

Bloomingdale Residents Say 'Yes' To Recent Home Rule Referendum

Fifty-seven percent of all registered voters within the Village cast ballots (compared to 38 percent in DuPage County). The final vote was 3,941 "yes" and 602 "no." Home rule passed by a margin of 85 percent to 15 percent.

On March 25 the Village Board passed a Resolution certifying the results of the election. Also on March 25, the Village Board passed an Ordinance enacting an additional one-quarter cent sales tax effective July 1.

As was promised, in the coming weeks we will begin the procedures to purchase the land in order to preserve it as "open space." I will keep you all posted as we move along in this process.

Thank you for your tremendous support - and thank you for the trust you

have shown in your local government. I personally assure you we will be worthy of that trust.

Lastly, let me thank all of the citizen volunteers who worked so hard to communicate the issues of home rule to the citizens of Bloomingdale. Without your hard work, our effort would not have succeeded.

It is gratifying to know that local government and its citizens can work together for the common good for our community.

Commercial Water Billings To Be Converted to Bi-monthly Cycle

Later this spring Northern Illinois Gas representatives will begin reading commercial and multi-unit customers' water meters. At this time the Village will also be converting those same customers' billing cycle to a bi-monthly, rather than monthly, billing cycle.

During the initial conversion period, businesses and multi-unit customers may experience a slightly lower or higher bill than "normal" as a result of more or fewer days in the billing period. Following this conversion period, the bi-monthly bills will be for a relatively consistent 60-day period and the amounts of the bill will only change as more or less water is used.

The purpose of this change is to control costs. The Village has already seen benefits from doing the same with residential utility billing.

For your safety and protection, NiGas personnel will be in uniform and are required to carry a photo-ID.

Questions about this change may be addressed to the Village's Finance Department at 893-7000.

PLEASE NOTE: These changes will not affect current residential billing at all.



Check the Calendar And the Clock Before Using Outside Water

The summer season is around the corner. Once again, sprinkling restrictions are in effect now through September. These restrictions have been mandated by state and federal authori-



The following restrictions apply to automatic sprinkling devices and allow for sprinkling only between the hours of 5:00 AM and 9:00 AM and 5:00 PM and 9:00 PM. These times have been established not only as a conservation method, but also as optimum times for effective lawn sprinkling with minimum loss due to evaporation or runoff.

Single Family residences with odd numbered addresses may sprinkle Monday, Wednesday and Saturday.

Single family residences with even numbered addresses may sprinkle Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday.

Units of government, commercial, industrial, manufacturing, office buildings and multi-family residential buildings may sprinkle on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday.

There is no sprinkling allowed on Fridays.

Permits for newly sodded or seeded lawns will be available from the Director of Village Services office upon application of such permit. Permits would allow for outside watering by means of automatic sprinklers for a period of thirty (30) consecutive days.

The use of hand-held water devices is permitted without restriction for any purpose except when the device is left on unattended, or no device is used to control the flow of water. If a hand-held watering device is left on unattended, it is subject to restrictions for an automatic sprinkling device.

Yard Waste Season is Underway

Effective July 1, 1990, yard waste materials (grass clippings, leaves, brush trimmings and tree trimmings) are no longer accepted at any landfill in the state of Illinois.

Browning Ferris picks up yard waste as part of the Village's yard waste program. Yard waste is to be placed curbside in either 33 gallon or less containers or in biodegradable paper bags. Yard waste stickers must be applied regardless of the method used.

Yard waste stickers are \$1.20 each and are available at the Village Hall or at the following local businesses: Dominicks, Jewel/Osco, Economart, and Bloomingdale Pharmacy. They may also be purchased directly from BFL. Remember, a yard waste sticker must be applied to each container or bag used.

BFI will also pick up bundled branches if a yard waste sticker is affixed to each bundle. Bundles should be no longer than four (4) feet and weigh less than 50 pounds. Branches may not exceed three (3) inches in diameter.

1996 Hydrant Flushing Program Begins April 16

It's that time of year again. Starting Tuesday, April 16th through May 9th, the Village Services-Utilities Division will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village. The flushing will occur between the hours of 8:00 P.M. and 12:00 midnight. Please DO NOT WASH LAUNDRY during the flushing hours, as rust staining of the clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

One question that is always asked is - "Why does the Village flush hydrants?" Hydrant flushing is routine maintenance for a water system. It accomplishes the following:


- 1. Improves water quality: Flushing removes minerals such as iron and magnesium that have collected in the water mains.
- 2. Improves water flow: By removing these minerals, the inside diameter of a water main is increased and therefore, allows a better flow of water.
- 3. Hydrant maintenance: A fire hydrant is a mechanical device. Operation of a hydrant lubricates internal mechanisms and gaskets.
- **4.** Hydrant inspection: Any deficiencies are noted and repaired as necessary to insure that each hydrant will perform when needed for an emergency.

