Schick, Army Trail Road Construction Updates

Schick Road Joint Repairs

The Village of Bloomingdale has contracted A. Lamp Concrete Contractors of Schaumburg, IL to reconstruct concrete construction joints on Schick Road from Springfield Drive to Gary Avenue. Work is expected to be completed by end September - early October. Also on Schick Road temporary, intermittent lane closures have been occurring over the past month for utility installations by the developer of the Los Lagos Subdivision.

Army Trail Road Construction

The DuPage County Department of Transportation has contracted with River City Demolition of Peoria, IL for the removal of eight buildings in the Army Trail Road corridor in anticipation of road widening improvements targeted to begin in the Spring/Summer of 2000. Five buildings are scheduled to be removed west of Gary Avenue including the former Cloverdale Tap building which was destroyed by fire in September 1997. The First Chicago Bank Building in Glendale Heights is to be removed for the construction of a future road connection from Army Trail Road to Whitman Drive and creation of a four legged intersection with the driveway serving the Home Depot/Dominick's Shopping Plaza. Finally a residence at the northwest corner of Harvard Lane and Army Trail will be removed. Work is scheduled to commence at the end of September 1999 and be completed In November 1999.

Lake Street Construction Update: Continue to expect delays; use alternate routes

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) Lake Street Construction Project is approximately 60% complete and is progressing as scheduled. The three eastbound lanes have been poured (Stage 3). The contractor will be switching traffic during the week of October 4, 1999. The new traffic configuration will be a divided highway. Westbound traffic will remain in the current traffic pattern, using the two outer lanes. The inner lane in each direction will be closed to traffic. As in the past, left turn lanes will be provided at Bloomingdale Road, Springbrook Shopping Center, Circle Avenue (north), Fairfield, and Glen Ellyn Road. Left turns may not be permitted at other locations. Once traffic is shifted to the new pavement, Stage 4 construction will begin.

Stage 4 will consist of constructing all medians, left turn lanes, permanent traffic signals, sidewalks, and landscaping.

All lanes should be open by November 15, 1999. All work on this project is scheduled to be completed by June 30, 2000. A separate land-scape project is scheduled to begin during the summer of 2000.

Please use caution when approaching Lake Street. Watch for new traffic lanes.

Bloomingdale Road will remain one lane in each direction at the intersection of Bloomingdale Road and Lake Street until mid-October.

For your safety and the safety of the construction workers, please use extreme caution while driving in the work zone and obey all construction and work zone signage. Watch for new work zone speed limits.

Residential Report

The Village staff and the Illinois Department of Transportation continue to monitor traffic patterns to ensure construction traffic delays are minimized and alternative routes are well-planned and maintained throughout the project. However, residents in close proximity to the construction may see heavier traffic due to the construction.

Fall Hydrant Flushing Begins October 5

The Village Services - Utilities Division will be performing the annual Hydrant Flushing Program beginning October 5, 1999 through October 28, 1999. The program will be performed during the daytime hours of 9:00 am - 2:00 pm. Please DO NOT WASH LAUNDRY during the flushing hours, as rust staining of the clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

One question that is always asked is - "Why does the Village flush hydrants?" Hydrant flushing is routine maintenance for a water system. It accomplishes the following:

1. Improves water flow: By removing these minerals, the inside diameter of a water main is increased and therefore

allows a better flow of water.

- **3.** Hydrant maintenance: A fire hydrant is a mechanical device. Operation of a hydrant lubricates internal mechanisms and gaskets.
- **4.** Hydrant inspection: Any deficiencies are noted and repaired as necessary to insure that each hydrant will perform when needed for an emergency.

This report provides information regarding the water the Village provides, including all sample results for contaminants that were tested for by the Village and the parent supply, Chicago. Lake Michigan is a surface water supply and is used to provide water to the City of Chicago and 188 other communities.


Corrections in the report were identified after printing and the following information is being provided so that all information is accurate and complete:

The Lead results within the Regulated Contaminants Table for both the City of Chicago and the Village of Bloomingdale should be in parts per billion (ppb) not parts per million (ppm) as indicated in the report. The sample result values in these tables remain the same. Additionally, the results for fluoride sampling were omitted. The City of Chicago adds fluoride to promote strong teeth and the results of sampling are as follows:

SNOW IS COMING TO BLOOMINGDALE...

The snow will be here before you know it. The winter season is a wonderful time of the year for all to enjoy the snow and the fun activities that accompany it. Unfortunately, for people involved in plowing snow it can be very dangerous. We are asking ALL RESIDENTS to prepare for the snow and ice sea-

son now – before the fall frost and inclement weather are upon us.

Residents are requested to check their mailboxes to ensure

they conform to Village and Post Office policy. Residents also need to ensure that mailboxes are in good condition and can withstand wet snow.

