### From the Mayor's Desk

If you have driven by Bloomingdale Golf Club recently, you will have noticed mounds of earth being moved at the golf course near the intersection of Lake & Glen Ellyn Road. What you are seeing take shape is a practice facility, which will provide a two-tier main tee, which can accommodate 12 people at one time. The small range is designed to cater to the serious golfer who would like to take some warm-up swings before his round.

In this same area, we are also building a teaching tee to be used by the pro when giving lessons - or it can be opened on occasion to accommodate six more golfers. In keeping with past practice, we are attempting to save as many existing trees as possible, which is resulting in a very interesting and unique range.

Finally, we are very excited that that the new range will also allow us opportunities to cater to beginning and junior golfers. By using the target greens and tees, we will create a six-hole short routing of par 3s. Offering this area for play on occasion will provide a safe area for both beginners and juniors to learn the game. By the October Almanac, we hope to have photos for you.

Also new to the golf course is the statue placed recently by the Business Promotion & Cultural Development Committee. This life-size sculpture, entitled "The Mayor's Bench" is the second statue to be placed in the Village purchased with private donations only, through brick sales and other contributions. Whether you are visiting the banquet rooms or the Pro Shop, the impressive piece is easily visible. Stop by and take a look.







- **6.** All cars must carry liability insurance, have safety glass, and have a working fire extinguisher inside the car during the show.



### Neighborhood Watch: Keeping You and the Community Safe!

Inhalant Abuse Awareness was the topic of discussion during the May Neighborhood Watch General Meeting. Many parents are not aware that inhalant abuse is on the rise and that the danger is "right under their noses."

Inhalant Abuse is deliberately inhaling gas or vapor with the intention of getting high. Inhalants are in everyday household products that make our lives easier, such as household cleaners, spray paints, paint thinner, gasoline, cooking sprays, fabric protectors, correction fluid, etc.

Barry McCaffrey, Director of the National Drug Council Policy Department, says that 1 out of 5 adolescents have used inhalants in their lifetime and are not aware of the deadly consequences they are facing. Inhalant Abuse is like playing "Russian Roulette," in which the participant could die the 1st, 10th or 100th time they try an inhalant. Other dangers include liver,

kidney, bone marrow or irreversible brain damage. Inhalant abuse has destroyed lives and families. Although, law enforcement cannot ban the household products mentioned above, everyone who comes in contact with children should be aware of the dangers in abusing inhalants.

Handout material was distributed to help the audience recognize the signs and symptoms of inhalant use. Detective Odoi and the audience discussed the topic which included examples of incidents that have occurred in this area.

# From the Bloomingdale Fire Department Coping with Heat Emergencies



The body works most effectively within a very narrow range of temperatures. High temperatures cause the body to react by increasing its metabolic rate. It also causes the body to lose fluids through perspiration and the dilation of blood vessels in an attempt to cool the body. Infants and young chil-

dren, the elderly, amateur athletes, and outdoor workers are more susceptible to these emergencies. Medical emergencies associated with heat exposure include: heat cramps, heat exhaustion, and heat stroke.

**HEAT CRAMPS:** A person may experience cramps, especially in the large muscles, after strenuous exercise. Move the person to a cool place and remove excess clothing. Do NOT massage cramped muscles. You may give electrolyte-containing solutions such as: Gatorade, All Sport, etc., if it is available.

HEAT EXHAUSTION: The person will be sweating, have moist clammy skin, might be

nauseous, and possibly vomiting. They might have a slightly elevated temperature, with a headache and mental confusion. For treatment, move the person to a cool place and cool them by removing as much clothing as possible and applying cool moist cloths. You may give something to drink if the person is alert and not nauseous. Stop cooling the person if goose bumps or shivers develop. If the person's medical condition doesn't improve, call for medical assistance.

HEAT STROKE: This is the most serious of the heat-related emergencies. The person will have an elevated temperature (greater than 105 degrees), hot dry skin, and appear confused. This is a true emergency. Call for medical assistance immediately. While waiting, move the person to a cool place and begin *rapid cooling*. Remove as much clothing as possible and apply cold compresses to the chest, groin, armpits, neck, temples, and behind knees. Sponge or mist with cool water and fan, or cover the body with a wet sheet and fan. Do not give this person anything to drink. Do not give them aspirin or other medication to lower their temperature. Do not give either the heat exhaustion or heat stroke person any stimulant, including alcohol or cigarettes.



Certain medications will make an individual more likely to suffer a heat emergency. These include; antihistamines, beta-blockers, antihypertensives, tranquilizers, antidepressants, antipsychotics, MAO inhibitors, alcohol, amphetamines, and diuretics.

Heat Emergency Sites are available for seniors throughout DuPage County. They include the DuPage County Administrative Offices (M-F 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m.), libraries, city halls, township offices, senior centers, park districts, malls, and P.A.D.S. (Daysite 682-3846). Check your local telephone directories for numbers. Please call ahead for availability. For cooling sites and heat-related information in DuPage County call the DuPage County switchboard at 682-7000, TDD/TTY (630) 682-6926, Hours 8 - 4:30. If there is an emergency, please call 911. For Suburban Cook County dial 1-800-564-5733, TDD/TTY 1-312-744-6189.

### Info to Know

In response to some recent questions and concerns, residents are reminded of the following three ordinances:

**Parking & Sidewalk Etiquette:** Parking vehicles in private driveways so that a portion of the vehicle blocks the sidewalk is not allowed. Sidewalks should remain open and free of obstacles.

