

Coast to Coast Fundraiser

We featured Jeff Kennedy a few months ago. Jeff is the 18 year old Bloomingdale resident who will take the trip of a lifetime this summer in the name of the American Lung Association. This young man will be taking part in the 1995 Coast to Coast Classic bicycle ride beginning June 19.

Jeff, a College of DuPage freshman majoring in meteorology, will travel from Seattle, Washington to Asbury Park, New Jersey on his bicycle in 48 days. In order to participate in the 3,436-mile trip and be able to have the American Lung Association benefit from his journey, Kennedy needs to raise \$6,000. Thus far, he has raised \$2,410 toward his goal and has paid his \$300 registration fee.

The trip itself costs \$3,050. He would like to be able to give the balance of his goal, \$3,250, to the Lung Association. Kennedy is a bicycle enthusiast, and has always wanted to do a cross country trip. He believes he has found a way for the trip to also be something special for others, too.

There are 38 bicyclists participating. Jeff is the only person from Illinois participating

in the Coast to Coast Classic, and is looking for support from both individuals and businesses who would be interested in backing him. Village Board Passes Revised Currew Ordinance

At the February 27, 1995 Village Board meeting, the Village Board passed an amended curfew ordinance. The new ordinance amends the former curfew ordinance passed in 1963 which was more restrictive than the State curfew law. The new curfew ordinance follows the State's curfew laws, and provides the following:

"Persons under the age of seventeen can not be on a public street, or way between 12:01 AM and 6:00 AM Saturday and Sunday, and between 11:00 PM and 6:00 AM Sunday through Thursday."

This ordinance further does not allow parents or legal guardians to knowingly allow persons under seventeen to violate this ordinance. Persons under the age of seventeen may be out past curfew if supervised by a parent, legal guardian or with a companion who is at least eighteen years old and is approved by the parent or legal guardian. Persons under seventeen years old who are engaged in a lawful business or occupation, which the laws of the State authorize a person under the age of seventeen years of age to perform, may be exempt from this ordinance. The fine for violating the curfew ordinance can be up to \$100.



five. In accepting the award, Ruth Ann thanked her husband, family and parents. In addressing her enthusiastic level of involvement, she explained, "My mother always taught me sleep is a waste of time."

Also honored at the gala event was Ed Levato, who was named Business Person of the Year. Levato began his law practice in Bloomingdale in 1982. He was joined by partner Keith Kotche in 1984 and by John Raucci in 1994. Levato, Kotche and Raucci relocated to Old Town in 1993. Levato says business has continued to grow every year and the firm has branched out into non-legal fields of real estate development and management and construction.

Levato, in accepting his award, said there should really be three more names on the plague . . . "Keith Kotche and John Raucci, my law partners and Dar, my life partner . . . " He went on to say the support of these three people allow him to spend the time away from work and home to be involved in community activities.

Levato has been a member of the Bloomingdale Chamber of Commerce since it officially began in 1982. He became a director in 1993, was elected president of the chamber in 1984, and has remained an active participant in Chamber activities. He has been a member of the District 13 School Board since 1987 and Board president since 1991. Other affiliations include the DuPage County Bar Association and Justinian Society of Lawyers.

The third award presented was for Ambassador of the Year. Receiving this honor was Rae Novak of Westlake Graphics. Novak began her business in 1982 and became a member of the Chamber that same year. She has served as a director for the past 11 years.



Alert, Cautious, Confident: Three Easy Steps to Help Seniors (and Everyone) Protect Themselves from Crime

Crime is a frightening problem to older citizens. In fact, crime can be a frightening problem for all of us. Persons who commit crimes look for targets, or victims of easiest opportunity. You can help to remove or reduce this opportunity.

To accomplish this task, you don't need physical strength, agility or speed. What you need to do is be alert, cautious and self-confident.

Crime prevention begins at home. Keep your doors locked at all times. Use deadbolt locks on exterior doors. Peephole viewers should be installed on exterior doors so you can see who is outside. If you live alone, don't advertise it. Phone numbers should be kept unlisted. Use only your first initial and last name on directories and mailboxes. If you have valuables such as large sums of cash or securities, these should be kept in the bank. The bank is still the safest place for these items.

