


BLOOMINGDALE CHURCH CELEBRATES 15TH ANNIVERSARY



On Sunday, April 18, the Bloomingdale Church celebrates its fifteenth anniversary as a congregation with several special events.

The celebration commemorates the first gathering of a founding core of four couples, its first service meeting at the Marquardt School on Glen Ellyn Road and the significant growth that the church has enjoyed since that time.

The congregation, from Bloomingdale and surrounding communities is comprised of people with varied church backgrounds who appreciate the church's focus on community and the relevance of basic biblical truths to a contemporary society.

Emphasizing that "people orientation", the 12-foot tall hand-carved wooden logo, designed 15 years ago by a church member, continues to keep the congregation focused.

Pastor Riemenschneider has guided the church since its inception under the sponsorship of the Lombard Bible Church and the Blanchard Road Church. Pastor Riemenschneider originally invested much of his time personally contacting people in the area to invite them to services and to learn what the community needed in a local church. He has just completed a seven-year Doctor of Ministry program at Denver Seminary and will graduate in June.

His wife, Marina, has been actively involved in the program. One of her most outstanding accomplishments is coordination of the church's summer day camp which last year attracted more than 400 children. They and their two boys live in Bloomingdale.

Pastor Dan Burmeister, the church's full-time Youth Pastor leads a full complement of youth activities with the help of eight lay adult youth sponsors. The teen program includes a teen band and a teen drama team that perform at church functions. He strives to provide activities like participating in a Habitat for Humanity project, so that teens can integrate religious training with real-world experiences.

The church welcomed Associate Pastor Bill Oberlin two years ago.

Working as a team, the congregation completed the construction of a new gymnasium/activity center in 1991 to meet expanding needs of its people. Volunteers worked weekends throughout the winter excavating, pouring concrete, setting roof trusses and roofing.

"It was a lot of work but a rewarding time. Now when I walk into the building, it makes me feel good to realize that we all did it together," notes Russ Stock, one of the volunteers. The activity center has enabled the church to expand its teen and children's programs.

Other outreach programs that the church sponsors include:

Morning Out Moms (M.O.M.'S), which offers a structured program for nursery and preschoolers and a hands-on craft and devotional speaker for mothers every 2nd Tuesday of the month at 9:15 am at the church.

Lambs and Ewes, a new program for mothers and babies that meets on the 1st and 3rd Friday of each month at 9:30 am

The Awana Club, a midweek age-specific program that offers games, gymnastic activities, stories and other activities for youth.

A comprehensive program of music and other media presentations for both adults and youngsters, that enhances Sunday worship services.

Festivities on April 18 will include special worship services at 8:30 and 10:45 am; "It's time for B.C. - A.D." dinner at Glendale Country Club at 4 pm; and a program of dramatic sketches, music and testimonials at 6:30 pm. For information call the church office at 894-0090.

Yard Waste Season Is Underway



As many residents know, Browning Ferris picks up yard waste as part of the Village's yard waste program. Yard waste is to be placed curbside in either 33 gal-

lon or less containers or in biodegradable paper bags. Yard waste stickers must be applied regardless of the method used.

Yard waste stickers are \$1.05 each and are available at the Village Hall, or at the following local businesses: Ace Hardware, True Value Hardware, Dominicks, Jewel/Osco, Econ-O-Mart and Bloomingdale Pharmacy. They may also be purchased directly from B.F.I. Remember, a yard waste sticker must be applied to each container or bag used.

The Village received many questions about alternatives to placing numerous containers curbside. Purchasing a lawn mulcher is one option. Rear yard compost piles are allowed, but the burning of leaves and other yard waste is not permitted by the Village's municipal code.

NEW ITEMS TO RECYCLE

The Village of Bloomingdale is pleased to announce as of April 1, 1993, paperboard (originally called chipboard and/or boxboard) was added to the list of materials being collected by the curbside and drop-off center recycling programs.

Paperboard is a single-layered cardboard that is either grey, white or brown in color on the inside surface and is often printed on the outside. Paperboard is in the packaging of breakfast cereal, pasta, crackers and other dry foods. You will also find over-the-counter, drugs, personal hygiene products, tissue and shoes in paperboard boxes. The cores of toilet tissue and paper towels are also made from this material.

Paperboard that is grey or grayish-brown on the inside is usually manufactured, at least in part, with old newspapers, corrugated boxes and paperboard. By looking for that gray-colored package, consumers are helping to create markets for their own recyclables.

