

BLOOMINGDALE ADA COMMITTEE HARD AT WORK

The Village of Bloomingdale has passed Resolution No. 92-R-2, which pledges full Village support of and compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act, and Ordinance No.92-27, which establishes the Village's Americans with Disabilities Act Committee. This committee was given the responsibility to study all Village facilities, programs, services and activities, and to assess whether they provide either equal access to or participation in such Village activities and services.

There are an estimated 43 million people in this country who are covered by the Americans with Disabilities Act. These are all individuals with unique needs, skills, and opinions. It is part of the charge of the Village's ADA Committee to ensure equal accessibility for the disabled to Village facilities which are places of public accommodation. Changes have been and are continuing to be made to Village facilities to ensure full compliance with ADA guidelines.

The ADA Committee is soliciting the input of disabled residents to assess their special needs that might not be addressed currently.

If you are not disabled, but still would like to receive a follow-up survey which will solicit more detailed comments and opinions as to the accessibility of Village facilities and programs to the disabled, you may return the survey with your address and phone number.

The ADA Committee meets on the third Wednesday of the month at 1:00 p.m. at the Village Hall upper level conference room.



INSTALLATION OF STOP SIGNS

The Village Services Department frequently receives inquiries from residents seeking installation of stop signs or other traffic control signage at various intersections throughout the Village. Frequently such requests for the installation of stop signs cannot be approved leaving residents wondering whether the Village is really concerned for the safety of pedestrians and vehicles using Village streets.

Rest assured, the Village is very concerned about your safety and the safety of pedestrians and motorists visiting the Village. It is with this concern that the Village utilizes specific uniformly— applied standards to evaluate requests for stop signs.

In determining whether an intersection requires some type of traffic control signage, the Village uses the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways (MUTCD) developed by the Federal Highway Administration and adopted by the Illinois Department of Transportation. This manual governs the usage of traffic control devices within the Village of Bloomingdale.

The decision to install a traffic control sign at a particular intersection is based upon specific intersection data which is evaluated in an engineering study. The data gathered and evaluated at an intersection includes:

- The number of vehicles maneuvering in the intersection
- The types of vehicles
- o The number of pedestrians using the intersection
- The average or mean speed of vehicles
- Intersection geometry including sight distance restrictions, vertical elevations, on-street parking conditions, and street lighting
- Accidents reported during the previous year.

The data collected is evaluated in light of specific warrant conditions as established in the *MUTCD* and the *Institute of Transportation Engineers Traffic Handbook*. The major criteria to determine if the warrant for a traffic control signage satisfied are:

- Total volume of approaching vehicles to the intersection
- Available sight distance related to intersection geometrics
- The total number of "right angle" accidents during the previous year.

The Village must use specific criteria and uniform standards accepted by both the legal community and the traffic engineering community in order to avoid potential liability to the Village. Therefore, the Village Services Department considers each request regarding traffic very seriously. Installation of unwarranted traffic control devices may actually increase the potential for conflict or accidents between motorists and motorists and pedestrians.

The Village Board is currently formulating a Village-Wide Traffic Concerns Committee which will provide a vehicle for citizens to present their concerns regarding traffic for consideration. More information will be presented in *The Almanac* regarding this committee. 

PARK DISTRICT PROPOSES REFERENDUM

The Bloomingdale Park District is seeking to pass a referendum in the November 3 election. This referendum will allow them to take the 15¢ levy from the Bond & Interest Fund and move it to the Corporate Fund.

The bonds will be paid off and the moving of the funds will allow for some much needed improvements and maintenance of existing facilities. The plan is three-fold and will span a period of four years.

- 1. Upgrade and improve every park
- 2. Renovate the Johnston Recreation Center at Circle Park
- 3. Build a new recreation center at Springfield Park

If the referendum passes on November 3, park improvements would begin immediately and all 10 parks would be completed by the summer of 1996 (2-3 parks per year).

Groundbreaking for the new recreation center would be held in the fall of 1993 with an opening planned for late summer/early fall of 1995.

Renovations to the Johnston Recreation Center would begin as soon as programs have been moved into the new building and will be completed within a year.

Passage of the referendum will allow the addition of such facilities as an indoor track, separate aerobics studio, weight training room, fully improved preschool room, fully equipped teaching kitchen and senior citizen meeting room.

The plan will not increase the tax rate. Moving the 15ϕ levy will only change where the money is spent, not how much is taxed.

RESIDENT REMINDER - According to Village Ordinance, **off-street parking** (driveways, designated subdivision parking areas) in residential areas are to be used for residents' passenger vehicles. Permitted vehicles include passenger cars, campers, vans and pick-up trucks (with or without advertising), house cars or trailers, private living coaches, trailers, boats and boat trailers. Living in any of these above mentioned vehicles is strictly prohibited. No more than two vehicles (not including passenger cars,) may be parked on one lot. No portion of a vehicle may be closer than 15 feet from the nearest edge of street pavement, or closer than three feet from the nearest edge of public sidewalk. WATER NEWS UPDATE

LEAD AND COPPER SAMPLING PARTICIPANTS THANK YOU

The Village has submitted its first set of Lead and Copper water samples for analysis to the Environmental Protection Agency. All Public Water Supplies are required to test for Lead and Copper under this new regulation.

While we do not anticipate any problems with Lead and Copper in our water, the regulation and its specific sampling criteria are complicated, and have posed a new challenge to Public Water Supplies across the country. The regulation is unique, in that it requires samples to be taken after the water has sat motionless for six hours. Additionally, the sample must be taken at either the kitchen or bathroom faucet.