Get involved in Neighborhood Watch. Neighborhood Watch is people helping and watching out for each other. When away from home, plan your route. If you take a long trip, let a friend or neighbor know where you are going. A cellular telephone is a low cost friend in an emergency. Make sure your car is in good working order before leaving and always check your home to make sure it is locked up and secure.

Senior citizens are frequently victims of consumer crimes and con games. The most popular of these is home repair fraud, the "Pigeon Drop", and the "Bank Examiner" scheme. They are briefly described as follows:

- ♦ Home repair fraud can involve any type of home repair. UNSCRUPULOUS repair people will pressure a person into an unnecessary home repair. Before having any home repair done, check the company working at your home with the Better Business Bureau and ask for references.
- ♦ The "Pigeon Drop" is when someone claims to have found a large sum of money and offers to share it with you. They will ask you to put up "good faith" money before you can get in on the deal. That is the last you will see of your money.
- → The "Bank Examiner" scheme is when a professional-looking person tells you he is a bank officer and needs your assistance in the investigation of a dishonest teller. He will then ask you to withdraw cash from your savings account and give him the money so he can check the serial numbers. At this point he takes your money and you never see him again.

Reducing the risk of crime is easy and effective if you remember to be alert, cautious and confident.

Stratford Junior High Steps into Technology

Stratford Junior High very proudly showed off its Technology lab at a special ribbon cutting ceremony in February. The lab is part of the eighth grade Exploratory series which also includes music, art and health.

The technology lab offers instruction in laser optics, robotics, engineering, space and rocketry, transportation, flight, health care, autocad, pneumatics, meteorology, bio-technology, radio broadcasting, research and design, electronics and communication.

Students spend nine weeks with William Kasper, who provides direct instruction in all 15 areas and acts as a resource for them. They study five to seven of the 15 available topics. This is a hands-on laboratory experience. Stratford Junior High sees the laboratory as a stepping stone in career education. Principal Robert Ballenger and Kasper are delighted with the students' progress so far. The lab has been in use since September, 1994.



Postmen Pick Up for Pantry

The National Association of Letter Carriers of the United States Postal Service will conduct its annual food drive on Saturday, May 13. This is a national event which helps to stock food pantries across the country assisting the needy.

Last year over 2500 pounds of non-perishable food items were collected from generous Bloomingdale residents. Helen Fiduccia, Bloomingdale Township General Assistance Director, acknowledged the donations were critical to the pantry. This food drive is timed to supplement pantries for the period of May through October, a time when donations are typically slow.

Many area needy families were fed as a result of the care shown by Bloomingdale residents. Daryl Miller and Bryan Toler, coordinators for the Bloomingdale drive, urge residents to once again take part. The two are hoping to exceed last year's numbers. They suggest residents cut this article out and hang it on the refrigerator as a reminder.

On Saturday, May 13, prior to 9:30 AM, residents are asked to place non-perishable food items by their mailbox. Carriers will collect them as they deliver the mail.

Mayor Iden has proclaimed May 13, 1995 to be Annual Food Drive Day in Bloomingdale, and urges residents to participate as generously as they can.

Saturday Service to Local Shopping Malls, Medical Facilities Available from PACE

Pace, the suburban transportation service, allows residents from Bloomingdale to take advantage of convenient Saturday bus service to local shopping malls and medical facilities.

Route 711 Wheaton-Carol Stream-Stratford Square serves local shopping centers including Stratford Square, Northland Mall, Chateau Village Apartment complex, Target, K-mart, and local medical centers such as Mona Kea Medical Park and Marionjoy Hospital.

The bus also provides service to the Wheaton Metra station for convenient transportation to Chicago. In addition, passengers can make connections at the Metra station to other Pace routes that serve an even larger area.

As an added plus, it's inexpensive to ride the bus. Pace's new Commuter Club card, for \$39, allows unlimited rides on Pace's regular routes and commuter feeder routes.

VILLAGE OF BLOOMINGDALE 1995 TREE MAINTENANCE PROGRAM



On March 13, 1995, the Bloomingdale Village Board awarded the 1995 Tree Pruning and Removal Contract to B. Haney and Sons, Inc. of Franklin Park, Illinois.

This program consists of priority pruning (dead, dying, diseased branches, as well as obstructing branches), stump removal, and removal of potentially hazardous trees.