There are, however, limitations to what can be accepted in recycling programs. Due to present market limitations, the DuPage County Processing Facility CANNOT currently accept the following materials:

all frozen food boxes

egg cartons

o all other wet-strength containers

laundry and soap boxes

all beverage carriers (6,12 & case boxes)

o any container that has plastic, metal or waxed coating attached in some way.

Today the Village of Bloomingdale accepts the following in the curbside and drop-off program:

o paperboard

o phone books

corrugated boxes & brown paper bags o glass bottles & jars

o aluminum can & foils

o steel cans

PET & HDPE plastic bottles (only #1 & #2)

2-liter pop bottles, water, milk, laundry & juice bottles

o plastic 6- and 12-pack rings

empty aerosol cans

newspaper (with all Sunday supplements)

magazines & catalogs (includes all glossy magazines & catalogs)

Residents should receive a letter from Browning-Ferris explaining the addition and procedures for preparing paperboard for recycling. If you have not received a letter call Browning-Ferris at 469-1036.

In other recycling news, the Illinois EPA is sponsoring several one-day household hazardous waste collections in surrounding areas. These sites are open from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. on the specified dates.

"As Village President, I will continue to set policies and establish the direction of Bloomingdale consistent with the goals we have outlined."








LOU MUZI, Village President


April 20 Elections-






JAMES M. GEBIS, 4-year Trustee

PAMELA I. RION, 4-year Trustee



1993 Hydrant Flushing Schedule

It's that time of year again. Starting Tuesday, April 13th through May 6th, the Village Services-Utilities Division will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village. The flushing will occur between the hours of 8 P.M. and 12 midnight. Please DO NOT WASH LAUNDRY during the flushing hours, as rust staining of the clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

One question that is always asked is "Why does the Village flush hydrants?" Hydrant flushing is routine maintenance for a water system. It accomplishes the following:



- Improves water quality: Flushing removes minerals such as iron and magnesium that have collected in the water mains.
- 2. Improves water flow: By removing these minerals, the inside diameter of a water main is increased and therefore, allows a better flow of water.
- 3. Hydrant maintenance: A fire hydrant is a mechanical device. Operation of a hydrant lubricates internal mechanisms and gaskets.
- 4. Hydrant inspection: Any deficiencies are noted and repaired as necessary to insure that each hydrant will perform when needed for an emergency.

HELP PROTECT OUR NATURAL WATER WAYS AGAINST POLLUTION

The Village currently maintains 70 miles of underground Storm Sewers. As part of this system there are 900 manholes and 2800 inlets/basins, which allows access for maintenance and more importantly storm water run off.

The purpose of the Storm Water Collection System is to take storm water run off away from streets and structures. The water enters the system at curb or yard inlets and is then transported by gravity through the Storm Sewer Mains. The Storm Sewer Mains deliver the water to retention or detention ponds, which in turn discharge into natural water ways.

The Storm Water Collection System is completely separate from the Sanitary Sewer Collection System. While they have similarities in the way they transport the flows received, the destination is different. The Sanitary Sewer Collection System discharges to the Water Reclamation Facility located at Glen Ellyn Road near Edgewater Drive where it receives treatment prior to dis-

charge to the East Branch of the Du-Page River. Storm water receives no treatment prior to discharge to the receiving stream.

It is important to understand that anything dumped into any of the storm water inlets eventually is discharged into natural water ways and endangers the environment. Village Ordinance 92-31 strictly prohibits the discharge of any flammable or toxic, in liquid, gas or solid forms into either sewer system. Examples would include motor oil, gasoline, paint, paint cleaners and cleaning solvents. Fines for violation of this ordinance can be levied from \$50 to \$500 per occurrence. In addition, violators can be responsible for clean up costs which normally run thousands of dollars.

The Village requests that all our residents help us combat this type of potential pollution. If you see anyone dumping anything into the inlets near your house, please call the Bloomingdale Police Department at 529-9868, or the Public Works Utilities Division at 529-5865. If you would like more information, please contact the Village Services-Utilities Division.

VOLUNTEER GROUPS WANTED

The Village is planning a Storm Water inlet identification program, this coming summer. The program consists of marking inlets with a painted emblem. The emblem was designed by the Conservation Foundation of DuPage County and bears the message, "DUMP NO WASTE! - DRAINS TO RIVER," split by a silhouette of a small-mouth bass. The program's primary purpose is to prevent pollution by increasing awareness.

The Village will supply the emblems, paint, and a liaison from Village Services-Public Works, to assist volunteer groups willing to donate their time and efforts.