We would like to recognize and thank the sixty residents who agreed to participate in this sampling program. Without their participation, the collection of these samples would have been virtually impossible.We look forward to working with them in March for the collection of the second set of samples.

FALL HYDRANT FLUSHING DISCONTINUED

Fall hydrant flushing, which has become an annual tradition in the Village, has been discontinued. Semi - annual hydrant flushing is no longer necessary now that we have treated Lake Michigan water, which is considerably softer and has less mineral content than our previous Well water supply. Therefore, we will be able to perform the hydrant flushing less frequently than in the past, while producing the same preventative maintenance results.

The Spring Hydrant Flushing will become an annual program, each hydrant will be inspected, and flushed at that time. Performing this type of preventative maintenance in the Spring, allows us to promptly make any repairs to the hydrant which are found during the flushing program, without scheduling delays due to inclement weather conditions.


Lake Water Is Safe

Now that our water has been supplied with 100 percent treated Lake Michigan water since February, 1992, you may have noticed subtle changes in the taste and odor of the water.

A lake water supply is subject to seasonal changes due to temperature and natural conditions such as lake turn-over. During the summer with warmer water temperatures, a musty odor may be more noticeable.Also, you may have noticed a stronger chlorine odor than in the past. This "free chlorine" odor is more noticeable to sensitive senses because lake water receives complete filtration and there is less mineral content for chlorine to react with. Actually, the amount of chlorine is no greater than it was with our former well water.

In either case, the water is perfectly safe to drink. The water is tested not only by the Village but also by the DuPage Water Commission and the City of Chicago, as required by Illinois Environmental Protection Agency regulations, to ensure quality.






Disfrict 13 News

In the interest of making science a priority and of doing a better job to serve students in the area of science. District 13 has adopted new science programs. The new curriculum will provide youngsters with a good conceptual background, as well as providing them with plenty of hands-on experiences.

The Board of Education has supported the district's commitment to emphasize the importance of science, especially at the elementary level. They have also approved a part-time position of gifted/science coordinator, as well as having a teacher serve as science coordinator at each building in order to facilitate the implementation of the new curriculum.

District 13 also applied for and received grant dollars in the area of science literacy during the last two years. This enabled the district to do much teacher training prior to implementing the new program, and to provide the highly successful "Saturday Science" program for voungsters. Although those dollars were not forthcoming this year, the school board has committed to continue to support the program through local funding.

The goal of the district is to produce scientifically literate students. Teachers are introducing this new curriculum with a great deal of enthusiasm. By creating a greater level of scientific un-

1993 TREE PLANTING PROGRAM

The Village Board has again allocated funds for this very successful program which was started in 1982. The program provides trees, including planting, at a 50/50 cost sharing with the Village. The trees will be planted early next Spring and are available for parkways or front vards.

The following are the guidelines of the program:

- 1. Since the budget is limited, the program will be on a first-come, first-served basis. Requests should be submitted by December 1, 1992. No money is needed at this time.
- Bills will be sent in early 1993.
 Trees will be 2-1/2" caliper, unless stated otherwise. Trees will be quality nursery stock but not specimen plants.
- The Village reserves the right to 3. disapprove requests based on conflicts, safety, or proper spacing. 4. Each parcel will be limited to two
- (2) trees per year. Participants will be given the
- 5. opportunity to mark the location of the planting desired, but the Village retains the right to change, if necessary.
- 6. We anticipate the cost of the trees to be between \$200 and \$300 each, with the Village paying
- half of the amount. 7. Trees will be guaranteed for one year. Participants are responsible for all watering which will be described in instructions furnished by the Village.

- 8' Multi-Stem Redbud See above
- Black Alder (Alnus glutinosa) Oblong crown of dark green leaves with light green undersides. Can tolerate poor drainage. Grows moderately to 50'.
- 8' Black Alder See above
- American Yellowwood (Cladrastis lutea/kentukea) Round crown pl light green compound leaves which turn yellow-brown infall. Grows moderately fast to 40'.

PARKWAY TREE REPLACEMENT

Parkway trees are the trees in the Village right-of-way, alongside Village streets, usually located between the sidewalk and curb. These trees are typically spaced forty feet apart and are located to avoid conflicts with intersections, street lights, underground or overhead utilities and drainage.

If a parkway tree was removed, for whatever reason, three options are available to the resident for replacement of that tree:

1. The homeowner may replace the tree entirely on their own, choosing the time of planting, the size and species of tree. Tree species which are soft-wooded or have invasive roots or have short, wide forms are unacceptable for parkway planting. These include Willows, Poplars, Evergreens, Silver Maple, Cottonwood, Siberian Elm, Tree of Heaven and Aussian Olive. No permit for this work is required from the Village. Prior to digging, Contact JULIE at 1-800-892-0123 to locate buried utilities. Further information regarding species selection can be obtained from Mr. Larry Slavicek in Village Services Department-Engineering Division.

2. The resident may participate in the Village 50/50 program for the replacement. This program offers 2-1/2" trunk diameter trees of various species

which are ordered in the fall of each year and are planted the following spring. See "1993 Tree Planting Pro-gram" within this *Almanac* for further information and an application form.

3. The resident may make a request for the Village to make the replacement. A list is maintained on a first-come, firstserved basis and trees are planted when funds are available in the Tree Budget. As funds are limited, the planting is typically two or more years from the resident's request until the replacement. The trees are 2" or 2-1/2" trunk diameter and the species are at the Village's discretion.






VOLUNTEERS




