Bloomingdale's 13th annual Family Fest will begin Thursday, June 21 and run through Sunday, June 24 at the corner of Lake Street and Springfield Drive. Everyone is invited to four days of fun, food and entertainment.

Fest hours will be 6-10 p.m. Thursday and 1-11 p.m. Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Thursday's festivities will begin six o'clock on the dot at the Carousel Stage where everybody's favorite DJ *Mike Lettieri*, of M&R Music, Inc., will provide a variety of crowd-pleasing music, special shows, games and an introduction for Thursday's featured entertainer stilt walker-balloonist *Frank Birdsall*.

The Garden Stage will be rockin' from 7-10 p.m. as Johnny Star and the Meteors confirm that rock 'n' roll music from the 50's and 60's has not lost its appeal. Then Neil Diamond impersonator, Bloomingdale's very own Michael Palmisano, will join the band. His performance will leave no one doubting that Diamond's music will endure—forever.

Windy City Amusements, Inc. will light up the Midway with exciting carnival rides & games for the whole family, and bounteous good eats will be served up by a cornucopia of food and beverage vendors.

A full schedule of Family Fest activities will start on Friday June 22 and continue through Sunday—1-11 p.m.

Each day will bring more fun for children of all ages. In addition to carnival rides and games along the Midway, everyone will delight in the variety of things to do at the Carousel Stage. And, the Children's Activities Tent will host all sorts of activities each day as well, including The Vertical Challenge, a 24-foot high climbing wall, which will be operating on Saturday from 1-5 p.m.

Animal Entertainments will present its wondrous Exotic Petting Zoo, along with pig races—five times each day—and continuous camel and pony rides.



When the Village of Bloomingdale was originally served with Cable TV in 1983, it was under a franchise agreement between the Village and MetroVision. For the first couple of years, rates were regulated by the franchising authority, i.e. the Village.

Then, in 1986, Federal legislation changed the way rates were regulated, in fact, all local authority was taken away. In 1992, a new Cable Act was passed by Congress, and gave some basic, minimal control to the Village. That applies only to the basic rate, not the enhanced or expanded basis service, and not to any premium services. The village reviews rate adjustments annually for compliance to make sure that the cable company is abiding by the law.

Aside from legislation, we have also seen changes in the cable companies. First, Time Warner bought out MetroVision. Then, AT&T Broadband bought the Time Warner Cable franchise and system, but not the whole Time Warner company.

A number of residents have contacted us recently and asked some questions. A summary of those is presented here for general information.

WHY DON'T WE HAVE ANOTHER CABLE COMPANY TO CHOOSE FROM? Our franchise agreement for Cable has never been an exclusive arrangement, nor is it now. If another company came to us asking for a franchise, we would certainly talk to them. Whether we would grant such a franchise would depend on the quality of the company and their ability to perform.

WHY DO SOME TOWNS HAVE MORE THAN ONE CABLE CHOICE, AND BLOOM-INGDALE DOES NOT? Ameritech, through their Americast subsidiary, started to get into the cable business a few years ago. They installed and are operating some systems, such as in Glendale Heights. Just when we started to talk with them about a franchise, Ameritech was purchased by SBC. The new parent company chose not to be in the cable business, so they ended the discussions. While we would be willing to look at a new franchise, with the high costs of installing a cable system, and sharing the revenue with an existing system, it is somewhat unlikely that another traditional cable system will be in our future.

WHAT ARE OUR OPTIONS? For now, the options are limited to the dish systems, or traditional antennas. New technology might provide other options in the future.

TO WHOM DO I COMPLAIN ABOUT AT&T'S SERVICE? Naturally, we would suggest that complaints go first to the company. After that, please notify Dan Wennerholm, Village Administrator, at the Village Hall, 671-5610. We also hold a public hearing each year in the fall regarding the performance of the cable company. The date for this year's hearing has not yet been set, but please contact us at the village hall for up-to-date information.

<u>WHY DO THE RATES KEEP GOING UP?</u> This question is best answered by AT&T, but for the most part, the answers we have received are related to the cost of upgrading and maintaining the system, along with providing the programming.

WHAT CAN THE VILLAGE DO TO GET HIGH SPEED INTERNET ACCESS VIA

<u>CABLE?</u> There is no requirement in the Cable Television Franchise agreement to provide other services, such as telephone or high speed access to the internet. We are, however, making sure that AT&T is aware that there is a market for such services, and we have been assured that they are anxious to meet that need. Depending on the location, there are wireless options for this service available in Bloomingdale.

The Neighborhood Watch Program is a cooperative effort between the residents of Bloomingdale and the Bloomingdale Police Department to help reduce burglary, vandalism, and other neighborhood crimes. Its operational objectives are to disseminate information to homeowners on how to protect themselves, their property and their community; to establish communication and helpful relationships between neighbors; and to create real and psychological restraints for criminals.

Neighborhood Watch goes beyond the concept of securing your own home. It means caring about your neighbors, being aware of

who is in the neighborhood, and what is happening. It also means calling the

police and your neighbors if you see suspicious people, vehicles, or activity. It gives you and your neighbors a greater sense of security when you know someone cares.