**Open burning** is allowed only for recreational purposes. This is defined as an outdoor fire utilized to cook food for human consumption. Within Village boundaries, all open burning must be confined to approved containers for the designated purpose. Landscape waste may not be burned.

### **GYPSY MOTH UPDATE**

The Illinois Department of Agriculture confirmed on Friday, June 22, 2001 that parts of southern Roselle had become infested with the gypsy moth caterpillars. Additionally, four other new infestations have been confirmed in DuPage County this year. Last year only three areas were found.

The Illinois Department of Agriculture is trapping moths and monitoring the extent of these infestations. Maps will be prepared by October 1, 2001 from all data collected.

The prognosis for infestation next year is worse, and consideration of a program of aerial sprayings in June 2002 of *Bacillus thuringiensis kurstaki*, a biological insecticide, will be addressed by the Village Board and included in the budget process later this year. 



# Computer Lab Offers Instruction on the Internet, Popular Computer Programs for Adults & Seniors

The following computer classes are recommended for ages 13 and older. There is a \$10.00 refundable deposit for each class, due at the time of registration. ### **Using Publisher**

Wednesday, August 1st, 7:00-9:00 p.m.

This desktop publishing program can be used to create newsletters, brochures, cards, banners, etc. The class will cover the basic techniques needed to create professional publications. (Having taken "Introduction to Microsoft Word" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

### **Computing for Seniors**

Thursday, August 2nd, 1:00-3:00 p.m.

This class is reserved for senior citizens. The contents will be similar to Introduction to the Personal Computer. A large portion of the class will be dedicated to answering questions and problems that could benefit the entire class.

### **Understanding Your Computer 3**

Wednesday, August 8th, 7:00-9:00 p.m.

This class will cover more advanced hardware topics such as using drivers, learning to install, remove, and update components of the computer, as well as understanding the basics of how they work. (Having taken "Understanding Your Computer 1 & 2" is strongly recommended.)

### **Introduction to Microsoft Word**

Thursday, August 16th, 1:00-3:00 p.m.

This class is aimed at those with little or no experience using Microsoft Word. Topics such as creating and saving files, formatting, and editing documents will be covered. There will be time available for questions and specific problems related to Microsoft Word. (Having taken "Understanding Windows 1" or equivalent experience is recommended.)



### Intermediate Excel

Wednesday, August 29th, 7:00-9:00 p.m.

This class will be an extension of Introduction to Microsoft Excel, elaborating on the topics introduced there. Formulas, graphs, and linking will be covered here. (Having taken "Introduction to Excel" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

### **Understanding Windows 1**

Thursday, August 30, 1:00-3:00 p.m.

This class will provide a basic understanding of how to use Windows. Topics such as using the desktop, manipulating windows, and understanding files will be covered. This class is intended for those with little to no knowledge of computers.



### **Intermediate Microsoft Word**

Saturday, September 1st, 2:00-4:00 p.m.

This class is intended for users who have some experience with computers and Microsoft Word. It will cover how to use the more advanced options available in Microsoft Word 2000. Lecture will include using outlines, adding images, and other formatting/design topics. (Having taken "Introduction to using Microsoft Word" is recommended.)

This six-session course will cover a wide range of computer topics. It is intended to give seniors a strong foundation in computing, teaching them general computer/Windows principles, using the Internet, and familiarity with Microsoft Office products. The skills learned here will help to prepare the student for whatever computing task interests them. Please see the following Course Outline for more information.

### Computer Programs for Adults & Seniors (continued)

### **Senior Computer Course Outline**

### Sessions 1 and 2:

- Very basic introduction to computers and how to use them. Topics such as learning how to use disks and CD-ROMs, becoming comfortable with the mouse, using windows, and running programs.
- •Discussion will continue over first two classes with recommended practice exercises given after both session 1 and 2.

### Sessions 3 and 4:

- These two classes will introduce seniors to using the Internet. Basic understanding of connecting and using the World Wide Web will be covered as well as more detailed E-Mail questions and introducing more complicated Internet topics such as downloading, searching, and using multimedia products online (music, movies, games, etc.).
- The third class will cover most of the topics covered in "Introduction to the Internet and E-Mail" with a few changes to better suit the class. In the fourth session we will fill in E-Mail and Browser details missing from the third session and begin with the complicated topics discussed above.

### Sessions 5 and 6:

• The final two sessions of this course will introduce the Microsoft Office Suite, paying particular attention to MS Word but also introducing products such as Excel, Power Point, and Publisher, while discussing the Office environment. These classes should provide enough comfort to get started in any MS Office program.

# Introduction to the Internet and E-Mail

Wednesday, September 12th, 7:00-9:00 p.m.

This class will introduce participants to the Internet, including navigating with the browser. Creating an email address and using e-mail will also be covered. (Having taken "Understanding Windows 1" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

### **Understanding Your Computer 1**

Wednesday, September 19th, 7:00-9:00 p.m.

This class is the first of three sequential courses in which we will cover more advanced topics than those discussed in Understanding Windows or Introduction to the PC. This class will continue over three separate classes and will allow more time for explanations. Topics to be covered include: Windows functions such as using/installing software, finding and organizing files, and more. We will also discuss basic hardware ideas and how to use disks, CDs, and the hard drive. (Having taken "Understanding Windows" is recommended.)

### **Introduction to Excel**

Wednesday, September 26th, 7:00-9:00 p.m.

This class will cover the basic concepts of creating and using spreadsheets. (Having taken "Introduction to using Microsoft Word" or equivalent experience is recommended.)




