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



SNOW REMOVAL OPERATIONS

With the seasonal snowfall just around the corner, the Village Services Department, Public Works Division is ready to combat snow and ice on the 112 center lane miles of Village streets, making them safer for motorists.

When a storm begins, day or night, the Village crews are promptly mobilized and begin spreading salt. The Village initially salts all Village streets approximately 100 feet before and after each intersection. The initial salt application mitigates icing conditions contributing to more effective snow removal operations. After a 1-inch to 2-inch accumulation of snow, crews begin the snow plow operations according to predetermined snow routes. This routes consist of 4 routes with 8 vehicles (2 separate vehicles handle cul-de-sacs and dead ends) and have been carefully designed to allow for the optimum use of the available snow plowing equipment and personnel. All Village-owned streets will eventually be plowed, but main streets are cleared before side-streets, which are cleared before cul-de-sacs and dead ends. The rate at which the streets are cleared depend on many factors including total accumulation, the provide and begins and presenting and vehicles are cleared depend on many factors including total accumulation. type of snow (wet or powder-like), temperature and volume of traffic on streets during plow operations.

WHAT ARE THE VILLAGE OF BLOOMINGDALE'S PARKING REGULATIONS WHEN IT SNOWS? The Village's winter parking ban takes effect after snowfalls of 2-inches or more. The ban applies to all vehicles on any Village-owned street and is in effect for a period of 24-hours or until the streets have been cleared of snow. Residents can assist Village crews in the snow removal efforts by parking vehicles in driveways or other off-street parking areas.

DOES THE VILLAGE REPAIR MY MAILBOX IF DAMAGED DURING SNOW PLOWING OPERATIONS?

The Village will replace and/or reimburse a resident up to \$35.00 for a mailbox and post which is damaged as a result of the Village snow plow operations, provided the mailbox is installed per Village set back requirements. If you have questions as to whether or not your mailbox is in compliance with Village requirements, you may contact the Street Division of Village Services Department or the Public Works Division at 529-5865.

WHY DOES MY DRIVEWAY SOMETIMES GET "PLOWED IN" WHEN A SNOW PLOW TRUCK PASSES? The Village snow plows are designed to direct the snow to curb side of the plow blade. "Side delivery plows" are the fastest and most efficient means available to remove snowfall from the streets. As a result, snow is discharged along the length of the curb, the parkways, and the private driveway areas. The Village has thousands of private driveways abutting Village streets, the cleaning of which is the responsibility of the property owner.

Manpower and equipment limitations prohibit the Village from responding to routine requests to remove snow from private driveways. Therefore, we strongly recommend you delay your schedule for clearing the driveway until the snow plows have cleaned the majority of your street. THE VILLAGE ORDINANCES PROHIBIT THE DISCHARGE OF SNOW ONTO THE VILLAGE STREETS. This illegally placed snow may freeze or become compacted, creating a safety hazard for all motorists.

WHOM DO I CALL WITH QUESTIONS REGARDING SNOW REMOVAL OPERATIONS?

Any questions regarding snow removal should be directed to the Village Services Department-Public Works Division Maintenance Superintendent at 529-5865.

Use extra caution when driving through intersections following a heavy snowfall. Snow is piled on cross streets when intersections are plowed. Until crews have had their final pass to completely clear the intersection, the snow piles along the curb lane may hinder visibility.

- 0 Please do not attempt to stop the snow plow operators to discuss questions or problems. Such interruptions slow crews and reduce the speed of the truck and the efficiency of the snow removal operations. Drivers are instructed not to stop to talk to residents
- If it is still snowing, or if snow is anticipated on the evening before garbage pick-up day, we ask that you delay putting out your garbage for as long as possible. This will minimize the problem of garbage containers being covered by snow that is pushed against the curb by the plows. Place garbage containers on the driveway or as close to the driveway as possible to 0 give refuse collectors room to pick them up.

ROAD CONDITION INFORMATION

Several agencies offer wintertime road condition information. The Village CANNOT supply any information about state or county roads. We appreciate your cooperation in calling us about Village roads only if there is a problem that you feel needs to be called to our attention. We CANNOT tell you precisely when a particular street will be plowed.

FIRE HYDRANTS

For the convenience of firefighters-if an emergency should occur (maybe at your address), dig a path to the fire hydrant in front of your house from the strest. Dig out around the fire hydrant too. If firefighters can see a hydrant, they can get to it more quickly. Better yet, adopt a hydrant near your home and see that it is accessible.

CAUTION: MOTORISTS

Do not follow snowplows too closely. Sometimes they stop and then back up. If you're right behind one when that happens, well ... Give snow plows plenty of space. Also, remember driving on slick wintertime pavements is dangerous, even if they've been plowed. Take more time to get where you're going, begin slowing for stops sooner and, for heaven's sake, don't drink and then try to drive.