Lynbrook, Longridge & Royce to be Reconstructed

The Village is planning to reconstruct Lynbrook Drive south of 195 Lynbrook Drive, Longridge Drive south of 200 Longridge Drive, Royce Drive north of 182 Royce Drive and Royce Court during the summer of 1996. This project includes removal and replacement of the existing asphalt pavement including curbs and gutters, and road base. The new road pavement on Royce Drive and Royce Court will be the same width as the existing road; no widening is planned. Pavement width on Lynbrook Drive and Longridge Drive will be one foot narrower than existing to allow for protection to tree root system in narrow parkway areas during construction. All work is funded 100% by the Village.

The project is scheduled to begin during the month of May and will take approximately 3 months to complete. During construction, the road will be closed to through traffic. If you live in the construction zone, or on one of the adjacent streets you will be permitted to proceed past the barricades to WORKING

Motorists are advised to use alternate routes around the construction zone to avoid delays. Local detour signage will be posted prior to construction.

reach your residence.

As part of this project, the Village will be installing a depressed curb at each driveway. This means the "bump" at the curb of each driveway is being eliminated, and a smooth transition from the street to each driveway will be constructed. The Village will also be reconstructing the driveway aprons, that is, the concrete driveway between the sidewalk and the curb, as part of the project.

Summer 1996 Street Repair Schedule

The Village is planning to perform overlay maintenance on Walter Court, Plymouth Lane, Hempstead Lane/Drive, Woodcrest Court, St. Francis Court, Millford Lane/Court, Salem Court, Bridgewater Lane, Surrey Lane/Drive, Norton Lane/Drive, Sutherland Lane, Fairfield Way (Schick to Bourne), Lawrence Avenue (Gary to Virginia), Foster Avenue (Bloomingdale to east Village limit), Broker Road (St. Francis to Circle). Pavement patching (no new surface course) is planned for Third Street and Lockwood Lane.

The work will be done during the summer of 1996. All work is funded 100% by the Village.

New overlay construction consists of repairing curbs

which do not drain properly, repairing failed pavement areas and installing a new asphalt surface over the entire road. We will not be repairing cracked



curbs unless the failed curb is impeding drainage.

During this project, the streets will remain open to traffic. There will be brief periods when certain sections of the road are temporarily closed while work is taking place at a particular location. This work will begin in May and will take approximately 10 weeks to complete.

Any construction project of these types and sizes will create some inconvenience to the neighborhood. We appreciate your patience and cooperation during the construction process and will make every effort to minimize the disruption.

- 4. An Arbor Day observance.



The Forum is intended to serve as a catalyst bringing talented people together and allowing them to share with the public an insight into the wealth of creative effort that is taking place within the community.





Critter Corner DUCKS AND GEESE



Ducks and Geese are considered waterfowl. Although many species of waterfowl can cause problems to farmers and lakefront property owners, the species most often at fault are the well known Canada goose, the Mallard duck and a domestic species called the Muscovy duck. The Canada goose is a large, plump bird with a brown body, black neck and head, and a large white cheek patch. The Mallard, one of the most common ducks in the United States, is identified by a blue band, bordered by white, on its wings. The bright green head of the male (drake) is distinctive. The drab brown female (hen) is identifiable by association with the male.

Most ducks and geese are migratory, although local populations may become resident and remain year round at a location. All waterfowl require bodies of water, such as rivers, creeks, or lakes, at some time of the year.

The diets of waterfowl are varied, but ducks and geese, whose activities conflict with the interests of humans, feed chiefly on grass, grains, and other vegetation. Reproduction of ducks and geese is prevalent in the spring.

All waterfowl are protected under the federal Migratory Bird Treaty Act and its amendments. When they occur in large numbers, geese and ducks often contaminate areas with droppings, which can be a problem if left to accumulate.


Control of the waterfowl requires awareness first, and sensitivity to potential problems. Supplemental feeding, such as bread, while a pleasurable activity, often leads to overpopulation and dependency. Also, Avian Botulism can occur if the waterfowl consume spoiled or contaminated food stuffs.

Waterfowl can be deterred by using plastic netting or light wire fencing, such as chicken wire, or scarecrows, or a 2 foot x 3 foot black plastic flag stapled to a 4 foot wood lathe.

Mail carriers thank residents for their participation and urge them to once again be generous in their donations.


