on marketing projects over the past two years, including the banner program and the new signs located at entrances to the Village. Recently the members turned their collective efforts to a cultural endeavor.

This group has commissioned an artist to create an original, bronze, life-size statue of a mother and child sitting on a bench reading. This will be placed in the new courtyard being constructed at the Bloomingdale Public Library.

The group would like to see this as the first in a series of lifelike statues to be placed in various areas of town over the next several years. The plan is to have this artwork paid for strictly through donations of residents and businesses.

To that end, the committee has launched a commemorative brick program. The bricks will be permanently installed in the courtyard area surrounding the statue and will be personalized. A 4"x8" brick is \$75.00 per family and/or group. An 8"x8" brick is \$250 for businesses. All donations are tax deductible.

Each brick holds three lines of type with 13 characters per line (which includes spaces and punctuation). The engraved letters are filled with a black epoxy to protect it from the elements.

An order form is included on page nine of this Almanac. Forms are also available at the Bloomingdale Public Library and at the Village Hall.

Sanitary Sewer Hookups Now Underway In Indian Lakes Area

The Village is pleased to announce that the installation and testing of the sanitary sewer main and sewer laterals is complete. Landscaping in many areas has been completed as well as street paving on Meadowlark, Red Wing Court and Bob-O-Link.

Individual home connections to the sewer main have begun. Testing of the sewers on Skylark Drive, Martin Lane, Martin Court and Killdeer is completed, and those areas can now connect to the new sewer. Questions regarding sewer connections and permit applications are being addressed by the Village Services Department Engineering and Building and Zoning Divisions.

Remaining final landscaping and restorations of the parkway will be completed in the spring.

"Are You O.K.?" Checks On Well Being of Those Who Are Home Alone

The Bloomingdale Police Department and the Bloomingdale Lions Club are looking for residents interested in participating in a free service called <u>"ARE</u> <u>YOU O.K.?"</u>

"Are You O.K.?" was purchased in 1993 by the Lions Club and is run by the Police Department. Every day, current subscribers receive a telephone call at a designated time to check on their well being. When the subscriber answers the telephone, a pre-recorded message is played. In the subscriber is okay, he/she simply hangs up the telephone after hearing the pre-recorded message. If subscribers do not answer the telephone after three attempts to contact them, a family member is contacted or the police are dispatched to the residence.

Previously, this free service was offered only to seniors who lived alone, disabled persons, or shut-ins. Because of the positive response to this program, the Village and the Lions Club want to make this service available to others. Working parents whose children are home alone after school may be interested in participating in this free service. Seniors or disabled residents previously unaware of the program may also be interested in participating. Medical professionals and clergymen who know of families or individuals who could benefit from this program also are asked to contact the Bloomingdale Police Department for additional information.

Residents who sign up for this program will be asked to complete several forms. If you wish to sign up, or if you are interested in more information, please call supervisor Shilora Larson or Supervisor Patti Baron at the Bloomingdale Police Department,529-9868.

Family Technology Night at District 13: More than 50 families showed up for Bloomingdale School District 13's Family Technology Night at DuJardin School on November 28. The program, co-sponsored by Microsoft Corp., FamilyPC Magazine, and the district's technology department, provided a demonstration of the latest software and hardware systems available for educational use. The night culminated with students taking their parents on a tour, via computer terminals, to showcase some of the programs that enhance their classroom studies.

SNOW INFO TO GO!!!

With the seasonal snowfall just around the corner, the Village Services Department, Public Works Division is ready to combat snow and ice on the 112 center lane miles of Village streets, making them safer for motorists.

When a storm begins, day or night, the Village crews are promptly mobilized and begin spreading salt. The Village initially salts all Village streets approximately 100 feet before and after each intersection. The initial salt application mitigates icing conditions contributing to more effective snow removal operations. After a 1-inch to 2-inch accumulation of snow, crews begin the snow plow operations according to predetermined snow routes. The routes consist of 4 routes with 8 vehicles (2 separate vehicles handle cul-de-sacs and dead

ends) and have been carefully designed to allow for
the optimum use of the available snow plowing equipment and personnel. All Village-owned streets will eventually be plowed, but main streets are cleared before side
streets, which are cleared before cul-de-sacs and dead
ends. The rate at which the streets are cleared depends on
many factors including total accumulation, type of snow
(wet or powder-like), temperature and volume of traffic on streets during plow operations.

