




# **Bombers Have Their Sights on Cooperstown**

# Robert G. Iden, Village President



"I continue to be committed to maintaining a high level of Village services, preserving open space within our boundaries, and to monitoring the quality of future development."






# Susan L. Bartucci, Village Clerk

# April 30 is Deadline for Displaying 2001 Vehicle Stickers

All vehicles owned by a Bloomingdale resident or registered to a Bloomingdale address must have a Village vehicle license. Stickers go on sale March 1 and must be affixed by midnight, April 30.

The cost of a vehicle sticker for a passenger car is \$10. Costs vary for other vehicle licenses. Call the Village Hall for more information. A late charge of \$5 will be assessed for late sticker purchases.

Residents will be receiving a pre-printed application with the prior year's data included. An envelope for mailing back the application and payment will be included.

To avoid long lines and inclement weather, residents are encouraged to mail application with payment. Vehicle stickers will be returned by mail. Of course, as always, vehicle stickers can be purchased in person at the Village Hall, as well as at the following locations:



# District 15's Dr. Golden Retires

At the conclusion of this school year Dr. Lawrence Golden will retire as superintendent of Marquardt School District 15. At that time he will have completed 37 years in the field of education, with 34 of those years in service to Marquardt School District 15.

During his thirty-four years he has witnessed the tremendous growth of the school district from three buildings and 800 students to seven buildings serving approximately 2700 students. As he looks back on his career he is proud of the instructional program, especially the incorporation of technology within that program.

During his tenure as principal and superintendent of Marquardt School District 15, Dr. Golden has been nominated by the Board of Education for the Illinois Association of School Board's *Those Who Excel* program as well as the *Executive Educator* program, attaining recognition in both of these programs. Through his efforts in promoting gifted

education in Illinois, he was acknowledged by the Illinois Council for the Gifted by receiving its highest statewide award. In addition, the Village of Glendale Heights has recognized Dr. Golden for his involvement in the activities of the Confronting Substance Abuse Committee during the past several years.

Dr. Golden says it has been his pleasure to serve the students and parents of this community. He is very proud of what has been accomplished and wishes the district continued success in meeting the needs of District 15's student population.

# Scholarship Funds Available from Local Organizations

Once again several scholarships are available for residents through local groups. The **Bloomingdale Women's Club** is pleased to announce its 2001 scholarships. They are awarding three \$500 scholarships: two are available to male or female high school seniors residing in Bloomingdale; the other is available to a woman resident of the Village who is continuing her education or updating her skills. Community service will be a major component for awarding the scholarships.

Applications are available at the Village Hall, the Bloomingdale Public Library and in the guidance office of local high schools as well as in the Financial Aid Office at the College of DuPage. Applications can also be requested by writing to Bloomingdale Women's Club Scholarship Committee, P.O. Box 271, Bloomingdale Il 60108. All applications are due back to the club by April 15, 2001. The Bloomingdale Chamber of Commerce will also be offering scholarships to graduating seniors and continuing post secondary students for vocational, business or a 2 or 4-year college. Candidates must be a Bloomingdale resident. Previous Bloomingdale Chamber of Commerce scholarship winners will not be considered. Applications will be due back in mid-April. Applications are also now being accepted for three scholarships for college-bound high school seniors who previously attended **District 13 schools**. The scholarships, made available by the district's parent-teacher

organizations, may be picked up at Lake Park, Driscoll Catholic and St. Francis high schools. Applications must be returned to the sponsoring school by Friday, April 6.

Students may apply for scholarships offered by either school they attended. Scholarship winners will be selected by a committee who evaluates the student's application, grade point averages, introductory letters and letters of recommendation. This is the tenth year the PTOs have been offering the college scholarships.

This year the **Bloomingdale-Roselle Rotary Club** is also awarding a \$500 scholarship by way of an essay contest about the "4 Way Test" of the things we think, say, or do. This ethical test has been used throughout Rotary International since 1948.

- 1. Is it the TRUTH?
- 2. Is it FAIR to all concerned?
- 3. Will it BUILD GOOD WILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?
- 4. Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?"

