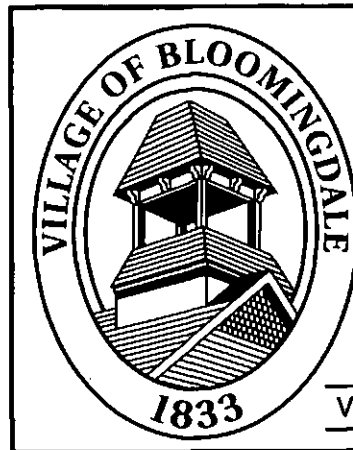

### From the Mayor's Desk

Trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and citizenship. These are all values we hope our young people grasp while growing up - qualities that will help them grow into successful and productive citizens in our society. But they can't do it alone. They need the guidance and support of their community. Enter the Character Counts! Coalition, a nonprofit consortium of the nation's largest and most influential educational and youth-serving organizations united in one mission: strengthening the character of America's youth.

Formed in 1993, the national Character Counts! organization reaches more than 40 million young people and their families. The program is endorsed by the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives, as well as 40 states and nearly 1,000 communities, counties, school districts and chambers of commerce.

The Village of Bloomingdale and Bloomingdale Police Department, along with several other community organizations, including Bloomingdale's Park District, Public Library, Fire Protection District, Township & Chamber of Commerce, as well as School Districts 13, 15 and 108, St. Isidore and Bloomingdale churches, have formed a local coalition to focus on promoting the importance of positive character

traits. The coalition, spearheaded by School District 13, was officially launched on May 26.

"The Character Counts! program is all about living, modeling and teaching young people that character does count in society," said Dr. Jerome Gordon, District 13 superintendent. "Involving the entire Bloomingdale community is our ultimate goal, and we are encouraged as representatives from area businesses and service organizations are responding enthusiastically to this program."

National Character Counts! Week is being celebrated this month. Many of the organizations have passed resolutions in support of the program and its benefits to the community at large. The Village Board officially proclaimed October 18-24, 1998 as Character Counts Week in Bloomingdale, and urged all residents to "support the community-wide initiative by practicing the six pillars of character in their everyday lives."

In other news, the old clubhouse at Bloomingdale Golf Club was demolished mid-September. Weather permitting the golf course will stay open until October 15. The construction of the clubhouse is coming along and interior design selections have been made for the new facility. Renderings and sample materials are currently on display in the lobby of the Village Hall. We're very excited about this most recent step and would love to have residents stop in and take a look.

Thanks to all those who took part in celebrating the 26th annual Septemberfest. Gary Fuchs and his committee do a terrific job! The Saturday night car show and entertainment were a big hit again. Congratulations to the car show winners. Steve Quinn of Schaumburg took the Septemberfest Commission's Best of Show Award for his 1941 Plymouth Coupe. 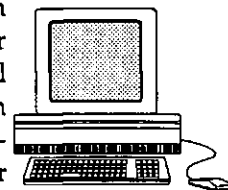

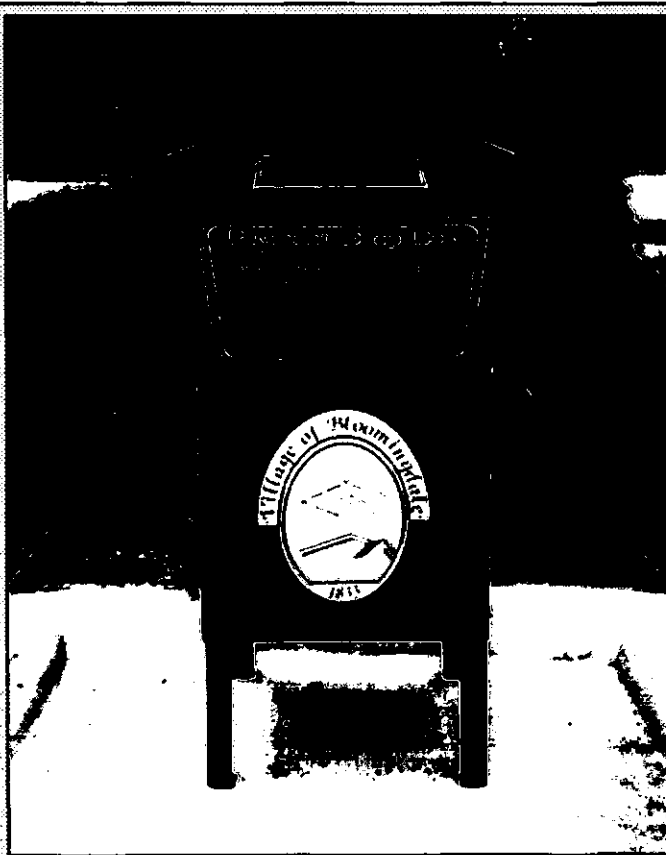

## Household Hazardous Waste Collection October 17

Did you know that some residential waste can pose a danger if you throw it away with your regular garbage?

