nebago School, Stratford Jr. High School and Indian Lakes Country Club.



Bloomingdale seeks king and queen TO REIGN AT SEPTEMBERFEST

Once again it's time to start thinking about completing an application for Bloomingdale's Annual King and Queen Contest. The contest, for Bloomingdale residents between 16 and 21 years of age, is held in conjunction with the Septemberfest celebration on Sunday, September 11, 1994.

This will be the fourth year that the contest is open to both young men and women. Applicants are judged on appearance, poise, personality, civic involvement and communication skills. The applicants must submit an essay of 300 to 400 words that describes the contributions they feel they will make as a representative of Bloomingdale's youth. Registration forms are available from the Almanac, the Village Hall or the library and must be postmarked by August 15, 1994.

Last year, both King Christopher Howard and Queen Alison Liddle received \$1,500 scholarships. First runners-up received \$750 along with \$500 to second runners-up and \$250 for third and fourth runners-up. The Septemberfest Commission is committed to the continuation of this tradition, and raised the cost of the booth fee to \$35 so that additional money will be available for the scholarship award this year.

Sebastian "Buzz" Puccio, the Septemberfest Chairman, emphasized that additional financial contributions are still needed for the scholarship fund. as well as gifts of merchandise for the King, Queen and their courts.



Local Ladies Learn Safety In Unique New Program

For 10 weeks during this past winter 19 women residents of the Village had the opportunity to learn about self defense in a pilot program designed by our Deputy Chief, Chuck Mader. Focusing on three elements - skills, tactics and conditioning (both physical and mental), Deputy Chief Mader fashioned the class in such a way that his students experienced a high level of participation.

Using the book, *The Hero Within* by Carolyn Pearson, the women did reports on book chapters, brought in fitness topics to present and shared safety tips.

"They were actually networking without realizing it," explains Mader. "I turned the class over to the class." It appears he did just that. As one woman explained, as the class went on, the women began to experience almost a bonding of sorts as they interacted and shared stories and experiences.

The women all agreed the class was invaluable. The one word that everyone interviewed mentioned was awareness. It seemed the

single most beneficial result of the class was that they will now always be aware. Awareness empowers them, makes them feel less like a potential victim, and more like someone who has some control.

Mader feels strongly that self-esteem is incredibly important and yet that is one quality that women are often lacking. Pat Howard summed it up, "If you act like a victim, you are more likely to be one." She went on to explain the more aware you are of what is going on around you, the less vulnerable you are. The deputy chief also demonstrated some practical defensive tactics to his students,

as well as sharing health and safety tips.

The women also drew on personal knowledge to share with each other. For example, Penny Leider who was formerly in hotel sales, made a presentation on personal security when staying in a hotel which was enlightening.

Aviva Kroll summed up what seemed to be the sentiment of the class. "We feel so sheltered here. Chuck gave us more knowledge, a lot of the tools and the awareness, so we can feel not sheltered, but rather, more self-assured."

Deputy Chief Mader is planning another class next year.


ROAD CONSTRUCTION - SUMMER 1994

The Village is planning to reconstruct Euclid Avenue (Circle Avenue to DuJardin School) Juniper Lane and Hawthorne Drive this summer. This project includes removal and replacement of the existing asphalt pavement including curbs and gutters, and road base. The new road will be the same width as the existing road; no widening is planned. All work is funded 100% by the Village.

The project is scheduled to begin in June and will take approximately 3 months to complete. During construction, the road will be closed to through traffic. If you live in the construction zone, or on one of the adjacent streets you will be permitted to proceed past the barricades to reach your residence.

Motorists are advised to use the detour around the construction zone to avoid delays. Glen Ellyn Road should be used as an alternate detour.

As part of this project, the Village will be installing a depressed curb at each driveway. This means the "bump" at the curb of each driveway is being eliminated, and a smooth transition from the street to each driveway will be constructed. The Village will also be reconstructing the driveway aprons, that is, the concrete driveway between the sidewalk and the curb, as part of the project.

OVERLAY MAINTENANCE

The Village is planning to perform overlay maintenance on Euclid Court, Circle Avenue (Park to Broker), Hingham Lane, Hingham Court, Fairfield Way (Bourne to Millford), Braintree Drive (Schick to Cambridge) during the summer of 1994. All work is funded 100% by the Village.

New overlay construction consists of repairing curbs which do not drain properly, repairing failed pavement areas and installing a new asphalt surface over the entire road. We will not be repairing cracked curbs unless the failed curb is impeding drainage.

During this project, the streets will remain open to traffic. There will be brief periods when certain sections of the road are temporarily closed while work is taking place at a particular location. This work will begin in June and will take approximately 10 weeks to complete.

Water Conservation & Control

The summer season is around the corner. Once again, sprinkling restrictions are in effect now through September. These restrictions have been mandated by the State and Federal Authorities controlling Lake Michigan water allocations. The following are highlights from our Ordinance No. 90-30.

The following restrictions apply to automatic sprinkling devices and allow for sprinkling only between the hours of 5 am and 9 am and 5 pm and 9 pm. These times have been established, not only as a conservation method, but also as optimum times for effective lawn sprinkling with minimum loss due to evaporation or runoff.

Single family residences with odd numbers - Monday, Tuesday and Saturday

There is no sprinkling allowed on Fridays.

Permits for newly sodded or seeded lawns will be available from the Director of Village Serv-



ices upon application of such permit. Permits allow for outside watering by means of automatic sprinklers for a period of 30 consecutive days.

The use of hand-held water devices is permitted without restriction for any purpose except when left unattended, or no device is used to control the flow of water. If a hand-held sprinkling device is left on unattended, it is subject to restrictions for automatic sprinklina devices.


New Season at Bloomindale Church Day Camp
