


Septemberfest '98 Continues Traditions from Last Year

After the success of the silver anniversary celebration last year, the Septemberfest Commission decided to make the 1998 festival a day-and-a-half long event. This very special marriage between Bloomingdale residents, the Village Board and employees, local not-for-profit organizations, and the Park District, will begin on Saturday evening, September 12, with an old-fashioned sock hop and collector car show from 6:30-10:30 PM. On Sunday, September 13, the event will run from 10:30 AM until 5:30 PM, and will feature entertainment, food, antique and craft dealers, and games that will appeal to family members of all ages. All festival activities are held in the heart of Bloomingdale Old Town at Lake Street and Bloomingdale Road.

Saturday evening's festivities begin with music and entertainment provided by Mike Lettieri of M&R Music. At 7:30 PM, The No Mercy Blues Band will take the stage to provide their special mix of up-tempo, good-time blues combined with the passion of early American rock 'n roll. Blues lovers will recognize the band from recent appearances at House of Blues and Buddy Guy's Legends. The car show will feature 40 vehicles that are at least 25 years old. In addition to receiving a commemorative dash plaque, all vehicles will be judged for the Mayor's Choice and Best of Show Awards. There is no entrance fee for this show, but due to limited space, only those car enthusiasts who submit an application will be allowed into the show. From the Mayor's Desk



Much has happened at Bloomingdale Golf Club since the last *Almanac* issue. The maintenance building is now under roof and will be occupied this month. The

roof trusses are installed on the new clubhouse and we expect to be fully under roof by the end of August.

We have also contracted with Whitney, Inc., an interior design group. These plans are progressing. At the same time, the improvements to the course are continuing.

As planned, all of the golf course improvements, including the new clubhouse, maintenance building and irrigation system will be paid for from our 1/4 cent home rule sales tax and golf course revenues. No new taxes will be enacted and no property taxes will be needed or used to pay for any of these improvements.

When home rule was enacted in 1996, I told the voters we would create a 1/4 cent municipal sales tax to continue the program for open space and to pay off the principal and interest on the bonds needed to purchase the golf course, as well as to pay for golf course improvements. I assured the citizens of this town that the 1/4 cent municipal (continued on page 3)



There is also information on the Lake Street reconstruction project which is beginning in August on page 4.

VILLAGE OF BLOOMINGDALE 1998 STREET IMPROVEMENTS

STREET RECONSTRUCTION

Harvard Drive to Byron Avenue

The Village is currently reconstructing Glen Ellyn Road between Byron Avenue and Harvard Lane. The project is approximately 50% complete. The project consists of removal of the old, deteriorated street pavement and curb and gutter, and replacement of the curbs and pavement with new materials.

During the construction of this project, Glen Ellyn Road is open to two-way traffic. However, the Village is encouraging the use of alternate routes during the construction of this section of the road, as there may be single lane closures for short periods of time during working hours.

This project should be completed and all lanes re-opened by mid-August 1998. If you have any questions regarding this project, you may contact Scott Reisinger, Engineering Technician, at 893-7073 x 235.

Nordic Road to Ironwood Drive

The Village is also beginning reconstruction of Glen Ellyn Road between Nordic Road and Ironwood Drive. This project consists of removal of most of the old pavement, and replacement with a road 35 feet in width (the same width as the remainder of Glen Ellyn Road). Other features of the project include installation of curb and gutter and a storm sewer system for the length of the improvement, installation of a new concrete sidewalk on the west side of Glen Ellyn Road between Circle Avenue and Tee Lane, recreational path installation on the east side of the road for the length of the improvement, and relocation of the overhead electric cables to an underground system between the project limits. The new access into the Bloomingdale Golf Club will be constructed during this project, aligned with Tee Lane and including left turn lane access into the Golf Club or Tee Lane.

The project schedule for this work is to construct the storm sewer system improvements before Labor Day. After Labor Day, the pavement reconstruction and widening will begin. During construction of the wider pavement, Glen Ellyn Road will be restricted to one-way southbound traffic between Schick Road and Ironwood Drive. The Village is recommending northbound motorists use alternate routes and avoid the construction area. The new road should be completed and all lanes re-opened by mid-November 1998. If you have any questions regarding this project, you may call the Village Services Department at 893-7073. Thank you for your patience during the construction of these projects.

