Reflections




Bloomingdale, founded in 1833 and incorporated as a Village in 1889, will be seeing its second "turn of a century" at the end of this year. We are fortunate to have

well preserved documentation dating back to our incorporation election in 1889. Both minutes and ordinances were laboriously handwritten for many years.

The election of March 5, 1889 brought out 47 voters in favor of incorporating as a Village. There were 12 votes against it. The election was held in the Tailor Shop of the late F.X. Neltnor. About a month later the first six trustees were elected: Frank Holstein, H.W. Vanderhoof, John Bagge, William Wangelieu, Joe Fiedler and William Rathje. Vanderhoof was named president (or first mayor) from that group.

Although not always stimulating reading, the minutes and laws give us a glimpse into life roughly 100 years ago. At one meeting Julius King gets his dog tax abated (\$1 or \$2 depending on the dog's gender) because his dog was shot. An ordinance passed in 1899 allows the Chicago Telephone Company to erect poles and wires for communication by telephone.



Another early ordinance prohibits anyone from "flying kites, throwing stones, trundling hoops..." or anything that was likely to frighten a horse. By 1904 the Village Board passed an ordinance regulating automobiles in Bloomingdale. Note the speed limit was 18 mph, 4 mph when turning a corner.

In 1909 anyone who took the Village fire truck or water wagon with team to a real fire within the village limits, would be paid \$5 each occurrence. A 1915 ordinance regulates the use of cement sidewalks, specifying that children under 13 (and no one else!) were allowed to roller skate from 4 - 7 p.m. as long as they were not too noisy or boisterous.

The total budget for 1910 was \$2550, which included \$350 in salaries. Our budget for this fiscal year was \$37 million, which includes the golf course. How far we have come in the last 100 years. From a remote (relatively) farm town to today's bustling suburb which boasts quality homes, education, recreation, commerce and more, our founding fathers could have never imagined where we would be today. One hundred years ago, Bloomingdale was just getting telephone service. Today we can communicate by phone (wireless, no less), fax and e-mail.

As a child in the 40's & 50's, my idea of the year 2000 conjured up visions of Flash Gordon and Buck Rogers. Now that we are on the verge of this new millennium, the future looks a little more familiar than the one Flash and Dale Arden inhabited. How lucky we all are to be here for this opportunity.

Our founding fathers, and those who followed, did their best to make Bloomingdale a great place to live. It has continued to be just that.

On behalf of the Village Board and the employees of the Village of Bloomingdale, I wish you and yours a wonderful holiday season. I give you our sincere commitment to continue to make Bloomingdale a wonderful place to live well into the new century.





Lake Street Construction Update

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) Lake Street Construction Project is progressing as scheduled. All lanes are now open to traffic.

The remainder of work includes:

- ➡ All medians
- Permanent traffic signals
- ➡ Street Lighting
- ➡ Sidewalks
- ➡ Seeding and sodding

→ Landscaping (A separate landscaping project is scheduled to begin during the summer of 2000.)

Work on the above items will continue as weather permits. Please note that occasional daytime closures may be necessary for the construction of these items.

Additional warning signs will be placed at all intersections to alert drivers to new lane configurations. Please be alert for changes in traffic patterns.

Please use caution when approaching Lake Street. Watch for new traffic lanes.

For your safety and the safety of the construction workers, please use extreme caution while driving in the work zone and obey all construction and work zone signage. Watch for work zone speed limits.

Enjoy a Real Christmas Tree

If your family is among the 36 million that will purchase a real Christmas tree this year, you can do so with a clear conscience that the tradition is both environmentally correct and even patriotic. According to the National Christmas Tree Association, 90 percent of all Christmas trees are grown on some 15,000 plantations, many of which are family operations. These tree farms are found in all 50 states and employ 100,000 people full or parttime. Artificial trees, which are non-recyclable when discarded, are manufactured mostly in Asia, and are usually made of synthetic material made from non-renewable resources. Also, for each real Christmas tree harvested, two or three seedlings are planted in its place. Since young trees in their rapid growth years have a high rate of photosynthesis, just one acre of Christmas trees produces the daily oxygen requirement for 18 people. With approximately one million acres dedicated to Christmas tree production in the U.S., this translates to oxygen for 18 million people every day.

