

Stand Up and Be Counted: Year 2000 Census Is Underway!

The National Census, conducted in the United States by the Census Bureau every 10 years, is under way. Every resident of the Village of Bloomingdale should have received a written form from the Census Bureau.

IF YOU DO NOT WANT TO RECEIVE A PERSONAL VISIT by Census Bureau workers, complete the form and return it to the Census Bureau by mail. If you fail to do this, the Census Bureau will contact you at home until they secure a completed census form.

The Census is important for many reasons. The districts for Congress and the districts for State Legislature and County Board offices are determined by population counts made during the Census. Failure to cooperate could mean under-representation for certain elected offices. The State income tax, motor fuel and other tax payments the Village Bloomingdale receives from the State of Illinois are based on the Village population determined during the Census. The Village of Bloomingdale receives approximately \$113.00 per year, per resident in these tax payments. If the population is undercounted, the Village loses monies it is entitled to receive. This could cause taxes to be increased due to this loss of State and Federal funds.

The DuPage County Solid Waste Department will be sponsoring two spring Household Hazardous Waste Collections. Hours for both are 8 a.m. - 3 p.m. Residents may drop off household hazardous wastes that may be poisonous, flammable, corrosive, and/or reactive, such as lead-acid batteries, fireworks, explosives, ammunition, latex and oil based paint, photo or pool chemicals, fluorescent bulbs, pesticides, fertilizer, propane tanks, auto fluids, turpentine, cleaners, asphalt sealer and poisons.



IEPA Honors Village's 1999 Consumer Confidence Report

The Village of Bloomingdale's 1999 Water Quality Report was recognized by Illinois Environmental Protection Agency as "one of the best first time consumer confidence reports issued in Illinois" according to Mary F. Reed of IEPA's Compliance Assurance Section. The report contains information regarding the Village's water quality and the results of any water quality testing performed on samples collected in 1998.

The Village of Bloomingdale Utilities Superintendent, Robert C. Maguire indicated "the Village is proud to have been recognized for this effort. This was our first Water Quality Report and we feel honored the IEPA has chosen it for display." Kevin M. O'Dea, Water Production Supervisor for the Village, prepared the report. Kevin has done an outstanding job with this report.

Over 1,750 privately owned and public water supplies throughout the state were required to provide this report to their water users during 1999. The IEPA has requested additional copies from the Village Services – Utilities Division to be used as an example in displays throughout the state and at association meetings with other water supplies.

THINK TREES GARDEN CALENDAR

APRIL:

- ☐ As temperature warms, remove winter protection/coverings from plants.
- Remove tree wraps applied last fall.
- ☐ Dig and move trees and shrubs prior to bud break.
- ☐ Bare root plants should be planted before new growth begins; container plants can still be planted later into the spring.
- ☐ Plant a tree in celebration of Earth Day and Arbor Day.
- ☐ Divide and move perennials every three years to prevent them from over-crowding.
- ☐ On susceptible crabapples, control apple scab with a fungicide just as leaf buds begin to open. Spray should be repeated every 10 to 14 days until dry weather begins.
- Deadhead spring bulbs when they are finished flowering to direct energy back into bulbs. Discard tulips that only produced large leaves and no flowers.

MAY:

- ☐ Watch for insects and diseases that gave you problems last year. The sooner you detect damage, the easier they will be to control.
- ☐ Replenish mulch around existing plants to a depth of three to four inches. Keep mulch away from trunks.

College of DuPage Brings Off Campus Learning Center To Bloomingdale

After 17 years of serving students in the Glenside Public Library, College of DuPage has brought its off-campus learning center to Bloomingdale. The new facility is located at 162 S. Bloomingdale Road, in Town Square. It opened on March 27, the beginning of spring quarter.


A grand opening is planned for Saturday, April 29 from 1:30 - 4:30 p.m. Several dignitaries will be on hand for the 2:30 p.m. ribbon cutting. There will be tours of the new facility and C.O.D. faculty will be on hand to conduct computer demonstrations.

The 5600 square-foot facility will house a Center for Independent Learning (CIL), an independent study-based center especially designed for today's busy working adults that offers a non-traditional delivery format known as "flexible learning."

Through various media, including study guides, textbooks audio and video tapes, television, radio and computer-based lessons, CIL students spend a minimum amount of time on campus while earning college credit.

Open 62 hours a week, including Sunday afternoons, the center will offer 100 college-level transfer courses. There will also be an expanded number of traditional classroom courses, as well as enhanced non-credit and English as a second language courses.

THINK TREES PRUNING EVERGREENS

Evergreens come in an unlimited number of sizes and shapes. If the right evergreen is selected to fit the assigned space, minimum pruning is required. However, if pruning is necessary, Justin C. "Chub" Harper of the American Conifer Society makes the following recommendations:

Easiest to control are Yews and Hemlocks. Both have abundant buds on both old and new wood that develop into twigs when the cut is above the bud. Thus, they can be sheared and not permanently harmed so they can be used as hedges. The leaves tolerate some shade so they grow well on the inside of the plant and hence the plant can be made dense by shearing or pruning. Pruning just before new spring growth allows the pruning cuts to be covered with new growth very rapidly to get away from the "just sheared look".

