
The Business Tents will feature local commercial exhibitors, and will be open at various times throughout the Fest.





Mosquitoes Bugging You? 10 Quick Tips for Keeping Them Under Control

Bloomingdale Township, by contract with Clarke Mosquito Control, is the agency responsible for mosquito abatement services throughout the Township, which includes the Village of Bloomingdale. The product used by Clarke is environmentally safe for use in residential areas. This product is used in very low doses and therefore is considered not harmful to most adults, children and household pets. If there is any concern of allergy or of chemical sensitivity, residents can request to be placed on a call list for advance notice of pesticide use. Residents may report these and any other concerns directly to Clarke Mosquito Control at its "Mosquito Hotline," 1-800-942-2555.

Mosquitoes and summer go hand-in-hand. Mosquitoes are known transmitters of encephalitis, malaria and yellow fever to humans, and heartworm to pets.

A few simple preventative actions, if performed by all residents, can help reduce mosquito populations and breeding grounds, since many generations of mosquitoes can breed right in your own yard.


Standing water means you could be raising mosquitoes. While adult, flying mosquitoes may rest in tall grass and shrubbery, they do not develop there. All mosquitoes need water to begin and complete their life cycle. Some mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water where they hatch in just a day or two. Other mosquitoes may lay their eggs in old tires, tin cans, or other water-holding containers. The eggs may remain unhatched for weeks or even months until they are covered with water! Minimizing locations of standing water may reduce potential breeding ground for mosquitoes.

YARD & HOME CHECKLIST

- Remove and properly dispose of old tires, tin cans, buckets, drums, bottles or any water-holding containers.
- Fill in or drain any low spots in your yard such as depressions or ruts, which create puddles.



- Keep yard drains, swales and culverts clear so water will drain away.
- Cover trash containers to keep out rain water.
- C Repair leaky outside faucets.
- Empty plastic wading pools at least once a week and store indoors when not in use.
- □ Make sure your backyard pool is properly cared for while on vacation.
- Fill in tree rot holes and hollow stumps that hold water with sand or dirt.
- Change the water in bird baths and plant pots or drip trays once each week.



 Keep grass cut and shrubbery trimmed around the house.

Together we can minimize potential breeding grounds and increase our enjoyment of the great outdoors.

Check That Calendar Before You Turn on the Sprinkler!

The Village is required by our Lake Michigan Water allocation to have a water conservation ordinance. The Village's Water Conservation and Control Ordinance is in effect each year between May and September. This ordinance limits use of automatic sprinkling devices and encourages conservation. The ordinance allows single-family residential use of automatic sprinklers for ODD numbered addresses on Monday, Wednesday, and Saturday from 5:00 A.M. to 9:00 A.M. or 5:00 P.M. to 9:00 P.M. Single family residences with EVEN numbered addresses, commercial, governmental, industrial, and office buildings are allowed on Tuesday, Thursday, and Sunday during the same time periods. Use of any automatic sprinkling device on Friday is not permitted.



Mosquitoes and the West Nile Virus

West Nile Virus, a disease transmitted by mosquitoes, was first discovered in the Chicago area in 2001 after making its first U.S. appearance in New York City in 1999. The virus, which can cause encephalitis, is transferred when mosquitoes that have bitten a bird carrying the virus then bite a human. Crows, blue jays and hawks appear to be highly sensitive to West Nile Virus. For humans, the only risk of contracting West Nile Virus comes from mosquito bites – it is not spread by person-to-person or bird-to-person contact.

Symptoms of the disease are initially similar to the flu, with muscle weakness and disorientation. Though the majority of those infected will have mild symptoms or no symptoms at all, in some individuals, West Nile Virus can cause inflammation of the brain (encephalitis) and in severe cases, paralysis, coma or death. The disease is most serious – even fatal – in those with compromised immune systems and the elderly.

What Can Residents Do?

In addition to the preventative measures listed above, Clarke Mosquito Control offers the following advice to residents to help protect themselves against infection and assist in the fight against West Nile Virus:

■ Inspect all window and door screens to be sure they're "bug tight".

■ Stay indoors at the times when mosquitoes are most prevalent: morning, dusk, and early evening. When you are outdoors, cover up with long pants and a long-sleeved shirt.

■ Use insect repellents. Repellents deter mosquitoes from biting when applied properly to exposed skin and clothing. Apply mosquito repellent with DEET in accordance with label directions.

Call to Have Dead Birds Tested

DuPage County Health Department is accepting dead blue jays and crows for testing.

Residents who find a dead blue jay or crow that appears to have died as a result of natural causes should contact Public Works Maintenance at 671-5800. We will assist residents in retrieval of the dead bird and provide notification of the DuPage County Health Department.

