It's that time of year again --time to mark vour calendars with the above dates, and come Bloomingdale Family Fest at Lake Street and Springfield Drive.

The Fest will open on Thursday, June 26th from 6:00-11:00 PM with carnival rides, games and food. The beer garden will also be open with entertainment by "Jade" on the Garden Stage from 7:30-10:30 PM. Beginning at noon on Friday, June 27th the Fest will offer walk-around entertainment, a petting zoo with exotic animals, pony and camel rides and pig races with featured attractions that will continue until Sunday evening. The weekend activities will climax with the Village's traditional fireworks display co-sponsored by the Village of Bloomingdale and the Bloomingdale Park District.

Advance ride tickets can be purchased until June 26 at the Village Hall, Bloomingdale Library, Citibank (Army Trail Road), Bloomingdale Bank & Trust, and 1st Chicago (two Bloomingdale locations). A sheet of 40 tickets is \$20.00, a \$30.00 value.

Various attractions this year will include The Tom Carey Band on the Garden Stage on Friday, entertaining from 6:30-8:00 PM. At 8:30 PM, we have the .38 Special on the Main Stage, then the Tom Carey Band from 10:00-11:00 PM. Saturday's Garden Stage entertainment from 1:30-4:30 PM will be Jason Hubbard, then at 6:30-8:00 PM music by the Dustin Parker Band. At 8:30 PM on the Main Stage we have the Mamas & The Papas. On Sunday, the Garden Stage entertainment will include Wiskey Bent Band at 1:30-4:30 PM, and R Gang at 6:00-7:30 PM. Main Stage entertainment is Ajacks Music Mania, beginning at 8:00 PM, followed by the fireworks at approximately 9:30 PM. R Gang then returns to the Garden Stage until 11:00 PM.

Twenty-five vendors will be offering a delicious variety of edibles. Be prepared to go from root beer floats, corn-on-thecob, curly fries, sandwiches, to funnel cakes, egg rolls, ice cream, pizza, and much more!

Free shuttle bus service will be available from Winnebago School, Westfield and







Check the Calendar And the Clock **Before Using Outside Water**

The summer season is around the corner. Sprinkling restrictions are in effect from May 1 through September. These restrictions have been mandated by state and federal authorities controlling Lake Michigan water allocations. The following are highlights from our Ordinance No. 90-30:



The following restrictions apply to automatic sprinkling devices and allow for sprinkling only between the hours of 5:00 AM and 9:00 AM and 5:00 PM and 9:00 PM. These times have been established not only as a conservation method, but also as optimum times for effective lawn sprinkling with minimum loss due to evaporation or runoff.

Single Family residences with odd numbered addresses may sprinkle Monday, Wednesday and Saturday.

Single family residences with even numbered addresses may sprinkle Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday.

Units of government, commercial, industrial, manufacturing, office buildings and multi-family residential buildings may sprinkle on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday.

There is no sprinkling allowed on Fridays.

Permits for newly sodded or seeded lawns will be available from the Director of Village Services office upon application of such permit. Permits would allow for outside watering by means of automatic sprinklers for a period of thirty (30) consecutive days.

The use of hand-held water devices is permitted without restriction for any purpose except when the device is left on unattended, or no device is used to control the flow of water. If a hand-held watering device is left on unattended, it is subject to restrictions for an automatic sprinkling device.

Yard Waste Season is Underway

Browning Ferris picks up yard waste (grass clippings, leaves, brush trimmings and tree trimmings) from April 1 through November 30. Yard waste is to be placed curbside in either 33 gallon or less containers or in biodegradable paper bags. Yard waste stickers must be applied regardless of the method used.

Yard waste stickers are \$1.23 each and are available at the Village Hall or at the following local businesses: Dominick's, Jewel/Osco, Economart, Sears Hardware, and Bloomingdale Pharmacy. They may also be purchased directly from BFI. Remember, a yard waste sticker must be applied to each container or bag used.

