## Helpful Hints for A Safe And Happy Halloween

Help keep your favorite ghosts and goblins safe this Halloween by reviewing these important safety rules with your children.

□ NO candy should be eaten until it has been inspected by an adult.

- ☐ Discard any unwrapped items.
  - ☐ Check all food wrappers for signs of tampering.
- ☐ Keep costumes simple. Costumes should be made of light, brightly colored or reflective material, so that your trick-or-treater can be easily seen at night. Costumes should not restrict either vision or movement.
- ☐ At least one person in the group should carry a flashlight while trick or treating.
- ☐ Trick or treat in groups whenever possible, accompanied by one or more adults.
- ☐ Instruct your children not to enter any home, and don't invite anyone else's child into your home.
- ☐ For safety's sake, trick or treat only at homes in your own neighborhood.
- ☐ Remind children to cross only at corners, and to look both ways before crossing the street. Children should use sidewalks whenever possible, obey traffic lights, and walk -- never run -- across streets.

#### Parkway Tree Maintenance

For any and all work by a resident or resident's contractor on a parkway tree, a permit is required by Ordinance No. 95-61, An Ordinance Regulating the Planting, Maintenance and Removal of Trees on Public Areas.

#### PLEASE NOTE -Installing planter

walls around parkway

trees is work which requires a permit. The Village discourages the installation of planter walls around parkway trees because the parkway is Village property and the typical installation of a small diameter ring filled with soil is injurious to the tree. For those residents who have installed planter walls without permits, approval can be obtained by contacting Larry M. Slavicek, Village Forester, at 630-671-5803. The Village will be notifying residents of a violation when unacceptable planters are encountered.

The Village has a comprehensive, systematic pruning schedule which ensures each tree is trimmed every five years. Contract tree pruning occurs during February through April. In-house trimming can occur any time during the year. If a resident believes a parkway tree requires pruning, please contact the Forestry Division at 671-5800.

#### Mulch

The Village has woodchip mulch available at Public Works, 305 Glen Ellyn Road, for those who wish to come and pick it up. Pick-up can be done from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. -Monday through Friday.

Late summer/early fall is an advantageous time to mulch as the mulch will moderate the effects of winter on the soil and plant roots, and the decomposition of organic mulches during the winter will add nutrients for the spring growing season.

#### Leaf Collection

The Village does not provide leaf pick-up services. Blowing or raking leaves into the street is a violation of the Comprehensive Code of Village of Bloomingdale - Chapter 9 Section 1-42.

BFI (847-429-7370) will pick up leaves and other yard waste on regular trash pick-up days from April 1st through November 30th. Leaves must be placed in bags or cans (with handles), each affixed with a

er (\$1.26 per sticker). Weight limit of each bag or can is 50 pounds.

## Fall Hydrant Flushing Begins October 3

The Village Services - Utilities Division will be performing the annual Hydrant Flushing Program beginning October 3, 2000 through October 26, 2000. The Program will be performed during the daytime hours of 9:00 am - 2:00 pm. Please DO NOT WASH LAUNDRY during the flushing hours, as rust staining of the clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

One question that is always asked is - "Why does the Village flush hydrants?" Hydrant flushing is routine maintenance for a water system. It accomplishes the following:

1. Improves water quality: Flushing

removes minerals such as iron and magnesium that have collected in the water mains.

- **2.** Improves water flow: By removing these minerals, the inside diameter of a water main is increased and therefore, allows a better flow of water.
- **3.** Hydrant maintenance: A fire hydrant is a mechanical device. Operation of a hydrant lubricates internal mechanisms and gaskets.
- **4. Hydrant inspection:** Any deficiencies are noted and repaired as necessary to insure that each hydrant will perform when needed for an emergency.

## Got Odd Jobs That Need to Be Done? Teens Can Help

The Bloomingdale Township has a CHORE Program which matches up youngsters ages 13-16 with senior citizens, as well as other residents, to help them with odd jobs around the house and yard. Most of the workers are 8th or 9th graders. They can do light maintenance, such as clean out garages or basements, wash windows (cannot climb ladders), some yard work (rake leaves, cut grass with push mowers, sidewalk snow clearing, etc.). Other possible tasks are pet walking, car washing and house cleaning.