DuPage County Health Department offers this useful information for distinguishing crows from other birds with black feathers:

Adult crows are about 17 to 21 inches in length; they are all black including feathers, beak, legs and feet.

Grackles are also all black, smaller than crows, but larger than a robin (11 to 13 inches in length). The head has a purple or green iridescent sheen; the rest of the body is black or brown-black. The eyes are yellow. The tail feathers are nearly as long as its body.

Starlings are robin-sized birds with black spotted feathers, yellow beaks and yellow feet.



Village Bloomingdale Storm Water Management Activities

Subsequent to significant storms of September and October last year, the Village of Bloomingdale has been actively constructing a variety of storm and sanitary sewer projects to help mitigate the recurrence of flooding. The restoration work on projects that commenced in November of 2001 have recently been completed. These projects included:

Municipal Properties Storm Drainage Project

A joint venture to improve drainage collection and increase storm runoff capacity of the system serving the Village Hall/Public Library/Fire District Properties.

Local Storm Drainage Improvements

159 W. Schick Road – replace failed drain tile2262 Thrasher – installed yard drain3322 Cardinal – replace failed storm drain0Install additional valve to weir plate at Lake Illini Outfall

270 Thrasher – replace failed french drain 378 Meadowlark – installed yard drain Cardinal/Eagle – install pipe diverters

219 Lehigh/214-218 Lynbrook – provided inlet in rear yard and storm sewer

Sanitary Sewer Projects – Suncrest Subdivision

Euclid Avenue Sanitary Sewer Extension

Extend Sanitary Sewer from intersection of Euclid/Lake North under Lake Street to existing sewer near Springbrook. Contract awarded to Nickolson Construction, Inc. of South Elgin in the amount of \$101,406.87. Pending the receipt of permits from the Illinois Department of Transportation and the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency, work is scheduled to begin on June 15th with pipe installation completed at the end July and final restoration in September.

Overhead Sanitary Sewer Grant Program

Since October 2001, three residents have participated in the Village program to convert existing sanitary sewer services to 'overhead' services. For more information regarding this program contact Village Services – Utilities Division at 671-5830.


Sanitary Sewer Televising, High Pressure Cleaning and Sanitary Manhole Lining

Considerable infiltration and inflow of stormwater into the Suncrest Subdivision Sanitary sewer system from foundation drains, downspouts and directly into the collection system itself, unfortunately caused flooding of some residences last fall. In response, and also as part of routine maintenance, the Village cleaned, televised and performed root cutting and grease removal maintenance on 6,138 feet of sanitary sewer. Further, as part of on-going system maintenance over the past two fiscal years, the Village has constructed manhole lining on a total of 59 sanitary manholes to minimize the infiltration of stormwater into the sanitary system.

Village-wide on-going projects include sanitary sewer cleaning and TV inspection, sealing both sanitary sewer pipes and manholes found to allow undesirable infiltration of storm water. Also, the Village is researching the feasibility of a foundation drain disconnection program for the Suncrest subdivision which would facilitate the separation of foundation drain connections to the sanitary system that contribute to flooding in the subdivision.

2002 Culvert Repair Project

The Village needs to repair several large diameter corrugated metal pipe arch culverts in the Westlake Subdivision. The repairs, scheduled to begin in June, consist of the removal of debris and deteriorated pipe material from the bottom of the existing culverts, and placement of a reinforced concrete liner to restore the structural integrity to the nearly 30-year old culvert pipes. All work can be accomplished from the inside of the culvert, minimizing any disruption to traffic. Neighbors can expect only infrequent and partial lane closures. The culvert locations include twin culverts beneath Glen Ellyn Road between Byron and Edgewater, and single culverts crossing beneath Lakeview Drive between Edgewater and South Circle; Lakeshore Lane at Clearbrook; Edgewater Drive east of Royce and Greenway Drive at the west side of Winnebago School. The Contractor for the project will be Parkway Construction of Lewisville, Texas in the amount of \$165,800.



Village of Bloomingdale NOTICE TO WATER & SEWER CUSTOMERS

After nearly 12 years of service, Nicor Gas will begin eliminating its meter reading division and terminate its agreement to read the Village's water meters as of June 30, 2002. As a result, we will be going through a transition period until new, automated radio frequency water meters can be installed. During this transition period the Village must find other ways to collect water meter reading data. The water meter readings are necessary to determine your bill amount for both water and sanitary sewer services.