The Village does not permit boulders to be placed in the Village right-of-way where such boulders could result in damage to persons or property. Although we understand your reasons for placing the boulders near the edge of the road adjacent to your property (protection of your lawn and to provide a level of comfort for you and your family that errant vehicles will not injure persons or damage property at your home) – we are requesting that boulders in the right-of-way be placed back a minimum of three feet from the curb (or the street in non-curb areas).

In order to ensure a safe snow and ice control season we are asking your cooperation with the above-mentioned items. Mailboxes should be repaired and boulders should be removed no later than October 31, 1999.

Y2K Preparations are on Track

To date, ComEd, Nicor and Ameritech have reported that they are in compliance with the Year 2000. Although we certainly anticipate a smooth transition into the new millennium, please DO NOT DO ANYTHING OUT OF THE ORDINARY with regard to your utility consumption (electric, telephone, gas, and water). A dramatic surge or decrease in consumption could create more problems than any Y2K related malfunction. The Village recommends that all households prepare for Y2K the same as you would for any bad winter storm situation. The following information is provided to assist all households with their Y2K preparation efforts:

DIGITAL THERMOSTATS, BURGLAR/FIRE ALARMS & OTHER ELECTRONIC DEVICES

If your heat currently operates from a programmable thermostat, please check with the manufacturer of the thermostat to confirm that it will operate properly on January 1st. Some systems are not compliant and may either activate shortly after midnight or stop working altogether. If you have a fire or burglar alarm that is monitored by an alarm service, please check with them to ensure that your system is Y2K compliant as well. Some systems are not compliant and may either activate shortly after midnight or stop working altogether. Generally, most appliances, such as coffee makers, microwaves, clock radios will not be affected by Y2K because these items use a clock rather then a calendar. Products that do have calendars, such as VCRs and camcorders are not likely to have problems unless they were purchased before 1987.

SPECIAL MEDICAL CONSIDERATIONS

Do you or anyone in your home have an illness that requires constant medical attention such as an oxygen concentrator, cardiac monitor, or are bedridden? If so, please plan on having a spare oxygen cylinder on hand or back up batteries for the monitor should there be an interruption in the electrical power for a period of time. The Bloomingdale Police Department is in the process of updating its list of homebound and/or medically disabled residents. While we will not be in a position to supply electrical generators to residents, we can make arrangements to check in on you by telephone or in person during the transition period, and assist. Please contact Commander Tim Goergen, 529-9868.

ALTERNATIVE HEAT SOURCES

Most homes will remain comfortably warm for up to six hours or longer. If using a fireplace for extended periods of time, keep a window slightly opened to provide air for proper combustion. Ovens and range tops are not designed,

nor intended to heat your home. Alternate heating sources, such a kerosene heater should only be used in strict accordance with the manufacturer's specifications. Gasoline and Coleman fuel cannot be used in these devices. Most propane heaters are not intended for indoor use and could introduce dangerous levels of carbon monoxide into your home. If your home is

without heat for a long period of time and the temperature of your home nears freezing,

shut-off your water and drain your pipes to prevent freezing of the water lines. If your electricity is on and your heat is not working, check your thermostat, some digital thermostats are calendar programmed and could malfunction. If you had plans to use a back-up generator in the event of lost electricity, please use extreme caution. Hooking up a back-up generator to your home's electrical service has a number of safety risks. Non-industrial generators do not supply enough amperage to supply power for today's home energy needs (to run a furnace, lighting, appliances, etc.). Home fires and Carbon Monoxide Poisoning deaths have occurred by misuse of a generator. Statistics from the Northeastern Ice Storm of January/February 1997 show that as many as 100 people were killed and 5,000 people injured by such misuse. Unless your home's power supply was installed with a disconnect to the main power feeding lines, use of a generator could "backfeed" into the main power line and cause other problems for yourself, your neighbors, and for the electrical utility company. A Village building permit is required for the installation of a generator.

THINK TREES ... TERMINOLOGY

Genus

A group of tree species that have fundamental traits in common but that differ in other, lesser characteristics.

Example:

Maple (Common Name) Acer (Scientific Name)

Species

A natural group of trees in the same genus made up of similar individuals that produce similar offspring, some with minor variations.

Example:

Red Maple (Common Name) Acer rubrum (Scientific Name)

Variety

A subdivision of a species having distinct, though often inconspicuous difference, and breeding true to that difference.

Example:

Acer rubrum var. drummondi

Cultivar

A variety, selected for one or more outstanding characteristics, that is being cultivated, and reproduced by asexual means to preserve genetic makeup.

Example:

Acer rubrum 'Autumn Flame'

Sign Up for Village's 2000 Tree Program

The Village Board has again allocated funds for this very successful program which was started in 1982. This year for the first time additional funds have been included for business/commercial properties. The program provides trees, including planting, at a 50/50 cost sharing with the Village. The trees will be planted next Spring and are available for street parkways, residential front yards and business/commercial properties. If further information is desired, contact Larry Slavicek, Urban Forester, at 630-529-5865, Extension 19.