Preliminary Work for Lake Street Reconstruction to Begin in August

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) will be reconstructing Lake Street from Glen Ellyn Road to west of William Way—1.8 miles. The project will add one lane in each direction so there will be three east and three westbound lanes. The road widening project also includes constructing new watermain, sanitary sewers, and storm sewers.

Utility companies are currently moving their lines in preparation for the road widening. The utility companies' work requires temporary lane closures since some of these lines are located beneath the pavement.

Actual road construction is anticipated to begin at the end of August, 1998 with completion of the roadway in November, 1999. Final completion in the year 2000. Construction will be completed in four stages.

According to IDOT, four (4) lanes of traffic (2 east & 2 west bound) on Lake Street will try to be maintained during all stages of the road construction. (except for day closure of single lanes) Bloomingdale Road will be limited to one (1) lane in each direction during stages 3 & 4.

STAGE #1 -- FALL 1998

- Temporary asphalt pavement will be constructed along the south side of Lake Street.
- ◆ Eastbound traffic will use this new pavement.
- ♦ Westbound traffic will use the existing eastbound lanes.
- ♦ Left turn lanes will be provided only at Bloomingdale Road, Springbrook, Circle Avenue north, Fairfield, Euclid, and Glen Ellyn Road.
- ◆ Left turns will be prohibited at all other locations.
- Temporary traffic signals will be maintained at all existing signalized intersections.

BE ALERT FOR CHANGES IN TRAFFIC PATTERNS.

STAGE 2 - Winter 1998/Spring 1999

Construct new lanes on the north side of the road.

STAGE 3 - Summer 1999

Relocate traffic to the north side of the road and construct new lanes on the south side of the road.

STAGE 4 - Fall 1999/Spring 2000

Build center lanes and median. Install street lights, sidewalks, traffic signals, and complete landscaping. Details about stages 2, 3, and 4 will be provided in future issues of the *Almanac*.


Residential Report

The Village Board, Traffic Concerns Committee, and the Village staff are working together with the Illinois Department of Transportation to ensure construction traffic delays are minimized and alternative routes are wellplanned and maintained throughout the project. Residents, in close proximity to the construction, may see heavier traffic on their streets due to the construction. IDOT and the Village will be monitoring the traffic patterns to prevent further delays and maintain safe alternative routes.

Sunday's entertainment lineup will appeal to everyone. Ronda Rae and the Replays make a return visit to Bloomingdale. For those who did not see the group's July appearance at the Sunshine Serenade program, this six-member group features close, three-part harmonies and tight instrumentation. Their play list covers folk, rock, and classic rock 'n roll. Mike Lettieri of M&R Music will continue his role as disc jockey and MC, with music, games and karaoke.

Prior to the opening ceremonies at noon on Sunday, Bloomingdale residents can demonstrate their community spirit as they line the parade route along Schick Road and Third Street. Starting at 11:30 AM, the parade will feature the Bloomingdale Park District baton twirlers, local civic and not-for-profit groups, and classic cars to escort Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale candidates to the Main Stage. This year, the Commission has opened parade participation to local area businesses that make a \$25 donation to the scholarship fund. The Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale Scholarship Competition, formerly known as the Bloomingdale King and Queen Contest, is open to young women and men between the ages of 16 and 20 who are residents of incorporated Bloomingdale. The emphasis in this competition is on poise, civic involvement, and communication skills. Applications were due August 3.

One of the primary sources to fund the Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale scholarships is the Joe Draghi Scholarship Fund, named in honor of a long time and beloved Septemberfest Commission member. Donations from Bloomingdale businesses and residents still are needed to finance the scholarships. Another source of income for the scholarship fund is the booth fee of \$40 paid by Septemberfest exhibitors and not-for-profit groups. Look for the return of the Bloomingdale Lions Club food booth on Saturday and Sunday. On Sunday, the Bloomingdale Women's Club Festival of Arts will run concurrently with the Septemberfest festivities, and will feature original clothing, jewelry, wood crafts and ceramics.