Over the past 18 months, the Village has been studying and evaluating alternative meter reading systems, as well as the age of all the water meters that are installed in the homes and businesses in the Village. This evaluation has determined that nearly 45% of the meters are older than 15 years and that the most efficient, economical and accurate way to collect water meter reading data is with water meters equipped with radio transponders. This type of water meter is capable of signaling a data collection device located in a vehicle or carried by a person as the device "drives-by" the water meter. The device collects water consumption data from your water meter via radio frequencies and stores the data in a memory pack. This data can then be used by the Village's utility billing software to prepare your bi-monthly water & sewer bill. This process has the advantage of increasing meter reading accuracy and significantly reducing the labor costs associated with collecting water meter readings.



The timeframe to convert to this automated radio read system is projected to be about two years and will begin this Fall. As you might imagine, it is a very involved process that will require direct access to the over 7,000 water meters that are installed in the homes and businesses in the Village. Because Nicor is ceasing its meter reading operation and the projected two year timeframe to convert meters, we are faced with the transition period discussed above. We fully appreciate the need to develop a convenient, practical and economical way to collect water meter readings. The solution may consist of a combination of ways, such as:

- 1. "Phasing-out" Nicor's water meter reading operations,
- 2. Hiring other contractors to read water meters,
- 3. Involving our staff to assist beyond their current customer service responsibilities,
- 4. Preparing estimated water & sewer bills based on each individual customer's billing history, and
- 5. Researching the potential of asking you, the customer, to read your water meter and submit it to the Village. If you are asked to read your water meter, we will attempt to make it as convenient and economical as possible for you to send your water meter reading to the Village.

Living with Wildlife

The presence of wild animals in our village reflects their ability to adapt to the urbanization of their native habitat. Although it may seem that these wild animals use this urban environment at the expense of their human neighbors (creating a disturbance or causing property damage, earning the "nuisance" wildlife reputation), these animals are behaving naturally.

In an effort to limit human-wildlife conflicts, we encourage homeowners to take the following preventive action:

- Do not feed wild animals.
- □ Keep pet food/water dishes inside, especially at night.
- □ Clean up spillage from bird feeders.
- Keep grills/barbecues clean; even the smallest food scraps may attract wild animals.
- □ Keep trash cans inside if possible; if this is not possible, place ammoniasoaked rags on top of the lid and secure with bungee cords.
- Trim tree limbs that provide easy access to your roof.
- □ Repair broken, weak, or rotted areas on your roof, soffit and fascia.
- □ Install and maintain chimney caps.
- □ Use welded wire to exclude animals from underneath decks, elevated sheds, openings under concrete slabs and porches.
- Secure outside access to crawl spaces.
- □ Cover window wells (if an animal falls in, carefully place a roughened board into the window well at a 45∞ angle so the animal can climb out).



Fire in the United States

The U.S. has one of the highest fire death rates in the industrialized world. For 1998, the U.S. fire death rate was 14.9 deaths per million population. Between 1994 and 1998, an average of 4,400 Americans lost their lives and another 25,100 were injured annually as the result of fire. About 100 firefighters are killed each year in duty-related incidents. Each year, fire kills more Americans than all natural disasters combined. Fire is the third leading cause of accidental death in the home; at least 80 percent of all fire deaths occur in residences. About 2 million fires are reported each year. Many others go unreported, causing additional injuries and property loss. Direct property loss due to fires is estimated at \$8.6 billion annually. (Source: U.S. Fire Administration)

Safety on Wheels

Playing where you live is lots of fun, but you need to play safely. Obey the safety rules for everything that you do.

Wear protective gear before you use any kind of roller skate or a skateboard. When you skate you should wear a helmet, elbow pads, wrist guards, gloves, and kneepads. Remember not to wear anything that keeps you from seeing or hearing well. Don't hitch rides on the back of buses, cars, trucks, or vans, and don't skate at night. Skate in a safe place. Avoid places where there is water, oil, sand, gravel or dirt. Never skate where there are cars. In order to have the safest and most enjoyable time skating, take lessons or learn from someone who can teach you the basics of turning, braking, stopping and controlling your speed.

About 1,000 American bicyclists die in crashes every year, about three-fourths of them die from head injuries. Hundreds more suffer permanent brain damage. Most of these head injuries can be prevented with bike helmets. When you ride a bike, be sure to wear a helmet that fits well and feels comfortable. It can protect you from serious injury in case of an accident. Fasten the strap securely. The helmet should sit evenly on the top of your head, not slide around your head or pull off with the strap fastened.

Before you ride your bike, check that: the **seat** is secure; the **wheels** have no loose or broken spokes; the **tires** are inflated to the proper pressure (this is printed on the tire); the **brakes** work smoothly and quickly; the **handlebar** is tight and in the correct position; **reflectors** are clean and on tightly; and that there are **no cracked parts** on the bike. If you find any problems, let your parents know immediately so they can decide if your bike is safe enough to ride. If there are any questions, have your bike inspected by a bicycle mechanic.