Household products that are flammable, toxic, corrosive, or reactive, can threaten public health or damage our environment when disposed of improperly. Fortunately, DuPage County, the Village of Bloomingdale and the Bloomingdale Women's Club are sponsoring a One Day Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event on Saturday, October 17, 1998 from 8 a.m. until 3 p.m. at the Public Works Facility, at 305 S. Glen Ellyn Road (3 blocks north of Army Trail Road and one mile south of Lake Street).

The list of items **ACCEPTED** at the event includes: waste paint, pesticides, poisons, cleaners, household batteries, tainted gasoline, used oil, and other automotive fluids.

**UNACCEPTABLE** items include: auto (lead-acid) batteries, radioactive materials, ammunition, explosives, fireworks, smoke detectors, propane tanks, or fire extinguishers. Because the collection event is only permitted to accept household hazardous waste, wastes from business, commercial, or agricultural sources cannot be accepted.

## VILLAGE OF BLOOMINGDALE 1998 STREET IMPROVEMENTS

### Glen Ellyn Road Reconstruction – Harvard to Byron Oakwood Drive Reconstruction Harvard Drive Reconstruction

The reconstruction of these streets was completed prior to Labor Day of this year. All pavement and lawn restorations are now complete. Thank you for your patience during the reconstruction of these roads.



### Glen Ellyn Road Reconstruction – Nordic to Ironwood

This section of Glen Ellyn Road is currently under reconstruction. This work is being done as part of the Bloomingdale Golf Clubhouse construction project. Glen Ellyn Road will be widened to match the width of the remaining portion of Glen Ellyn Road south of Ironwood. The new Glen Ellyn Road pavement will include a left turn lane at the new entrance to the Bloomingdale Golf Club at Tee Lane.

It was necessary to make Glen Ellyn Road a one-way southbound road between Schick Road and Ironwood Drive to facilitate the construction of the new pavement. The traffic detour and one-way southbound lane on Glen Ellyn Road will remain until the new pavement is completed in about five weeks.

As part of this work, the Village will also be installing a concrete sidewalk on the west side of Glen Ellyn Road between Ironwood Drive and Tee Lane, and a 10 foot wide asphalt recreational path on the east side of Glen Ellyn Road between Lake Street and Ironwood Drive.

The Village is recommending northbound motorists use alternate routes and avoid the construction area. The new road should be done and all lanes re-opened by mid-November 1998. If you have any questions regarding this project, you may call the Village Services Department at 893-7073.

# Fall Hydrant Flushing Begins October 20

The Village Services - Utilities Division will be performing the annual Hydrant Flushing Program beginning October 20, 1998 through November 12, 1998. The Program will be performed during the daytime hours of 9:00 am - 2:00 pm. Please **DO NOT WASH LAUNDRY** during the flushing hours, as rust staining of the clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

One question that is always asked is - "Why does the Village flush hydrants?" Hydrant flushing is routine maintenance for a water system. It accomplishes the following:

1. Improves water quality: Flushing removes minerals

such as iron and magnesium that have collected in the water mains.

2. Improves water flow: By removing these minerals, the inside diameter of a water main is increased and therefore, allows a better flow of water.

3. Hydrant maintenance: A fire hydrant is a mechanical device. Operation of a hydrant lubricates internal mechanisms and gaskets.

4. Hydrant inspection: Any deficiencies are noted and repaired as necessary to insure that each hydrant will perform when needed for an emergency.

# Lake Street Reconstruction Project Now Underway

## Utility work in progress; temporary lanes to be in place before winter

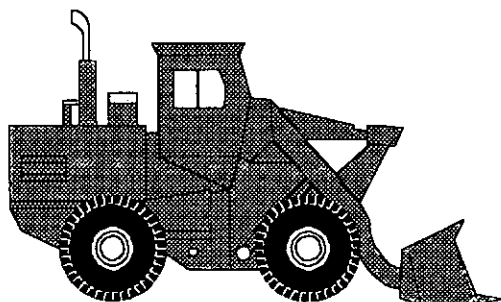
The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) Lake Street Construction Project officially began on Tuesday, September 8, 1998. Construction began at the east end of the project replacing existing water main, sanitary, and sewer lines along Lake Street. IDOT is hopeful this work will be completed in time to construct temporary lanes on the south side of Lake Street before winter.

Utility companies are finishing moving their lines in preparation for the road widening. The utility companies' work requires temporary lane closures since some of these lines are located beneath the pavement. Currently, Commonwealth Edison is moving east on the north side of Bloomingdale Road, near the intersection of Bloomingdale Road and Lake Street.

Four lanes of traffic (2 east and 2 westbound ) on Lake Street will try to be maintained throughout the construction (except for day closure of single lanes). However, motorists can expect temporary lane and possible road closures at various locations along the corridor due to sanitary and water main construction.

The Village Board, Traffic Concerns Committee, and the Village staff are working together with the Illinois Department of Transportation to ensure construction traffic delays are minimized and alternative routes are well-planned and maintained throughout the project. Residents, in close proximity to the construction, may see heavier traffic on their streets due to the construction. IDOT and the Village will be monitoring the traffic patterns to prevent further delays and maintain safe alternate routes.

