

Don't Miss the Last Septemberfest of the Twentieth Century!

The annual Septemberfest celebration will once again feature one and onehalf days of entertainment, food, antique and craft dealers, and games that will appeal to family members of all ages. It is a very special union between Bloomingdale residents, the Village Board and employees, local not-for-profit organizations, and the Park District. The 1999 event begins on Saturday evening, September 11 with a street dance and collector car show from 6:30 pm to 10:30 pm. and continues on Sunday, September 12 from 10:30 am until 5:30 pm with more musical entertainment and exhibitors. All festival activities are held in the heart of Bloomingdale Old Town at Lake Street and Bloomingdale Road.


Saturday evening's festivities start with music and entertainment provided by Mike Lettieri of M&R Music. At 7:30 pm, Infinity will take the stage with their unique vocals and instrumentation. Voted the "Best Tribute Band in the Midwest' for five consecutive years, Infinity specializes in the sounds of the '70s, '80s, and '90s such as Styx, Boston, Kansas, and Journey, whose popular album, "Infinity," provided the inspiration for the band's name. The car show will feature 40 vehicles that are at least 25 years old. In addition to receiving a commemorative dash plaque, all vehicles will be judged for trophy categories that include the Mayor's Choice and Commission's Best of Show awards, plus new awards in the "Best of" category, such as red car, paint job, convertible, and more. There is no entrance fee for this show, but due to limited space, only those car enthusiasts who submit an application will be allowed into the show. Completed applications are due to the Septemberfest Commission by September 1. Please see page 10 for the application, or contact the Village Hall.

Sunday's musical entertainers, the Grand Avenue Swing Band, will have you tapping your feet and swaying to the melodies of the 1930s and 1940s, as well as to the sounds of contemporary music performed in the big band style. According to the band leader and cofounder, Nick Desmond, the band chose its name for the Western Springs Community Center on Grand Avenue,

where the group practices. Thanks to the generosity of the Park District, you'll be able to practice the latest dance steps on a ballroom dance floor rather than in the grass. The floor will be installed for Saturday evening, also.

Mike Lettieri of M&R Music will continue his role as disc jockey and MC, with music, games, and karaoke, and the Park District will demonstrate tumbling and gymnastics.

Prior to the opening ceremonies at noon on Sunday, Bloomingdale residents can demonstrate their community spirit as they line Third Street for the opening parade, starting at 11:30 am. (continued on page 4)



Street Paving to be Complete by Labor Day

The 1999 Street Improvement Program is on schedule and will be completed in the late summer of 1999. Paving of some streets is already complete, with only landscape restoration to be done. These streets include all streets in Founder's Pointe and Bloomfield Hills, as well as Arbor Lane, Bedford Lane, Villa Way, Douglas Drive, and 3rd Street.

Paving of other streets, including the final paving layer of Arbor Lane, Bedford Lane, Applewood Drive, and Elmwood Lane, and completion of Byron Avenue will occur in before Labor Day.

The contractor for this project is A. Lamp Concrete Contractors of Schaumburg, Illinois. A. Lamp Concrete Contractors has worked in Bloomingdale on street improvement projects, which include concrete curb and gutter, storm sewer repairs, driveways, sidewalks and recreational paths.

During the 1999 Street Improvement project on Byron Avenue, A. Lamp Concrete Contractors furnished and installed the underground water supply for a drinking fountain in Sunnyside Park. The water supply piping was provided by A. Lamp Concrete Contractors as a donation to the Bloomingdale Park District. The work included tapping the water main, bringing the water supply across Byron Avenue and into Sunnyside Park. The Park District will be installing the drinking fountain near the basketball court in the spring of 2000.

Lake Street Construction Update

The paving of the eastbound lanes began during the week of July 26, 1999 and will be completed within 3-4 weeks. (Schedule dependent on weather.) The two outer eastbound lanes will be poured first and then the inner eastbound lane will be poured. While the Village understands these plans are intense and will cause an inconvenience to the businesses, it is equally important to complete the road construction.

During the pouring of new pavement, the contractor (depending on location) will leave 15-30 foot wide gaps in the pavement to allow access to businesses on the south side of the road which have no other access to the site. After pavement is cured, the driveway access will be across the new pavement and the gaps completed.

Below summarizes how each business and street will be affected by the paving of the eastbound lanes:

Social Security Building/Platt Hill-Social Security Building and Platt Hill will have one (1) 30-foot gap to allow access to these businesses. The Social Security driveway and Platt Hill eastern driveway will be closed.

William Way - will remain open and be completed one-half at a time.

South Maple Avenue - will remain open and be completed one-half at a time.

Third Street - will be closed as long as First Street, Franklin and Bloomingdale Road are open.

Old Town – will have one 30-foot wide gap east of the barn to allow access to these businesses.

