

Bloomingdale Intergovernmental Group Develops Joint Community Projects

A Bloomingdale guide to services and a formal community calendar are among projects the newly formed Bloomingdale Intergovernmental Group (BIG) discussed at a recent meeting.

The services guide and community calendar would provide residents with a ready resource. Kandy Litchfield, Bloomingdale Library Board member and BIG representative, noted the importance of these communication services.

"The guide and calendar would allow residents to have information about Village programs at their fingertips. It is our goal to make accessing information about village services more convenient for the community."

BIG representatives also discussed researching the feasibility of a community voice mail system, in which one telephone number would allow residents to access information about Bloomingdale programs and services via a recorded information message directory. Ongoing projects also include jointly purchasing services and goods from vendors, such as buses, stationery and equipment.

Dan Wennerholm, Village of Bloomingdale administrator, said he hopes BIG will be a long-term partnership between participating government agencies. "I am confident that BIG representatives will maintain the high level of interest that we have established in our discussions and efforts so far. The group's purpose will be to continue to identify programs that are most beneficial to the community."

BIG includes School Districts 13, 15, 93 and 108; the Bloomingdale Chamber of Commerce; Library and Park Districts; Village of Bloomingdale; Township of Bloomingdale and the DuPage County

Board/Forest Preserve. Meetings are held bi-monthly at alternating sites. The March 16 meeting will take place at Lake Park High School east campus and the May 18 meeting will be held in the Park District's new gymnasium. At each meeting members discuss activities and issues occurring at each organization and develop cooperative programs.


He also serves as liaison to the Traffic Concerns Committee and the Old Town Commission.

HYBRID TREES

The Village Forestry Division is working with the Morton Arboretum and Chicagoland Grows, Inc. to evaluate and select a superior Platanus tree for the Chicago area.

Chicagoland Grows is a non-profit corporation established by the Chicago Botanic Garden, the Morton Arboretum, and the Ornamental Growers Assocation of Northern Illinois. Chicagoland Grows is dedicated to the evaluation, selection, production, and marketing of recommended and new plant cultivars. Plants selected for the program have proven to be adaptable to the Midwest, and are made available to the commercial and retail landscape industry through an international network of growers and propagators.

In an agreement with Chicagoland Grows, the Village planted three hybrid Platanus trees in Village parkways on October 27, 1994. The trees are a hybrid involving American Sycamore (Platanus occidentalis) and Oriental Planetree (P. orientalis). The American Sycamore chosen is a large specimen adjacent to the Visitor Center at the Morton Arboretum which has shown virtually no sign of anthracnose, a serious fungal disease to this species. Pollen of Oriental Planetree was obtained from the National Arboretum in Washington, D.C. In the Spring of 1993, thirty two-year-old Platanus x acerifolia seedlings from this crossbreeding were placed among a grove of Sycamores conspicuously showing anthracnose infection. Among the thirty saplings, infections were minimal. Four completely anthracnose free saplings were chosen for propagation. The Village received three of these four trees. The intent is to select a single clone from the four for propagation. The Village has agreed to monitor and help maintain records for these trees.

With the cooperation of the residents, the trees were planted at the following locations:

- 1. Two on Circle Avenue at 199 Lockwood Lane
- 2. One on Euclid Avenue at 247 Tee Lane

The Village would like to extend a thank you to the Morton Arboretum and Chicagoland Grows for a continued successful working relationship with our Forestry Division.

ANIMAL SPOTLIGHT:

SQUIRRELS



The squirrel is a 16-20 inch rodent, usually gray or brownish-gray on sides and back and whitish below, but occasionally all black.

Squirrels are never found far from trees and have adapted to our landscaping, suburbs and urban parks. They are very dominant where people supply food in bird feeders or other sources. Dens may be in tree cavities, or leaf nests in the branches of trees.

As mammals, squirrels may contract rabies, but only very rarely. Most serious problems with squirrels involve adult females entering a building to establish a nest. They will explore any likely-looking opening while searching for a den site, and they often enter chimneys or attics through unscreened vents or openings left by loose or rotten boards. They will enter a building somewhere high on the structure and exploit an existing hole. The homeowner's first sign of the squirrel's presence is usually the sound of scampering in the attic or above the fireplace.

