

25th Anniversary Septemberfest Sparkles With New Events

The celebration of a silver anniversary is a landmark occasion, and the Bloomingdale community will not be disappointed with the day-and-onehalf-long celebration planned for the 25th annual Septemberfest. To commemorate this very special marriage between Bloomingdale residents, the Village Board and employees, local not-for-profit organizations, and the Park District, the festival will begin on Saturday evening, September 6 with an old fashioned sock hop and collector car show from 6:30 pm to 10:00 pm. On Sunday, September 7, the event will run from 10:30 am until 5:30 pm, featuring entertainment, food, antique and craft dealers, and games that will appeal to family members of all ages. All festival activities will be held in the heart of Bloomingdale Old Town at Lake Street and Bloomingdale Road.

Saturday evening's festivities will begin with music and entertainment provided by Mike Lettieri of M&R Music. At 7:30 pm, Danny and the Twisters will take the stage to provide their special brand of classic rock and roll. In keeping with the 25-year theme, sock hoppers are encouraged to dress in costumes reminiscent of 1972 and earlier, and will be eligible for prizes for the top three costumes. The car show will feature 40 vehicles that are at least 25 years old. In addition to receiving a commemorative dash plaque, all vehicles will be judged for the Mayor's Choice and Best of Show awards. Car enthusiasts who wish to participate in this show must submit an application by August 15 to the Septemberfest Commission. Please see page 8 for the application.

Sunday's music lineup will appeal to everyone. Bloomingdale natives Jam'R and 2nd Dimension combine singing, dancing, and audience participation as they perform Top 40s, hip-hop, and chant-response at 2:10 pm and 5:00 pm. At 3:30 pm, Simply Vintage will perform underground rock from the 1960s, including favorites such as Cream, Led Zeppelin, and Crosby, Stills & Nash. Mike Lettieri of M&R Music will continue his role as disc jockey and MC, with music, games, karaoke, and local talent Tunisia Davis to sing the national anthem.

The opening ceremonies will begin at noon with a small parade featuring the Bloomingdale Park District baton twirlers, local girl and boy scout troops, and classic cars to escort Village Board members and the Ms. and Mr.

Bloomingdale candidates to the Main Stage. The parade will start at the Post Office, cross Schick Road, continue down Third Street to Franklin Street, and finish at the Main Stage.



Storm Sewers, Sidewalks, Streets Undergoing **Improvements This Summer**

Village street construction storm sewer repairs are complete on Lehigh Drive, Larchmont Drive, Lynbrook Drive, Brentwood Court, Dover Court, and Colony Court. Curb installation and initial layers of paving will follow in late July/early August, followed by pavement removal on Longridge Drive. New curbing and paving on Longridge Drive will occur in late August. Restoration of lawns will take place after Labor Day. The contractor for this work is A. Lamp Concrete Contractors, 847-635-3060. SIDEWALK CONSTRUCTION

Carriage walk replacements in Suncrest Subdivision will begin during the final week of July. Carriage walks will be eliminated on Nordic Road west of Euclid Avenue and Pleasant Avenue north of Schick Road. A new five foot wide sidewalk will be installed, set back from the curb by a grass strip. The contractor for this work is M & C Scavelli, 773-774-1772. LAKE STREET

Utility companies are currently making adjustments to facilities in advance of the widening of Lake Street. The utility company work requires temporary lane closures since some of these facilities are located beneath the pavement. Demolition of house and tree removal is slated for fall of 1997. The pavement widening of Lake Street by the Illinois Department of Transportation is scheduled to begin in late summer 1998, with completion targeted for fall of 1999.

Village Updates Building Construction Ordinances to Protect Public Safety, Health


The Village of Bloomingdale President and Board of Trustees recently adopted ordinances to amend the current Village building, electrical and mechanical construction codes updating the minimum regulations governing building construction within the Village.

These ordinances will not be retroactive to existing buildings or businesses unless new construction is proposed on the premises. Only areas that would be affected by the new construction would be required to comply with newly adopted ordinances.

The building construction codes adopted by ordinance at this time are the 1996 Edition of the BOCA National Building Code, the 1996 Edition of the International Mechanical Code and the 1996 Edition of the National Fire Protection Association - National Electrical Code. Adoption of these widely recognized model codes will clearly provide the minimum construction standards within the Village of Bloomingdale to insure the public safety, health and welfare insofar as they are affected by building construction.

A thirty (30) day grace period will be extended to building permit applications which were submitted after July 28, 1997. It is anticipated that new construction permit applications received after September 1, 1997 will be subject to the requirements of the newly adopted ordinances.