WHAT ARE THE VILLAGE OF BLOOMINGDALE'S PARKING REGULATIONS WHEN IT SNOWS?

The Village's winter parking ban takes effect after snowfalls of 2 inches or more. The ban applies to all vehicles on any Village-owned street and is in effect for a period of 24 hours or until the streets have been cleared of snow. Residents can assist Village crews in the snow removal efforts by parking vehicles in driveways or other off-street parking areas.

DOES THE VILLAGE REPAIR MY MAILBOX IF DAM-AGED DURING SNOW PLOWING OPERATIONS?

The Village will replace and/or reimburse a resident up to \$35.00 for a mailbox and post which is damaged as a result of the Village snow plow operations, provided the mailbox is installed per Village setback requirements. If you have questions as to whether or not your mailbox is in compliance with Village requirements, you may contact the Street Division of the Village Services Department or the Public Works Division at 708-529-5865.

> WHY DOES MY DRIVEWAY SOME-TIMES GET "PLOWED IN" WHEN A SNOW PLOW TRUCK PASSES? The Village snow plows are designed to direct the snow to the curb side of the plow blade. Side delivery plows are the fastest and most efficient means available to remove snowfall from the streets. As a result, snow is discharged along the length of the curb, the parkways, and the private driveway areas. The Village has thousands of private

driveways abutting Village streets, the cleaning of which is the responsibility of the property owner.

Manpower and equipment limitations prohibit the Village from responding to routine requests to remove snow from private driveways. Therefore, we strongly recommend you delay your schedule for clearing the driveway until the snow plows have cleaned the majority of your street. THE VILLAGE ORDINANCES PROHIBIT THE DISCHARGE OF SNOW ONTO THE VILLAGE STREETS. This illegally placed snow may freeze or become compacted, creating a safety hazard for all motorists.

WHOM DO I CALL WITH QUESTIONS REGARDING SNOW REMOVAL OPERATIONS?

Any questions regarding snow removal should be directed to the Village Services Department - Public Works Maintenance Division Superintendent at 708-529-5865.

♦ Use extra caution when driving through intersections following a heavy snowfall. Snow is piled on cross streets when intersections are plowed. Until crews have had their final pass to completely clear the intersection, the snow piles along the curb lane may hinder visibility.

♦ Please do not attempt to stop the snow plow operators to discuss questions or problems. Such interruptions slow crews and reduce the speed of the truck and the efficiency of the snow removal operations. Drivers are instructed not to stop to talk to residents.

♦ If it is still snowing, or if snow is anticipated on the evening before garbage pick-up day, we ask that you delay putting out your garbage for as long as possible. This will minimize the problem of garbage containers being covered by snow that is pushed against the curb by the plows. Place garbage containers on the driveway or as close to the driveway as possible to give refuse collectors room to pick them up.



Ornamental rocks along the curb or next to the pavement on non-curb streets present a serious safety hazard to the snow removal equipment. If residents use rocks or planters for landscape beautification, they need to insure that they are a minimum of three feet in back of the curb or pavement on non-curb streets. If these obstacles are not removed by the residents, the Village will remove them, if deemed necessary for safe snow removal operations.

FIRE HYDRANTS

For the convenience of firefighters - if an emergency should occur (maybe at your address), dig a path to the fire hydrant in front of your house from the street. Dig out around the fire hydrant too. If firefighters can see a hydrant, they can get to it more quickly. Better yet, adopt a hydrant near your home and see that it is accessible.