Squirrels nesting in attics will usually gather insulation into a nest near the entrance. Thoroughly inspect inside the attic to find where the opening is, where the nest is, and whether there are any babies present. Concentrate the search in the area where noises were heard. If there is no access to the attic, inspect the outside of the eaves, vents, and roof until the opening is located. When the squirrels have left the nest, as they usually do during the day, seal up the opening with some type of flashing material.

In the case where a squirrel is trapped inside a chimney and is unable to climb out on its own, a means of escape may be provided by hanging a half-inch rope down the chimney. Be sure to tie one end to the top of the chimney before lowering the other end, and make sure it reaches the damper or smoke shelf. The squirrel will climb up the rope and escape, usually within a few daylight hours. After it is certain that the squirrel has escaped, remove the rope and screen the chimney with a commercially made cap.

Squirrels rarely do significant damage at night. They are only active during the day, so it would be possible to observe them in action.

Vehicle Stickers

All vehicles owned by a Bloomingdale resident or registered to a Bloomingdale address must have a Village vehicle license. Stickers go on sale March 1 and must be affixed by Midnight, April 30.

The cost of a vehicle sticker for a passenger car is \$10. Costs vary for other vehicle licenses. Call the Village Hall for more information. A late charge of \$5 will be assessed for late sticker purchases.

Sticker applications will arrive in your mailbox soon. To avoid long lines and inclement weather, residents are encouraged to mail applications with payment in envelope provided. Vehicle stickers will be returned by mail.

Of course, as always, vehicle stickers can be purchased in person at the Village Hall, at First Chicago Bank, Springbrook and Schick & Gary facilities only, and at the Springbrook Currency Exchange.

The Village Forestry Division is looking for volunteers to plant 200 seedlings provided by the National Tree Trust on Saturday, April 22nd, from 9 a.m. - noon at the Public Works Facility, 305 S. Glen Ellyn Road.

Through a Community Tree Planting grant, the Village will be re-




ceiving 100 Scarlet Oak (Quercus coccinea) and 100 European Beech (Fagus sylvatica) seedlings, soil and pots for the purpose of growing the seedlings into saplings for transplanting into the local community from the National Tree Trust. Community Tree Planting involves a commitment from all participants to plant trees on public property, such as right-of-ways, school grounds, community parks, etc.

The National Tree Trust is a private, non-profit organization created to serve as a catalyst for local volunteers and community groups in the growing, planting and maintenance of trees in rural communities, urban areas and along our nation's highways. The Tree Trust was established in 1990 and endowed with a one-time grant from Congress as part of the "America the Beautiful" initiative designated by President Bush. The Tree Trust has partnered in reforestation. beautification and education projects with 300 groups, which include volunteer organizations. government agencies, forest product firms and other leading corporations, in 35 states since its founding. Now in its fourth year of operation, the Tree Trust is committed to bringing more trees to more communities across the nation. The Tree Trust has helped volunteers plant and nurture over one million trees each year in communities and along roadsides.

Volunteers will be trained to containerize and care for seedlings. Participants are asked to bring gloves and enthusiasm. After two growing seasons, the trees will be planted out through an "Adopt A Parkway Tree" Program.



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"Growing to Serve"

"Growing to Serve" has been the motto of the Bloomingdale Public Library since its inception in 1974. Over the years, the Library has grown considerably and always the Library Board and staff have kept the motto "Growing to Serve" in the forefront. Due to the successful Library referendum, the Library will once again be growing and increasing services in order to better serve our patrons.

In December 1994, the bonds were to be sold for the financing of the entire project. In January, 1995, the Library's existing promissory note was paid off with proceeds from the bond issue. This made the Library's \$1,752.53 loan monthly payment available for use this fiscal year. At the November Library Board meeting, the Board decided to use this money to finance Sunday hours starting January 15, 1995, rather than waiting for September of 1995.

In the coming months, the Library Board and staff will work with the architect to finalize the building plans, and in June 1995, we hope to break ground for the new addition. The new addition will be built during the summer months. In the fall, the existing walls will be opened to the new addition. The remodeling of the first floor will commence during the winter months. It is anticipated that the building and remodeling project will be completed the spring 1996.

When the project is completed, there will be more space for books, seating, studying, library programs, community meetings, and computer equipment.

Also, a portion of the bond proceeds will be used to purchase more books and other materials for the library collection over the next three years.

The Library Board and staff are excited about all these upcoming changes and the ways in which they will enable us to provide better service to our patrons.



The contest benefited the business community through a purchase and the Bloomingdale Township Food Pantry through a cash donation.


