It's June in Bloomingdale - and what does that mean? Graduation, Father's Day....FAMILY FEST!!!

Yes, it's that time again and once more the festival will take place at Lake Street and Springfield Drive. This year the festival runs three days - Friday, June 25 through Sunday, June 27.

This year's three fun-filled days will feature headline entertainment such as The Buckinghams, the "Chicago-bred, gone national" band on Friday, June 25 at 8:30 p.m.; the dynamic Mark Lindsay, formerly of Paul Revere & the Raiders on Saturday, June 26 at 8:30 p.m.; and New Odyssey, a widely versatile dance band featuring three multi-talented musicians playing 30 different instruments on Sunday, June 27 beginning at 8 p.m.


Garden stage entertainment includes Joe Catafio & the Giant Killers on Friday, from 6:30 - 8 p.m. and again after the main show. Saturday night the Uptown Rhythm Express featuring the Blooze Brothers take to the garden stage from 6:30-8 p.m. and return after the main act. Sunday features R Gang at 6-7:30 p.m. and again after the fireworks.

In addition, the 1999 Fest features the rides and games of Windy City Amusements, a wide variety of food from 20 area vendors, and roving children's entertainment. Top that all off with our spectacular fireworks show on Sunday night, and it promises to be a great weekend! There are pre-sale tickets for the carnival rides currently on sale at the Village Hall, Bloomingdale Public Library and at Stratford Square. The 40-ticket sheet sells for \$19.00, which is a \$6 savings over the \$25 cost on site. The pre-sale is available through Thursday, June 24. The unlimited ride specials will be offered on both Saturday and Sunday afternoons from noon to 4:00 for \$12.00 per person.

One major change for this year is the loss of the large parking area which is directly east of the festival site. Because of that there is no on-site parking, except for some handicapped parking. To accommodate fest goers, there will be seven shuttle bus pick ups: Indian Lakes Resort (east end), DuJardin Elementary, Stratford Junior High, Springbrook Shopping Center (east end), Village Hall, Winnebago Elementary and Lake Park West (in Roselle). The free shuttle service will begin at 3:30 p.m. on Friday, and 11:30 a.m. on Saturday and Sunday. The shuttles will run until all festival patrons have been taken back to their vehicles.

A couple notices - Springfield Drive will be closed from Monday, June 21 through Monday, June 28 at noon. Also, there will be no street closings approved for neighborhood parties during this weekend.



Assisted Living Facility Under Construction in Bloomingdale

Sunrise Assisted Living Inc. is currently building an 82 suite assisted living community for seniors at 129 East Lake Street. This assisted living facility will provide a more residential, less institutional, homelike quality care environment for even frail seniors.

Lake Street Construction Update

Weather permitting, the process of switching traffic onto the new concrete will start the second week of June. The first phase will be switching westbound traffic onto the new pavement. Then, temporary pavement will be constructed for eastbound traffic. It is anticipated during the third week of June and upon completion of the temporary pavement, eastbound traffic will be switched onto the new pavement.

When approaching Lake Street from side roads and driveways, use caution and watch for new traffic lanes. IDOT will be placing "stop here new lanes open" warning signs at selected locations. Use caution.

Two lanes of traffic will remain open in each direction except for:

- Bloomingdale Road will be one lane in each direction at the intersection of Bloomingdale Road and Lake Street until fall.
- Temporary lane and possible daytime road closures at various locations along the corridor can be expected during non-peak hours.

Once traffic is switched to the new pavement, Stage 3 construction will begin. This work will include underground and drainage work, curb & gutter, and electrical work. It is anticipated that Stage 3 work will be completed during September 1999.




attending Anderson University majoring in health and education.

Village Personnel Will be Knocking on Your Door to Check Your Water Meter

The Village of Bloomingdale Village Services-Utilities Division will begin a residential meter inventory in beginning June 14th, 1999. Employees of the Village will be recording information about each home's water meter and outside remote, including size, serial number, remote number, manufacturer and meter model. This information will be used to update Village records. Each employee assisting in this program will have a Village Identification Card that will be shown prior to entering each home. Do not allow entry unless this Identification Card is shown to you! If you have any concerns about any individual asking for entry, contact the Utilities Division at 529-5865, ext. 8, prior to letting the individual into your home.

We are asking you to assist us by clearing the area around your inside water meter of any items that might make it difficult for our personnel to access the meter. The meter is usually located in the basement or utility room of each home, immediately adjacent to your water service entry point.

In the event there is a difference between the inside meter and outside remote readings, a service request will be generated to service the equipment as scheduling allows. There will be no charge to the homeowner if there is a difference between the inside meter and outside remote reading under this program! This program is for informational purposes only and will be used to determine future meter needs for the Village.

The Utilities Division thanks you for your cooperation in completing this program. If you are not home at the time of our employee's visit, a card will be left with instructions on contacting us for scheduling an appointment for access to the inside water meter in your home.

Be Ready for the Unexpected: FEMA Recommends Supplies for a Family Disaster Supply Kit

Following any emergency, Village and other relief workers will be on scene ready to assist. However, depending on the scope of a disaster, emergency response delays could realistically range from hours to days. It is for this reason that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) developed a list of the "most needed" supplies in the event of a disaster. FEMA recommends that all households have a "Disaster Supplies Kit" on hand to sustain a family for up to three days in the event of any emergency, to include the following supplies:

A large easy to carry container to hold and transport:

➡ First Aid Kit



- 3-day supply water, 1 gallon per day per person
- ⇒ 3-day food supply, ready to eat & non-perishable
- Baby supplies (formula, diapers, bottles, medications)
- Medications, extra glasses/contacts, denture needs, etc.
- Mess kits (or paper cups, plates, and plastic utensils) & utility knife
- ➡ Flashlight, radio, and extra batteries
- ⇒Some cash
- Personal hygiene items (toilet paper, soap, feminine supplies)
- One change of clothing, sturdy shoes/boots, and rain gear
- Blankets/sleeping bags

You may also want to consider keeping all-important family documents in a waterproof, portable container. (E.g. birth/marriage certificates, will, insurance policies, contracts, deeds, stocks, passports, social security cards, immunization records, bank account numbers, etc.) For a more expansive list of recommended supplies to keep on hand for an emergency, check out the FEMA web site at www.fema.gov or write to: FEMA, PO Box 2012, Jessup, MD, 20794-2012.