Tree maintenance is scheduled to begin Monday, April 3, 1995 and continue through April, depending on weather conditions.

The primary locations affected are east of Cardinal Drive. These locations have been inspected and marked in the following manner by our Village Forester:

White "X"

Removal of tree or stump

•White "O"

Pruning of tree

Trees being removed will be replaced as part of the Tree Planting Program within the next two years.

Later this year, the Village of Bloomingdale will initiate a routine pruning program on a six year cycle. The Village will be divided into six sections with each section scheduled for inspection and maintenance every sixth year.

WOODCHUCKS

The Woodchuck, also known as the Groundhog, is a large bulky rodent. Woodchucks prefer to live around agricultural areas, fields or farmlands; how-

Woodchucks, being vegetarians, primarily eat native grasses and other plants. They will eat a variety of vegetables and fruits and can pose problems in gardens.

ever, in suburban and urban areas they

will often be seen in the grassy areas

Woodchucks are true hibernators and will not be seen between early November and late February. They breed in March and April, and a litter of four to six are born about a month after mating. The young mature rapidly and are on their own by midsummer.

Woodchucks are timid and easily frightened. In areas where woodchucks have burrowed under houses or sheds, removal of grass cover may be an effective means of keeping them from taking up residency.

Although there are no repellents registered for use on Woodchucks, you may find that placing a tin can filled with a strong odorous substance such as pine oil, would deter the Woodchuck from remaining in the area. This method should not be used in the spring or early summer because of the danger of harming the young.



Household Hazardous Waste Collection

Although the IEPA has listed no collection events in DuPage County this spring, the following two are within driving distance for Bloomingdale residents.



1995 HYDRANT FLUSHING VILLAGE OF BLOOMINGDALE

It's that time of year again. Starting Tuesday, April 11th through May 4th, the Village Services-Utilities Division will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village. The flushing will occur between the hours of 8:00 P.M. and 12:00 midnight. Please **DO NOT WASH LAUNDRY** during the flushing hours, as rust staining of the clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

One question that is always asked is - "Why does the Village flush hydrants?" Hydrant flushing is routine maintenance for a water system. It accomplishes the following:

- 1. Improves water quality: Flushing removes minerals such as iron and magnesium that have collected in the water mains.
- 2. Improves water flow: By removing these minerals, the inside diameter of a water main is increased and therefore, allows a better flow of water.
- 3. Hydrant maintenance: A fire hydrant is a mechanical device. Operation of a hydrant lubricates internal mechanisms and gaskets.
- 4. Hydrant inspection: Any deficiencies are noted and repaired as necessary to insure that each hydrant will perform when needed for an emergency.

1995 BRANCH COLLECTION PROGRAM DATES ANNOUNCED

The Bloomingdale Public Works' Forestry and Street Divisions will be conducting their semi-annual Branch Collection Program beginning on Monday, April 24, 1995. The program is available to single family residences within the Village of Bloomingdale only.

The following information shall assist residents regarding branch collection procedures:

- ♦ Branches up to six niches in diameter and twenty feet in length are the only items that will be picked up. LEAVES, VINES, MULTIFLORA ROSE BUSHES, AND SMALL (under one-half inch in diameter) WILLOW STEMS WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.
- ◆ All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and should be stacked in an orderly fashion with cut or larger end towards the pavement. BRANCHES SHOULD NOT BE BUNDLED, TIED, BAGGED OR PLACED IN CANS. Any branches exceeding six inches in diameter will not be picked up.

- ◆ Small twigs and leaves may be placed in bags with tags for B.F.I. pick-up. B.F.I. yardwaste pickups begin April 3rd and continue through November 30th.
- ◆ Each branch collection period will be one week in duration and PICKUP WILL BE ALLOWED ONLY DURING THE SCHEDULED WEEK.
- → Residents should have their branches out NO LATER THAN THE FIRST DAY OF THEIR SCHEDULED PICK-UP.

Wood chips are available and on request will be delivered, or may be picked up at the Public Works Facility from 7:00 AM until 4:00 PM Monday through Friday, and from 7:00 AM until 9:00 AM on Saturdays. To request a load of wood chips, or for further information, call Helen Price at 529-5865, ext. 7.



National Merit Honors