Be aware of traffic. Stop, look left, look right, and then left again for cars and other moving objects before leaving a sidewalk, driveway, or alley. Enter the roadway only when it is clear. When you ride in traffic, you can maneuver better than the cars around you. Most bicyclists get into accidents because they are tempted to ignore traffic rules. Being predictable is the key to safe bicycling in traffic. The basic rules for riding predictably are: **Get Smart** – know the rules, **Be Confident** – learn riding skills and always be courteous, and **Communicate** – make eye contact, signal your moves, and wave when someone yields.

By wearing the proper protective equipment at all times and being aware of what's happening around you, you can have a safe and enjoyable summer on wheels.



This six-session course will cover a wide range of computer topics. It is intended to give students a strong foundation in computing, teaching them general computer/Windows principles, using the Internet, and familiarity with Microsoft Office products. The skills learned here will help to prepare the student for whatever computing task interests them. Please see the following Course Outline for more information. This class series requires a \$60 deposit (\$10 per class)

Seniors Computer Course Outline

Sessions 1 and 2:

Very basic introduction to computers and how we use them. Topics such as learning how to use disks and CD-ROMs, becoming comfortable with the mouse, using windows, and running programs. Discussion will continue over first two classes with recommended practice exercises given after both session 1 and 2.

Sessions 3 and 4:

These two classes will introduce participants to using the Internet. Basic understanding of connecting and using the World Wide Web will be covered as well as more detailed E-Mail questions and introducing more complicated Internet topics such as downloading, searching, and using multimedia products online (music, movies, games, etc.). The third class will cover most of the topics covered in "Introduction to the Internet and E-Mail" with a few changes to better suit the class. In the fourth session we will fill in E-Mail and Browser details missing from the third session and begin with the complicated topics discussed above. Sessions 5 and 6

The final two sessions of this course will introduce the Microsoft Office Suite, paying particular attention to MS Word but also introducing products such as Excel, Power Point, and Publisher, while discussing the Office environment. These classes should provide enough comfort to get started in any MS Office program.

Understanding Your Computer 2

Wednesday June 12, 7:00 p.m. – 9:00 p.m. Instructor: Sean

Class will cover more advanced Windows topics such as changing settings, manipulating/customizing toolbars, properties screens and startup/recovery disks. (Having taken



"Understanding Your Computer 1" or equivalent experience is strongly recommended.)

Introduction to the Personal Computer

Saturday June 15, 2:00 p.m. – 4:00 p.m. Instructor: Sean

Those with little or no knowledge of computers will benefit from this class. Skills and techniques to perform basic functional operations with a computer will be covered.

Introduction to Microsoft Access

Wednesday June 19, 7:00 p.m. – 9:00 p.m. Instructor: Sean

This class will provide a basic understanding of using Microsoft Access. Topics such as creating Tables, Queries, Forms, and Reports will be covered. (Having taken "Introduction to Microsoft Word" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

<u>Understanding Windows 1</u>

Saturday June 22, 2:00 p.m. – 4:00 p.m. Instructor: Sean

This class will provide a basic understanding of how to use Windows. Topics such as using the desktop, manipulating windows, and understanding files will be covered. This class is intended for those with little to no knowledge of computers.

Introduction to Microsoft Excel

This class will cover the basic concepts of creating and using spreadsheets. (Having taken "Introduction to using Microsoft Word" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

Using the Internet

Saturday July 13, 2:00 p.m. – 4:00 p.m. Instructor: Sean

This course will cover all from the most basic Internet questions and topics to more intermediate material such as search engines and downloading. This class is intended for those with little or no computer experience.

Intermediate Microsoft Access

Monday July 15, 7:00 p.m. – 9:00 p.m. Instructor: Sean

This class will cover more advanced topics such as Edit Masking, creating Modules, and using Wizards. (Having taken "Introduction to Microsoft Access" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

Intermediate Excel

Wednesday July 17, 7:00 p.m. – 9:00 p.m. Instructor: Sean

This class covers more advanced topics in Excel such as formulas, graphs and linking between multiple worksheets. (Having taken "Introduction to Microsoft Excel" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

Outlook can be much more than just an E-mail program. This class will introduce many of the different functions and tools that Outlook provides. (Having taken "Introduction to Microsoft Word" and "Introduction to the Internet and E-Mail" is recommended.)

Monday July 22, 2:00 p.m. – 4:00 p.m. Instructor: Sean

This class will be aimed at those with little or no experience using Microsoft Word. Topics such as creating and saving files, formatting, and editing documents will be covered. There will be time available for questions and specific problems related to Microsoft Word. (Having taken "Understanding Windows 1" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

Understanding Your Computer 3


Wednesday July 24, 7:00 p.m. – 9:00 p.m. Instructor: Sean






