Mark your calendars! The Bloomingdale Family Fest will be held from Thursday June 24 through Sunday, June 27 at Lake Street and Springfield Drive.

Carnival rides will be offered from 6 to 10 pm Thursday June 24 for those who would like to Sneak-A-Peek. Beginning at 4 pm Friday, June 25 games, rides, foods and featured attractions will be offered continuously throughout the weekend climaxing with the Village's traditional fireworks display cosponsored by the Village of Bloomingdale and the Bloomingdale Park District.

Advance ride tickets can be purchased at the Village Hall or at the Bloomingdale Library. A sheet of 40 tickets is \$15; a sheet of 22 tickets is \$8. This is a savings of \$2 per sheet.

New attractions this year include the Orbotron, the Fly Trap Velcro Wall and an authentic Showboat offering twelve show-stopping performances each day. Other favorites include the Petting Zoo, Pony and Camel rides, Pig Races, Face Painting, Record a Hit, Inc., Karaoke and the Ultimate Wave.


Once again, this year's entertainmnet will be featured on both main stage and in the beer garden.

Bloomingdale Old Town Gets New Lease On Life

Old Town Bloomingdale, our unique historic shopping district, is getting a "new lease on life," thanks to two local attorneys. Edward Levato and Keith Kotche became the new owners of Old Town earlier this month and have begun to breathe new life into the aging rafters.



In addition to cosmetic changes, such as repairing the parking lot, painting and doing more extensive landscaping, the partners have sought out and have begun to fill the many shops that make up the nostalgic area.

Among the newcomers is "What's the Scoop?" an ice cream and old time confectionery shop. Owned by resident families, the Yerlys and the Lambs, the ice cream shop promises to bring a flurry of activity along Third Street as summer approaches. Check out the group specials and birthday club. In addition, there is always a youth sports discount for youngsters under 12 dressed in uniform.

Jill's Ceramics, owned by Jill Creasy, is another recent arrival. She features finished ceramic pieces, as well as a wide variety of handcrafted items, such as dowel dolls, fabric painting, jewelry and floral pieces. Utilities Update

WATER CONSERVATION AND CONTROL

The summer season is right around the corner. Soon it will be time to take your garden hoses and sprinkler attachments out of storage to quench the thirst of your lawn. Once again Ordinance 90-30 will be in effect this year, which restricts the times and methods of water used for lawn sprinkling. These restrictions have been mandated by the State and Federal Authorities controlling the Lake Michigan water allocations. The rule not only applies to current water utilities supplied by lake water, but to those who will be supplied by lake water in the future. Water conservation is important to each person in our community and by actively participating in conserving water, you protect a valuable natural resource and save money.

HIGHLIGHTS OF ORDINANCE NO. 90-30, WATER CONSERVATION AND CON-TROL ARE AS FOLLOWS:

- A. Single Family residential addresses with odd numbers may use the public water supply for outside watering through automatic sprinkling devices only on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday between the hours of 5:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. or 5:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.
- B. Single Family residential addresses with even numbers may use the public water supply for outside watering through automatic sprinkling devices only on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday between the hours of 5:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. or 5:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.
- C. Units of Government, Commercial, Industrial, Manufacturing, Office Buildings, and Multi-Family Residential buildings may use the public water supply for outside watering through automatic sprinkling devices only on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday between the hours of 5:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. or 5:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.
- D. Permits for newly sodded or seeded lawns will be available from the Director of Village Services office upon application of such permit. Permits would allow for outside watering by means of automatic sprinklers for a period of thirty (30) consecutive days between the hours of 5:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. or 5:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m..
- E. The use of hand-held water devices is permitted without restriction for any purpose except when the device is left on unattended, or no device is used to control the flow of water. If a hand-held watering device is left on unattended, it is considered to be an automatic sprinkling device and subject to the restrictions previously mentioned.

The times that automatic sprinkling is permitted have been established not only as a conservation method, but also are optimum times for effective lawn sprinkling with minimum loss due to evaporation or runoff.

THE WATER CONSERVATION AND CONTROL ORDINANCE NO. 90-30 IS EF-FECTIVE FROM MAY THROUGH SEPTEMBER, ANNUALLY. Copies of the Ordinance are available at the Village Hall.

BLOOMINGDALE SEEKS KING AND QUEEN TO REIGN AT SEPTEMBERFEST

Even though summer is off to a slow start, it is still not too early to start thinking about completing an application for Bloomingdale's Annual King and Queen Contest. The contest, for Bloomingdale residents between 16 and 21 years of age, is held in conjunction with the Septemberfest celebration on Sunday, September 12, 1993.

This will be the third year that the contest is open to both young men and women. Applicants are judged on appearance, poise, personality, civic involvement and communication skills. The applicants must submit a handwritten essay of 300 to 400 words that describes what contributions they feel they will make as a representative of Bloomingdale's youth. Registration forms are available from the Almanac, the Village Hall or the library and must be postmarked by August 14. 1993

Last year, both King Jason Fangusaro and Queen Annie Federici, pictured here. received \$1,500 scholarships. First runners-up received \$750 along with \$500 to second runners-up and \$250 for third and fourth runners-up. The Septemberfest Commission is committed to the continuation of this tradition, and is maintaining the cost of the booth fee at \$30 so that additional money will be available for the scholarship award this year.

Sebastian "Buzz" Puccio, the Septemberfest Chairman, emphasized that additional financial contributions are still needed for the scholarship fund, as well as gifts of merchandise for the King, Queen and their courts.


Bloomingdale Participates In Clean-Up of DuPage River