Preparing Plants for Winter

Drying Winds

Many plants, especially evergreens which retain their leaves all winter, are susceptible to desiccation from cold, dry winds, and sun. Desiccation injury occurs when plants lose water through their leaves faster than their roots can absorb it.

 \Rightarrow Water all plants well until the ground freezes. This is especially important because once the ground freezes, plants are no longer able to absorb water.

➡ Construct a screen from burlap to protect exposed plants from drying winds.

 \Rightarrow Apply anti-desiccant sprays in November or December and again in January or February when the temperature is above 40 degrees to slow water loss.

Ice and Snow

 \Rightarrow Gently brush or shake heavy, wet snow from the branches of small trees and shrubs. Do not attempt to remove ice or frozen snow. This may cause more damage to the plant.

 \Rightarrow Protect multi-stemmed evergreens, such as arborvitae, junipers, and yews, from winter storm damage by tying trunks together with old nylons or soft cotton rope. Remove the ties in the spring!

➡ Avoid using large amounts of de-icing salts around plants along sidewalks and driveways.

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

The Holiday Weekend Service will run from <u>8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Saturdays</u> <u>and from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Sundays</u>. There is No Service on Christmas Day and New Year's Day.

Bloomingdale residents may ride anywhere within the Bloomingdale Township Boundaries, and also to Central Dupage, Alexian Brothers and Glen Oaks Hospitals, DuPage Oncology Clinic, Monakea Medical Complex, Wheaton Medical Clinic, and Wheaton Eye Clinic.

Bloomingdale's Weekend Dial-A-Ride one-way rates are:

\$1.30 For Adult Residents (age 14 and older)

Free for children (under age 7) accompanied by an adult

Reservations shall be accepted up to one week in advance on a first serve basis. Same day service requests are accepted, however, transportation cannot be guaranteed.




- \diamond Keep your purse close to your body with your hand on the clasp.

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"You're not going to let him get away with this, are you?" The Lord sighed, and said, "No, I guess not."




Four Bloomingdale Residents to Participate in Eco-Challenge in Borneo


Volunteers Needed to Deliver Meals




Erickson Elementary Students Provide a Thanksgiving Feast for 800 People



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BLOOMINGDALE PREPARES FOR Y2K

As most people are now aware, there has been much discussion and varying opinions regarding the potential impact of the Y2K bug. Both the Village and the utility companies have worked aggressively to prepare for January 1, 2000. Although the Village is very optimistic of a smooth transition into the new millennium, we do recommend that every household and business prepare "sensibly" for Y2K. With regard to

electric, gas, telephone and water usage please, DO NOT DO ANYTHING OUT OF THE ORDINARY. A dramatic increase/decrease in the use of a public utility could cause more problems than Y2K itself.

The Village has completed the inventory and assessment of its mission critical services. All identified "at-risk" mission critical systems operated by the Village are either being remediated or replaced. The Village continues to monitor the compliance status of the public utility services and its mission critical third party vendors to ensure a smooth transition into the

21st century. To this end, contingency plans are being developed and will be activated in the unlikely event of third-party utility service failures. The Village's Y2K compliance plan is proceeding on schedule. We expect all of our mission critical processes under the Village's direct control to be Y2K compliant by December 1, 1999.

The Village has established a Y2K Information Line (630) 529-9599 for residents and businesses to call with questions or desiring further information. Effective, December 31st at 10:00 p.m., the Y2K Information Line will be staffed with Village personnel to personally answer questions and to identify problems as they arise within the Village. The hotline will remain staffed until it is determined to be no longer required. In the event of telephone service interruption, the Police Department lobby will be open and operating as a **Y2K Information Center**.