As criminals become aware of areas having Neighborhood Watch groups, they avoid them and move on to other neighborhoods because they know that the residents are alert and will report their activities to the police.

The Bloomingdale Neighborhood Watch Program has general meetings every other month on the third Friday of the month. (The third Friday of the following months: February, April, June, August, October).

Programs presented so far this year have included information about child sex offender registration procedures, as well as the ways to obtain the offender listings. Attendees also saw demonstratons by the three of the seven DuPage County Sheriff's Department Canine Units and their Deputy handlers. These were Astor and Tyrant, German Shepherds from the

Canine Explosive Unit and Canine Patrol/ Narcotics Division, and Hunter, a bloodhound which tracks and locates missing persons.

May's meeting provided information on the dangers of inhalant abuse, which is a problem on the rise. Our next meeting dates are the following:

The DuPage County Highway Department began Army Trail Road Widening Improvements (84 Court to Schmale Road) on March 15, 2001. The expected construction completion date is June 30, 2002. Phase I has been moving along well and should be completed in June, 2001, weather permitting.


For those looking for a place to sit down, relax, and enjoy a friendly game, The Village Vocal Chords once again will sponsor the Bingo Tent on Friday, 6-11 p.m., and on Saturday and Sunday from 5-11 p.m.

The Business Tent, featuring local commercial exhibitors, will be open at various times throughout the Fest.

A filled-to-the-brim musical entertainment schedule will begin on Friday from 6:30-8:00 p.m. when the Garden Stage will host *The Nightshift Band*. This variety show band's repertoire virtually spans the 20th century, from the jazz stylings of big band music, through rock 'n' roll classics of the 50's and 60's, to disco & rock of the 70's, and up to the contemporary hits of today. They will return to the Garden Stage—following the main stage show—until 11 p.m.

The Main Stage will present *Foghat* at 8:30 p.m. This band's roots go back to the second generation British blues-rock scene, where they were contemporaries of Led Zeppelin and Cream.

Saturday afternoon's opening act on the Garden Stage will be *Stardust*. This trio of female vocalists will present a fast-paced show that cascades through dreamy harmonies reminiscent of



three famous sister acts of the 30's and 40's—Boswell, Andrews and McGuire—from 1:30-4:30 p.m. Then, from 6:30-8:00 p.m., and again following the Main Stage show until 11 p.m., *Off the Record* will rock that Garden Stage with a solid mix of the most current rock 'n' roll, classic rock, country and blast-from-the-past oldies.

Saturday's Main Stage headliner will be one of country and western music's rising stars, *Ty Herndon*. His performance, which begins at 8:30 p.m., will include songs from his four albums, the most recent of which, "Steam," features an energetic sound that's a little bit country and a little bit rock 'n' roll.

Sunday, from 1:30-4:30 p.m., the Garden Stage will host *The Chicago Rovers*. This trio of talented musicians got together in 1998 in order to consolidate their individual St. Patrick's Day engagements. They were well received

and decided to continue their blend of traditional Celtic music, which has a unique touch of modern sensibility. The Garden Stage finale—from 6:00-7:30 p.m., and following the fireworks until 11 p.m.—will feature the *Uptown Rhythm Express featuring the Blooze Brothers*, the nation's number one Blues Brothers tribute band.

The Main Stage will host two closing acts beginning Sunday at 7:30p.m. *Ronnie Rice* will shake, rattle and roll the platform with his unique blend of classic rock 'n' roll. Then, the *New Colony Six* will let loose a high-energy performance of songs from their top-10 rock 'n' roll albums and number one singles from the 60's and 70's, along with selections from some of the groups with which they have shared the stage and airwaves.

Sunday's fireworks display, sponsored by the Village of Bloomingdale and the Bloomingdale Park District, gets bigger and better every year, and this year is no exception. The phenomenal

Mosquitoes Bugging You? 10 Quick Tips for Keeping Them Under Control

Bloomingdale Township, by contract with Clarke Mosquito Control, is the agency responsible for mosquito abatement services throughout the Township, which includes the Village of Bloomingdale. The product used by Clarke is environmentally safe for use in residential areas. This product is used in very low doses and therefore is considered not harmful to most adults, children and household pets. If there is any concern of allergy or of chemical sensitivity, residents can request to be placed on a call list for advance notice of pesticide use. Residents may report these and any other concerns directly to Clarke Mosquito Control at its "Mosquito Hotline," 1-800-942-2555.

Mosquitoes and summer go hand-in-hand. Mosquitoes are known transmitters of encephalitis, malaria and yellow fever to humans, and heartworm to pets.

A few simple preventative actions if performed by all residents can help reduce mosquito populations and breeding grounds, since many generations of mosquitoes can breed right in your own yard.

Standing water means you could be raising mosquitoes. While adult, flying mosquitoes may rest in tall grass and shrubbery, they do not develop there. All mosquitoes need water to begin and complete their life cycle. Some mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water where they hatch in just a day or two. Other mosquitoes may lay their eggs in old tires, tin cans, or other water-holding containers. The eggs may remain unhatched for weeks or even months until they are covered with water! Minimizing locations of standing water may reduce potential breeding ground for mosquitoes.

