
The parade at noon brought out the crowds and an incredible number of community groups. I think this was probably our best parade to date! You can see pictures on the back page.





## Fire and Police Bear Sale Continues





## 2003 Tree Planting Planting Program

The Village Board has again allocated funds for this very successful program which was started in 1982. For the fourth year, additional funds have been included for business/commercial properties. The program provides trees, including planting, at a 50/50 cost sharing with the Village. The trees will be planted next Spring and are available for street parkways, residential front yards and business/commercial properties. Business/commercial properties that wish to participate should contact Larry Slavicek, Urban Forester, at 671-5803 or slavicekl@vil.bloomingdale.il.us.

The following are the guidelines of the program:

- □ Since the budget is limited, the program will be on a first-come, first-served basis. Requests should be submitted by December 1, 2002. No payment is required at this time. Bills will be sent about February 1, 2003.
- $\Box$  Trees will be 2 1/2 inch caliper, unless stated otherwise. Trees will be quality nursery stock but not specimen plants.
- ☐ The Village reserves the right to disapprove requests based on conflicts, safety, or proper spacing.
- ☐ Removal of dead trees, stumps and/or large roots is not included and must be performed by participants before March 15th.
- ☐ Each residential parcel will be limited to two trees per year. Each business/commercial property will be limited to four trees per year.
- ☐ Participants will be given the opportunity to mark the desired location for the tree; however, the Village retains the right to change the location, if necessary.
- ☐ We anticipate the cost of 2 1/2" caliper trees to be between \$250 and \$350 each, with the Village paying half of the amount.
- ☐ Trees will be guaranteed for one year. Participants are responsible for all watering which will be described in instructions furnished by the Village.
- ☐ For trees to be planted in the public parkway, this application will serve as the permit requirements of the ordinance regulating trees on public areas.

## Helpful Hints for A Safe & Happy Halloween

Help keep your favorite ghosts and goblins safe this Halloween by reviewing these important safety rules with your children.

- ☐ NO candy should be eaten until it has been inspected by an adult.
- Discard any unwrapped items.
- ☐ Check all food wrappers for signs of tampering.
- ☐ Keep costumes simple. Costumes should be made of light, brightly colored or reflective material, so that your trick-ortreater can be easily seen at night. Costumes should not restrict either vision or movement.
- ☐ At least one person in the group should carry a flashlight while trick or treating.
- ☐ Trick or treat in groups whenever possible, accompanied by one or more adults.
- ☐ Instruct your children not to enter any home, and don't invite anyone else's child into your home.
- ☐ For safety's sake, trick or treat only at homes in your own neighborhood.
- ☐ Remind children to cross only at corners, and to look both ways before crossing the street. Children should use sidewalks whenever possible, obey traffic lights, and walk -- never run -- across streets.

# **Bloomingdale Police Department Receives National Accreditation**

The Village of Bloomingdale proudly announces that the Bloomingdale Police Department recently received national accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA). Our department now joins an elite group of 515 law enforcement agencies to receive this prestigious international recognition. With 18,000 law enforcement agencies nationwide, only an approximate 2.8 percent of agencies realize this achievement.

There are three phases to the accreditation process which include self evaluation and a mock assessment, as well as an on-site evaluation conducted by a commission team. Following our on-site assessment this spring, our department was awarded accredited status.

The Bloomingdale Police Department received high marks for its community relations programs, such as Street Smart Seniors and the Citizen Police Academy. These were praised for providing excellent two-way communication with the community.

The benefits of accreditation include controlled liability costs, a stronger defense against lawsuits and citizen complaints, greater accountability within the department, increased community advocacy, as well as recognition which symbolizes professionalism, excellence and competence.

Congratulations are due to Police Chief Gary Schira, along with the 49 sworn and 20 civilian members of the department, for a job extremely well done.