MISSION CRITICAL VILLAGE SERVICES

WATER/SEWER: The Village Water and Sewer facilities are Y2K compliant. Contingencies are in place to provide service in the unlikely event of wide spread power outages or the failure of the DuPage Water Commission to supply Lake Michigan water to the Village.


POLICE: The Village's 911, squad cars and radio equipment are all Y2K compliant. Extra police officers and employees will be working New Year's Eve to respond as needed.

FIRE/AMBULANCE: The Bloomingdale Fire Protection District No. 1 will have increased staff



on-duty December 31st. Standard operating guidelines have been established in preparation for any problems that may arise from Y2K; including, but not limited to, alarms, celebration mishaps and inclement weather. In the unlikely event of interrupted communication lines, citizens with an emergency can come to Station # 1 (108 W. Washington St.) or Station #3 (246 S. Gary Ave.) for assistance.

SNOW & ICE CONTROL: The Village's snow & ice control fleet is Y2K compliant. Contingencies are in place to provide adequate staff in the event of a snow & ice control emergency.





PUBLIC UTILITIES

Please continue your day-to-day utility consumption activities as if January 1, 2000 was just another day. This will help minimize unusual load patterns for the utility companies, which could produce a service problem of its own.

ELECTRICITY: At last report, Commonwealth Edison indicated that at of June 30, 1999 they are fully Y2K Compliant. For more specific information, please visit their Web Site at www.ucm.com.

GAS: At last report, NICOR Gas indicated that they are in the final stages of testing and contingency planning which they expect to complete by the end of the third-quarter 1999. For more specific information, please visit their Web Site at www.nicorinc.com.

TELEPHONE: At last report, Ameritech indicated that 98% of their mission-critical system (i.e., system

vital to the provision of voice and data switching transporting) was completed. For more specific information, please contact Ameritech direct at (888) 247-5259, or visit their Web Site at www.ameritech.com/y2k. For long distance and/or cell phone services, please contact your carrier directly.

UTILITY SERVICE INTERRUPTIONS

The best thing each of us can do to prepare for the unlikely event of an extended public utility interruption is to prepare in the same way you would for the threat of a major winter storm. If a public utility does go out, remain calm and continue to tend to the basic needs of vourself and your family. The following are some useful household preparation guidelines.

HEAT: Most homes will remain comfortably warm for up to six hours or longer. If using a fireplace for extended periods of time, keep a window slightly opened to provide air for proper combustion. Ovens



and range tops are not designed nor intended to heat your home. Alternate heating sources such a kerosene heater should only be used in strict accordance with the manufacturer's specifications. Gasoline and Coleman fuel cannot be used in these devices. Most propane heaters are not intended for indoor use and could introduce dangerous levels of carbon monoxide into your home. If your home is without heat for a long period of time and the temperature of your home nears freezing, shut off your water and drain your pipes to prevent freezing of the water

lines. If your electricity is on and your heat is not working, check your thermostat. Some digital thermostats are calendar programmed and could malfunction.

SPECIAL MEDICAL CONSIDERATIONS: If you or anyone in your home have an illness that requires constant medical attention such as an oxygen concentrator, cardiac monitor, or are bedridden, please plan on having a spare oxygen cylinder on hand or back up batteries for the monitor should there be an interruption in the electrical power for a period of time. The Bloomingdale Police Department is in the process of updating its list of homebound and/or medically disabled residents. While we will not be in a position to supply electrical generators to residents, we can make arrangements to check in on you by telephone or in person during the transition period, and assist. 