Any proposed developments that are presently on the Old Town Committee, Plan Commission or Village Board agenda will not be required to meet new ordinance requirements. Petitioners applying after September 1, 1997 will be subject to the requirements of the newly adopted ordinances.

News For You About Village Services

FALL BRANCH COLLECTION PROGRAM

The Bloomingdale Public Works' Forestry Division will be conducting its semi-annual Branch Collection Program beginning on September 22, 1997. Once during each spring and fall are the only times the Village of Bloomingdale picks up residents' branches with the exception of branches downed by storms. For storm damage pick-up, please contact Helen Price at 630-529-5865, Extension 7, within 72 hours of storm for scheduling.

The branch collection program is available to single family detached residences within the Village of Bloomingdale only. If residents of townhomes have questions regarding branch collection, please contact your association.

The following information shall assist residents regarding branch collection procedures:

☐ Branches must be out NO LATER THAN THE FIRST DAY OF THE SCHEDULED PICK-UP WEEK as our crew will be making only one pass down each block. PICK-UP WILL BE ALLOWED ONLY DURING THE SCHEDULED WEEK.

□ Woody branches up to six inches in diameter and twenty feet in length are the only items that will be picked up. Any branches exceeding six inches in trunk diameter will not be picked up. Our chipper is designed to chip woody limbs and branches. The equipment will not grind small twigs, vines or other non-woody yard waste. LEAVES, VINES, MULTIFLORA ROSE BUSHES, SMALL (under 1/2 inch in diameter) WILLOW STEMS, HERBACEOUS PLANTS AND WEEDS WILL NOT BE PICKED UP BECAUSE THE SOFT MATERIAL CLOGS AND DAMAGES OUR EQUIPMENT. IF IT IS BAGGABLE, IT IS YARD WASTE. STUMPS, ROOTS AND ROOT BALLS ALSO WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.

□ All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and should be STACKED IN AN ORDERLY FASHION with the cut or larger end towards the pavement. Branches should not be bundled, tied, bagged or placed in cans. Branches left out in a tangled mess will not be picked up due to time required for our crew to sort for loading.

☐ Please do not conceal thorny tree branches inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to our workers.

☐ Small twigs, leaves and other yard waste may be placed in bags with tags for B.F.I. pick-up. B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups begin April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups should be directed to 630-469-1036.



The Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale Scholarship Competition, formerly known as the Bloomingdale King and Queen Contest, is open to young women and men between the ages of 16 and 20 years of age who are residents of incorporated Bloomingdale. To enter this competition, applicants must complete an application and submit an essay of 300 - 400 words that describes the contributions they feel they will make as a representative of Bloomingdale's youth. Then, they are interviewed by a judges panel made up of civic and business leaders from Bloomingdale. The emphasis in this competition is on poise, personality, civic involvement, and communication skills. Applications were due August 1.

One of the primary sources to fund the Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale scholarships is the Joe Draghi Scholarship Fund, named in honor of a long-time and beloved Septemberfest Commission member. Donations from Bloomingdale businesses and residents still are needed to finance the scholarships. Scholarship awards for this year will be: \$2,000 for Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale, \$1,100 for first runners-up, \$900 for second runners-up, \$800 for third runners-up, and \$700 for fourth runners-up. To become a Friend of Septemberfest and contribute to the Joe Draghi Scholarship Fund, fill out the application on page 8, or contact the Village Hall.

Another source of income for the scholarship fund is the booth fee of \$35 paid by Septemberfest exhibitors and notfor-profits. This year, food vendors are needed for Saturday night. All other Septemberfest vendors will participate on Sunday only. Look for the return of the Bloomingdale Lion's Club's food booth on Saturday evening and Sunday, and the Bloomingdale Women's Club Festival of Arts. The Festival of Arts runs concurrently with the Septemberfest festivities on Sunday, and features original clothing, jewelry, wood and ceramics.

Septemberfest booth spaces are still available. To apply, submit your check for \$35 with the application form available at the Village Hall, or call 630-529-9868, extension 271 for more information. Deadline for entry is August 16, 1997.

The Septemberfest Commission has planned two new activities to celebrate this silver anniversary: a Septemberfest time capsule, and an art exhibit. Bloomingdale residents are encouraged to suggest items of historical significance to include in the time capsule, which will be opened at the 50th anniversary. Drop a note with your idea(s) to the Septemberfest Commission at the Village Hall, or call 893-7000 and ask for Dolores at extension 214. The art exhibit also has a special thematic twist. We are looking for a creative representation of either what Septemberfest looked like 25 years ago, or what Septemberfest will look like for the 50th anniversary. 


Bloomingdale Blast Heads to Tennessee

THINK TREES...DO NOT TOP THEM

What Is Topping?