Be assured that Village staff continues to work aggressively to prepare for January 1, 2000 and beyond. Y2K mission critical exposures have been identified and are in the process of being assessed, remediated, or replaced. Contingency plans are being prepared to ensure that all mission critical services provided by the Village are up and operating on January 1, 2000.

THINK TREES FORESTRY DIVISION NEWS

URBAN FORESTRY GUIDEBOOK

All residences received this booklet this month. The preparation and first printing of this publication was financially aided by the Urban and Community Forestry Grant Program, which is a 50/50 cost-share reimbursement program funded with monies of the Federal government and distributed in Illinois by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.

A HEALTHY LAWN, RATHER THAN A PERFECT LAWN

If you concentrate on creating a healthy lawn instead of the perfectly manicured look, you might save yourself a lot of work. Reasonable expectations for your turfgrass also may allow you to cut down on pesticides and fertilizers, because they are often overused in the quest for a perfect lawn.

Fertilizing your lawn will maintain its good color and density and discourage weeds and other pests. Lawns can get by with two nitrogen applications per year. There are ways to cut back on fertilizer. For instance, leaving your... grass clippings on the ground to decompose is a good organic source of nitrogen.

WHEN REPORTING A STREET LIGHT OUTAGE

Please contact the Village Services Department at 893-7073 ext. 233. You can leave a Voice Mail message at any time. When reporting, it would be very helpful if you could check the identification number which is located on a 3x5 card on the street side of the street light pole. This number helps to properly identify the location of the malfunctioning street light.

Thanks for your help.

One of the most important ways of protecting the health of your turf is to mow it properly. Don't remove more than one-third of the grass blades at any one mowing and don't mow it too short. When your turf is under stress, such as in shady locations, during the heat of the summer or when pests are a problem - three inches is the appropriate height.

PARKWAY TREE MAINTENANCE

For any and all work by a resident or resident's contractor on a parkway tree, a permit is required by Ordinance No. 95-61, An Ordinance Regulating the Planting, Maintenance and Removal of Trees on Public Areas.

The Village has a comprehensive, systematic pruning schedule which ensures each tree is trimmed every five years. Contract tree pruning occurs during February through April. In-house trimming can occur any time during the year. If a resident believes a parkway tree requires pruning, please contact the Forestry Division at 529-5865, ext. 7.

BRANCH COLLECTION

The Branch Collection Program is a service of the Forestry Division, which picks up residents' branches. The next pick-up will be this fall. Pick-up dates and guidelines will be published in the August Almanac. The pick-up of branches which are downed as a result of a storm is also done by the Forestry Division. To schedule a storm damage pick-up, contact the Forestry Division (529-5865, ext. 7) within 72 hours of the storm.

These services are available to any single family, detached residence within the Village limits. Townhouse residents should contact their association.

Optionally, BFI (469-1036) will pick up branches and other yard waste on regular trash pick-up days from April 1st through November 30th. Branches up to 4" in diameter and 4' in length can be bundled (up to 60 pounds) or placed in bags or cans, all affixed with a yard waste sticker (\$1.23 per sticker). Also, DuPage Yard Waste (630-876-8900) has a drop-off facility at 1195 W. Washington in West Chicago. They will accept any size load or material with fees being \$11.00 per yard for 6" diameter or less, and \$15.00 per yard for sizes larger than 6" diameter.

10 Tips for Reducing Mosquito Nuisance This Summer

Bloomingdale Township, 529-7715, by contract with Clarke Environmental Services is the agency responsible for mosquito abatement services throughout the Township, which includes the Village of Bloomingdale. Residents may report concerns directly to Clarke Environmental at the Clarke's "Mosquito Hotline" 1-800-942-2555. Residents can also request to be placed on a call list for advance notice of pesticide use.

Mosquitoes and summer go hand-in-hand. Mosquitoes are known transmitters of encephalitis, malaria and yellow fever to humans, and heartworm to pets.

A few simple preventative actions if performed by all residents can help reduce mosquito populations and breeding grounds, since many generations of mosquitoes can breed right in your own yard.

Standing water means you could be raising mosquitoes. While adult, flying mosquitoes may rest in tall grass and shrubbery, they do not develop there. All mosquitoes need water to begin and complete their life cycle. Some mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water where they hatch in just a day or two. Other mosquitoes may lay their eggs in old tires, tin cans, or other water-holding containers. The eggs may remain unhatched for weeks or even months until they are covered with water! Minimizing locations of standing water may reduce potential breeding ground for mosquitoes.

YARD & HOME CHECKLIST

- Remove and properly dispose of old tires, tin cans, buckets, drums, bottles or any water-holding containers.
- Fill in or drain any low spots in your yard such as depressions or ruts, which create puddles.
- Keep yard drains, swales and culverts clear so water will drain away.
- Cover trash containers to keep out rain water.
- Repair leaky outside faucets.
- Empty plastic wading pools at least once a week and store indoors when not in use.

- Keep grass cut and shrubbery trimmed around the house.