CAUTION: MOTORISTS - STAY BACK 3 CAR LENGTHS

POST Do not follow snow plows too closely. Sometimes they stop and then 99 back up. If you're right behind one when that happens, well ... Give ш snow plows plenty of space. Also, remember driving on slick winter-SAVI time pavements is dangerous, even if they've been plowed. Take more time to get where you're going, begin slowing for stops sooner and, for heaven's sake, don't drink and then try to drive.

Edgewater Drive/Lakeview Lane Reconstruction Project **Now Completed**

The Edgewater Drive and Lakeview Lane reconstruction is now complete. The reconstruction, consisting of Edgewater Drive (Bloomingdale Road to Royce Drive), Lakeview Lane, and Lakeview Court, began Monday June 19 and continued for approximately four (4) months. Although there were delays in early July and August due to unplanned relocation of underground pipes and cables by Northern Illinois Gas, Commonwealth Edison, and Ameritech, the Village contractor was able to complete this project on schedule.

Landscaping of the islands and parkways consisting of tree and shrub planting is 75% complete. The remaining 25% of the landscaping will be installed in the spring to best accommodate conditions for the particular species being planted.

THINK TREES **CURBSIDE CHRISTMAS TREE PICK-UP IN JANUARY**

Browning Ferris Industries (BFI) will pick up Christmas trees during the month of January on your regularly scheduled refuse pick-up day - Thursday, January 4, 11 & 18 and on Friday, January 5, 12 & 19. Christmas trees do not need a yard waste sticker. BFI is requesting residents position the bottom portion of their Christmas tree toward the curb for easy loading. Trees should be free of any decorations (tinsel, ornaments, lights, etc.). If there are any questions regarding the collection of Christmas trees, please contact BFI at 708-469-1036.

fire and emergency medical personnel to locate your home without delay in the event of an emergency.




The DuPage Senior Citizens Council is a non-for-profit

THINK TREES VILLAGE TREE ORDINANCE



On October 23, 1995, the Village approved an ordinance regulating the planting, maintenance, and removal of trees in Villageowned public places and parkways. Parkways are typically the area between the sidewalk and the street paving of a public street right-... of-way.

The Village President and Board of Trustees strongly believe trees are an integral part of the Village's infrastructure and quality of life. Trees provide protection from weather, reduce pollution, oxygenate the atmosphere, inhibit soil erosion, provide wildlife habitat, increase property values, and are aesthetically pleasing.

In order to maintain the prosperity of the urban forest, the new ordinance requires a tree planting, maintenance, or removal permit for the following:

- 1) A permit is required for planting, maintenance and removal of trees in Villageowned public places or parkways.
- 2) A permit is required for any excavation of ditches, tunnels, trenches, or any construction of a driveway within a radius of ten (10) feet from any public tree.

Required permits will be issued at no charge to applicants. Applications must be made at the office of the Urban Forester at the Public Works Facility, 305 Glen Ellyn Road, and not less than 48 hours (two working days) in advance of the time the work is to begin. The Village does reserve the right to require a performance bond in the form of cash or a letter of credit to assure compliance with permit conditions.



The courtyard will include benches for outside reading and relaxation, flower beds, trees and hedges. The courtyard and new library addition dedication is scheduled for December 1996.

Individuals, groups and businesses may purchase a brick. A 4" x 8" brick is \$ 75.00 per family and/or group, and a 8" x 8" brick is \$250.00 for businesses. Each brick holds three lines of type with 13 characters per line (includes spaces and punctuation) and the engraved letters are filled with a black epoxy to protect it from the elements.

Monies raised through the Commemorative Brick Program will be used to cover the cost of the Bronze statue and bench. All donations are tax deductible.

The Bloomingdale Business Promotion and Cultural Development Committee reserves the right to edit text and determine the location of the bricks in the pathway pattern.

WRITER'S PROFILE

Children's books create fantasy and enchantment in a child's life. A local author has dazzled thousands of children, placing them at the center of her career.



Sharon Kane has a special fascination for children, their delicate features, movements, and behavior. She set out to write books, the kind that explore a child's imagination, and she was successful. She is the author of 21 children's books. One copy of each is being displayed at the Northern Indiana Historical Society in South Bend, Indiana.