BFI will also pick up bundled branches if a yard waste sticker is affixed to each bundle. Bundles should be no longer than four (4) feet and weigh less than 50 pounds. Branches may not exceed three (3) inches in diameter.



Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale Needed for 25th Anniversary Septemberfest Celebration

Septemberfest is not far away and neither is Bloomingdale's annual Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale Scholarship competition (formerly known as the Bloomingdale King and Queen Contest). The contest, for Bloomingdale residents between the ages of 16 and 20, is held in conjunction with the Septemberfest celebration on Saturday evening, September 6 and Sunday, September 7, 1997. The contest is open to both young men and women who reside in the corporate limits of Bloomingdale. Applicants are judged on poise, community involvement, and interview.

Each applicant must submit an essay of 300 to 400 words that describes what contributions they feel they will make as a representative of Bloomingdale's youth. The application follows, and is also available at the Village Hall or the library and must be postmarked by August 1, 1997.

The Septemberfest Commission has committed for following scholarship amounts for 1997: Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale -- \$2,000; 1st runners-up -- \$1,100; 2nd runners-up -- \$900; 3rd runners-up -- \$800; and 4th runners-up -- \$700.

All applicants will attend a pizza party Friday evening, August 15, and receive gift certificates to Stratford Square in appreciation for their participation. Judging will be held on Saturday morning, August 16, 1997 at the Village Hall.

The main source of income for the scholarships is booth fees and donations to the Joe Draghi Scholarship Fund. Additional financial contributions are still needed, as well as gifts of merchandise for Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale and their courts.



THINK TREES ... MULCHING


There is a current landscape maintenance practice gaining popularity which is very damaging to trees. The maintaining of a mulched or cultivated ring around trees with a deep cut outside edge and a cone shaped mound of mulch and/or soil stacked up on the trunk of the tree may be advantageous in the care of the lawn, but the cutting of the outside edge cuts and exposes the shallow feeder roots of the tree. Also, the moisture of any material stacked against the bark of the tree will cause decay and canker problems.

Proper mulching:


- Is kept away from the trunk.
- ▶ Is three to four inches deep, spread out evenly and becoming shallower approaching the trunk of the tree. In poor clay soils, mulch should not be more than two inches deep as adventitious roots will grow into the mulch layer to escape excessive moisture and/or poor soil, creating a shallow vulnerable root system.
- ▶ Helps retain and conserve soil moisture.
- Increases soil fertility when organic mulches decompose.
- ▶ Improves soil structure through better aeration and temperature moderation.
- Increases tree growth and vitality.
- ▶ Should be one foot in diameter for every one inch of trunk diameter or extended as far out as the branch spread (the larger, the better).
- ▶ Is an organic material, such as composted wood chips, leaf litter, pine straw, shredded bark or peat moss. Grass clippings may be used if dried first and herbicides are not used on the lawn.
- Creates a soil surface condition much like the tree would have in its native forest habitat.

Improper mulching of trees causes damage to the tree and therefore, such activity to a parkway tree is a violation of the Village Public Tree Ordinance No. 95-61.

Hearty congratulations to all these scholarship winners.







Youngsters move together in the "fields of Sunshine Farm."



Tedrahn's general store opened in Cloverdale in 1888, but the original building burned on November 7, 1934 and a new store opened June 24, 1935. It closed for good on December 31, 1983, and the space is now occupied by Berec Photo Studios. This, and many other bits of the area's past have been revealed to Kandy Jones as she recorded oral histories from long-time residents Paula Tedrahn, Velda Hahn, Ruth Schmitz, Laura Coppock, Ethel Williamson and Emil Zidek.

On April 18, library staff members Rich Clark, Lisa Heil, and Kandy Jones toured the Lake Street property of Emil Zidek. Two of the five buildings are scheduled for demolition this summer, so pictures were taken for our local archives.

A second "Afternoon of Reflections of Bloomingdale's Past" was held at the library on Saturday, May 17 when more long-time residents got together to reminisce and record.




