

Septemberfest Ushers In New Season

For 21 years Bloomingdale residents have been coming together for one last summertime fling. Our annual Septemberfest celebration has come to be a well-loved gathering of friends and neighbors among booths set up by not-for-profit organizations and crafters.

Over the years certain elements have come and gone, but the small town flavor remains the same. The 21st annual Septemberfest celebration will take place from 11 am - 6 pm on Sunday, September 12. The official flag ceremony begins at noon followed by the coronation of the 1993 Septemberfest King and Queen.

The King and Queen contest is open to Bloomingdale young people between the ages of 16 and 21. Because of the outstanding support by our community, last year's King and Queen were awarded \$1500 scholarships, with \$750 scholarships going to the first runners-up, \$500 to the second runners-up and \$250 in scholarship monies to each of the third and fourth runners-up. In addition, the king and queen candidates received donated gifts and certificates from many local area merchants.

Fourteen young women and seven young men entered the contest last year. The Septemberfest Committee expects the same enthusiastic response this year. Candidates must submit a handwritten essay of 300-400 words that describes what contributions they feel they will make as a representative of Bloomingdale's youth. Candidates are also interviewed by a judging panel made up of representatives of local organizations.

Results are tabulated by Behr and Co., a Certified Public Accountant, and the results are not revealed until the coronation ceremony at Septemberfest. The interviews will be held on Saturday, September 11. On Friday evening, September 10, all king and queen candidates are invited to attend a pizza party where they will meet with the judges and the 1992 king and queen, Jason Fangusaro and Annie Federici. Deadline for entry is August 23. See inside for an official entry form.

As is tradition, the Septemberfest celebration will be highlighted by a variety of entertainment starting at 11 am. Featured entertainment will include disk jockey Mike Lettieri and the

traditional teen talent show. For information call Mike Lettieri at 790-9556.

There will also be plenty of food and drink available thanks to the many non-profit groups participating.

There are still some booth spaces available. For more information contact Irene Jones, 893-7000, ext. 219. Once again \$5 of the booth fee will go to the scholarship fund for the King and Queen contest.

The Bloomingdale Women's Club will also be hosting its Festival of Arts in conjunction with Septemberfest. As last year, the arts and crafts fair will be held on the west side of Bloomingdale Road in the Old Town parking lot.

Recycled Motor Oil & Oil Filters Require Special Handling

Go ahead, change your own motor oil and save money, if you choose. But please take the proper precautions.

When you have motor oil and oil filters to dispose of, remember that oil is a limited resource. It must be used and disposed of in a frugal and environmentally sensible manner. If poured down storm sewers or onto "that special place in the backyard" it contaminates both land and water doing serious damage to the environment. But recycling that used motor oil and re-refining it into new lubricants or as fuel for steel mills and oil refineries makes good \$ense.


Oil Express at 250 S. Gary (phone 351-3898) accepts used automobile fluids from 8 am to 7 pm Monday through Thursday and from 8 am to 6 pm Friday and Saturday. Other locations that take fluids during normal working hours can be found in the Recycling Yellow Pages distributed by DuPage County: If you need to dispose of oil on Sundays, you need to go to 922 E. Ogden in Naperville (phone 962-1616).


The Village of Bloomingdale Public Works WILL NOT accept motor oil or oil filters at any time.


When preparing your motor oil for delivery to drop-off centers please be careful to abide by the following rules:

 Deliveries are timited to five (5) gallons or less per visit and must be consumer-generated quantities.

- Plastic containers are not appropriate for disposal of oil. They cannot be recycled.
- Do not mix motor oil with paint, solvents, antifreeze or other contaminants
- Deliver oils only during regular business hours. (if you need to dispose of oils on Sunday, you can do so at 922
- E. Ogden, Naperville between 9 am and 3 pm.)
- Avoid trying to deliver dispose-ables during peak hours. Saturday momings, for example are particularly hectic at most locations.
- Always thank the attendant or manager for helping you contribute to the well-being of the environment.



Central Closes For Final Time

June 1993 marked the passing of a milestone for both the Village of Bloomingdale and Elementary School District 13. After more than 50 years of life, learning and laughter, Central School has closed to make way for District 13's new elementary facility, Erickson Elementary.

The northeast portion of the present building is the original structure, which opened in 1937. Prior to that youngsters attended school in what is presently the Park District Museum on Bloomingdale Road.

The original Central provided three classrooms, an office and a room used for a gym, (most recently used as a faculty lounge). Additions and renovations over the years resulted in 14 teaching stations, offices, a library, gymnasium and a faculty lounge.

The school has served as a K-8, a junior high and a K-5 facility at different times over the years. It will be remembered fondly, not only by those young-


sters and teachers moving on to Erickson, but also by the many adults who made and still make Bloomingdale their home.

Farewell ceremonies were held at Central School. Following some activities for the students, which included writing parting messages in chalk on the pavement, those in attendance -

teachers, youngsters, parents and other interested parties - encircled the building for a good-by hug.

Erickson Elementary will open, along with DuJardin and Westfield Junior High on Tuesday, September 7. At 58,000 square feet, the building will house roughly 675 youngsters, grades K-6.

Brush Collection Chipper Program

The Bloomingdale Public Works, Street Division, will be offering their annual Brush Collection and Chipper Program beginning Monday, September 27, 1993 through Friday, October 29, 1993.