Eligibility requirements for the contest are that the applicant:

- (1) be a resident of or attend school in Bloomingdale, Roselle, or Medinah, Illinois,
- (2) be a graduating high school senior, and
- (3) submit an application information page and an essay about the "4 Way Test"

# **Spring Branch Collection Begins March 26**

The Bloomingdale Public Works' Forestry Division will be conducting its Spring Branch Collection Program beginning on March 26, 2001. PLEASE NOTE – To better serve our residents a summer pick-up is again being included in the program. Residents' branches will again be collected three times during the year, once during spring, summer and fall. The summer pick-up will take place during July. Large branches downed by storms will also be picked up. Small branches and twigs downed during storms should be bagged for BFI pick-up. For storm damage pick-up, please contact Helen Price at 671-5800 within 72 hours of storm for scheduling.

The branch collection program is available to single family detached residences within the Village of Bloomingdale only. If residents of townhomes have questions regarding branch collection, please contact your association.

The following information shall assist residents regarding branch collection procedures:

☐ Branches must be out NO LATER THAN 7 A.M. ON THE DAY PICK-UP IS TO BEGIN FOR THE SECTION as our crew will be making only one pass down each block and WILL NOT RETURN.

□Woody branches up to 6 inches in diameter and up to 20 feet in length are the only items that will be picked up. Long lengths, up to 20 feet, are favored. Do not reduce the length for our benefit. Any branches exceeding 6 inches in trunk diameter will not be picked up. Our chipper is designed to chip woody limbs and branches. The equipment will not grind small twigs, vines or other non-woody yard waste.

LEAVES, VINES, SMALL (under 1/2 inch in diameter) FLEXIBLE WILLOW STEMS, HERBACEOUS PLANTS AND WEEDS WILL NOT BE PICKED UP BECAUSE THE SOFT MATERIAL CLOGS AND DAMAGES OUR EQUIPMENT. IF IT IS BAGGABLE, IT IS YARD WASTE.

□ All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and should be STACKED IN AN ORDERLY FASH-ION with the cut or larger end towards the pavement. Small branches may be bundled with string. PLEASE NOTE - branches left out in a tangled mess will not be picked up due to time required for our crew to sort for loading.

☐ Branches with spikes, hooks or other metal objects will not be picked up. STUMPS, ROOTS, ROOT BALLS, WOODEN FENCE AND CONSTRUCTION LUMBER ALSO WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.

☐ Please do not conceal thorny tree branches inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to our workers.

☐ Small twigs, leaves and other yard waste may be placed in bags with tags for B.F.I. pick-up. B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups begin April 1st and continue through November 30th. Questions concerning B.F.I. yard waste pick-ups should be directed to 847-429-7370.

## **SPRING 2001 BRANCH PICKUP SCHEDULE**

### SECTION ONE: Pick-up begins March 26, 2001

Area bounded by Schick Road on the south, Gary Avenue/Cloverdale Road on the west, Lake Street on the north, and Bloomingdale Road on the east.

### SECTION TWO: Pick-up begins April 2, 2000



# PARKWAY TREE MAINTENANCE

For any and all work by a resident or resident's contractor on a parkway tree, a permit is required by Ordinance No. 95-61, An Ordinance Regulating the Planting, Maintenance and Removal of Trees on Public Areas.

### PLEASE NOTE -

Installing planter walls around parkway trees is work which requires a permit. The Village discourages the installation of planter walls around parkway trees because the parkway is Village property and the typical installation of a small diameter ring filled with soil is injurious to the tree. For those residents who have installed planter walls without permits, approval can be obtained by contacting Larry M. Slavicek, Village Forester, at 671-5803. The Village will be notifying residents of a violation when unacceptable planters are encountered.

The Village has a comprehensive, systematic pruning schedule which ensures each tree is trimmed every five years. Contract tree pruning occurs during February through April. Inhouse trimming can occur any time during the year. If a resident believes a parkway tree requires pruning, please contact the Forestry Division at 671-5800.

### CONTRACT TREE PRUNING

Nels J. Johnson Tree Experts of Evanston, Illinois will begin parkway tree pruning for the Village in February. All trees with a diameter at breast height of eight or more inches will be pruned to improve tree health and structure in a careful and systematic manner. Streets included in this year's cycle are:
