From the Mayor's Desk

We are very happy to report that our reverse 911 system, which was approved by the Village Board earlier this year, is now in place. This system allows the police department and the village to reach residents and businesses via the phone with important messages. This system operates using the existing phone lines and allows us to automatically dial eight residences per minute.

The system can automatically select phone numbers in the database within a defined geographical area, meaning we can target only a certain area in town, as needed. It could be used, for example, during power outages to give updates or during water main breaks to issue a boil water order. Reverse 911 can be used for anything from police emergencies or disasters to community oriented policing.

Due to the fact that the system only has published phone numbers in its database, anyone with an unpublished number would not be included in the system. Residents can, however, request to be included.

We are encouraging all residents who have unlisted phone numbers to contact us. These residents can call 671-5727 where they will receive a voice mail message asking them to leave their name, address and phone number. A clerk in the police department will retrieve the information. She will then call and verify the information so that it can be put added to the reverse 911 database.

Be assured, all information given to the police department will be kept confidential and will not be given to anyone else.

More good news, the Lake Street project is just about totally complete. More of the landscaping went in last month. The final landscape touches will be finished in Spring 2001.





Help Keep Fire Hydrants Visible

For the convenience of firefighters - if an emergency should occur (maybe at your address), dig a path to the fire hydrant in front of your house from the street. Dig out around the fire hydrant too. If firefighters can see a hydrant, they can get to it more quickly. Better yet, adopt a hydrant near your home and see that it is accessible.



What Are the Village's Parking Regulations When It Snows?



The Village's winter parking ban takes effect after snowfalls of 2 inches or more. The ban applies to all vehicles on any Village-owned street and is in effect for a period of 24 hours or until the streets have been cleared of snow.

What If a Snowplow Damages My Mailbox?

The Village will replace and/or reimburse a resident up to \$35.00 for a mailbox and post which is damaged as a result of the Village snow plow operations, provided the mailbox is installed per Village setback requirements. If you have questions as to whether or not your mailbox is in compliance with Village requirements, you may contact the Street Division of the Village Services Department or the Public Works Division at 671-5800.

Why Does My Driveway Sometimes Get "Plowed In" When a Snowplow Truck Passes?



The Village snow plows are designed to direct the snow to the curb side of the plow blade. Manpower and equipment limitations prohibit the Village from responding to routine requests to remove snow from private driveways. Therefore, we strongly recommend you delay your schedule for clearing

the driveway until the snow plows have cleaned the majority of your street.

Motorists - Stay Back Three Car Lengths

Do not follow snow plows too closely. Sometimes they stop and then back up. If you're right behind one when that happens, well . . . Give snow plows plenty of space. Also, remember driving on slick wintertime pavements is dangerous, even if they've been plowed. Take more time to get where you're going, begin slowing for stops sooner and, for heaven's sake, don't drink and then try to drive.

Residents are requested to position their Christmas trees cut end toward the curb for easy loading. Browning Ferris Inc. will dispose of the Christmas trees.

BFI Rate Increase Effective December 1st

In accordance with the Village's contract for curbside single-family residential refuse pick-up services, BFI will be increasing their refuse pick-up rates by 2.6% effective December 1, 2000. This increase represents the Consumer Price Index (CPI) increase for all items in the Chicago-Gary-Kenosha area. BFI's monthly charge for refuse and recycling pick-up services will increase from \$11.49 to \$11.79. Senior citizen monthly rates will increase from \$5.74 to \$5.89. Yard waste sticker rates will increase from \$1.26 to \$1.29.

PLANTS AND WINTER

Woody plants most likely to suffer winter injury are those that are marginally hardy to our area or those that enter winter already weakened by previous stress. To encourage the fall hardening process, late summer pruning and fertilization should be avoided. If we have not had adequate rainfall, keep watering until the ground freezes — this is especially important for evergreens.

Mulching the area around trees and shrubs with a three-to-four inch layer of organic material, like woodchips or shredded bark, will conserve soil moisture and protect roots from cold temperatures. (Remember to keep the mulch off the base of the plants.)

Shallow-rooted perennials can be protected from the freeze-thaw cycles of winter by covering plants with evergreen boughs from leftover holiday greens.

Many plants, especially evergreens which retain their leaves all winter, are susceptible to desiccation from cold, dry winds, and sun. Desiccation injury occurs when plants lose water through their leaves faster than their roots can absorb it. To prevent desiccation injury:

- Water all plants well until the ground freezes. This is especially important because once the ground freezes, plants are no longer able to absorb water.
- Construct a screen from burlap to protect exposed plants from drying winds.
- Apply anti-desiccant sprays to evergreens (especially rhododendrons) in November or December, and again in January or February when the temperature is above 40 degrees to slow water loss and help prevent winter burn.

Young trees with a thin bark, such as maples and lindens, are susceptible to sunscald, a trunk injury. The bright winter sunshine tends to warm the bark during the day, only to have it freeze again at night, as well as dehydrate the bark. These situations can cause the bark to split and peel, which makes the tree prone to future insect and disease problems. To prevent this type of trunk damage, apply commercial tree wrap products prior to winter freezing. Remove the wrap in April.

Feeding damage from mice and rabbits can also be a problem during winter. Rabbits will feed on bark above the snow, while mice will tunnel under the snow and feed on bark at ground level. Partial bark removal on trunks and stems weakens the plant; complete bark removal will cause plant death. Protect trunks, stems, and branches with wire screen, hardware cloth, or commercial tree wraps above the snow line.

The winter storm that poses the greatest danger to trees and shrubs is a heavy, wet snowfall followed by very cold temperatures and more snow. The result is a heavy accumulation on the crowns of trees and shrubs, which can cause stems to split and break.

Snow removal on trees and shrubs should only be done while the snow is fresh; once it becomes frozen, trying to remove it can cause damage, such as broken branches.

To remove snow, gently brush it or shake it from the branches to lessen the accumulated weight caused by the heavy snow. It is best to tap the branches carefully with your hand rather than using a utensil, such as a broom or brush, which may cause breakage.

As a preventative measure, in late fall tie together the stems of upright evergreens and small, multi-stemmed trees with an old nylon stocking, wire threaded through a garden hose, a bungee cord, or soft cotton rope. Remember to remove these restraints in the spring.


Avoid using large amounts of de-icing salts around plants along sidewalks and driveways.



achievements demonstrate an enduring commitment to qualities associated with good character.



Cloverdale School Opens Doors