The following information will help the residents of Bloomingdale to get prepared for this event:

Brush, branches, and stems under six (6) inches in diameter are the only items that will be picked up. LEAVES, VINES AND MULTIFLORA (ROSE BUSHES WITH THORNS) WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.

Each resident will be allowed PICK-UP ONLY during their scheduled pick-up week. Each brush removal period will be one week in duration.

Residents are encouraged to have their materials out NO LATER THAN THE FIRST DAY OF THEIR PICK-UP SCHEDULE.

ALL BRUSH, BRANCHES AND STEMS SHOULD BE PLACED AT THE CURB AND SHOULD BE STACKED IN AN ORDERLY FASHION WITH CUT OR BUTT END TOWARDS THE CURB. Brush, branches or stems should not be bundled or tied. Any branches.

stems, and brush exceeding six (6) inches in diameter will not be picked up.

Bagged or canned branches will not be picked up. Small twigs and leaves should be in bags with tags for B.F.I. to pick-up.





BLOOMINGDALE PUBLIC LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT FISCAL YEAR 1992-1993

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The Bloomingdale Public Library actively provides current, high-demand popular materials and useful, timely information in a variety of formats for persons of all ages in pursuit of their recreational and personal needs. The Library places special emphasis on stimulating young children's interest in reading and learning, and assists students of all ages in formal education courses.

COMMITMENT TO SERVICE

The Library Board of Trustees and staff are committed at all times to providing excellence in library services. The trustees and staff actively work together to make the Library an open, friendly and warm place for patrons to visit.

LIGHTS OF THE YEAR

On April 30, 1993, Bloomingdale Public Library's fiscal year ended, and the statistics revealed that 1992-93 was one of the the Bloomingulate Library's best years. Our year was so successful because of the wonderful patronage of our community and the outstanding support of the Bloomingdale Business community and non-profit organizations such as the Lions Club, the Bloomingdale Women's Club and the Friends of the Library. In addition, the fine support the Library received from the Village of Bloomingdale helped to make the Library's year very successful.

BELOW ARE HIGHLIGHTS OF FY 1992/1993

Our Patrons -

- checked out 165,641 items (books, videos, cassettes, etc.)
- visited the library 179,753 times. This averages out to approximately 10.8 visits for each resident in Bloomingdale, registered for many library cards. Currently 10,300 residents (62%) of Bloomingdale have registered library cards.

Our Staff -

- added 3,495 new items (books, cassettes, videos, CD's, etc.) to our collection of materials, which increased our total collection to 57.838 items.
- presented programs to 13,648 patrons; 11,327 children and 2,321 adults.
- answered a record-breaking number of reference questions approximately 37,908 during the year.

The Library -

- provided rooms for community group meetings 145 times and for library programs 265 times, for a total of 410. That's an average of almost 8 activities each week.
- Expanded and enhanced patron access to materials and services by moving the Youth Services Department to the library's lower level and enlarging the Adult Services Department to encompass the library's entire first level.
- Enhanced patron access to a wide variety of information in many formats in the following ways:
 - 1) Migrated to a new on-line computer system with upgraded hardware and patron access on-line card catalogs in a consortium with eight libraries.
 - Added a second micro-fiche/film reader/printer for patron use for InfoTrac micro-film cartridges.
 - 3) Subscribed to OCLC, an international dial-in service, for cataloging and interlibrary loans.
 - 4) Created a learning games collection for patron checkout.
 - 5) Expanded patron inter-library loan capabilities by adding a modern line with PC for dial-up access to several hundred library data bases.
- Expanded the library's patron microcomputer center by adding a Macintosh Ilsi with an Imagewriter printer, a new service for patrons.
- Expanded the library's nonfiction video collection by joining a video cooperative with two other libraries.
- Added more programs for children, such as evening story times, to accommodate working parents.





Sight Impairments?

Lions Donations Give The Blind More Reading Materials

The members of the Bloomingdale Lion's Club work tirelessly throughout the year to help make life just a little easier for those who are restricted by failing eye sight.

The Club just recently purchased 30 audio books to the Bloomingdale Public Library's Books On Cassette collection.

This collection of roughly 300 books, librarians say, are among the most frequently circulated items they handle. Using this collection together with the Talking Books program available through the DuPage Library system, people with limited eyesight can remain avid readers.

Erma Sotis, a "compulsive reader" is just one of the Bloomingdale residents who rely heavily on the talking books offered at the Library and on the government's Talking Book Program.

Sotis became legally blind six years ago. The adjustment was particularly

difficult because of her passion for books. Today she can't get to the library much. Sotis relies on her family, the Bloomingdale librarians and the post office to keep her stocked with reading materials. Talking Books and Tapes on Cassettes allow her remain an avid reader and to stay in touch with the world around her.

Although Bloomingdale offers a substantial collection of talking books and maintains six tape recorders as well, Lions President Ralph Laich, said he still runs into people who don't know that the collection is available and easily accessible.

He cited one individual who has lived within walking distance of the library for five or six years who just now discovered this valuable resource.

If you know someone who is dealing with physical limitations (they don't have to be legally blind), Laich urges you to put them in touch with the Library and the Lions Club.