The sight of topped trees is all too common in the communities and along the roadways of America - trunks with stubby limbs, trees stripped of all dignity and grace.

Topping causes unnecessary stress and increased risk to the tree's health. The results pose a danger from rot and weakly attached re-growth. In short, as one arborist said, "Topping is the absolute worst thing you can do for the health of your tree."

Why NOT To "Top"

- 1. Starvation: Good pruning practices rarely remove more than 1/4 to 1/3 of the crown, which in turn does not seriously interfere with the ability of a tree's leafy crown to manufacture food. Topping removes so much of the crown that it upsets an older tree's well-developed crown-to-root ratio and temporarily cuts off its food-making ability.
- 2. Shock: A tree's crown is like an umbrella that shields much of the tree from the direct rays of the sun. By suddenly removing this protection, the remaining bark tissue is so exposed that scalding may result. There may also be a dramatic effect on neighboring trees and shrubs.
- 3. Insects and Disease: The large stubs of a topped tree have a difficult time forming callus. The terminal location of these cuts, as well as their large diameter, prevent the tree's chemically based natural defense system from doing its job. The stubs are highly vulnerable to insect invasion and the spores of decay fungi. If decay is already present in a limb, cutting the limb can speed the spread of the disease.
- 4. Weak Limbs: At best, the wood of a new limb that sprouts after a larger limb is truncated is more weakly attached than a limb that develops more normally. If rot exists or develops at the severed end of the limb, the weight of the sprout makes a bad situation even worse.
- 5. Rapid New Growth: The goal of topping is usually to control the height and spread of a tree. Actually, it has just the opposite effect. The resulting sprouts (often called water sprouts) are far more numerous than normal new growth and they elongate so rapidly that the tree returns to its original height in a very short time and with a far more dense and dangerous crown.
- 6. Tree Death: Some species of trees are less tolerant to topping than others and do not sprout readily after severe pruning. The reduced foliage will lead to the death of the tree.
- 7. Ugliness: A topped tree is a disfigured tree. Even with its re-growth it never regains the grace and character of its species. The landscape and the community are robbed of a valuable asset.

- 8. Cost: The true costs of topping are hidden. These include: reduced property value, the expense of removal and replacement if the tree dies, the risk of liability from weakened branches, and increased future maintenance.
- 9. Violation: If topping is done to a Village of Bloomingdale parkway tree, it is a violation of Ordinance No. 95-61 and subject to penalty.

Alternatives to Topping:

There are times when the size and shape of a shade tree need to be controlled. With care and skill, this can be accomplished without marring the tree's beauty or usefulness. Responsible pruning even contributes to the health and safety of a tree.

As alternatives to topping, some general principles are:

- **1**. Start out right by planting trees that will fit your available space.
- 2. Begin proper pruning early in the life of a tree.
- 3. To slow growth of a tree, avoid the use of nitrogen fertilizer.
- 4. Prune properly and regularly. A light pruning every three years will keep your tree in healthy condition. It will also have less drastic effects on both the landscape and your financial assets compared with neglecting older trees or resorting to topping.





It has been seven months since the dedication of the Library's new facilities and many comments have been placed in the suggestion box. The majority of them are very positive about the library's services and building. With all the changes that have taken place, some patrons have questions or comments that need to be addressed.

1. Why do we have printer receipts?

When plans were made to purchase a self-check out system, it became obvious that it would be more cost effective to have one system for noting the due date of materials checked out at the library. The self-check would only operate with a receipt printer and as a result all check out stations were changed to receipt printers. These receipts allow the patron to keep track of the titles and any differences in due dates at a glance. They can be conveniently posted on the refrigerator or a bulletin board. They do not have to be returned and if it is lost, call the circulation desk (529-3120 ex. 312) and a staff member will be able to access your record for the due date.

2. When are we going to get more library material?

There has been a substantial increase in the library's material budget:

Books 46%

Music 33%

Videos 47% Audio Books 40%

Each week the very latest in new materials can be found on the "This Week's Additions" displays located in both the Adult and Youth Services Departments.

3. Why did we change to a drive-up book and video return?

Building reconfiguration and the need to eliminate congestion at the front entrance where the reason the library had the new book and video return installed in the parking lot. Having the drops located in the parking lot allows materials to be returned without leaving the car during inclement weather. They are also large enough to allow for 24-hour returns. Materials that are deposited in freestanding drops are considered returns from the previous day until the drops are emptied in the morning. Once the bins are swapped out, materials are considered returned on that day. The drops are emptied at least three times a day. We hope the convenience of a freestanding material return proves to be helpful to the community.