# Fire Department Referendum

On November 3rd, Bloomingdale Fire Protection District #1 will place on the ballot a bond referendum for the sale of \$4 million in general obligation tax exempt bonds in order to build a new headquarters station.

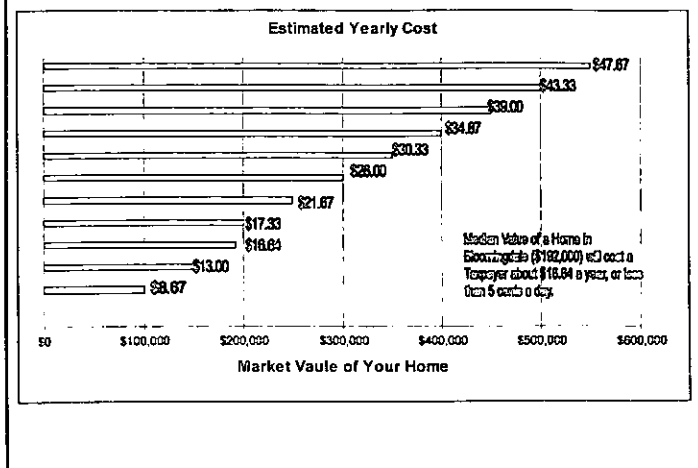
The District recently purchased four acres of property on the far northwest corner of Bloomingdale Road and Fairfield way, next to the Village Hall and library. The proposed one-story, 18,000 square foot building with a partial basement will consist of apparatus bays, living quarters, administration facilities, fire prevention bureau, and training rooms.

The current headquarters station in Old Town was originally designed to meet the needs of the organization in 1958. The station was intended to handle the functions of a volunteer fire department, not the current daily operations which involves 56 personnel. It is not feasible nor cost effective to remodel or add on to the current station.

The square footage of the new headquarters will be approximately three times the size of the current headquarters station. Studies conducted have shown that the size of the new headquarters station should be sufficient for 50 years. It was decided that it was better to build an adequate station at this time rather than come back to the taxpayers in a few years, asking for a tax increase to add onto the new station.

The referendum is for \$4 million. With a median value of a home in Bloomingdale being \$192,000, this will cost a homeowner \$16.64 per year, or less than 5 cents a day.

The referendum is spread over 20 years. Current statistics show that homeowners stay at their current residence an average of seven years. The referendum will be spread over 20 years so the impact will affect current and future residents.

The International Society of Arboriculture is a scientific and educational organization devoted to the dissemination of information in the care and preservation of shade and ornamental trees.

The purpose of the ISA Certification Program is to improve the level of knowledge and standard of practice within the tree care profession. It is designed to assist the public in identifying those professionals in arboriculture who have demonstrated, through a professionally developed examination and education program, a thorough knowledge of tree care practices. The ISA Certification program tests and certifies an individual's knowledge in the field of arboriculture. Certification is granted for three years.

# Choose a Tree to be Planted in Your Parkway Next Spring

The Village Board has again allocated funds for the very successful tree planting program which was started in 1982. The program provides trees, including planting, at a 50/50 cost sharing with the Village. The trees will be planted next Spring and are available for street parkways or front yards.

Of interest this year, all the species offered for parkway planting are native to Illinois and of value to wildlife. Of the six species, the River Birch and the Swamp White Oak are the most tolerant of heavy clay soils and/or poor drainage, and the Ironwood the least tolerant of same. Also, with the exception of the River Birch and the Ironwood, these trees have fruits which, if not consumed by wildlife, may be considered a nuisance. If further information is desired, contact Larry Slavicek, Urban Forester, at 630-529-5865, Extension 19.

The following are the guidelines of the program:

1. Since the budget is limited, the program will be on a first-come, first-served basis. Requests should be submitted by December 1, 1998. No payment is required at this time. Bills will be sent about February 1, 1999.

2. Trees will be 2 1/2" caliper, unless stated otherwise. Trees will be quality nursery stock but not specimen plants.

3. The Village reserves the right to disapprove requests based on conflicts, safety, or proper spacing.

4. Each parcel will be limited to two trees per year.

5. Participants will be given the opportunity to mark the desired location for the tree; however, the Village retains the right to change the location, if necessary.

6. We anticipate the cost of the trees to be between \$200 and \$300 each, with the Village paying half of the amount.

7. Trees will be guaranteed for one year. Participants are responsible for all watering which will be described in instructions furnished by the Village.

8. For trees to be planted in the public parkway, this application will serve as the permit requirements of the ordinance regulating trees on public areas.

Matures into majestic tree with large trunk and broad crown. Dark green leathery leaves with white undersides

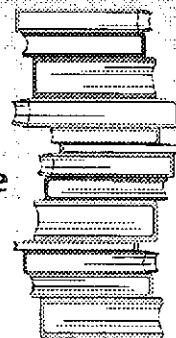


In order to promote the importance of reading to babies, the Bloomingdale Public Library has launched its **BORN TO READ** program for new parents.

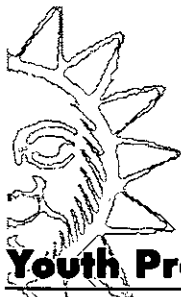
