Residents and businesses will be happy to know we are approaching the end of the Lake Street construction project. This last phase, which will be completed in spring, will include landscaping, lighting and restoration work. It has been a long haul, but the end is now in sight. The next road project that will affect both our residential and commercial population is Army Trail from Schmale west to Gary Avenue. DuPage County tells us they are planning to start this project this summer.

In 1998 the Village Board passed an adult use ordinance to regulate the licensing and location of such businesses. Although at that time we had no specific need for such an ordinance, the village made that proactive move. Last November, thanks to that ordinance and the diligence of Building Commissioner Mike Gricus and Director of Village Services Michael Marchi, we were able to stop an undesirable use from locating at 207 East Lake Street without ending up in a potentially long and costly litigation. In other communities, officials have had to fight these battles over many months while the business was operating.

We look forward to the year 2000 and beyond in Bloomingdale. In upcoming Almanac issues I'll talk about programs and projects we have slated to accomplish during this year.





### Year 2000 Census Begins March 15

The National Census, conducted in the United States by the Census Bureau every 10 years, will commence on April 1, 2000.

Every known resident of the Village of Bloomingdale will receive a written form from the Census Bureau. 4 of 5 people will receive a short form. 1 of 5 people will receive a long form.

IF YOU DO NOT WANT TO RECEIVE A PERSONAL VISIT by Census Bureau workers, you need to complete the form which will be mailed to you and return it to the Census Bureau by mail. If you fail to do this, the Census Bureau will contact you at home until they secure a completed census form.

The Census is important for many reasons. The districts for Congress and the districts for State Legislature and County Board offices are determined by population counts made during the Census. Failure to cooperate could mean under representation for certain elected offices. The State income tax, motor fuel and other tax payments the Village of Bloomingdale receives from the State of Illinois are based on the Village population determined during the Census. The Village of Bloomingdale receives approximately \$113.00 per year, per resident in these tax payments. If the population is undercounted, the Village loses monies it is entitled to receive. This could cause taxes to be increased due to this loss of State and Federal funds.

You will start to receive written Census forms by mail by March 15, 2000. Complete the form and mail it in. If you do this simple act, you will have no personal contact from Census workers. An accurate count assures our community receives all of the money we are entitled to by law.




### **DuPage County Ordinance Prohibits Burning Yardwaste or Household Refuse**

The DuPage County Board adopted the DuPage County Waste Management Ordinance on March 22, 1988. Landscape waste means all accumulations of grass or shrubbery cuttings, leaves, tree limbs, and other materials accumulated as the result of the care of lawns, shrubbery, vines and trees. Open Burning means the combustion of any matter in the open or in an open dump. Refuse means waste of all kinds. (definitions from Ordinance OWR-OO1-90, the DuPage County Waste Management Ordinance).

### What is allowed:

▲ Open burning shall be allowed for recreational purposes. This is defined as an outdoor fire utilized to cook food for human consumption.



- ▲ Any open burning shall be constantly attended until the fire is extinguished. Fire extinguishing equipment such as dirt, sand, garden hose, etc. shall be available for immediate use.
- ▲ Within the village's boundaries, all open burning shall be confined to approved containers designed for the designated purpose.

### What is not allowed:

▲ It is unlawful for any person to cause or allow any open and uncontrolled burning of landscape wastes in the Villages of Bloomingdale and Glendale Heights or unincorporated DuPage County.



- ▲ It is unlawful for any person to cause or allow the burning of any refuse including landscape waste in any chamber not specifically designed for the purpose and approved by the Illinois EPA.
- ▲ It is unlawful for any person to cause or allow the open dumping or disposal of any waste, including landscape waste, at any site in Bloomingdale, Glendale Heights or unincorporated DuPage County, except at a site approved by the Illinois EPA.
- ▲ It is unlawful for any person to abandon, dump, or deposit any waste, including landscape waste, upon the public highways or other public property, except at a site approved by the Illinois EPA.

The Bloomingdale Fire Protection District #1, and village and county officials shall have the final approval for open burning, and in certain cases may determine that the fire needs to be extinguished for health and safety reasons.



# April 30 Is Deadline for Displaying 2000 Bloomingdale Vehicle Stickers

All vehicles owned by a Bloomingdale resident or registered to a Bloomingdale address must have a Village vehicle license. Stickers go on sale March 1 and must be affixed by midnight, April 30.