SUPPLIES: The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) developed the following list of the "most needed" supplies in the event of a disaster. FEMA recommends that all households have a "Disaster Supplies Kit" on hand to sustain a family for up to three days in the event of any emergency, to include the following supplies:

- ✓ 3-Day Supply Water, 1 gallon per day per person (Store water in a thoroughly washed plastic, glass, fiberglass or enamel-lined metal container. Never use a container that has held toxic substances)
- 3-Day Food Supply, Ready to Eat & Non-Perishable (First, eat perishable foods and foods from the refrigerator. Then, eat the foods from the freezer. Last, eat non-perishable foods and staples.)
- 🖌 First Aid Kit
- ✓ Baby Supplies (formula, diapers, bottles, medications)
- ✓ Medications, Extra Glasses/Contacts, Denture Needs, etc.
- ✓ Mess Kits (or paper cups, plates, and plastic utensils) & Utility Knife
- ✓ Flashlight, Radio, and extra batteries
- ✓ Some Cash
- ✓ Personal Hygiene items (toilet paper, soap, feminine supplies)
- ✓ One change of clothing, sturdy shoes/boots, and rain gear
- Blankets/sleeping bags




A full tank of gas for your car is also recommended. If you would like more information on how to prepare for an emergency, check out the FEMA web site at www.fema.gov or write to: FEMA, PO Box 2012, Jessup, MD, 20794-2012.

GENERATORS: Hooking up a back-up generator to your home's electrical service has a number of safety risks. Non-industrial generators do not supply enough amperage to supply power for today's home energy needs (to run a furnace, lighting, appliances, etc.). Home fires and Carbon Monoxide Poisoning deaths have occurred by misuse of a generator. Statistics from the Northeastern Ice Storm of January/February 1997 show that as many as 100 people were killed and 5,000 people injured by such misuse. Unless your home's power supply was installed with a disconnect to the main power feeding lines, use of a generator could "backfeed" into the main power line and cause other problems for yourself, your neighbors, and for the electrical utility company. A Village building permit is required for the installation of a generator.



<u>VILLAGE WARMING CENTERS</u>: The Village is prepared to open a community warming center, in the event of localized loss of electrical service, and provided that the Village can meet community demand. The location and the number of warming

centers to be opened will be determined January 1st, subject to the number of residents in need and the availability of electrical service at each potential warming center facility. Due to the limitation of both space and staffing, warming centers will not be opened in the event of a catastrophic Village-wide loss of electrical power. The location of an opened Village warming center can be acquired by calling the Village's Y2K Information Line after 7:00 a.m. on January 1st.



DIGITAL THERMOSTATS, BURGLAR/FIRE ALARMS & OTHER ELECTRONIC DEVICES

If your heat currently operates from a programmable thermostat, please check with the manufacturer of the thermostat to confirm that it will operate properly on January 1st. Some systems are not compliant and may either activate shortly after

midnight or stop working altogether. If you have a fire or burglar alarm that is monitored by an alarm service, please check with them to ensure that your system is Y2K compliant as well. Some systems are not compliant and may either activate shortly after midnight or stop working altogether. Generally, most appliances, such as coffee makers, microwaves, clock radios will not be affected by Y2K because these items use a clock rather then a calendar. Products that do have calendars, such as VCRs and camcorders are not likely to have problems unless they were purchased before 1987.

MONEY & FINANCE

Management of financial records is a good idea anytime of the year. With regard to Y2K, try to keep a sensible amount of cash and coin on hand, in case the ATM's and bank computers are down for awhile. If



you don't already do so, try to maintain transaction receipts, deposit records and bank/credit card statements for at least the last several months of 1999. It's always a good idea to maintain copies of your important financial information such as mortgage, deeds, stocks, bonds, birth certificates, and passport, etc, in a safe place. LOOK OUT FOR

SCAM ARTISTS! Be skeptical of anyone who asks for your account information or tries to sell you a product, service, or investment that is supposedly Y2K safe.



GET READY ... WINTER WEATHER



When a storm begins, day or night, the Village crews are promptly mobilized and begin spreading salt. The Village initially salts all Village streets approximately 100 feet before and after each intersection. The initial salt application mitigates icing conditions contributing to more effective snow removal operations. After a 1inch to 2-inch accumulation of snow, crews begin the snow plow operations according to predetermined snow routes. The routes consist of 4 routes with 8 vehicles (2 separate vehicles handle cul-de-sacs and dead ends) and have been carefully designed to allow for the optimum use of the available snow plowing equipment and personnel. All Village-owned streets will eventually be plowed, but main streets are cleared before side streets, which are cleared before cul-desacs and dead ends. The rate at which the streets are cleared depends on many factors including total accumulation, type of snow (wet or powder-like), temperature and volume of traffic on streets during plow operations.