Septemberfest booth spaces are still available. To apply, submit your check for \$40 (\$80 for not-for-profit food vendors for both Saturday and Sunday) with the application form available at the Village Hall, or call 529-9886, ext. 271 for more information. Not-for-profit food vendors must obtain a DuPage County permit to sell food and must post that permit throughout the festival. Deadline for entry is August 16, 1998.

Parking is available at Lake Street/Route 20 and Maple Street, with handicappedaccessible parking at Day and Third streets. Watch local newspapers for details several weeks before the event, and be sure to pick up a copy of the entertainment schedule and exhibitors list at the Village Hall the week before the event.

Mark Your Calendar for Fall Branch Collection Schedule

The Bloomingdale Public Works' Forestry Division will be conducting its semi-annual Branch Collection Program beginning on October 5, 1998. Once during each spring and fall are the only times the Village of Bloomingdale picks up residents' branches with the exception of branches downed by storms. For storm damage pick-up, please contact Helen Price at 529-5865, ext. 7, within 72 hours of storm for scheduling.

The branch collection program is available to single family detached residences within the Village of Bloomingdale only. If residents of townhomes have questions regarding branch collection, please contact your association.

The following information shall assist residents regarding branch collection procedures:

• Branches must be out NO LATER THAN 7 A.M. ON THE FIRST DAY OF THE SCHEDULED PICK-UP WEEK as our crew will be making only one pass down each block and WILL NOT RETURN.

• Woody branches up to six inches in diameter and up to twenty feet in length are the only items that will be picked up. Long lengths, up to twenty feet, are favored. Do not reduce the length for our benefit. Any branches exceeding six inches in trunk diameter will not be picked up. Our chipper is designed to chip woody limbs and branches. The equipment will not grind small twigs, vines or other nonwoody yard waste. LEAVES, VINES, SMALL (under1/2 inch in diameter) FLEXIBLE WILLOW STEMS, HERBA CEOUS PLANTS AND WEEDS WILL NOT BE PICKEDUP BECAUSE THE SOFT MATERIAL CLOGS AND DAMAGES OUR EQUIPMENT. IF IT IS BAG-GABLE, IT IS YARD WASTE.

• All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and should be STACKED IN AN ORDERLY FASH-ION with the cut or larger end towards the pavement. Small branches may be bundled with string. PLEASE NOTE - branches left out in a tangled mess will not be picked up due to time required for our crew to sort for loading.

• Branches with spikes, hooks or other metal objects will not be picked up. STUMPS, ROOTS, ROOT BALLS, WOODEN FENCE AND CONSTRUCTION LUMBER ALSO WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.

• Please do not conceal thorny tree branches inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to our workers.

• Small twigs, leaves and other yard waste may be placed in bags with tags for B.F.I. pick-up. B.F.I. yard waste pickups begin April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups should be directed to 630-469-1036.




<u>THINK TREES . . .</u> Evergreen Seasonal Needle Drop

Every year in late summer and early fall, many people become alarmed by yellowing and browning on the older needles of many evergreens. The older, inner needles gradually discolor and fall off. This annual loss of older needles is called seasonal needle drop.

Evergreens shed their old needles to make room for new growth. Depending upon the species, evergreen needles have varying life spans. The White Pine has the most dramatic change, as two or three year old needles, which occur in bundles, turn yellow throughout the tree before turning brown and dropping. Austrian and Scots Pines retain their needles for three years, and Red Pines keep them for four years before dropping. The Arborvitae sheds branchlets, instead of individual needles, which usually turn brown rather than yellow as they age, and remain attached to the tree for guite a while before falling. Spruce and Fir needles also yellow and drop with age. However, these trees retain their needles for several years, and loss is often gradual and unnoticed.

Seasonal needle drop is a natural occurrence. In times of drought, fall browning may be particularly noticeable, since more needles are shed in reaction to environmental stresses. As long as needle loss is restricted to older growth and is not excessive, there is no need to worry. If the current season's growth is discolored, spotted or wilted, the tree may be suffering from a more serious disease or insect problem, and should be diagnosed to determine if control is necessary.


You Can Help Build A New Boardwalk & "Make The Connection...."