The cost of a vehicle sticker for a passenger car is \$10. Costs vary for other vehicle licenses. Call the Village Hall for more information. A late charge of \$5 will be assessed for late sticker purchases.

A new sticker application form will be arriving in your mailbox this year. Residents will be receiving a pre-printed application with the prior year's data included. An envelope for mailing back the application and payment will be included.

To avoid long lines and inclement weather, residents are encouraged to mail application with payment. Vehicle stickers will be returned by mail. Of course, as always, vehicle stickers can be purchased in person at the Village Hall, as well as at the following locations:

### THINK TREE CARE .....

### PLANTING, PRUNING & MAINTENANCE

For any and all work by a resident or resident's contractor on a parkway tree, a permit is required by Ordinance No. 95-61, An Ordinance Regulating the Planting, Maintenance and Removal of Trees on Public Areas.

The Village has a comprehensive, systematic pruning schedule which ensures each tree is trimmed every five years. Contract tree pruning occurs during February through April. In-house trimming can occur any time during the year. If a resident believes a parkway tree requires pruning, please contact the Forestry Division at 671-5800.

### **CONTRACT TREE PRUNING**

Nels J. Johnson Tree Experts of Evanston, Illinois will begin parkway tree pruning for the Village in February. All trees with a diameter at breast height of eight or more inches will be pruned to improve tree health and structure. Streets included in this year's cycle are:

### **TREE PLANTING**

### 50/50 Tree Planting Program:

The 50/50 Tree Planting Program is a program for parkway and front yard trees which was started in 1982. Trees are provided to residents, including planting, in a 50/50 cost-sharing with the Village. The trees are planted in the spring and are limited to two trees per year on a lot.

Village residents are notified of the program in the October 'Almanac'. Information and applications for the 'Tree Planting Program' are included for interested property owners. Actual requests must be submitted by December 1st and billing occurs in February.

### Parkway Tree Planting

Replacement parkway trees may also be requested from the Village. The size of this program is limited by the available funds in the Tree Budget and is maintained on a first-come, first-served basis. The tree planting usually occurs between one and two years from the time of the request.

### **PARKWAY TREE MAINTENANCE**

The residents may plant parkway trees. In this case, a permit must be obtained and the tree species must be approved. The Village Forester can provide assistance in species selection.

## GARDEN CALENDAR: FEBRUARY & MARCH

Don't be fooled by warm, sunny days. It is still too early to remove mulches, screening, and other winter plant protections. Make sure they are still in place.

Prune trees and shrubs. The ideal time to prune is in the dormant season, just prior to new growth. Wait to prune spring-flowering plants to avoid removing this year's flower buds.

### VOLUNTEERS WANTED

The Village Forestry Division is looking for volunteers to plant 100 seedlings provided by the National Tree Trust on Saturday, April 29th, from 10 a.m. – noon at the Public Works Facility, 305 S. Glen Ellyn Road.

For the sixth consecutive year, the Village has received a Community Tree Planting grant from the National Tree Trust. The Village will be receiving 100 Bald Cypress (Taxodium distichum) seedlings, soil and pots for the purpose of growing the seedlings into saplings for transplanting into the local community. Community Tree Planting involves a commitment from all participants to plant trees on public property, such as right-of-ways, school grounds, community parks, etc.

The National Tree Trust is a private, non-profit organization created to serve as a catalyst for local volunteers and community groups in the growing, planting and maintenance of trees in rural communities, urban areas and along our nation's highways.

### Mark Your Calendar for Spring Branch Collection

The Bloomingdale Public Works' Forestry Division will be conducting its Spring Branch Collection Program beginning on March 27, 2000. PLEASE NOTE – To better serve our residents a summer pick-up is being added to the program. Residents' branches will now be collected three times per year, once during each spring, summer and fall. The summer pick-up will take place during the end of June and July. Branches downed by storms will also be picked up. For storm damage pick-up, please contact Helen Price at 671-5800 within 72 hours of storm for scheduling.

The branch collection program is available to single family detached residences within the Village of Bloomingdale only. If residents of townhomes have questions regarding branch collection, please contact your association.

The following information shall assist residents regarding branch collection procedures:

☐ Branches must be out NO LATER THAN 7 A.M. ON THE DAY PICK-UP IS TO BEGIN FOR THE SECTION as our crew will be making only one pass down each block and WILL NOT RETURN.

☐ Woody branches up to six inches in diameter and up to twenty feet in length are the only items that will be picked up. Long lengths, up to twenty feet, are favored. Do not reduce the length for our benefit. Any branches exceeding six inches in trunk diameter will not be picked up. Our chipper is designed to chip woody limbs and branches. The equipment will not grind small twigs, vines or other non-woody yard waste.

