

LIBRARY REFERENDUM ON NOV. 8 BALLOT

At the Tuesday, November 8th election you will be presented with a choice that concerns you personally. The ballot will contain a question asking for the approval of \$3,600,000 of bonds to be issued by the Village of Bloomingdale to expand, remodel, and improve the library. A Citizens' Referendum Committee is working so that you can make an informed choice.

The Library Board has been planning this project since 1988. They have witnessed growth and change in the Village of Bloomingdale that has increased use and placed new demands on the library.

Over the last ten years, the population of Bloomingdale has grown 58% to the present 19,992. During that same time, the number of library patron visits per day has increased 93%. Attendance at library programs has soared 751%. Our student population, as well as adults, have expressed a need for Sunday hours. Additionally, the li-

brary is faced with mandates for improving the facility to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

If the referendum is approved, the project will provide you with:


- 1. Sunday hours during the school year.
- 2. More books, periodicals, and other materials.
- 3. A larger building to accommodate your increased use.
- 4. Additional meeting room space for groups and organizations.
- 5. Space for specialized equipment and personal computers.
- 6. Lower shelves, wider aisles, and other improvements that comply with guidelines established by the Americans With Disabilities Act.
- 7. An enhanced security system to protect library materials.
- 8. A centralized check-out system for more efficient circulation.

The planned expansion will increase the size of the library building by 15,000 square feet, bringing the total square footage to 35,000. All of the areas used by patrons will be larger compared to what exists now. The facilities serving both the adults and the youth will be expanded almost 70%. Architectural drawings of the proposed expansion are on display at the library.

Cost projections indicate the library tax rate, currently .2329, will increase by .0300 to .2629 for the bond issue. This new tax rate means a family with a \$150,000 home will pay \$13.95 more next year, or \$1.16 per month.

We encourage everyone to get out and vote. If you want to vote in the November 8th election you must be registered. The deadline for voting absentee by mail is Thursday, November 3rd.

Your library is a part of the investment you place in your community, your home, and yourself.






NATURE CORNER

ANIMAL SPOTLIGHT

MICE



One of the most frequently encountered domestic pests are mice. The house mouse and sometimes the long-tailed field mouse seek the warmth and shelter of buildings for nesting sites and food.

Traps and poisons may solve the problem temporarily, but building them out is the only long range answer.

The first thing to do if you have a mouse problem is to remove potential shelters and food supplies. Mice like to live near sheds, piles of trash or leaves, or any unclean area. Keep piles of leaves, wood, newspapers or trash well away from the house

You must be especially careful to keep them out of the house. Check every possible entrance. Keep floor drains closed to prevent them from climbing in through the sewers. Stuff the holes around water pipes with steel wool. Patch all cracks and holes in the walls with plaster mixed with steel wool. Holes larger than one-forth inch should be covered with sheet metal or wire mesh screens.

Standard snap traps or glue traps baited with peanut butter, nuts bacon, cheese or chocolate can be very effective. Proper placement of the traps is crucial. Mice usually travel along the walls. If you can't determine their favorite paths, sprinkle some flour or talcum powder in suspected areas and look for tracks. It is important to check the traps frequently.

Poisons should be used as a last resort following all the instructions.

BIRDS

At one time or another, every homeowner is faced with unwelcome guests, some of them nonhuman. As suburban areas grow, wild animals find their territories being taken over by large two-legged creatures who chop down trees and make a lot of noise. The animals must perish, move, or adapt to the changed environment. Birds are the animals which are affected the most.

Taking steps to effectively control the nesting of birds in and around your property demands proper timing, persistence, and a willingness to experiment. You must take steps to deter the birds from nesting. Bird populations are more vulnerable during the nesting season.

Homeowners should be aware that birds will seek shelter from the wind, rain, snow and anything that may cause them danger. You should insure your furnace chimney, fireplace chimney, sewer stacks and dryer vents are covered to prevent birds from entering to build a nest. Outside lights that are under eaves are another area birds like to build nests. These should be removed and relocated to a tree. Control measures must be continued as long as the birds remain. If one form of control does not work, try another. Sometimes a combination of techniques is necessary for good results. Some proven techniques which have been used successfully are noisemakers, sticky repellants, pie plates hung from the eaves, inflated paper bags, balloons and imitation snakes.





1995 TREE PLANTING PROGRAM

The Village Board has again allocated funds for this very successful program which was started in 1982. The program provides trees, including planting, at a 50/50 cost sharing with the Village. The trees will be planted next Spring and are available for parkways or front yards.

The following are the guidelines of the program:

- 1. Since the budget is limited, the program will be on a first-come, first-served basis. Requests should be submitted by December 1, 1994. No money is needed at this time. Bills will be sent about February 1, 1995.
- 2. Trees will be 2-1/2" caliper, unless stated otherwise. Trees will be quality nursery stock but not specimen plants.
- 3. The Village reserves the right to disapprove requests based on conflicts, safety, or proper spacing.
- 4. Each parcel will be limited to two trees per year.
- 5. Participants will be given the opportunity to mark the desired location for the tree, however, the Village retains the right to change the location, if necessary.
- 6.We anticipate the cost of the trees to be between \$200 and \$300 each, with the Village paying half of the amount.
- 7. Trees will be guaranteed for one year. Participants are responsible for all watering which will be described in instructions furnished by the Village.

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
DOMINIC FROIO ART COLLECTION DONATION
