

# Plans for Bloomingdale's 24th Annual Septemberfest Underway!

Bloomingdale residents and area neighbors are in for another wonderful celebration when they attend the 24th Annual Bloomingdale Septemberfest on Sunday, September 8, 1996. Set in the heart of Bloomingdale's Old Town at Lake Street and Bloomingdale Road, the festival will run from 10:30 AM until 5:30 PM and feature entertainment, food, antique and craft dealers, and games that will appeal to family members of all ages.

Several popular acts from last year's Septemberfest will make a return appearance this year. Those Funny Little People will perform from 11:40 until 11:55 AM at the Main Stage prior to the opening ceremonies, and Picture Perfect and Sarah B! will perform from 1:00 until 2:00 PM at the Main Stage.

New to Septemberfest this year is Danny and the Twisters, a very popular local group that plays the best of classic rock and roll. They will be on the Main Stage from 3:30-4:30 PM.

The opening ceremonies will begin with the traditional flag-raising ceremony. New this year will be a small parade featuring the Bloomingdale Park District baton twirlers escorting all the Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale candidates to the Main Stage.

The Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale Scholarship Competition, formerly known as the Bloomingdale King and Queen Contest, is open to young women and men who are residents of incorporated Bloomingdale and who are between 16 and 20 years of age. To be considered for this competition, applicants are required to complete the application form on page 5 of this newsletter along with an essay of 300 to 400 words that describes the contributions they feel they will make as a representative of Bloomingdale's youth. They are then interviewed by a judges' panel made up of civic and business leaders from Bloomingdale. The emphasis in this competition is on poise, personality, civic involvement, and communication skills.

The Joe Draghi Scholarship Fund, named in honor of a long-time and beloved

Septemberfest Committee member and Bloomingdale resident, is one of the primary funding sources for the Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale scholarships. Donations from Bloomingdale's businesses and residents still are needed to finance the scholarships. Last year's scholarships were \$1,600 for Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale, \$800 for both first runners-up, \$600 for both second runners-up, and \$400 for both third and fourth runners-up. To become a Friend of Septemberfest and contribute to the Joe Draghi Scholarship Fund, fill out the application on page 3, or contact the Village Hall.

Another source of income for

the scholarship fund is the booth fee of \$35 paid by Septemberfest exhibitors and not-for-profit organizations. This year Septemberfest will welcome back many participants from previous years, such as the Bloomingdale Lions Club and Sons of Italy, and will also see new exhibitors such as a small farmers' market. The Bloomingdale Women's Club will once again host the Festival of Arts that will run concurrently with the Septemberfest festivities. The Festival of Arts features original clothing, jewelry, wood and ceramics. St. Paul Church will also be hosting an ice cream social at the church. (continued on page 5)



An Update on the Golf Course Acquisition

Village officials have been busy preparing for the acquisition of Glendale Golf Course. I have been visiting other golf courses, along with staff and trustees, to gain information and ideas.

We have had some preliminary discussions in regard to some changes we foresee when we take over. We have been looking at the well and septic system currently in place and making some determinations on the needs in this area. Some

landscaping and drainage changes are also being looked at, as well as improvements to the clubhouse.

The anticipated closing on the golf course is September 30. You will find a form at the bottom of this page to use to suggest a name for the course. The name Glendale Golf Course leads many to think the property is located in Glendale Heights. We are looking for a name that will reflect Bloomingdale. Put on your thinking cap and send in a suggestion. If we pick one of the entries for the name, the submitter will receive a \$100 Stratford Square mall gift certificate.

We also have over 30 residents who have expressed an interest in serving on the Citizens Advisory Committee for the golf course. The trustees, staff and I have been examining the work this group will be able to accomplish for us. As we continue to discuss policies, improvements, operations and other aspects, I will keep you informed of our progress. We are very excited about the future of this new Village asset and want to share that with you.

# Bloomingdale Bicycle Patrol on a Roll to Success

Community policing is one of the buzz words heard lately in the law enforcement field. Bloomingdale has always prided itself on its emphasis on community relations from the DARE Program to Neighborhood Watch to the Citizen Police Academy. Recently, we have taken another step to bring the police presence into the neighborhoods with our Bicycle Patrol.

Twenty officers have signed up to be part of this pilot program, which is under the supervision of Sergeant Len Jaster, assisted by Patrolman Frank Boenzi. A team of two officers goes out several times a week for the

entire 3:00-11:00 PM afternoon shift. The beat is the entire Village, so the officers can easily log some 30 miles on the mountain bikes during that time. According to Officer Boenzi, the officers try to hit the problem areas in town first, then cover the rest of town. "Visibility," he said "is the key to this program."

"We can get to places on the bikes we can't get to with the squad cars and people don't usually notice who we are until we're right there." By the same token, Boenzi notes that residents have felt very comfortable stopping the officers to talk.

The officers have written tickets for ordinance violations, such as tobacco possession by minors and use of illegal fireworks, as well as making some arrests for more serious offenses. Boenzi relates there have even been traffic stops made by the Bicycle Patrol.

"You blow your whistle or yell 'stop', and people stop," he says. "They can tell we are the police from the helmet and the shirt."