What Are the Village's Parking Regulations When It Snows?

The Village's winter parking ban takes effect after snowfalls of 2 inches or more. The ban applies to all vehicles on any Village-owned street and is in effect for a period of 24 hours or until the streets have been cleared of snow. Residents can assist Village crews in the snow removal efforts by parking vehicles in driveways or other off-street parking areas.

Will the Village Repair My Mailbox If It Is Damaged During Snowplowing Operations?

The Village will replace and/or reimburse a resident up to \$35.00 for a mailbox and post which is damaged as a result of the Village snow plow operations, provided the mailbox is installed per Village setback requirements. If you have questions as to whether or not your mailbox is in compliance with Village requirements, you may contact the Street Division of the Village Services Department or the Public Works Division at 671-5800.

Why Does My Driveway Sometimes Get "Plowed In" When a Snowplow Truck Passes?


The Village snow plows are designed to direct the snow to the curb side of the plow blade. "Side delivery plows" are



the fastest and most efficient means available to remove snowfall from the streets. As a result, snow is discharged along the length of the curb, the parkways,

and the private driveway areas. The Village has thousands of private driveways abutting Village streets, the cleaning of which is the responsibility of the property owner.

Manpower and equipment limitations prohibit the Village from responding to routine requests to remove snow from private driveways. Therefore, we strongly recommend you delay your schedule for clearing the driveway until the snow plows have cleaned the majority of your street. THE VILLAGE ORDINANCES PROHIBIT THE DIS-CHARGE OF SNOW ONTO THE VILLAGE STREETS. This illegally placed snow may freeze or become compacted, creating a safety hazard for all motorists.



IS JUST AROUND THE CORNER!

Who Do I Call With Questions About Snow Removal Operations?

Any questions regarding snow removal should be directed to the Village Services Department - Public Works Maintenance Division Superintendent at 671-5800.

Use extra caution when driving through intersections following a heavy snowfall. Snow is piled on cross streets when intersections are plowed. Until crews have had their final pass to completely clear the intersection, the snow piles along the curb lane may hinder visibility.

Please do not attempt to stop the snow plow operators to discuss questions or problems. Such interruptions slow crews and reduce the speed of the truck and the efficiency of the snow removal operations. Drivers are instructed not to stop to talk to residents.

If it is still snowing, or if snow is anticipated on the evening before garbage pick-up day, we ask that you delay putting out your garbage for as long as possible. This will minimize the problem of garbage containers being covered by snow that is pushed against the curb by the plows. Place garbage containers on the driveway or as close to the driveway as possible to give refuse collectors room to pick them up.

Additional Snow Removal Information

Ornamental rocks along the curb or next to the pavement on non-curb streets present a serious safety hazard to the snow removal equipment. If residents use rocks or planters for landscape beautification, they need to insure that they are a minimum of three feet in back of the curb or pavement on non-curb streets. If these obstacles are not removed by the residents, the Village will remove them, if deemed necessary for safe snow removal operations.

Fire Hydrants

For the convenience of firefighters - if an emergency should occur (maybe at your address), dig a path to the fire hydrant in front of your house **from the street**. Dig out around the fire hydrant too. If firefighters can see a hydrant, they can get to it more quickly. Better yet, adopt a hydrant near your home and see that it is accessible.

Motorists - Stay Back Three Car Lengths

Do not follow snow plows too closely. Sometimes they stop and then back up. If you're right behind one when that happens, well ... Give snow plows plenty of space. Also, remember driving on slick wintertime pavements is dangerous, even if they've been plowed. Take more time to get where you're going, begin slowing for stops sooner and, for heaven's sake, don't drink and then try to drive. WINTER PHONE NUMBERS


Stratford "Squares for Lifelong Learning" Tile Wall Project An Unequivocal Success