# **Consider These Environmentally Friendly Options for Disposing of Leaves**

What can be done with all those leaves? The fall color show is ending and all those leaves are cascading down – clogging the gutters and smothering the grass. The old fall tradition of burning leaves is outlawed so most homeowners bag them up to be hauled away at additional expense.

What a terrible waste! Leaves can be such a simple garden chore and an extremely valuable resource. How sad to waste them by throwing them away and paying for the privilege.

Leaves are prime organic matter! Grind them up with the lawn mower or shredder and put them back on the garden. There will be no waste to bag up and pay to haul away. Note: Leaves, fruit and twigs from trees and shrubs which experienced a fungal disease this season should be raked and discarded to prevent reinfection next year.

Leaves left in their natural state tend to flatten and glue themselves together into an impervious mat, suffocating the plants and soil beneath it.

The leaves need to be broken up – both to prevent this mat from forming and to expose more surfaces to the beneficial organisms that speed decay. The tiny, bent pieces provide space for oxygen and water drainage. As leaves decompose, they add valuable nutrients to the soil.

Grinding leaves up very fine with the lawn mower and leaving them right on the lawn is a lot easier than raking, and provides a nutritional bonus. And the biggest benefit of all to recycling leaves on the lawn and garden is that it is worm food. Worms digest leaves and leave behind rich castings full of fertilizer that is perfect plant food, and their tunnels aerate the soil. A garden rich in worms is very healthy indeed.

Squirrels and survivalists know that leaves bunched together in a pile make

great insulation. This insulation quality can be used to protect delicate plants if the leaves are contained loosely in a wire cage around the plant – not piled on top of it. In spring, the leaves can be chopped up and used as mulch.

So, save some work and money by recycling your bounty of leaves.








#### **Bloomingdale Teens Win Country Fair Talent Contest**

## Did you know . . .

At any given moment, nearly 1,800 thunderstorms are in progress over the surface of the earth.

On average, the United States gets 100,000 thunderstorms each year. Approximately 1,000 tornadoes develop from these

storms.

The power of lightning's electrical charge and intense heat can electrocute on contact, split trees, ignite fires, and cause electrical failures.

More deaths from lightning occur on the East Coast. More forest fires are started in the West as the lightning season coincides with the dry season there.

Approximately 10,000 forest fires are started each year by lightning. Approximately \$100 million in annual losses result from forest and building fires caused by lightning.

## OPEN BURNING AND DISPOSAL OF LANDSCAPE WASTE

The DuPage County Board adopted the <u>DuPage County Waste Management</u>

Ordinance on March 22, 1988. Landscape waste means all accumulations of grass or shrubbery cuttings, leaves, tree limbs, and other materials accumulated as the result of the care of lawns, shrubbery, vines and trees. Open Burning means the combustion of any matter in the open or in an open dump. Refuse means waste of all kinds. (definitions from Ordinance OWR-001-90, the <u>DuPage County Waste Management Ordinance</u>).

#### What is Allowed:

Open burning shall only be allowed for recreational purposes. This is defined as an outdoor fire utilized to cook food for human consumption. Approved containers for cooking are those that are UL Listed and commonly associated with cooking, such as common barbeque grills.

Fires in approved containers shall be permitted, provided that they are not less than 15 feet from any structure. Approved containers are defined as UL Listed containers designed for this purpose. Examples are the Weber outdoor fireplace or other similar listed devices.

Any open burning shall be constantly attended until the fire is extinguished. Fire extinguishing equipment such as dirt, sand, garden hose, etc. shall be available for immediate use.

Within the village's boundaries, all open burning shall be confined to approved containers designed for the designated purpose.

On a case by case basis, masonry barbeque grills (not in-ground pits) will also be permitted for cooking purposes only.

If you want to have a bonfire for recreational, religious, or other purposes, you must first obtain a permit to do so and receive approval from the appropriate fire district and community development department.

#### What is *Not* Allowed:

It is unlawful for any person to cause or allow any open and uncontrolled burning of landscape wastes in the Villages of Bloomingdale and Glendale Heights or unincorporated DuPage County.