Len Conradi, Commander of the Patrol Division, says the program has been very positive. "We haven't heard anything negative," he says. "It's new for both the residents and the police officers to have this kind of citizen contact. So far everyone seems to think it's great."

# News For You About Village Services

## BRANCH COLLECTION PROGRAM

The Bloomingdale Public Works' Forestry and Street Divisions will be conducting their semi-annual Branch Collection Program beginning on September 23, 1996. The program is available to single family residences within the Village of Bloomingdale only.

The following information shall assist residents regarding branch collection procedures:

O Woody branches up to six inches in diameter and twenty feet in length are the only items that will be picked up. Any branches exceeding six inches in trunk diameter will not be picked up. Our chipper is designed to chip woody limbs and branches. The equipment will not grind small twigs, vines or other non-woody yard waste. LEAVES, VINES, MULTI-FLORA ROSE BUSHES, SMALL (under 1/2 inch in diameter) WILLOW STEMS, HERBACEOUS PLANTS AND WEEDS WILL NOT BE PICKED UP BECAUSE THE SOFT MATERIAL CLOGS AND DAMAGES OUR EQUIPMENT. IF IT IS BAGGABLE, IT IS YARD WASTE. STUMPS, ROOTS AND ROOT BALLS ALSO WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.

☐ All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and should be STACKED IN AN ORDER-LY FASHION with the cut or larger end towards the pavement. Branches should not be bundled, tied, bagged or placed in cans. Branches left out in a tangled mess will not be picked up due to time required for our crew to sort for loading.

☐ Please do not hide thorny tree branches inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to our workers.

☐ Small twigs, leaves and other yard waste may be placed in bags with tags for B.F.I. pick-up. B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups begin April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups should be directed to 630-469-1036.

O Branches must be out NO LATER THAN THE FIRST DAY OF THE SCHEDULED PICK-UP WEEK as our crew will be making only one pass down each block. PICK-UP WILL BE ALLOWED ONLY DURING THE SCHEDULED WEEK.

# BLOOMINGDALE PUBLIC LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT FISCAL YEAR 1995-1996

#### STATIEMIENT OF PURPOSE

The Bloomingdale Public Library provides current, highdemand popular materials and useful, timely information in a variety of formats for persons of all ages in pursuit of their recreational and personal needs. The Library places special emphasis on stimulating young children's interest in reading and learning, and assists students of all ages in formal education courses.

#### COMMUTMIENT TO SERVICE

The Library Board of Trustees and staff are committed at all times to providing excellence in library services. The trustees and staff actively work together to make the Library an open, friendly and warm place for patrons to visit.

#### HIGHILIGHUS OF THE YEAR

On April 30, 1996, Bloomingdale Public Library's fiscal year ended, and the statistics revealed that 1995-96 was a great year for the Bloomingdale Library. Our year was so successful because of the wonderful patronage of our community and the outstanding support of the Bloomingdale business community and non-profit organizations such as the Lions Club and the Friends of the Library. In addition, the fine support the Library received from the Village of Bloomingdale helped to make the Library's year very successful.

The main highlights of Fiscal Year 1995-96 included the Groundbreaking Ceremony on September 7, 1995 and the day construction started on September 25, 1995. Everyone had an exciting year watching the construction progress.

#### Our Patrons -

- \* checked out 174,270 items (books, videos, cassettes, etc.)
- \* visited the library 192,088 times. This averages out to approximately 9.6 visits for each resident in Bloomingdale.
- \* registered for many library cards. Currently 15,229 residents (77%) of Bloomingdale have registered library cards.

#### Our Staff -

- added 6,724 new items (books, cassettes, videos, CD's, etc.) to our collection of materials, which increased our total collection to 64,991 items.
- presented programs to 14,479 patrons; 12,267 children and 2,212 adults.
- answered a record-breaking number of reference questions, approximately 34,840 during the year.

#### The Library -

provided rooms for community group meetings 250 times and for library programs 418 times, for a total of 668. That's an average of almost 13 activities each week.

#### EXTENSION OF SERVICES

The services of the Bloomingdale Public library were expanded in the following ways during Fiscal Year 1995-96:

☐ Expanded the library's adult patron microcomputer center by

adding two new IBM Compatible Pentium computers and a color printer for public use.

- ☐ Added a new service, free Internet access, for Bloomingdale residents.
- ☐ Enhanced patron access to information about the Library by creating a Library Homepage on the Internet that contains current information about the Library's programs and services.
- ☐ Expanded programming for senior citizens by adding a monthly senior citizen club that includes bus tours, speakers, etc.
- Q Expanded services to residents in nursing care facilities in Bloomingdale by establishing circulating in-house collections for residents.
- ☐ Expanded reference service for residents by offering reference service online via E-mail.
- ☐ Added a new circulation service, renewal of materials via telephone.
- ☐ Enhanced patron access to non-fiction videos by removing the \$1.00 rental fee, increasing the loan period to one week, and allowing reserves to be placed on them.
- ☐ Expanded services to children by establishing a microcomputer for children in the Youth Services Department.
- ☐ Started several new programs; Kids in Kindergarten, and Family Nights during the school year, for children and their families.
- ☐ Enhanced services to Bloomingdale schools by creating a full-time Library/School liaison to coordinate all school requests.