Mobil Gas Station - will have one 15-foot gap from Lake Street to allow access to the business.

First Avenue – will be closed as long as Franklin, Third Street and Bloomingdale Roads are open.

Ridge Avenue - Ridge Avenue will be closed as long as First Avenue is open.

Springbrook Shopping Center – will have a 30-foot gap to allow access to this shopping center.

Fairfield Way - will remain open and be completed one-half at a time.

Thorton's Gas Station – will have one 15-foot gap left unpaved to allow access to the business.

Amoco Gas Station – will have one 15-foot gap left unpaved to allow access to the business.

South Prairie Avenue - will be closed as long as Circle and Euclid are open.

South Circle Avenue - will be closed as long as Prairie and Euclid are open.

Euclid Avenue - will be closed as long as Prairie and Circle are open.

On the days when the contractor is installing new permanent pavement, it will be necessary for work to be completed at night. The pavement will have control joints sawed into the new concrete within 12-18 hours after installation. The control joints are necessary to control cracking on the new pavement sections. The sawing operation will be the extent of night work.

The parade route was shortened this year due to construction on Lake Street, but it still will feature the Bloomingdale Park District baton twirlers, local civic and not-for-profit groups, and classic cars to escort the Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale candidates to the Main Stage.

This year, the Commission will again offer the option of parade participation to local area businesses who make a \$25 donation to the scholarship fund. There is no donation requirement for not-for-profit organizations. To participate in the parade, contact Debbie Bodnar at 894-8309.

The Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale Scholarship Competition, formally known as the Bloomingdale King and Queen Contest, is open to young women and men between the ages of 16 and 20 years of age who are residents of incorporated Bloomingdale. To enter this competition, applicants must complete an application and submit an essay of 300 -400 words that describes the contributions they feel they will make as a representative of Bloomingdale's youth. Then, they are interviewed by a judges' panel made up of civic and business leaders from Bloomingdale. The emphasis in this competition is on poise, civic involvement, and communication skills. Applications were due August 2.

One of the main sources to fund the Ms. and Mr. Bloomingdale scholar-ships is the Joe Draghi Scholarship Fund, named in honor of a beloved Septemberfest Commission member who passed away several years ago. Donations from Bloomingdale businesses and residents still are needed to finance the scholarships. Sponsor banners have been introduced as a new feature this year for sponsors who donate over \$500 in cash or over \$1,000 in services. The banners will be displayed around the new Park District park in Old Town, starting the first week of August. Response from donors has been exceptional this year, with the following companies and organizations sponsoring banners:

An additional source for scholarship funding is the booth fee of \$40 paid by Septemberfest exhibitors and not-for-profits. Not-for-profit organizations selling food may set up their booths Saturday night as well as all day Sunday. All other Septemberfest vendors will participate on Sunday only. Look for the return of the Bloomingdale Lion's Club food booth on Saturday and Sunday. On Sunday, the Bloomingdale Women's Club Festival of Arts runs concurrently with the Septemberfest festivities, and features original clothing, jewelry, wood crafts, and ceramics.

Septemberfest booth spaces are still available. To apply, submit your check for \$40 (\$80 for not-for-profit food vendors for Saturday and Sunday) with the application form available at the Village Hall, or call 529-9868, extension 271 for more information. Not-for-profit food vendors must obtain a DuPage County permit to sell food and must post that permit throughout the festival. Deadline for entry is August 16, 1999.



Mark Your Calendar for Fall Branch Collection Schedule

The Bloomingdale Public Works' Forestry Division will be conducting its semi-annual Branch Collection Program beginning on October 4, 1999. Once during each spring and fall are the only times the Village of Bloomingdale picks up residents' branches with the exception of branches downed by storms. For storm damage pick-up, please contact Helen Price at 529-5865, ext. 7, within 72 hours of storm for scheduling.

The branch collection program is available to single family detached residences within the Village of Bloomingdale only. If residents of townhomes have questions regarding branch collection, please contact your association.

The following information shall assist residents regarding branch collection procedures:

- Branches must be out NO LATER THAN 7 A.M. ON THE DAY PICK-UP IS TO BEGIN FOR THE SECTION as our crew will be making only one pass down each block and WILL NOT RETURN.
- Woody branches up to six inches in diameter and up to 20 feet in length are the only items that will be picked up. Long lengths, up to twenty feet, are favored. Do not reduce the length for our benefit. Any branches exceeding six inches in trunk diameter will not be picked up. Our chipper is designed to chip woody limbs and branches. The equipment will not grind small twigs, vines or other non-woody yard waste. LEAVES, VINES, SMALL (under 1/2 inch in diameter) FLEXIBLE WILLOW STEMS,

HERBACEOUS PLANTS AND WEEDS WILL NOT BE PICKED UP BECAUSE THE SOFT MATERIAL CLOGS AND DAMAGES OUR EQUIPMENT. IF IT IS BAGGABLE, IT IS YARD WASTE.