WINTER IS BACK! VILLAGE OF BLOOMINGDALE SNOW PLOW ROUTE CHANGES

The Village Snow Plow Team is fully committed to maintaining a bare pavement, curb to curb policy - pushing back and cleaning all curbs, intersections, and cul-de sacs.

To meet the various demands of the different snow storms, the Village Services Department has made adjustments to the snow/ice control plan. It is the intent of the plan to provide an equal number of employees for two shifts, while minimizing impact to the current level of service, controlling fatigue, and mitigating liability claims and accidents.

To meet this intent, the Village has consolidated plow routes from 5 to 4 when compared to last year, thereby adding to each snow route approximately 3 center line miles. Each route will be assigned 2 trucks during each shift. Salt routes have been adjusted from 10 to 8.

The restructuring of routes allows the Village Services to create 2 snow/ice control shifts of 8 employees each.

It remains our intention to complete snow clean-up operations within 8 hours after the snow has stopped. However, the adjustment of plow routes may result in individual residents observing delays in our response when compared to previous years' operations. In other words, a resident may see a delay of between 1 to 1.5 hours compared to last year, for an initial pass of a Village plow operation vehicle through their subdivision. Compared to last year's plow routes, the following subdivisions may observe these time delays described above:

Bloomfield Hills Country Club Estates Lakewoods Chateau Lorraine Stratford Lakes

The significant advantage of this plan is that there will be 2 vehicles on each route <u>at all times</u> for the duration of a storm event. Last year, various "breaks" in operations occurred to provide "rest periods" for the 10 employees assigned to the 5 plow routes; leaving a "skeleton" crew to keep main streets open. We believe the new plan provides continuity to the operation.

Be assured that the quality of work, curb-to-curb clean up will remain the same as in past years.

To prevent plowing delays and assure the safety of all motorists, it is essential that vehicles do not follow snow plow trucks closely. Please stay at minimum three (3) car lengths behind the snow plow trucks, even when stopping at intersections. These trucks frequently back-up, and/or utilize intersections as a location to turn around. If you encounter snow plow vehicles at an intersection, please be patient and allow them a minimum of three (3) car lengths to maneuver their vehicle. Please do not try to go around or between snow vehicles at intersections or in any other hazardous situations.

The Village of Bloomingdale appreciates your cooperation and wishes you a safe and Happy Holiday.


Commuters can take the bus to the Roselle Metra train station for fast service to downtown Chicago. The bus meets three Chicago-

Christmas trees do not need a yard sticker. BFI is requesting residents position the bottom portion of their Christmas tree toward the curb for easy loading. Another option would be to place the tree in your backyard for the remaining winter months to provide shelter for wildlife or serve as a feeding station for birds. Then, the tree could be recycled by placing it out during the Village's spring brush collection program.

On October 13, 1994, the Illinois Department of Conservation announced 41 Illinois Municipalities and Park Districts will share \$796,197.00 to plant trees on public lands. The grants make up to 60 percent of a project's total cost while local government units must provide a minimum of 40 percent of the cost.

The grants from the U.S. Small Business Administration Tree Planting Initiative are administered by the Illinois Department of Conservation's Urban Forestry Program.

"This program promotes the proper planting and care of trees and creates greater awareness of technical assistance available to Illinois communities through the Department of Conservation," said Conservation Director Brent Manning.

Bloomingdale's grant application was selected and approved for

funding. The amount of our grant award is \$48,000.00. The grant application was a multiple unit of government request between the Village and the Park District with the Village serving as the lead agency and administer of the project.

The Village's project, titled Perpetuating the Urban Forest, will fill the planting spaces available along arterial routes. The streets included are Bryon, Edgewater, Glen Ellyn, Greenway, and Schick. Using native species, diversification of our species, which is a goal of our forestry program, will be an integral part of the project. Besides being native to Illinois, species were selected for their toughness and survivability.

The project is estimated to cost \$62,500.00 and will plant more than 200 trees. The Village's 40 percent share of the cost will be \$25,000.00.

The Park District's project will plant 60 trees in six parks for the enhancement and beautification of those parks. The plantings will separate activities and noise between the parks and the surrounding neighborhoods. The parks included are:

1.Circle Park

2.Indian Lakes Park

3.Lakeview Park 4.Sunnyside Park

5.Tompkins Park

5. Tompkins Fark

6.Westlake Park

The project cost of \$17,500.00 will be made up from \$10,500.00 grant share and a \$7,000.00 Park District share.

The Village Board officially accepted the grant award at the November 14th Village Board meeting. The Village Urban Forester, Larry M. Slavicek, will administer the project and the planting will take place in the spring.



On Friday morning, November 4, 1994, a new traffic signal was completed and operational at the intersection of Springfield and Butterfield Drives.




Look, Listen & Live




THANK YOU


"From Sputnik to Discovery"

Parents of Bloomingdale Elementary School District 13 students had the opportunity to explore the changes in education from the 1950's to the present during the districts first-ever Parent Information Night at Erickson Elementary in October.
