


Work has stopped on the Lake Street project, but as soon as weather permits, that construction will bé continuing. See page 3 for more information on those plans.





The Blizzard's Over . . . Now It's Time To Think About Mailbox Repairs

Peer Jury Focuses on Teaching Teens Accountability, Responsibility

The Village of Bloomingdale Police Department is initiating a Peer Jury program. The program is open to students ages 13 - 17 who are either residents of Bloomingdale or attend school in Bloomingdale.

Juvenile officers from the police department decide who is eligible to put into the peer jury system. These are usually first time offenders committing misdemeanors with no other extenuating circumstances. The students who sit on the peer jury will listen to the situation, ask questions, gather information, as well as determine the sincerity level of the offender. They will then pass judgement and define the consequences for the offender. This could range anywhere from a letter of apology to a number of community service hours. There is some training involved for those who sit on the jury.

The peer jury concept has worked successfully in other area communities. This is an opportunity for young people to help their community, as well as their fellow students. The program will be in operation in February 1999, but the program is still open to new jury applicants. Interested eligible students should contact Detective Gary Fuchs at 529-9868.

Residents will elect three Village Trustees on Tuesday, April 13. In the space below the candidates give you a brief overview of their background and their reasons for seeking election.



THINK TREES WANTED: VOLUNTEERS TO PLANT 100 SEEDLINGS ON APRIL 24

The Village Forestry Division is looking for volunteers to plant 100 seedlings provided by the National Tree Trust on Saturday, April 24th, from 10 a.m. – noon at the Public Works Facility, 305 S. Glen Ellyn Road.

For the fifth consecutive year, the Village has received a Community Tree Planting grant from the National Tree Trust. The Village will be receiving 100 Downy Serviceberry (Amelanchier arborea) seedlings, soil and pots for the purpose of growing the seedlings into saplings for transplanting into the local community. Community Tree Planting involves a commitment from all participants to plant trees on public property, such as right-of-ways, school grounds, community parks, etc.

The National Tree Trust is a private, non-profit organization created to serve as a catalyst for local volunteers and community groups in the growing, planting and maintenance of trees in rural communities, urban areas and along our nation's highways. The Tree Trust was established in 1990 and endowed with a one-time grant from Congress as part of the "America the Beautiful" initiative designated by President Bush. The Tree Trust has partnered in reforestation, beautification and education projects with 300 groups, which include volunteer organizations, government agencies, forest product firms and other leading corporations, in 35 states since its founding. Now in its eighth year of operation, the Tree Trust is committed to bringing more trees to more communities across the nation. The Tree Trust has helped volunteers plant and nurture over one million trees each year in communities and along roadsides.

Volunteers will be trained to containerize and care for seedlings. Participants are asked to bring gloves and enthusiasm. After this growing season, the trees will be planted in the Village's nursery for further growth.

BRUSH COLLECTION SCHEDULE

The Bloomingdale Public Works' Forestry Division will be conducting its semi-annual Branch Collection Program beginning on March 22, 1999. Once during each spring and fall are the only times the Village of Bloomingdale picks up residents' branches with the exception of branches downed by storms. For storm damage pick-up, please contact Helen Price at 529-5865, Extension 7, within 72 hours of storm for scheduling.

The branch collection program is available to single family detached residences within the Village of Bloomingdale only. If residents of townhomes have questions regarding branch collection, please contact your association.

The following information shall assist residents regarding branch collection procedures:

□ Branches must be out NO LATER THAN 7 A.M. ON THE DAY PICK-UP IS TO BEGIN FOR THE SECTION as our crew will be making only one pass down each block and WILL NOT RETURN.

□ Woody branches up to six inches in diameter and up to twenty feet in length are the only items that will be picked up. Long lengths, up to twenty feet, are favored. Do not reduce the length for our benefit. Any branches exceeding six inches in trunk diameter will not be picked up. Our chipper is designed to chip woody limbs and branches. The equipment will not grind small twigs, vines or other non-woody yard waste. LEAVES, VINES, SMALL (under 1/2 inch in diameter) FLEXIBLE WILLOW STEMS,

SPRING 1999 BRUSH PICKUP SCHEDULE

SECTION ONE:

Pick-up begins MARCH 22, 1999

Two areas with the first bounded by Army Trail Road on the south, Glen Ellyn Road on the west, Lake Street on the north and Medinah Road/Walter Road on the east. The second area is bounded by Lake Street on the south, Rosedale Avenue on the west, Picton Road/Foster Avenue on the north, and Medinah Road on the east.

SECTION TWO:

Pick-up begins March 29, 1999

PLEASE NOTE - branches left out in a tangled mess will not be picked up due to time required for our crew to sort for loading.

□ Branches with spikes, hooks or other metal objects will not be picked up. STUMPS, ROOTS, ROOT BALLS, WOODEN FENCE AND CONSTRUCTION LUMBER ALSO WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.

□ Please do not conceal thorny tree branches inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to our workers.

□ Small twigs, leaves and other yard waste may be placed in bags with tags for B.F.I. pick-up. B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups begin April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups should be directed to 469-1036.

The SPNA has announced a series of 5 "Family Nights" beginning April 16th, 1999. A Word About License Plates

Police Chief Gary Schira recently received a letter from an anonymous author in which the legality of displaying only one "vanity" license plate on a passenger car was questioned.

Please note: Regardless if the license plates are vanity or standard issue, both front and rear plates must be displayed on passenger cars as noted in the Illinois Vehicle Code (625 ILCS 5/3-413 (a), "Registration plates issued for a motor vehicle other than a motorcycle, trailer, semitrailer, truck-tractor; apportioned bus, or apportioned truck shall be affixed thereto, one in the front and one in the rear." Displaying only one license plate on a passenger car can result in one being stopped by a police officer and a traffic citation being issued.



Develop a training program for our community



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



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Ladies Self Defense Class Combines Common Sense, Self Confidence