- All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and should be STACKED IN AN ORDERLY FASH-ION with the cut or larger end towards the pavement. Small branches may be bundled with string. PLEASE NOTE branches left out in a tangled mess will not be picked up due to time required for our crew to sort for loading.
- Branches with spikes, hooks or other metal objects will not be picked up. STUMPS, ROOTS, ROOT BALLS, WOODEN FENCE AND CONSTRUCTION LUMBER ALSO WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.
- Please do not conceal thorny tree branches inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to our workers.
- Small twigs, leaves and other yard waste may be placed in bags with tags for B.F.I. pick-up. B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups begin April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups should be directed to 469-1036.



Fall Branch Collection Pickup Schedule

SECTION ONE:

Pick-up begins October 4, 1999

Two areas with the first bounded by Army Trail Road on the south, Glen Ellyn Road on the west, Lake Street on the north and Medinah Road/Walter Road on the east. The second area is bounded by Lake Street on the south, Rosedale Avenue on the west, Picton Road/Foster Avenue on the north, and Medinah Road on the east.



Area bounded by Army Trail Road on the south, Old Gary Avenue on the west, Schick Road on the north, and Bloomingdale Road on the east.

SECTION THREE:

Pick-up begins October 18, 1999

Area bounded by Schick Road on the south, Gary Avenue/Cloverdale Road on the west, Lake Street on the north, and Bloomingdale Road on the east.

SECTION FOUR:

Pick-up begins October 25, 1999

Area bounded by Army Trail Road on the south, Bloomingdale Road on the west, Edgewater Drive on the north, and Glen Ellyn Road on the east.

SECTION FIVE:

Pick-up begins November 1, 1999

Area bounded by Edgewater Drive on the south, Bloomingdale Road on the west, Lake Street on the north, and Glen Ellyn Road on the east.

NEWS FROM THE VILLAGE OF BLOOMINGDALE FORESTRY DIVISION

Parkway Tree Maintenance

For any and all work by a resident or resident's contractor on a parkway tree, a permit is required by Ordinance No. 95-61, An Ordinance Regulating the Planting, Maintenance and Removal of Trees on Public Areas.

The Village has a comprehensive, systematic pruning schedule which ensures each tree is trimmed every five years. Contract tree pruning occurs during February through April. In-house trimming can occur any time during the year. If a resident believes a parkway tree requires pruning, please contact the Forestry Division at 529-5865, ext. 7.

Leaf Collection

The Village does not provide leaf pick-up services. Blowing or raking leaves into the street is a violation of the Comprehensive Code of Village of Bloomingdale – Chapter 9 Section 1-42.

BFI (469-1036) will pick up leaves and other yard waste on regular trash pick-up days from April 1st through November 30th. Leaves must be placed in bags or cans (up to 60 pounds), each affixed with a yard waste sticker (\$1.23 per sticker).

Tree Planting

• 50/50 Tree Planting Program:

The 50/50 Tree Planting Program is a program for parkway and front yard trees which was started in 1982. Trees are provided to residents, including planting, in a 50/50 cost-sharing with the Village. The trees are planted in the spring and are limited to two trees per year on a lot. Village

residents are notified of the program in the October 'Almanac'. Information and applications for the 'Tree Planting Program' are included for interested property owners. Actual requests must be submitted by December 1st and billing occurs in February.

• Parkway Tree Planting:

Replacement parkway trees may also be requested from the Village. The size of this program is limited by the available funds in the Tree Budget and is maintained on a first-come,


first-served basis. The tree planting usually occurs between one and two years from the time of the request.

The residents may plant parkway trees. In this case, a permit must be obtained and the tree species must be approved. The Village Forester can provide assistance in species selection.

Mulch

The Village has woodchip mulch available at Public Works, 305 Glen Ellyn Road, for those who wish to come and pick it up. Pick-up can be done from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. – Monday through Friday.

Late summer/early fall is an advantageous time to mulch as the mulch will moderate the effects of winter on the soil and plant roots, and the decomposition of organic mulches during the winter will add nutrients for the spring growing season.

Back to School Fair



Each packet also will contain three tickets for a preview party to be held on November 7, 1999, 6-8 p.m. The party will include children's entertainment, refreshments and the formal unveiling of the art wall. Additional tickets will be available for \$5.

"We look forward to working with the library on the Stratford 'Squares for Lifelong Learning' tile wall," said Rhonda Lewallen, marketing manager at Stratford Square. "With all of the proceeds benefiting the library's computer lab, we feel this project will have a positive effect on our community."