YARD & HOME CHECKLIST

- Remove and properly dispose of old tires, tin cans, buckets, drums, bottles or any water-holding containers.
- Fill in or drain any low spots in your yard such as depressions or ruts, which create puddles.
- Given the term of term
- culverts clear so water will drain away.
- Cover trash containers to keep out rain water.
- Repair leaky outside faucets.
- Empty plastic wading pools at least once a week and store indoors when not in use.
- Make sure your backyard pool is properly cared for while on vacation.
- □ Fill in tree rot holes and hollow
- stumps that hold water with sand or dirt.
- Change the water in bird baths and plant pots or drip trays once each week.
- Keep grass cut and shrubbery trimmed around the house.










Junior Achievement In the Classroom

From the Bloomingdale Fire Department Help Your Kids Practice Safety on Wheels

Playing where you live is lots of fun, but you need to play safely. Obey the safety rules for everything that you do.

<u>Wear protective gear</u> before you use any kind of roller skate or a skateboard. When you skate you should wear a helmet, elbow pads, wrist guards, gloves, and kneepads. Remember not to wear anything that keeps you from seeing or hearing well. Don't hitch rides on the back of buses, cars, trucks, or vans, and don't skate at night. Skate in a safe place. Avoid places where there is water, oil, sand, gravel or dirt. Never skate where there are cars. In order to have the safest and most enjoyable time skating, take lessons or learn from someone who can teach you the basics of turning, braking, stopping and controlling your speed.

About 1,000 American bicyclists die in crashes every year, about three-fourths of them die from head injuries. Hundreds more suffer permanent brain damage. Most of these head injuries can be prevented with bike helmets. When you ride a bike, be sure to wear a helmet that fits well and feels comfortable. It can protect you from serious injury in case of an accident. Fasten the strap securely. The helmet should sit evenly on the top of your head, not slide around your head or pull off with the strap fastened.

Before you ride your bike, make the following safety checks. The seat is secure. The wheels have no loose or broken spokes. The tires are inflated to the proper pressure (this is printed on the tire). The brakes work smoothly and quickly. The handlebar is tight and in the correct position. Reflectors are cleans and on tightly. There are no cracked parts on the bike. If you find any problems, let your parents know immediately so they can decide if your bike is safe enough to ride. If there are any questions, have your bike inspected by a bicycle mechanic.

Be aware of traffic. Stop, look left, look right, and then left again for cars and other moving objects before leaving a sidewalk, driveway, or alley. Enter the roadway only when it is clear. When you ride in traffic, you can maneuver better than the cars around you. Most bicyclists get into accidents because they are tempted to ignore traffic rules. Being predictable is the key to safe bicycling in traffic. The basic rules for riding predictably are: Get Smart – know the rules, Be Confident – learn riding skills and always be courteous, and Communicate – make eye contact, signal your moves, and wave when someone yields.

By wearing the proper protective equipment at all times and being aware of what's happening around you, you can have a safe and enjoyable summer on wheels.

Check That Calendar Before You Turn on the Sprinkler!

The Village is required by our Lake Michigan Water allocation to have a water conservation ordinance. The Village's Water Conservation and Control Ordinance is in effect each year between May and September. This ordinance limits use of automatic sprinkling devices and encourages conservation. The ordinance allows single-family residential use of automatic sprinklers for ODD numbered addresses on Monday, Wednesday, and Saturday from 5:00 A.M. to 9:00 A.M. or 5:00 P.M. to 9:00 P.M. Single family residences with EVEN numbered addresses, commercial, governmental, industrial, and office

buildings are allowed on Tuesday, Thursday, and Sunday during the same time periods. Use of any automatic sprinkling device on Friday is not permitted.

Fees for Delinquent Water and Sewer Bills Increased

The Village Board recently passed an ordinance that increased water and sewer fees including several related to the collection of delinquent water bills. It is important to note that **water and sewer rates were not changed**. Water and sewer rates have remained the same since 1994. However, considerable time and money is spent in the collection process and the new fees will help defray these costs. The new fees are:

Certified Letter Fee: \$10.00

Fee for past due notice requiring a certified letter to be sent

Reconnection Fee: \$30.00

Fee to turn water service on after disconnection because of nonpayment of bill

Collection Agency Fee: 25% of the amount due Fee assessed by the Village's collection agent

Application Fee: \$10.00

Fee to establish a new account

The Village requires all utility accounts to have a security deposit. The security deposit amount has also been increased to \$50.00. The purpose of the deposit is to ensure payment of all future utility charges. However, if you are a current resident moving from one address in Bloomingdale to another address in Bloomingdale, the Village Board authorized a 50% reduction of the security deposit to \$25. Please note: If you are moving within Bloomingdale, please notify the Village of this when you establish your new utility bill account to ensure you receive the "discount."

Lastly, it is important to understand that the owner of a property, the occupant thereof, and the user of the service are jointly and severally liable to pay for the water and sewer service provided to the property by the Village. In other words, **regardless of who actually uses the water, the owner and/or tenant can be held responsible for the bill**.






