, discounts or services

..... when accepting such an item will, to a reasonable person, give the appearance that the official is being influenced in his official capacity".

...Provisions which prohibit the disclosure of confidential information by public officials and the use of such information to "advance the financial or private interest" of such an official.

...No Village officials are permitted to use their position for individual gain or use Village property for their private use.

If citizens believe that an elected or appointed official, or a Village em-

ployee, has broken this Ethics Ordinance, they are directed to make a written complaint to the Village Clerk. All properly submitted complaints will be investigated. In the event that violations are discovered, disciplinary action may be imposed. In order that all persons covered by this Ordinance might know of its terms, all newly elected or appointed officials, as well as newly hired employees receive copies of the Ordinance upon beginning their terms in office or employment.

This newly enacted Ordinance establishes a clear code of behavior which all Village residents should expect from their elected or appointed officials, as well as employees working for their Village. Since this Ordinance was promulgated more than five months ago, no complaints of violations have been made to the Village Clerk.





Dist. 13 Breaks Ground



On Thursday, July 23, the Board of Education of Bloomingdale Elementary School District 13 held a ground breaking ceremony for the new elementary school being built at 277 Springfield Drive.

The new elementary school will house 700 kindergarten through sixth grade students. It will be 58,000 square feet and will include a gymnasium with stage, art, instrumental and vocal music classrooms, as well as ar rooms available for special education programs. The building will be completed in time for the opening of school next year.

Burnside Construction Company of Downers Grove is building the one story school for a cost of \$3,953,118. The building was designed by John Ochoa and Mary Ann O'Hara of FGM/c Architects, Oak Brook. The total budget for the new facility including all fees and equipment is \$4.6 million.

A Note To Our Patrons Bare Shelves and New DRA Computer System Herald Growth

This Spring and Summer two important changes took place at the Bloomingdale Public Library. The new DRA computer system came online on May 5 and the library's expansion project started on June 24. Each of these undertakings have been gratifying experiences because of the favorable response from our patrons.

The new computer system has many features that the previous system lacked. A computer generated mailer is sent to patrons who have items being held for them. If the patron happens to be in the library before receiving the notification, the computer will alert the staff to a possible reserve waiting for pickup by the patron. Another feature of the system is the patron request list. As long as patrons have their library cards with them, their request list of titles that they have on reserve can be viewed. These and the Patron Access Catalog in the Adult Services Department are just a few of the new features with the system. Just as the staff was becoming at ease with the new computer system, the construction began on the lower level for the new Youth Services Department. The work is progressing smoothly even though some days are a little noisy for a library. At this time a completion date for the first phase is expected to be in late August or early September. This is when the community's help will be needed. Plans are being made for extended check-out times (as much as six weeks) so that the shelves will be BARE, and fewer materials will need to be moved at the same time. In the next few weeks, check the local newspapers, the village marquee and the library for more information on the BARE TEAM.






will be able to search by keywords n d phrases. To find out how to use the OPAC, ask a reference librarian for

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instruction. Bhupendra B. Patel uses the OPAC.


Women Managing Time


Janalee Garwood is the Head of Adult Services and has been at BPL since October 1992. Prior to receiving her Master's in Library Science, she worked as a reference