ROAD CONSTRUCTION - SUMMER 1993

RECONSTRUCTIONS

The Village is planning to reconstruct Kingston Lane and Freeport Drive (Kingston to Lockwood) and Greenway Drive from Edgewater Drive to west of 159 Greenway Drive during the summer of 1993. This project includes removal and replacement of the existing asphalt pavement including curbs and gutters, and road base. The new road will be the same width as the existing road; no widening is planned. All work is funded 100% by the Village.

The project is scheduled to begin during the month of June and will take approximately 3 months to complete. During construction, the road will be closed to through traffic. If you live in the construction zone, or on one of the adjacent streets you will be permitted to proceed past the barricades to reach your residence.

For Greenway Drive, all other through traffic should follow the posted detour route. The detour route is Greenway Drive to Bloomingdale Road to Edgewater Drive to Greenway Drive or the reverse route (Greenway to Edgewater to Bloomingdale to Greenway).

As part of this project, the Village will be installing a depressed curb at each driveway. This means the "bump" at the curb of each driveway is being eliminated, and a smooth transition from the street to each driveway will be constructed. The Village will also be reconstructing the driveway aprons, that is, the concrete driveway between the sidewalk and the curb, as part of the project.

PARK DISTRICT REFERENDUM

The Bloomingdale Park District is seeking referendum approval in the April 20 election. Essentially, it is asking the voters to authorize moving 15¢ from the Bond & Interest Fund to the Corporate Fund. By restructuring its debt, the Park District can funnel these funds into significantly improving the parks, facilities and programs currently available.

Among the improvements planned are:

- a revitalization of all parks, including enhancements such as playground upgrading, improved turf & landscaping, passive use facilities and more
- 5,400 sq. ft. of additional space under roof to the Johnson Recreation Center and renovate pool
- o construction of a new recreation center at Springfield Park
- o new teen center, senior center, pre-school classroom, new fitness center, additional gymnasium and aerobics space.

The Village is planning to perform overlay maintenance on Raven Lane (Bloomingdale to Wren), Picton Road (Bloomingdale to Glendale Terrace), Whitehall Terrace, Old Mill Lane, Kensington Court, Lakemont Court, Martin Court, Martin Lane, Killdeer Road, Pheasant Lane, Pheasant Court, Redbird Road, Redbird Court, Glen Ellyn Road (Ironwood to Byron) during the summer of 1993. All work is funded 100% by the Village.

New overlay construction consists of repairing curbs which do not drain properly, repairing failed pavement areas and installing a new asphalt surface over the entire road. We will not be repairing cracked curbs unless the failed curb is impeding drainage.

During this project, the streets will remain open to traffic. There will be brief periods when certain sections of the road are temporarily closed while work is taking place at a particular location. This work will begin in July and will take approximately 8 weeks to complete.

1993 Brush Collection And Chipper Program Schedule

The Bloomingdale Public Works, Street Division, will be offering their Brush Collection and Chipper Program beginning Monday, April 26, 1993 and ending Friday, May 28, 1993.

See box below for branch preparation and third colum of this page for schedule.

Brush, branches and stems under six inches in diameter are the only items that will be picked up. LEAVES, VINES and MULTIFLORA (ROSE BUSHES WITH THORNS)WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.

Residents will be allowed PICK-UP SERVICES ONLY during their scheduled pick-up week. Each brush removal period will be one week in duration.

Residents are encouraged to have their materials out NO LATER THAN THE FIRST DAY OF THEIR PICK-UP SCHEDULE.

ALL BRUSH, BRANCHES AND STEMS ARE TO BE PLACED AT THE CURB AND STACKED IN AN ORDERLY FASHION WITH CUT OR BUTT END TOWARDS THE CURB. Brush, branches or stems should NOT be bundled or tied. Any branches that exceed six inches in diameter will not be picked up.

BAG OR CANNED BRANCHES WILL NOT BE PICKED UP, SMALL TWIGS AND LEAVES SHOULD BE IN BAGS WITH TAGS FOR B.F.I. TO PICK UP.

TREE TIP

A damaged or broken leader is common with spruces, firs and pines. The problem looks severe, but usually can be easily repaired. Nature would eventually solve the problem, but it takes several seasons. You can help nature by choosing a strong lateral branch just under the broken leader, bending it gently upward and tying it carefully to a support stick tied to the main trunk with soft string or yam. Trim back other branches in the same whort of branches as the newly selected leader so they don't compete. Carefully