LEAVES, VINES, SMALL (under 1/2 inch in diameter) FLEXIBLE WILLOW STEMS, HERBACEOUS PLANTS AND WEEDS WILL NOT BE PICKED UP BECAUSE THE SOFT MATERIAL CLOGS AND DAMAGES OUR EQUIPMENT. IF IT IS BAGGABLE, IT IS YARD WASTE.

- ☐ All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and should be STACKED IN AN ORDERLY FASH-ION with the cut or larger end towards the pavement. Small branches may be bundled with string. PLEASE NOTE branches left out in a tangled mess will not be picked up due to time required for our crew to sort for loading.
- ☐ Branches with spikes, hooks or other metal objects will not be picked up. STUMPS, ROOTS, ROOT BALLS, WOODEN FENCE AND CONSTRUCTION LUMBER ALSO WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.
- ☐ Please do not conceal thorny tree branches inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to our workers.
- ☐ Small twigs, leaves and other yard waste may be placed in bags with tags for B.F.I. pick-up. B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups begin April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups should be directed to 469-1036.

### **SPRING 2000 BRANCH PICKUP SCHEDULE**

SECTION ONE: Pick-up begins March 27, 2000

Area bounded by Edgewater Drive on the south, Bloomingdale Road on the west, Lake Street on the north, and Glen Ellyn Road on the east.

### SECTION TWO: Pick-up begins April 3, 2000

Two areas with the first bounded by Army Trail Road on the south, Glen Ellyn Road on the west, Lake Street on the north and Medinah Road/Walter Road on the east. The second area is bounded by Lake Street on the south, Rosedale Avenue on the west, Picton Road/Foster Avenue on the north, and Medinah Road on the east.

### SECTION THREE: Pick-up begins April 10, 2000

Area bounded by Army Trail Road on the south, Bloomingdale Road on the west, Edgewater Drive on the north, and Glen Ellyn Road on the east.

### SECTION FOUR: Pick-up begins April 17, 2000

Area bounded by Schick Road on the south, Gary Avenue/Cloverdale Road on the west, Lake Street on the north, and Bloomingdale Road on the east.

### SECTION FIVE: Pick-up begins April 24, 2000

Area bounded by Army Trail Road on the south, Old Gary Avenue on the west, Schick Road on the north, and Bloomingdale Road on the east and Glen Ellyn Road on the east.

# Local Groups Make Scholarship Funds Available to Graduating High School Students, Returning Students

Once again several scholarships are available for residents through local groups. The Bloomingdale Women's Club is pleased to announce its 2000 scholarships. There are three \$500 scholarships. Two are available to male or female high school seniors residing in Bloomingdale. The other is available to a woman resident of the Village who is continuing her education or updating her skills. Community service will be a major component for awarding the scholarships.

Funds for the scholarships are obtained from one of the Bloomingdale Women's Club major fundraisers - the Festival of Arts which is held in conjunction with Septemberfest.

Applications are available at the Village Hall, the Bloomingdale Public Library and in the guidance office of local high schools as well as in the Financial Aid Office at the College of DuPage. Applications can also be requested by writing to Bloomingdale Women's Club Scholarship Committee, P.O.Box 271, Bloomingdale Il 60108. All applications are due back to the club by April 15, 2000. The Bloomingdale Chamber of Commerce is offering three \$1000 scholarships for entrance to vocational school, business school or a 2 or 4-year college. They are available to both graduating high school seniors and continuing post-secondary students. Candidates must be a Bloomingdale resident who will be enrolled as a full time student (i.e. minimum of 12 quarter hours or 15 semester hours) with a most recent academic record of a "C" average or above.

Previous Bloomingdale Chamber of Commerce scholarship winners will not be considered. Proof of enrollment as a full-time student and past academic performance will be required before monies will be awarded. Applications are due to the Chamber office, 109 W. Franklin by April 14. Pick up forms at the Village Hall, Public Library or Chamber office, as well as at local high school counselors' offices after February 15.

Applications are also now being accepted for three scholarships for college-bound high school seniors who previously attended School District 13 schools. The scholarships, made available by the district's parent-teacher organizations, may be picked up at Lake Park, Glenbard North, Driscoll Catholic and St. Francis high schools. Applications muse be returned to the sponsoring District 13 school by Friday April 14.