It is unlawful for any person to cause or allow the burning of any refuse including landscape waste in any chamber not specifically designed for the purpose and approved by the Illinois EPA.

It is unlawful for any person to cause or allow the open dumping or disposal of any waste, including landscape waste, at any site in Bloomingdale, Glendale Heights or unincorporated DuPage County, except at a site approved by the Illinois EPA.

It is unlawful for any person to abandon, dump, or deposit any waste, including landscape waste, upon the public highways or other public property, except at a site approved by the Illinois EPA.

The Bloomingdale Fire Protection District #1, and village and county officials shall have the final approval for open burning, and in certain cases may determine that the fire needs to be extinguished for health and safety reasons.



This year's 108 adult and 22 teen participants read a total of 774 books. Also, going along with our travel theme this year, participants read a total of 144 related books. Thanks to all who registered for the program and to our local sponsors who provided many wonderful prizes.

This six-session course will cover a wide range of computer topics. It is intended to give students a strong foundation in computing, teaching them general computer/Windows principles, using the Internet, and familiarity with Microsoft Office products. The skills learned here will help to prepare the student for whatever computing task interests them. Please see the following Course Outline for more information.

## **Adults Computer Course Outline**

#### Sessions 1 and 2:

Very basic introduction to computers and how we use them. Topics such as learning how to use disks and CD-ROMs, becoming comfortable with the mouse, using windows, and running programs.

### Introduction to Word

Saturday, Oct. 5 2:00 p.m. - 4:00 p.m. Instructor: Sean

This class will be aimed at those with little or no experience using Microsoft Word. Topics such as creating and saving files, formatting, and editing documents will be covered. There will be time available for questions and specific problems related to Microsoft Word. (Having taken "Understanding Windows 1" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

#### **Intermediate Access**

Wednesday, Oct. 9 7:00 p.m. - 9:00 p.m. Instructor: Sean

This class will cover more advanced topics such as Edit Masking, understanding relational databases, and using Wizards. (Having taken "Introduction to Microsoft Access" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

Discussion will continue over first two classes with recommended practice exercises given after both session 1 and 2.

#### Sessions 3 and 4:

These two classes will introduce participants to using the Internet. Basic understanding of connecting and using the World Wide Web will be covered as well as more detailed E-Mail questions and introducing more complicated Internet topics such as downloading, searching, and using multimedia products online (music, movies, games, etc.).

The third class will cover most of the topics covered in "Introduction to the Internet and E-Mail" with a few changes to better suit the class. In the fourth session we will fill in E-Mail and Browser details missing from the third session and begin with the complicated topics discussed above.

#### Sessions 5 and 6

The final two sessions of this course will introduce the Microsoft Office Suite, paying particular attention to MS Word but also introducing products such as Excel, Power Point, and Publisher, while discussing the Office environment. These classes should provide enough comfort to get started in any MS Office program.

### **Using Power Point**

Power Point can be used to create slides, overheads, audience handouts or on-screen presentations. This class will cover the basics of creating and organizing a presentation. (Having taken "Introduction to Microsoft Word" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

#### Introduction to Excel

This class will cover the basic concepts creating and using spreadsheets. (Having taken "Introduction to using Microsoft Word" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

## **Databases for Investors**

This program will explore the ValueLine.com database and the Business and Company Resource Center database. Participants will learn how to locate information in these databases that will help them make informed decisions about how to invest their money. We will explore the Value Line page, and learn how to research stocks and mutual funds. No investment advice will be given. Participants must be comfortable navigating the World Wide Web. Limit 12.

## Intermediate Excel

This class covers more advanced topics in Excel such as formulas, graphs and linking between multiple worksheets. (Having taken "Introduction to Microsoft Excel" or equivalent experience is recommended.)

This course will cover all from the most basic Internet questions and topics to more intermediate material such as search engines and downloading. This class is intended for those with little or no computer experience.

Instructor: Sean