Next easiest to control are the Firs, Cedars, Spruce, and Douglas Firs. These have easily identified buds along the current season's growth and sometimes on the stem of the previous year's growth. Size can be controlled at any time by pruning back to a bud or live twig. For a formal shape, they can be pruned or sheared when the current season's growth is soft (not woody). Their leaves are somewhat shade tolerant so pruning or shearing has the potential for making a dense plant.

More care must be taken with Pines. When pruning Pines one must be aware of their lack of buds along the stem and that buds are only at the tip of current season's growth.

Thus, pruning at most times of the year must be done carefully or shape will be lost. The time to prune Pines is in the spring when growth is soft, a candle (the expanding buds) can be cut or pinched before the needles are fully elongated and buds will develop from needle fascicles below the cut. Early summer pruning or "candling" will produce a compact plant.

The group most difficult to prune and control their size and the Junipers, Arborvitaes, and Falsecypress (Chamaecyparis). In this group, buds are present only where there are green leaves; a branch cut back to a non-leafy region will not form new foliage. Thus cutting or shearing to the brown inner part results in an unsightly scar that may not be covered for many years if ever. The naked or brown interior is the result of the fact that this group's foliage is intolerant of shade and therefore the interior leaves die. If they are sheared, it should be done with care and only when they are actively growing in the spring. This group of plants ends up being a thin "shell" of green growth over a

zone of twigs and limbs with no leaves and no potential for development of buds. Care must be taken not to open this thin "shell" during pruning.



PARKWAY TREE MAINTENANCE

For any and all work by a resident or resident's contractor on a parkway tree, a permit is required by Ordinance No. 95-61, An Ordinance Regulating the Planting, Maintenance and Removal of Trees on Public Areas.

The Village has a comprehensive, systematic pruning schedule which ensures each tree is trimmed every five years. Contract tree pruning occurs during February through April. In-house trimming can occur any time during the year. If a resident believes a parkway tree requires pruning, please contact the Forestry Division at 671-5800.



Yearlong Celebration of Library's 25 Years of Service to Community Begins June 9

The Bloomingdale Public Library will begin its celebration of two and a half decades of service to the community on June 9, 2000 with an open house from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The open house will be the first in a yearlong series of special events commemorating the library's 25th anniversary.

On June 9 the Library Board of Trustees along with the library staff and The Friends of the Library will welcome patrons at an outdoor café set up in Friendship Court. Throughout the day refreshments will be served and there will be musical entertainment.

Also on June 9, the youth services department will celebrate the birthday of the library's mascot, Pages the Bear. Youngsters will enjoy stories, games and crafts. Advance registration is required for either the 10:30-11:30 a.m. party, or the 2-3 p.m. party. **Registration begins Monday, May 22.** Sign up at the youth services reference desk or call 529-3120, ext. 332.

As we begin this year of celebration, we'd like to share a bit of historical data from the library's archives.

"After several years of study by a committee of residents, a referendum was held in June of 1974," said Karen Taylor (first president of the library board.)

"The community overwhelmingly showed its interest in having its own library."

"The board purchased a two-classroom modular unit from School District 15 and had it moved to town," said Taylor. "I'm sure many a resident groaned when they saw the faded pink 'shoe box' roll down Bloomingdale Road. Many donated dollars, materials and services, and many donated hours went into transforming the shoe box into a library."

Taylor also shared recollections of the people who diligently worked for a year to establish a solid foundation upon which today's library was built:

- A man and his son putting up a sign in the rain
- A man putting in the chimney when it was 10 degrees and snowing
- Area businesses, developers and organizations donating over \$25,000 in money, materials and services
- A troop of Cub Scouts planting flowers they started from seed
- Thirty people working weekend after weekend building, planting, painting and laying sod
- Hundreds of square feet of lumber, gallons of varnish and thousands of donated books
- Sore muscles, smashed fingers and black tar on a kid's good coat
- Hopes, dreams, perseverance and pride.

The original library was dedicated on June 9, 1975 and opened its doors with a collection of 4,500 adult and juvenile books, a staff of three, and over 30 volunteers providing 28 hours of service each week.

As we celebrate 25 years of progress and expansion, Bloomingdale's 35,000-square foot library holds 90,000 items, has 50 staff members, six volunteers and is open 68 hours a week.

During Sharon's early teens her art was published in Scholastic Magazine, Seventeen Magazine and the South Bend Tribune. At age seventeen she created a cartoon "Buttons an' Beaux," which was syndicated in newspapers across the country.

When Sharon was 25, her first children's book "Where Are You Going Today?" was published by Albert Whitman & Co., Chicago.

During the next 20 years she illustrated more than 25 picture books for Golden Press and Rand McNally.

Representative pieces of Sharon's work are on permanent display at the Northern Indiana Historical Society in South Bend.