Students may apply for scholarships offered by either school they attended. Each school is offering a \$500 scholarship. Seniors who attended Central School may apply for Erickson Elementary's scholarship.

Scholarship winners will be selected by a committee who evaluates the student's applications, grade point averages, introductory letters and letters of recommendation. This is the ninth year the dis-

trict's PTOs have been offering the college scholarships.



THINK TREE CARE .....

### TREE PRUNING: WHEN, HOW & WHAT TOOLS TO USE

Pruning is more than the indiscriminate cutting of limbs and branches. It requires an understanding of the function of the parts of the tree and their impact on overall tree structure. The objective of pruning is to produce strong, healthy, attractive plants. By understanding how, when and why to prune, and by following a few simple principles, this objective can be achieved. No tree pruning on Village parkways is to be done without a permit from the Forestry Division.

### **Reasons for Pruning**

The main reasons for pruning ornamental and shade trees include safety, health, and aesthetics. In addition, pruning can be used to stimulate fruit production and increase the value of timber. Pruning for safety involves removing branches that could fall and cause injury or property damage, trimming branches that interfere with lines of sight on streets or driveways, and removing branches that grow into utility lines. Safety pruning can be largely avoided by carefully choosing species that will not grow beyond the space available to them, and have strength and form characteristics that are suited to the site.

Pruning for health involves removing diseased or insectinfested wood, thinning the crown to increase airflow and reduce some pest problems, and removing crossing and rubbing branches. Pruning can best be used to encourage trees to develop a strong structure and reduce the likelihood of damage during severe weather. Removing broken or damaged limbs encourages wound closure.

Pruning for aesthetics involves enhancing the natural form and character of trees or stimulating flower production. Pruning for form can be especially important on opengrown trees that do very little self-pruning.

All woody plants shed branches in response to shading and competition. Branches that do not produce enough carbohydrates from photosynthesis to sustain themselves die and are eventually shed; the resulting wounds are sealed by woundwood (callus). Branches that are poorly attached may be broken off by wind and accumulation of snow and ice. Branches removed by such natural forces often result in large, ragged wounds that rarely close. Pruning as a cultural practice can be used to supplement or replace these natural processes and increase the strength and longevity of plants.

Trees have many forms, but the most common types are pyramidal (excurrent) or spherical (decurrent). Trees with pyramidal crowns, e.g., most conifers, have a strong central stem and lateral branches that are more or less horizontal and do not compete with the central stem for dominance. Trees with spherical crowns, e.g., most hardwoods, have many lateral branches that may compete for dominance.

To reduce the need for pruning it is best to consider a tree's natural form. It is very difficult to impose an unnatural form on a tree without a commitment to constant maintenance.

### When to Prune

Hardwood trees and shrubs without showy flowers: prune in the dormant season to easily visualize the structure of the tree, to maximize wound closure in the growing season after pruning, to reduce the chance of transmitting disease, and to discourage excessive sap flow from wounds. Recent wounds and the chemical scents they emit can actually attract insects that spread tree disease. In particular, wounded elm wood is known to attract bark beetles that harbor spores of the Dutch elm disease fungus, and open wound on oaks are known to attract beetles that spread the oak wilt fungus. Take care to prune these trees during the correct time of year to prevent spread of these fatal diseases. The best time is during the late winter.

Flowering trees and shrubs: these can also be pruned during the dormant season for the same reasons stated above; however, to preserve the current year's flower crop, prune according to the following schedule:

- ▶ Trees and shrubs that flower in early spring (redbud, crabapple, etc.) should be pruned immediately after flowering (flower buds arise the year before they open, and will form on the new growth).
- ▶ Trees and shrubs that flower in the summer or fall always should be pruned during the dormant season (flowers buds will form on new twigs during the next growing season, and the flowers will open normally).

Dead branches: can be removed any time of the year.

### **Pruning Tools**

Proper tools are essential for satisfactory pruning. The choice of which tool to use depends largely on the size of branches to be pruned and the amount of pruning to be done. As with most things, higher quality often equates to higher cost.



Generally speaking, the smaller a branch is when pruned, the sooner the wound created will close. Hand pruners are used to prune small branches (under one inch diameter). To prevent unnecessary tearing or crushing of tissues, it is best to use a by-pass style pruner, which have a curved cutting blade that slides past a broader lower blade, much like scissors. Larger branches can be cut with a pruning saw.


The new fire station is really coming along. The Fire Department plans to be in the building by early summer.