Youngsters are paid for the services at a rate determined by the township after speaking with the resident. Resident must provide equipment, yard waste bags, stickers, shovel, gloves, etc.

## | Put a New Tree in Your | Parkway for Half the Cost

The Village Board has again allocated funds for this very successful program which was started in 1982. For the second year, additional funds have been included for business/commercial properties. The program provides trees, including planting, at a 50/50 cost sharing with the Village. The trees will be planted next Spring and are available for street parkways, residential front yards and business/commercial properties. If further information is desired, contact Larry Slavicek, Urban Forester, at 671-5803.

The following are the guidelines of the program:

- 1. Since the budget is limited, the program will be on a first-come, first-served basis. Requests should be submitted by December 1, 2000. No payment is required at this time. Bills will be sent about February 1, 2001.
- **2.** Trees will be 2" caliper, unless stated otherwise. Trees will be quality nursery stock but not specimen plants.
- **3.** The Village reserves the right to disapprove requests based on conflicts, safety, or proper spacing.
- 4. Removal of dead trees, stumps and/or large roots is not included and must be performed by participants before March 15th.
- 5. Each residential parcel will be limited to two trees per year. Each business/commercial property will be limited to four trees per year.
- 6. Participants will be given the opportunity to mark the desired location for the tree; however, the Village retains the right to change the location, if necessary.
- 7. We anticipate the cost of 2" caliper trees to be between \$250 and \$350 each, with the Village paying half of the amount.
- **8.** Trees will be guaranteed for one year. Participants are responsible for all watering which will be described in instructions furnished by the Village.
- For trees to be planted in the public parkway, this application will serve as the permit requirements of the ordinance regulating trees on public areas.

## Computer Lab Offers Instruction on the Internet, Popular Computer Programs for Kids, Adults & Seniors

As summer eases into fall the Library's recently completed Computer Training Lab is gearing up for its first series of classes.

As a result of the overwhelming success of the Stratford

Squares for Lifelong Learning tile wall project initiated by Urban Retail Properties Company that raised \$25,000 and a \$10,000 donation made by the Village of Bloomingdale, the library has purchased 13 wireless Gateway Profile computers for the new lab.

If you are unfamiliar with wireless computer technology you may

think you are entering a non-functional computer lab because you won't see intertwined wires or cables all over the floor nor will you see any bulky computer hardware. But, once you check out the small box—called the "hub"—that is plugged into the wall data jack you will be at the threshold of experiencing one of the more impressive breakthroughs in computer technology.

Each of the wireless computers is portable and requires less than a square foot of desktop space—not including the keyboard and mouse, which actually still do have connecting wires. This translates into efficient use of space and increased flexibility in setting up computer training classes.

The library's class schedule for Fall 2000, prepared by Dana Iaccino, Special Programs Coordinator, and Sean Luster, Computer Services Assistant, has something for everyone.







"A number of the kids on our team, Mike Tabor and Shaun Riley for example, are beginning to take part in organized chess outside of the library," said Sean. For both beginners and those already playing chess competitively, the program provides a regular opportunity to sharpen their skills in a friendly, relaxed environment.

"We currently have several team members—first board, Eric Linder and fifth board, Kym McDaniels in particular—who had previous tournament experience before joining the program; on the other hand, many others involved in the program are getting their first introduction to chess," Sean added.

Though some participants may never play much outside the library group, their newfound hobby has brought about positive changes in their lives. Parents have commented that since their children started playing chess their grades have improved in math and other subjects that involve reasoning skills, and that their self-confidence has increased.

"I've always felt that learning how to think and developing the discipline to really work through a mentally challenging problem is what education is all about, and chess certainly fosters those skills," Sean added.

The library's expanded chess program, which began on August 22, now runs throughout the year. The program offers weekly sessions—Tuesdays from 6-9 p.m.—for those age eight and over, including adults. There also will be small weekly events, centered around recreational or tournament chess, as well as occasional weekend events. No registration is required for this program—just stop by and check it out.