The following are the guidelines of the program:

- 1. Since the budget is limited, the program will be on a first-come, first-served basis. Requests should be submitted by December 1, 1999. No payment is required at this time. Bills will be sent about February 1, 2000
- **2.** Trees will be 2 " caliper, unless stated otherwise. Trees will be quality nursery stock but not specimen plants.
- **3.** The Village reserves the right to disapprove requests based on conflicts, safety, or proper spacing.
- **4.** Removal of dead trees, stumps and/or large roots is not included and must be performed by participants before March 20th.
- 5. Each residential parcel will be limited to two trees per year. Each business/commercial property will be limited to four trees per year.
- **6.** Participants will be given the opportunity to mark the desired location for the tree; however, the Village retains the right to change the location, if necessary.
- 7. We anticipate the cost of 2 " caliper trees to be between \$250 and \$350 each, with the Village paying half of the amount.
- **8.** Trees will be guaranteed for one year. Participants are responsible for all watering which will be described in instructions furnished by the Village.
- **9.** For trees to be planted in the public parkway, this application will serve as the permit requirements of the ordinance regulating trees on public areas.

NEWS FROM THE VILLAGE OF BLOOMINGDALE FORESTRY DIVISION

Parkway Tree Maintenance

For any and all work by a resident or resident's contractor on a parkway tree, a permit is required by

Ordinance No. 95-61, An Ordinance Regulating the Planting, Maintenance and Removal of Trees on Public Areas.

The Village has a comprehensive, systematic pruning schedule which ensures each tree is trimmed every five years. Contract tree pruning occurs dur-

ing February through April. In-house trimming can occur any time during the year. If a resident believes a parkway tree requires pruning, please contact the Forestry Division at 529-5865, ext. 7.

Leaf Collection

The Village does not provide leaf pick-up services. Blowing or raking leaves into the street is a violation of the Comprehensive Code of Village of Bloomingdale – Chapter 9 Section 1-42.

BFI (630-469-1036) will pick up leaves and other yard waste on regular trash pick-up days from April 1st through November 30th. Leaves must be placed in bags or cans (up to 60 pounds), all affixed with a yard waste sticker (\$1.23 per sticker).



Mulch

The Village has woodchip mulch available at Public Works, 305 Glen Ellyn Road, for those who wish to come and pick it up. Pick-up can be done from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. – Monday through Friday.

Late summer/early fall is an advantageous time to mulch as the mulch will moderate the effects of winter on the soil and plant roots, and the decomposition of organic mulches during the winter will add nutrients for the spring and growing season.

Parkway Tree Planting

Replacement parkway trees may also be requested from the Village. The size of this program is limited by the available funds in the Tree Budget and is maintained on a first-come, first-served basis. The tree planting usually occurs between one and two years from the time of the request.

The residents may plant parkway trees. In this case, a permit must be obtained and the tree species must be approved. The Village Forester can provide assistance in species selection.

Mark Your Calendar for Fall Branch Collection Schedule

The Bloomingdale Public Works' Forestry Division will be conducting its semi-annual Branch Collection Program beginning on October 4, 1999. Once during each spring and fall are the only times the Village of Bloomingdale picks up residents' branches with the exception of branches downed by storms. For storm damage pick-up, please contact Helen Price at 529-5865, ext. 7, within 72 hours of storm for scheduling.

The branch collection program is available to single family detached residences within the Village of Bloomingdale only. If residents of townhomes have questions regarding branch collection, please contact your association.

The following information shall assist residents regarding branch collection procedures:

- Branches must be out NO LATER THAN 7 A.M. ON THE DAY PICK-UP IS TO BEGIN FOR THE SECTION as our crew will be making only one pass down each block and WILL NOT RETURN.
- Woody branches up to six inches in diameter and up to 20 feet in length are the only items that will be picked up. Long lengths, up to twenty feet, are favored. Do not reduce the length for our benefit. Any branches exceeding six inches in trunk diameter will not be picked up. Our chipper is designed to chip woody limbs and branches. The equipment will not grind small twigs, vines or other non-woody yard waste. LEAVES, VINES, SMALL (under 1/2 inch in diameter) FLEXIBLE WILLOW STEMS,

HERBACEOUS PLANTS AND WEEDS WILL NOT BE PICKED UP BECAUSE THE SOFT MATERIAL CLOGS AND DAMAGES OUR EQUIPMENT. IF IT IS BAGGABLE, IT IS YARD WASTE.

- All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and should be STACKED IN AN ORDERLY FASH-ION with the cut or larger end towards the pavement. Small branches may be bundled with string. PLEASE NOTE branches left out in a tangled mess will not be picked up due to time required for our crew to sort for loading.
- Branches with spikes, hooks or other metal objects will not be picked up. STUMPS, ROOTS, ROOT BALLS, WOODEN FENCE AND CONSTRUCTION LUMBER ALSO WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.
- Please do not conceal thorny tree branches inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to our workers.
- Small twigs, leaves and other yard waste may be placed in bags with tags for B.F.I. pick-up. B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups begin April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups should be directed to 469-1036.
